

TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1960, but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 21:

- 1. Phone Superintendent at No. 4321 and ask for a census blank.
- 2. Call in person at the school Tax office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school ndw. If he is six but not 18 or older on next Sept. 1st he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most often overlooked in the census.

Please read the census blank carefully, fill it out completely, and return it by your child next day to the teacher. Thank you.

In this same period there have been upward trends in non-agricultural prives, in coasumer incomes in business investments and other factors that contribute to a growing demand. The results of the large supplies of agricultural commodites have been lower prices to farmers, larger government stocks of farm products and lower re tail food prices to the consumer than otherwise would have occurr

Total agricultural output of farm and ranch products in 1959 probably set a new record, slightly above the 1958 output and about 25 per Study club will be held Tuesday, McHaney said agricultural output in 1959 might have been larger except for the Conservation Reserve, which retired 22.4 million acres from production.

Mothers planning long drives with children will find touring can be child's play—if the youngsters are pleasantly occupied. It's easy. When you pack, be sure to include toys and activity materials suited for your children's ages.



For three-to-seven-year-olds, picture books, blocks and paper and crayons are always welcome as well

crayons are always welcome as well as practical in the limited space of a car. Industrious little girls will enjoy wooden weaving looms and dolls with travel wardrobes in small suiteases. Boys of the same age should be delighted with tiny rubber or soft plastic cars or airplanes. Playing or picture cards and hand puppets are good, too.

Older children, from 8 to 12, are easier to keep entertained and retain their interest in a particular toy or game longer than the younger fry. Keep their interests up with activity books, drawing pads and puzzles. A number of board games have been made with magnetic or pegged pieces—excellent for use in moving cars. To rest eyes and provide diversion, try guessing and number games. "Twenty Questions" is always good. Avoid toys which might distract the driver, such as yo-yo s, balloons, balls and poise makers. Never parties.
