Twelve people were there to hear Mrs. Patricia Vogler of Hereford speak on "Textbooks in our Schools.

She reported on the new "Innovations in Education". Some of these bring Sensitivity training. Sex Education, Humanistic Psychology, and Fading Textbooks. (no homework).

Books shown encouraged suicide, murder, filthy language and disrespect for parents. Also a complete tearing down of any belief in God was also shown.

The sex education books that are being recommended and used in some of our nation's schools we would not allow in our homes. Also the pictures and wording would not be allowed in our newspapers. It is porncgraphy in the rawest form.

It was reported that in some schools, homework is not given, thereby keeping the parent from finding out what the child is learning.

We are fortunate that we live in Texas and have the opportunity on the local level for our books to be reviewed by a local review board.

However, here are a few things we can do to help stop the "River of Pollution" both locally and nationally. Check what your child is reading and studying. and keep a check on the school sex education program.

On the national level, Senator Edward Zorinsky is sponsoring a bill called the Parental Consent Amendment. It is called the (Elementary and Secondary Education Act.) for prior informed written parental consent for federally funded programs dealing with the student's values, attitudes and beliefs.
