



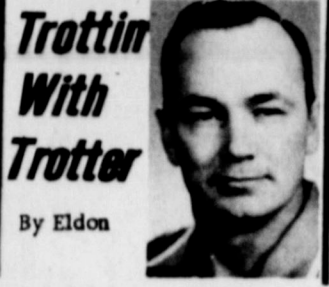

The Springlake High School Seniors will be given an occupational aptitude test Monday, February 18, 1963. This test is administered by the Air Force, and should prove very helpful in aiding Seniors to discover the occupation they are most suited for. These tests have proved extremely beneficial to the Air Force in helping to guide airmen to the jobs they were more naturally fitted for during their career in the service.

I'm sure our local seniors will agree after taking these, that they offer valuable assistance in choosing the most appropriate courses to follow when entering college.

I also understand that in early March, several Junior students (those highest in scholarship) will be taking the National Merit Scholarship Examination. To compete for this scholarship, students must have a 99+ average. (How many do you suppose will strive to make 99+ in order to compete with other ambitious Juniors throughout the nation?)

Local Seniors planning to attend college have been taking the American College Testing and Entrance Examinations at various colleges and universities. I understand that seniors should make reservations at least six weeks in advance.

Did you know that General Math is not recognized as a solid credit course for entrance into our colleges? At this time General Math has been replaced by Algebra I and 2. I understand Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Davis, Mr. Williams and Mr. Lawrence have been attending the Mathematics School Group courses at Lubbock. These courses are given to acquaint our teaching staff with the art of how best to present related mathematics I and II to the students. There are no textbooks available at this time, but they have been adopted for 1963-64 semesters. So, till such textbooks are available, Springlake will continue with two levels of algebra.

Who is responsible for these new recommendations? All those concerned with education in mathematics have a share in these changes. Elementary and secondary school teachers and college and university professors have participated equally in planning the changes and writing materials for classroom use and for the guidance of the teachers. There is much evidence to support the contention that in the past, we have not expected enough of our youth. Certainly, students in other countries have been able to learn more at an early age than we have expected here. Even the person who does not use math directly should know enough of the subject to appreciate its values and limitations so that he may be an intelligent voter, an understanding reader of current news and literature and be an active participant in the molding of our civilization.

Lamb County's Annual Junior Livestock Show scheduled for February 15 and 16 in Littlefield will see a record number of entries this year.

Judging will begin at 5:30 p.m. February 15 and 9 a.m. February 16.

Premiums will include \$200 for Grand Champion Steer; \$100 Reserve Champion Steer; \$75 Grand Champion Swine; \$50 Reserve Champion Swine; \$25 Grand Champion Sheep; \$15 Reserve Champion Sheep.

All animals must be in place no later than 1 p.m. February 15. Barns will be open from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. February 14 to receive animals.

Trophies furnished by Lamb County Farm Bureau and Lamb County Farmers Union will be awarded to the Grand Champion and Reserve Champion Steers and Swine and three Champion Lambs.

Olton Swine Breeders Association will give trophies to the Grand Champion Swine of each breed.

The Shetland Pony judging will begin at 7 p.m. February 15th.

The show will contain three classes: Class I, Horse and filly foaled in 1962; Class II, Mares foaled in 1961 or before and under 42 inches in height; and Class III, Mares foaled in 1961 or before and over 42 inches to 46 inches in height.

Premiums will include trophy and \$10 for Grand Champion, trophy and \$7.50 to Reserve Champion; \$5 to 1st in each class, \$3 to 2nd in each class and \$1 to balance of class.

Coleman Cowan of Lubbock will serve as judge of the Shetland Show. Euel Linn, Lubbock, will be beef and swine judge and J. C. Lane, Amarillo, will judge sheep.

Floyd Burgess, Earth is swine superintendent, assisted by Bill Boyles, Sudan, Raymond Duval, Amherst; W. W. Hall, Bill Kimbrough, Littlefield, Max Malone, Olton; Pat Bradley, Spade and Glen Gipson, Hart Camp.

Finis Branham, Littlefield will be sheep superintendent, assisted by Robert Akin, Raymond Lewis and Archie May all of Olton.

Show managers are Jerry Sanders, Jim Black and Marshall Howard, Littlefield.

Shetland Pony superintendent is Luther Shelton. Amherst assisted by Robert Akin, Raymond Lewis and Archie May all of Olton.

### PTA Program Will Feature Lubbock Speaker February 21

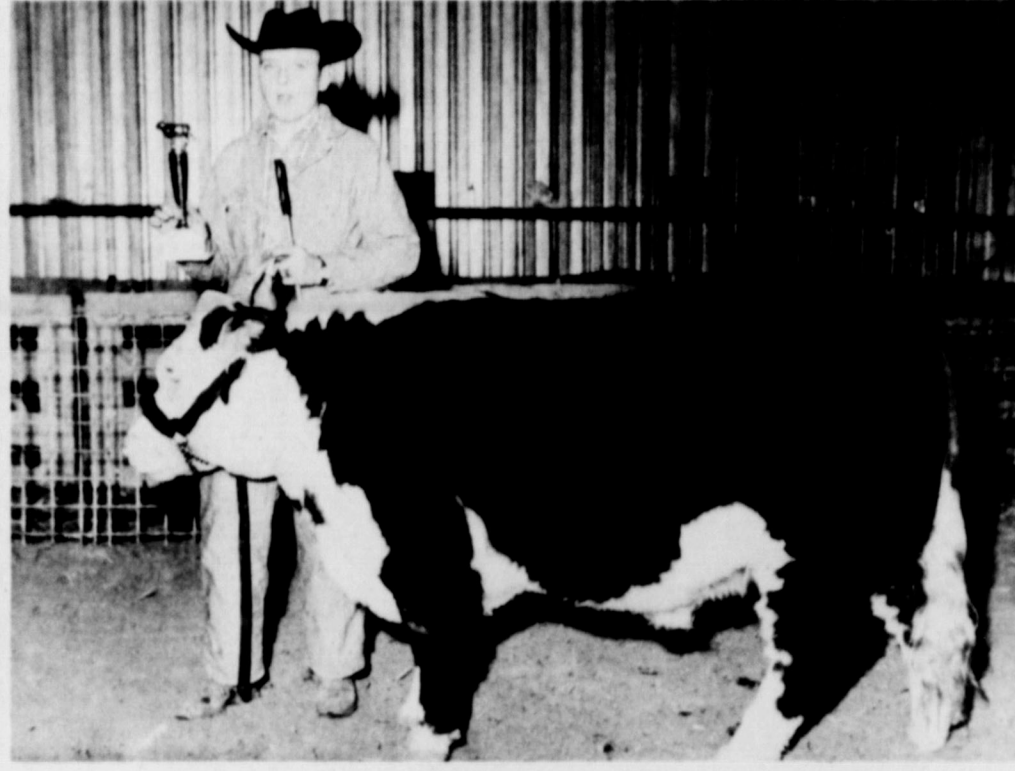

Damron, President of the Cooperative from Circle Back will preside at the meeting. A financial report, a progress report, and the general condition of the Cooperative will be discussed. The Cooperative has recently had a complete engineering study made of the area it serves and has found several hundred people who still desire telephone service. In order to supply the service, it has been necessary for the Cooperative to request a loan from the government through the Rural Electrification Administration. The application for this loan was made in December. At the present time, there are not adequate toll and extended area service lines; agreements have been reached with the General Telephone Company for additional lines. Not only do the agreements provide for what is considered adequate facilities for the present but also for the next ten years.

## Burglars Enter Parish Residence And Star Cafe

Burglars have been busy again in Earth with two recent break-ins reported.

The first robbery report was at the Gus Parish residence on the South Amherst Highway. The break-in occurred about 5 p.m. Saturday while the Parish's were in town. Entry was gained by breaking a glass storm door in the breezeway.

Thieves made off with one purple ladies coat, one navy blue suit, one 2-piece black dress, 4 jersey dresses, several slips, one set of pearls valued at \$25 and one other pearl necklace.

## All Districts Involved Have Signed Co-sponsorship Agreements For R. W. D.

W. E. Mitchell, Chairman of the Lamb County Soil Conservation Board, said that everything was looking good for the Running Water Draw Project. All the Districts involved have received signed co-sponsorship agreements with counties and cities involved. The SCD's are now awaiting the State Soil Conservation Board to set a priority on the project. The State Soil Conservation Board will set a priority on an engineering planning party to survey and select site locations for the reservoirs. Conservation funds will be available when the survey is completed.

There are meetings planned in the near future for the Steering Committee to plan just the type of structures to be considered in this project. The public will be urged to attend these meetings. There will be possibilities of developing multi-purpose structures for recreation and municipal uses.

Mr. Aubry Dalripple, Field Engineer for the State Board recently informed Mitchell that since Public Law 566 became effective in Texas in 1956, over 184 applications for

assistance have been received. Twelve of which were received during 1962 program year. The State Soil Conservation Board is the organizational agency in Texas to receive these applications and take necessary action on them. Up to date, 117 applications have been approved and of these, 55 have priorities set on them.

Planning Facilities in Texas have been the biggest holdup for up to now there is only one State and one Federal Planning Party. There is also a State Party operating on Trust Funds.

But at best, these parties can complete only four or five projects a year.

Something the local people can do is to attend and support the project at the hearings, showing that they are ready to get started.

Also it is very important that the land in the watershed have a Conservation agreement developed with the local Soil Conservation Districts. It is necessary that the watershed be protected by conservation practices to prevent siltation of the reservoirs.

## FTA Is Formed At Springlake High School

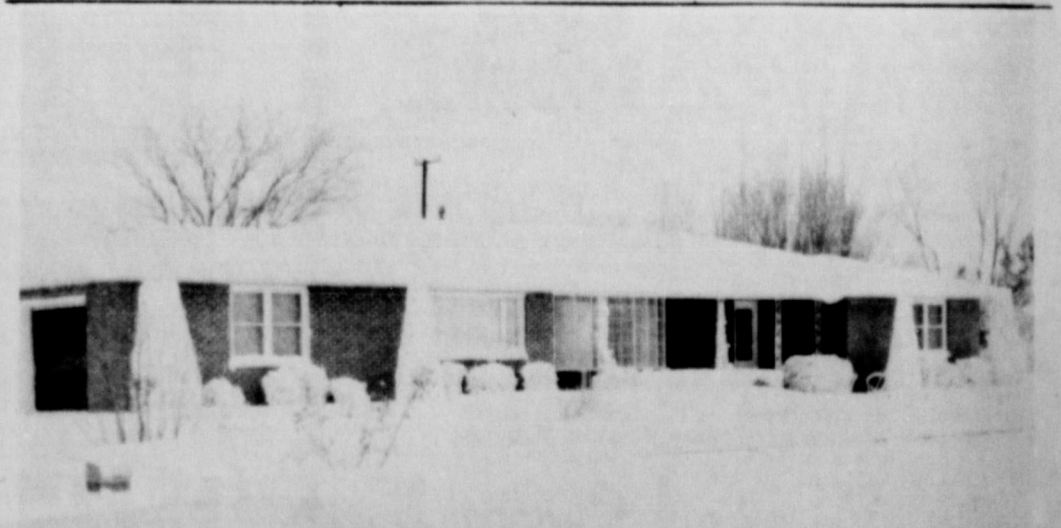
The Future Teachers of America is a recently organized club at Springlake High School having been organized by the Campbell Chapter of Olton High School.

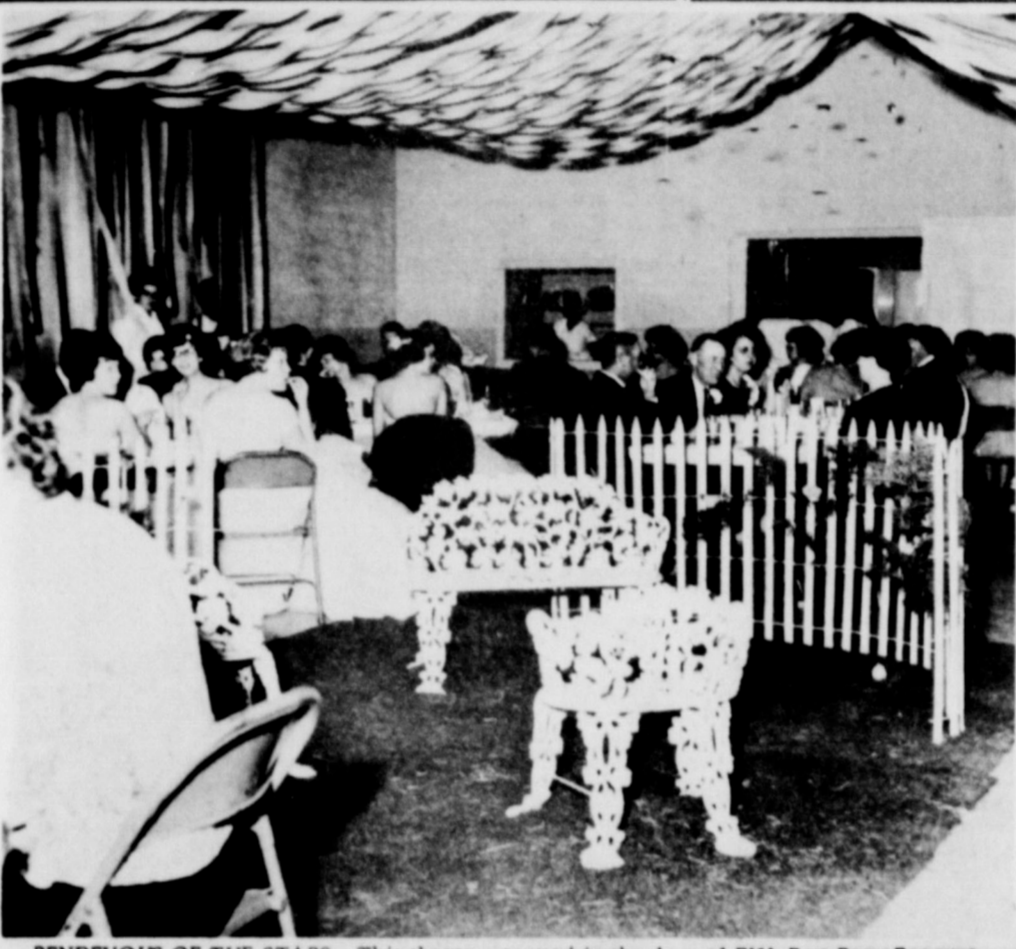

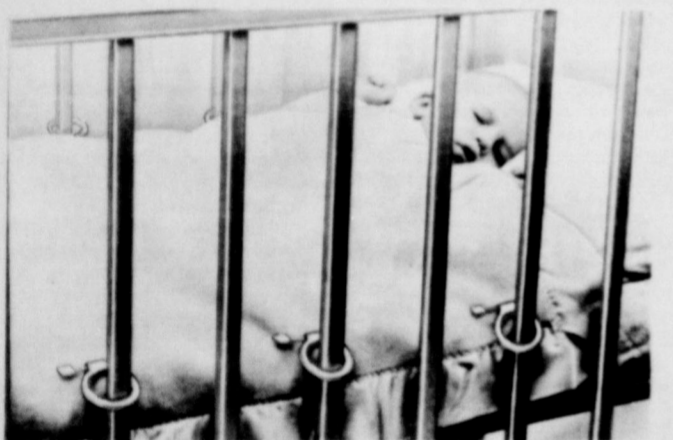

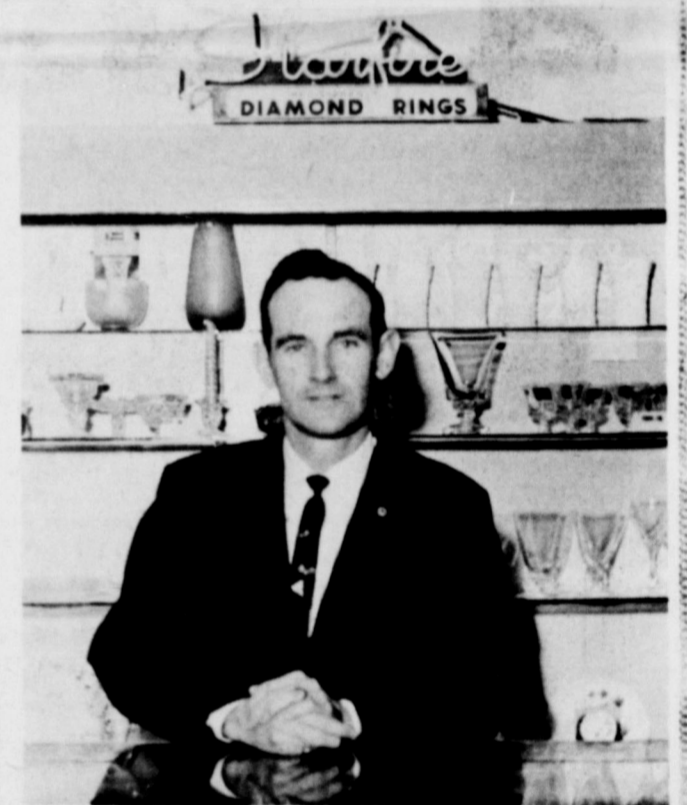

I enjoyed covering your games this year, boys, you played well and had great sportsmanship. I'm looking forward to covering more of your games next year.



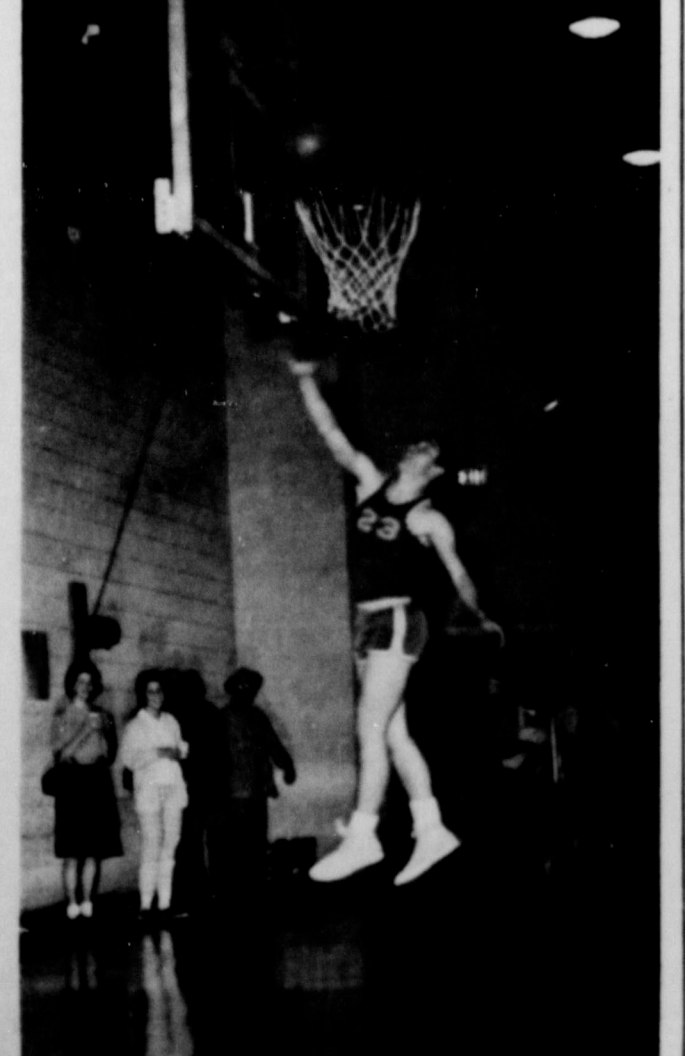
LOOK, I'M FLYING!!... Shown here is Dale Dent taking a shot. Rocky Cain is getting ready to rebound.

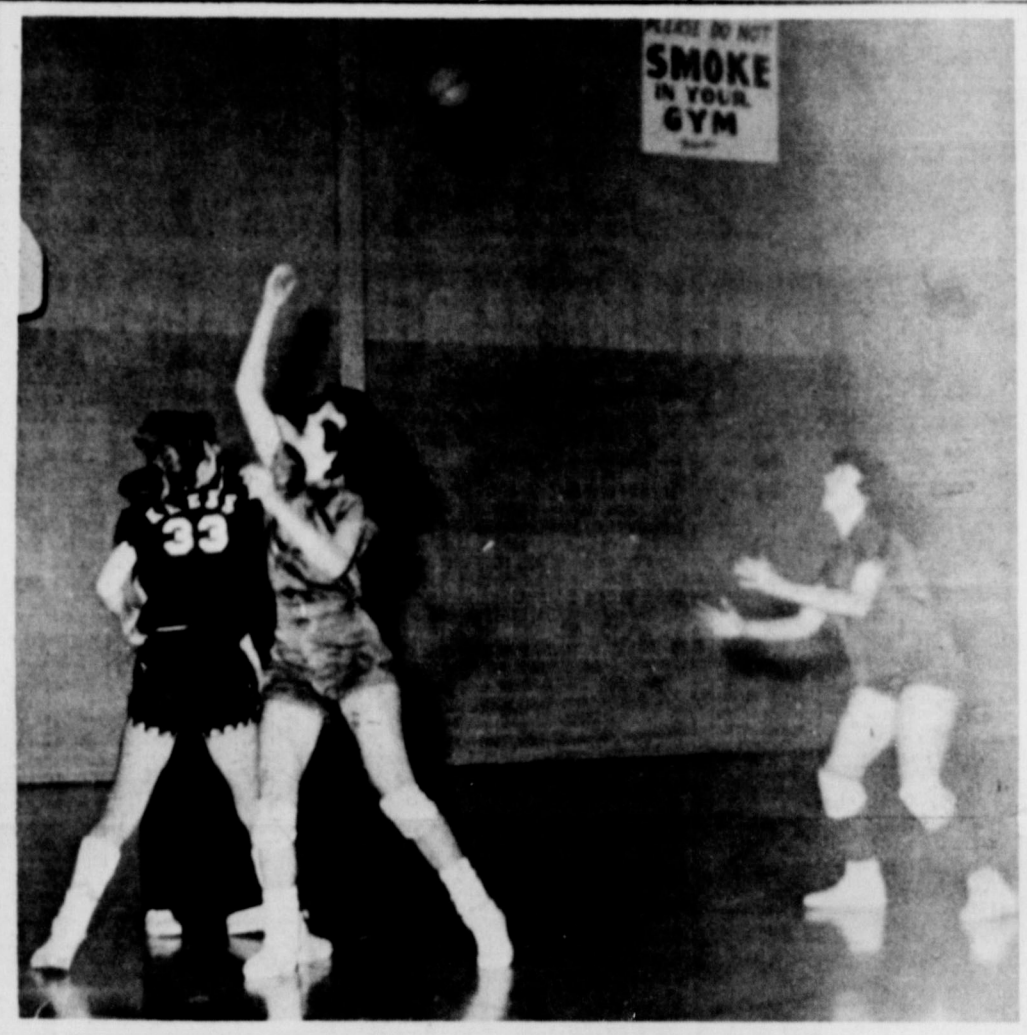
the buzzer sounded, and Springlake had broken the jinx with Kress---coming out on top, with the score of 38-36.

An unweighted mullet sank gently into the azure Gulf of Mexico. Raymond Muchowich was holding his light, two-handed rod intently and watching the bait vanish into the depths. Suddenly, the monofilament snapped taut.

Almost simultaneously Muchowich yanked back on the rod. The tip heeled over and throbbed. The small star-drag reel whirled in protest as a speedy king mackerel (kingfish, if you prefer) ripped off monofilament. Muchowich yelled gleefully as the streamlined fish bored deep. It paused somewhere out in the desolate vastness of the gulf and Muchowich gained back some line only to lose it again, as the king made another frantic run.

After several matching rushes the king settled down to a tenacious battle of give-and-take. Finally, Muchowich worked the king to a spot alongside the boat and we could see its outline in the clear water.

The boat captain stood poised with the gaff.  
Suddenly the fish made one last feeble rush for freedom. Muchowich smudged the line up tight and brought the fish twisting to the surface.

Then it was that the captain struck swiftly with the gaff and brought 15 pounds of flouncing kingfish aboard.

Muchowich looked around and grinned. "What did I tell you?" he chortled. "Great sport, no?"  
I didn't have time to answer because I was busy battling one of the sporty fish with my freshwater spinning outfit. On the light tackle it was cutting all sorts of capers.

Muchowich had brought me out in the gulf to demonstrate the popular new concept of king-fishing.

Most kings are caught by trolling, using derrick-like tackle that will quickly sap the strength of even the largest of them.

Muchowich, who operates a fleet of charter fishing boats out of Freeport, prefers to anchor on an offshore reef and cast for the kings with light tackle. It's immaterial to him whether he fishes with artificial bait such as a large wobbling spoon, or with natural baits like frozen mullet or live shrimp.

When using the natural baits he fishes without any weight on the line so the bait will sink slowly toward the bottom.

"The kingfish makes his best showing on that first, fast run," Muchowich explained. "When the boat is moving and you're using heavy tackle, the fish hasn't got a chance. You kill its spirit before it has an opportunity to show what it's made of."

"But on light tackle . . . well that's something a fisherman really must try in order to appreciate it."

And appreciating it, I was. As the javelin-shaped fish came up grudgingly from the depth, I realized that this mode of king fishing was indeed sporting.

It used to be that guides along the Texas coast tried to fix things so that their clients could

catch the greatest amount of fish in the shortest time possible. But after awhile some guides got to thinking that such wholesale slaughtering of fish, most of which were left to rot on the docks, was only depleting the available supply.

Now many fishermen are changing their technique. They are going to light tackle. Most such tackle is not much larger than that used to catch bass on inland lakes and streams. True, this type of sport fishing decreases the size of the catch. But it increases the fun. And it definitely is more sporting.

Ideal rig for this type fishing is a medium to stiff freshwater or light salt-water outfit, either conventional or spinning, equipped with about fifteen-pound test line.

A reel with built-in drag is preferred since it is almost impossible to stop the mad rush of a king by biting down on the reel arbor with your thumb without losing several inches of skin.

Kingfish are found in tremendous numbers along the Texas coast. Usually they put in an appearance in May (Memorial Day normally signals the beginning of the peak kingfish run). And they stick around until early fall.

They are caught near offshore reefs or alongside offshore oil rigs, or in similar spots where their favorite food is abundant.

It is well to remember that kings run in large schools and where one is caught, usually you'll take several.

Many anglers troll until they pinpoint a school, then they

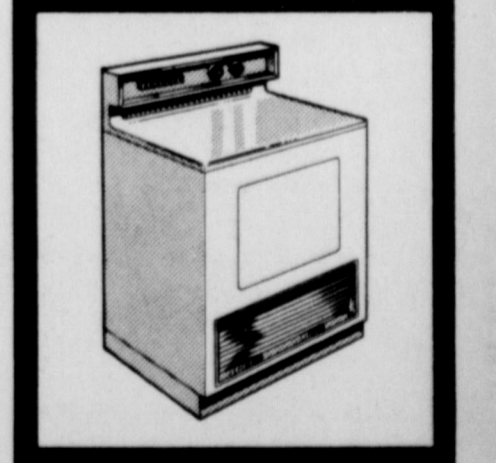

## All-Time High Is Reached As Boy Scout Membership Nears 5 1/2 Million

On the eve of its 53rd anniversary, observed February 7 to 13, the Boy Scouts of America announced it attained an all-time high in membership on December 31, with an active membership of 5,322,467 boys and leaders according to word received by Charles Alexander, President of South Plains Council.

Joseph A. Brunton, Jr., the Chief Scout Executive, told local Scout officials that 1962 closed with 3,909,485 boys registered, a gain of 96,258 or 2.5 percent during the year. Mr. Brunton also said there are 1,412,682 adult leaders in the movement, a gain of 11,327 or 0.8 percent.

In Cub Scouting, a program for boys eight, nine, and ten years of age, there are 1,892,797 boys, a gain of 24,104 or 1.3 percent. There are 1,708,707 Boy Scouts, 11 and older a gain of 50,514 or 3.0 percent.

Explorers in posts, ships, and squadrons total 307,381, young men 14 and older, a gain of 21,640 or 7.5 percent.

On December 31 last year there were 135,389 units, a gain of 2,763 over the previous year, or 2.1 percent. There are not 50,106 Cub Scout Packs, 63,314 Scout troops, and 21,969 Explorer units.

Since its founding 53 years ago (February 8) the Boy Scouts of America has ended each year with a gain in membership. Since 1910, there have been 36,058,864 boys and leaders identified with the Boy Scouts of America.

The South Plains Council, Boy

Scouts of America ended 1962 with 12,339 boys and adult leaders enrolled. There are a total of 301 units, of which 15 are Cub Scout packs, with 4691 Cub Scouts, 147 Boy Scout troops with 3877 Boy Scouts and 39 Explorer units with 523 Explorers enrolled.

## Scout Troop And Leaders Attend Methodist Church

National Scout Week was climaxed Sunday in Earth with the attendance of approximately 25 scouts of Troop 614 and their leaders at the Sunday morning services at the Earth Methodist Church.

Eagle Scout Arboth Rylant was recognized as Top Ranking Scout of the troop and the fact was pointed out that he also holds a Certificate of Merit awarded by the Boy Scouts of America for saving the life of little Ann Arter in December, 1961.

Scoutmaster Travis Jaquess and assistants W. J. Rylant, Sr. and Oran Parish, attended with the boys.

Scouts were active in Earth and Springlake Saturday as the members in uniform busily fined drivers and pedestrians for violations of traffic laws. About \$90 was collected in fines and the money will be used to re-charter the troop.

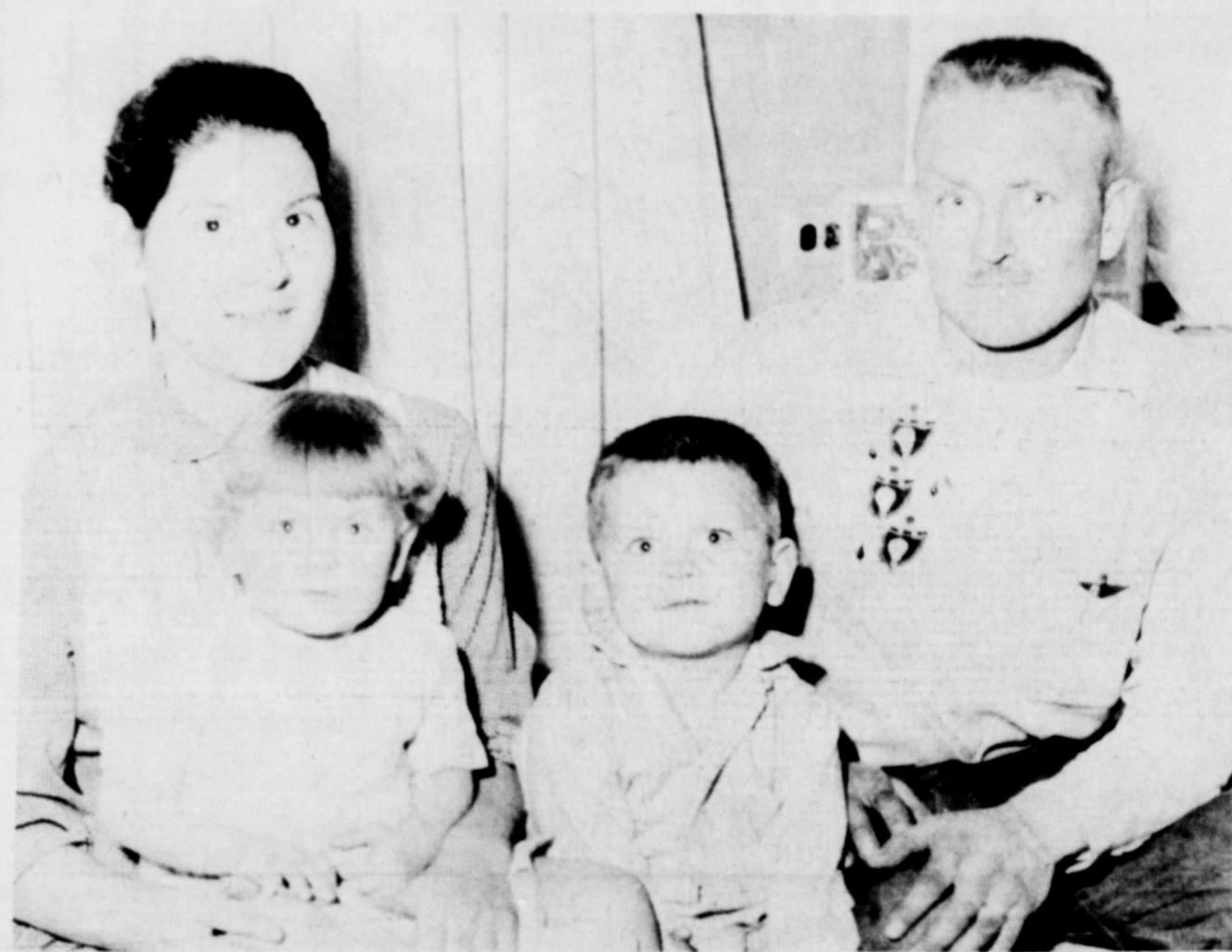

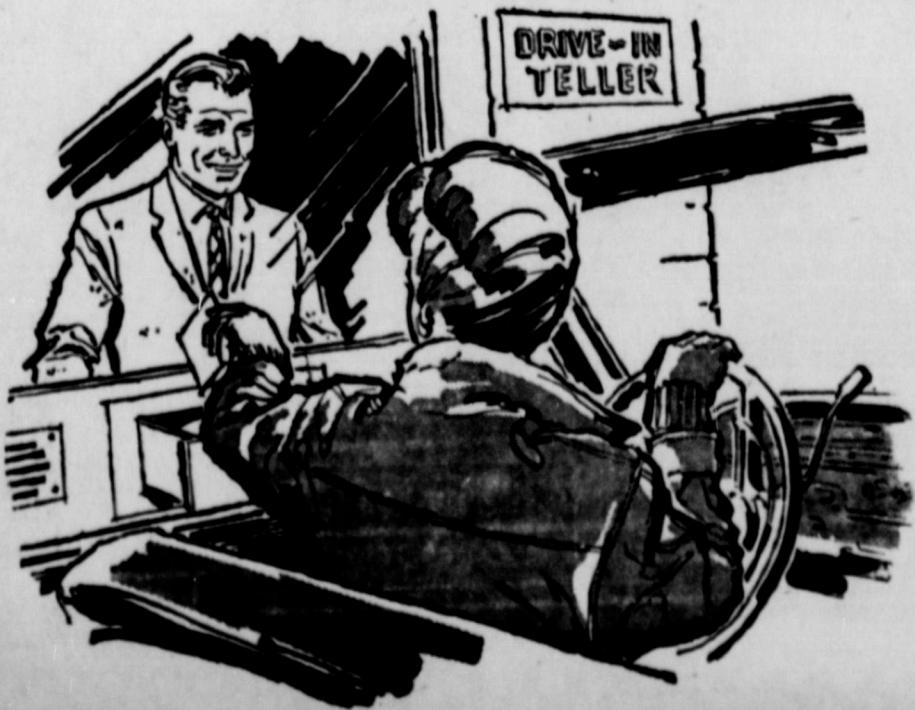

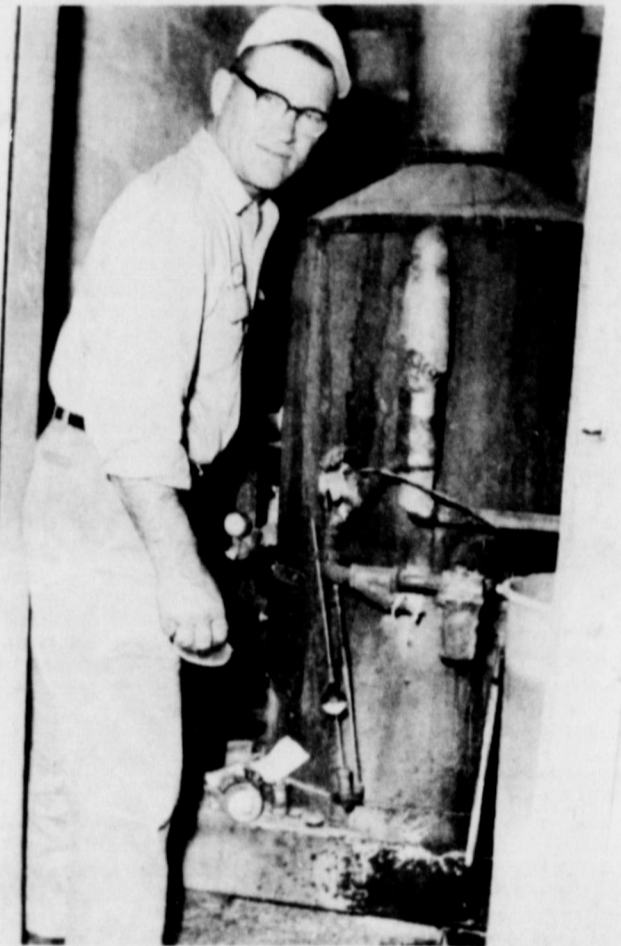

## Educational Television Shows Rapid Growth With Seventy-five Stations

If educational television has done anything, it has swept away whatever lingering reservations anyone had about its ability to grow, according to Changing Times, the Kiplinger Magazine.

An article in the current issue of the magazine reports that the medium, "hardly more than a controversial dream ten years ago," now counts 75 stations on its roster, with a potential audience of around 70 million. "There are even those who visualize the time--10 or 15 years hence--when technological change will make room for hundreds more ETV operations and when ETV stations will outnumber their commercial cousins."

Nevertheless, Changing Times finds that ETV has yet to gain the acceptance it needs to advance beyond the hand-holding stage in its courtship with the public. Citing a 1961 survey, the article notes that only \$12 out of every \$100 donated to ETV was obtained from local business, civic and individual contributions. Although the total program cost of educational television stations nationwide is about equivalent to the cost of one network series on commercial television, to get even modest sums ETV has had to scrape and beg and solicit--from government, schools, foundations, businessmen and the donating public.

"Few of the ETV stations have come into existence with out a monetary crisis or bitter controversy," the article continues. "But fortunately for ETV, its financial troubles have been alleviated with the help of a very generous angel the Ford Foundation. As of the last count, the Foundation had donated a total of \$76,500,000 to all of ETV, and there is no evidence that this rich well is about to run dry."

The magazine notes that ETV leads a dual life. "During the day, most stations are school teachers. At night or in the afternoon they assume the role of dispensers of culture, dealing almost exclusively in the arts, sciences and contemporary affairs."

"As a teacher, ETV rates straight A's in some areas but sweats to attain a 'gentleman's C' in others." As a cultural ambassador to the nation's homes, ETV's role and success

are not so readily appraised, the magazine continues. Its reach is high, its goals are ambitious, "but they are beginning to be achieved."

Tomorrow? The article reports that a study for the Dept. of Health, Education and Welfare visualizes as a minimum, doubling ETV's present coverage at a cost of \$30,000,000 for stations and \$15,000,000 annually for operations. Thousands more schools will tie in with ETV. A major goal: to bring ETV to the 150 urban areas with population in excess of 100,000 and 270 areas with populations over 50,000 that now have no educational stations.

"As it drives ahead, ETV will reflect and review, decide where its weaknesses lie and where its strength," the article concludes. "In ten years it has accomplished much. It has demonstrated its practicality and provided evidence of its value as a new medium of education and enrichment for Americans. Now its assignment is to broaden its audience, to gain the public welcome that it has thus far missed."

## Interest Charges Are Deductible For Income Tax

There's hardly a consumer who doesn't buy something on credit, yet many of them overlook the interest charges when figuring their annual income tax, according to Changing Times, the Kiplinger Magazine.

An article in the current issue of the magazine, which suggests ways taxpayers can trim the annual debt to Uncle Sam, reminds readers that finding another \$100 to \$200 of deductions can save at least \$20 to \$40 in taxes.

"Interest paid on your auto loan, home mortgage, life insurance policy loan or other debt is deductible," the article points out. So is any penalty paid to speed up mortgage payments or retire a mortgage. Taxpayers who own stock in a cooperative apartment can deduct a portion of annual payments as interest. And interest on back taxes finally paid to the Federal, state or local governments is deductible.

"Perhaps you bought on the installment plan," the article continues. "The interest charge often is included in the 'carrying charge' and not stated separately. In that case, deduct as interest 6% of the average unpaid monthly balance during the year. Check the rules on just how to figure it out."

Finally the article advises taxpayers who borrowed on a "discount" loan to remember to include the charges. "Say you got \$1,809 cash on a \$2,100 loan and paid back \$70 monthly for 30 months. You are actually paying \$7 a month interest which is deductible--the \$210 discount divided by the 30 months."

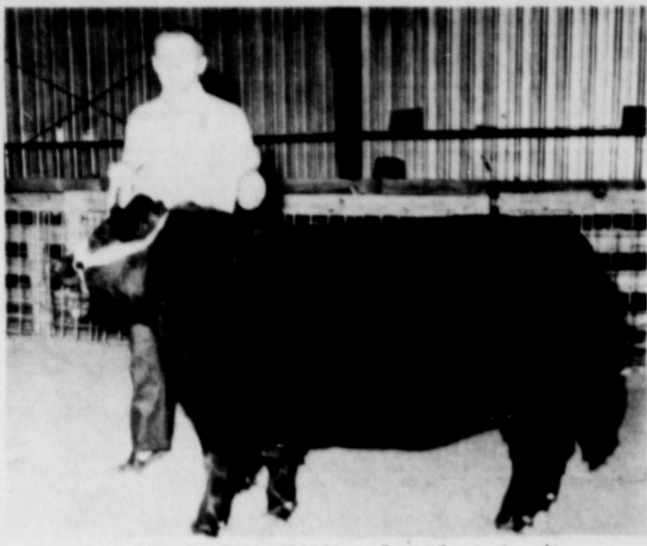

## State Office Transfers To DPS In State Capitol

AUSTIN--Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today the transfer of the Office of Defense and Disaster Relief from the Governor's office to the DPS has been completed.

Garrison, who has been designated by executive order as Coordinator of Defense and Disaster Relief, named George Busby, Chief of the DPS Inspection and Planning Division, to direct the activities of the new office.

C. O. Layne, DPS Inspector for Civil Defense, will act as Busby's deputy.

"The Department of Public Safety has taken over this function as agent for Governor John Connally and will conduct it consistent with the existing policies of this department," Garrison said.

"We will work with local and federal officials in a concerted effort to increase the effectiveness of the defense and disaster relief program.

Busby has served as Chief of the Inspection and Planning Division, one of the four major divisions of the department, since September, 1957. The division conducts studies and research into new programs in police science, develops test areas and promotes pilot studies of suggested programs, and makes field inspections.

A native of Karnes County, Busby entered the department as a Highway Patrolman in February, 1963 and was stationed at Dallas. He subsequently served at Sherman, San Antonio, Uvalde, and in 1941 was promoted to sergeant and was stationed in Austin. A year later he was promoted to captain and stationed at Dallas.

In 1951 when the Motor Vehicle Inspection law was enacted, Garrison created the Motor Vehicle Inspection Division and appointed Busby as its chief. He served in that capacity until his appointment as chief of Inspection and Planning in 1957.

Layne, who was born at Munday in Knox County, joined the Highway Patrol in April, 1938, and was stationed at Amarillo. He was transferred to Dallas in 1942 and in February, 1943, was promoted to sergeant and stationed at Pecos. He was transferred to El Paso in 1945, serving there until his promotion to captain in March, 1947.

As captain in the Highway Patrol, Layne served at Pecos and Beaumont, and was promoted to Inspector for Civil Defense in January, 1956.

In this capacity he has served as liaison officer representing the DPS in matters of defense and disaster preparedness between the department and the Governor's office and has worked with city and county officials in the development of local defense programs. During periods of disaster, Layne has coordinated field information and department services.

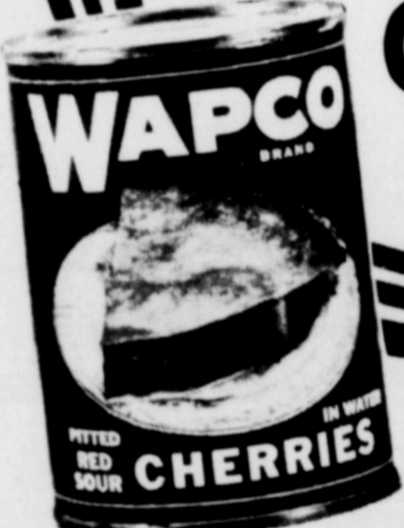
