Improved Mail Delivery Services Possible

Postmaster Harold D. Miller said today that a new order from Postmaster General Winton M. Blount will mean substantial improvement in mail delivery services.

Postmaster General Blount has advised the local postmaster of provisions of a new order making home delivery services available for the first time to 4 million Americans.

The service improvement applies to persons served out of 18,700 first, second and third class post offices over the country that do not have city delivery services. Affected are those postal customers living more than a quarter mile away from these offices and less than half

a mile away. Persons living less than half a mile away previously had not been provided this service.

Discussing the local area effects of Mr. Blount's new order, Postmaster Miller explained, "Anyone who lives more than 4 blocks from the post office are eligible if they meet the other requirements."

To get the new service it is only necessary that those living in the eligible areas ask their postmasters to provide it, and a majority of those to be served must want the home service.

Under Mr. Blount's order, those living less than a quarter mile from the post office will continue to pick up their mail at these offices.

"But," the postmaster noted, "this order, however, will make the home deliveries available wherever desired by the majority of those living beyond a quarter mile."

"This distance factor can be significant for much of the year in areas where severe weather conditions prevail; in areas where large numbers of older persons are living, or in more remote sections where even a little distance may mean a lot in terms of travel difficulties."

The expansion of services should be virtually complete in

all of the affected delivery service areas under actions taken by postal regional offices, acting on recommendations of local postmaster-by February, 1971.

It will be accomplished principally by adding delivery stops to already existing rural routes, or by expanding the areas served by some shorter rural routes for the purpose, and a limited number of new rural routes may also be needed in other instances.

The fact that fewer persons will be calling at post office for their mail will not alter the independent status of any of the post offices where the service change is provided.

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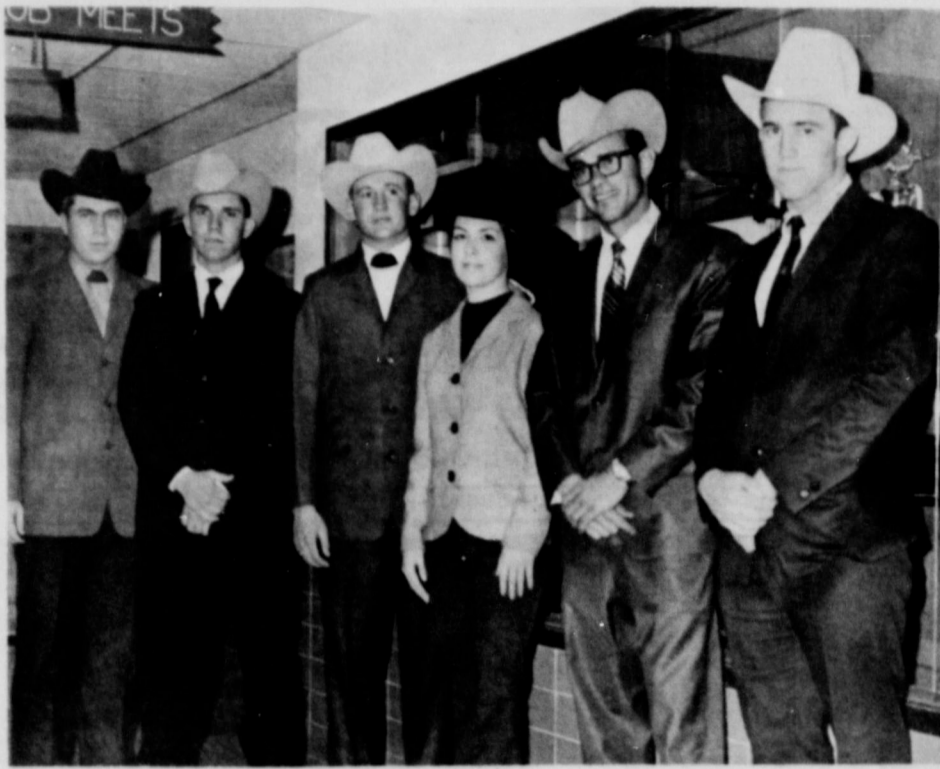

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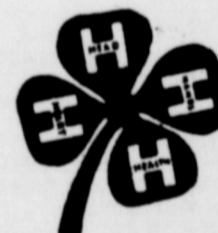

Bardwell Striped Bass Are Doing Well

CORSICANA--More than 20,000 striped bass fingerlings, averaging three to four inches long, were stocked in Lake Bardwell during 1969, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Biologists for the Department report the fish are doing well in the 6,000-acre Ellis County lake, and should provide excellent fishing this spring.

Fishermen who have latched on to these salt water transplants report that they fight harder, pound for pound, than any other sport fish.

Stripers up to 14 inches long and 23 ounces have been caught so far, and biologists say it is

possible that the fish stocked in Texas water will reach 20 to 30 pounds.

The fresh water record was caught in Georgia and weighed 63 pounds.

Fishermen recovering striped bass should report their catches to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. A one-per-day limit is in effect on Bardwell for stripers.

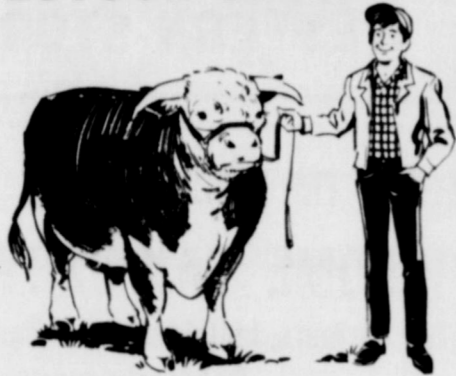

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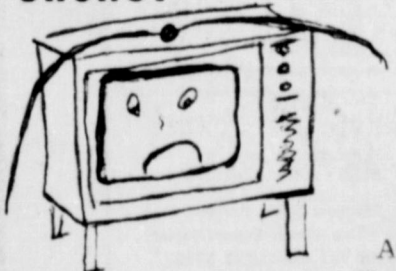
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Pruda Sanders Honored With Bridal Shower

13 Accidents In Lamb During January

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 13 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffler, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$8,925.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock DPS Region for January, 1970 shows a total of 460 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed, 188 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$648,408 as compared to January, 1969 of 447 accidents resulting in 26 persons killed, 260 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$424,881.

The Sergeant reminded all motor vehicle owners that still have their inspection stickers on the lower right-hand side of their windshields that April 15 is the deadline for having the new sticker placed on the lower left-hand side of their windshields. The Sergeant also stated only about 35 per cent of the registered vehicles in the surrounding area have been inspected.

D. P. S. Launching Program To Stop Unlicensed Drivers

Department of Public Safety is launching a statewide program emphasizing driver licensing. A study showed that many of the serious traffic accidents involved unlicensed drivers.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS director, said the drive is in conjunction with Gov. Preston Smith's coordinated traffic safety program. Studies revealed that 9.6 per cent of drivers involved in fatal accidents were unlicensed. Here's what the program will undertake immediately:

- Urge all drivers to see that they are properly licensed.
- Provide for periodic, frequent license checks by patrolman.
- Develop special training schools for those who need more knowledge and skill to qualify for driver licenses.
- Urge employers in large plants and business establishments to encourage employees to obtain proper licenses, particularly those moving to Texas from other states.
- Safety groups and local agencies will be called on to aid.

Early Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus Infections Damaging

College Station--Texas A&M University researchers have found they can measure the degree of grain sorghum yield loss caused by Maize Dwarf Mosaic

Virus and pinpoint it to the time of infection.

Dr. R. W. Toler, Texas A&M plant virologist, said the research was conducted to determine the effect of inoculation time of Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus on crop characteristics of a tolerant and a susceptible grain sorghum.

The virus caused reduction in yield, delay in maturity, stunting and lowering of test weights of both hybrids. Additionally, the susceptible one showed reduction in head size, threshing percent and number of heads produced. Percent protein of the susceptible hybrid also increased, Toler said.

Seed size and weight of 1,000 seed (or specific gravity) were not affected by the virus. Toler said the effects of the virus were dependent upon the particular hybrid and the time of inoculation.

Generally, the earlier in the growth cycle that virus infection occurred, the greater was the effect of the virus. For most sorghum plant characteristics, the Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus had no effect when inoculation was made after 40 to 47 days of growth, Toler concluded.

Co-workers with Toler on this research were Robert D. Barte, A&M graduate student, and Dr. A. J. Bockholt, plant breeding researcher at Texas A&M.

ATTEND CHURCH

Cigarette Smokers Beware!

Cancer researchers said Saturday they have laboratory evidence that proves for the first time that cigarette smoking causes cell damage in the larynx or voice box.

The cell damage increases with heavier smoking, they reported.

Earlier, "strikingly similar" cell damage had been found in the bronchial tissue of the lung and the tissue of the esophagus in smokers.

The findings in all these cases, the scientists said, are consistent with statistical studies linking death rates from cancer to smoking habits.

Further, the scientists reported finding more evidence suggesting that cells damaged by smoking repair themselves in persons who have stopped smoking.

Report In Journal

The larynx study was carried out by researchers from the Veterans Administration Hospital in East Orange, N. J., and the American Cancer Society. A report appears in the latest issue of the journal Cancer.

Dr. Oscar Auerbach, senior medical investigator at the hospital, and pathologist at New York Medical College, said the study was made on larynxes taken at autopsy from 971 men who died at the hospital from causes other than larynx cancer between November 1964 and December 1967.

The cell changes, including some early cancer, were 'highly related to smoking habits,' Dr. Auerbach said. He listed these findings:

Findings Listed

- All of the 519 men who smoked at least one pack of cigarettes a day had cell damage in some part of the larynx.
- Among those who smoked two or more packs a day, 85 per cent had more advanced cell damage.
- Four of the 159 who smoked at least a pack a day had cancer of the vocal cord that had not been detected before death.
- The cell changes increased in proportion to the number of cigarettes smoked per day before death.
- The changes occurred to a greater degree in cigarette smokers than in cigar and pipe smokers.



BASIC CAUSES—"Our government today is following the same path toward national insolvency that over the past years was followed by Great Britain, a policy which last year resulted in the devaluation of the pound," said Sen. John J. Williams (R-Del.).

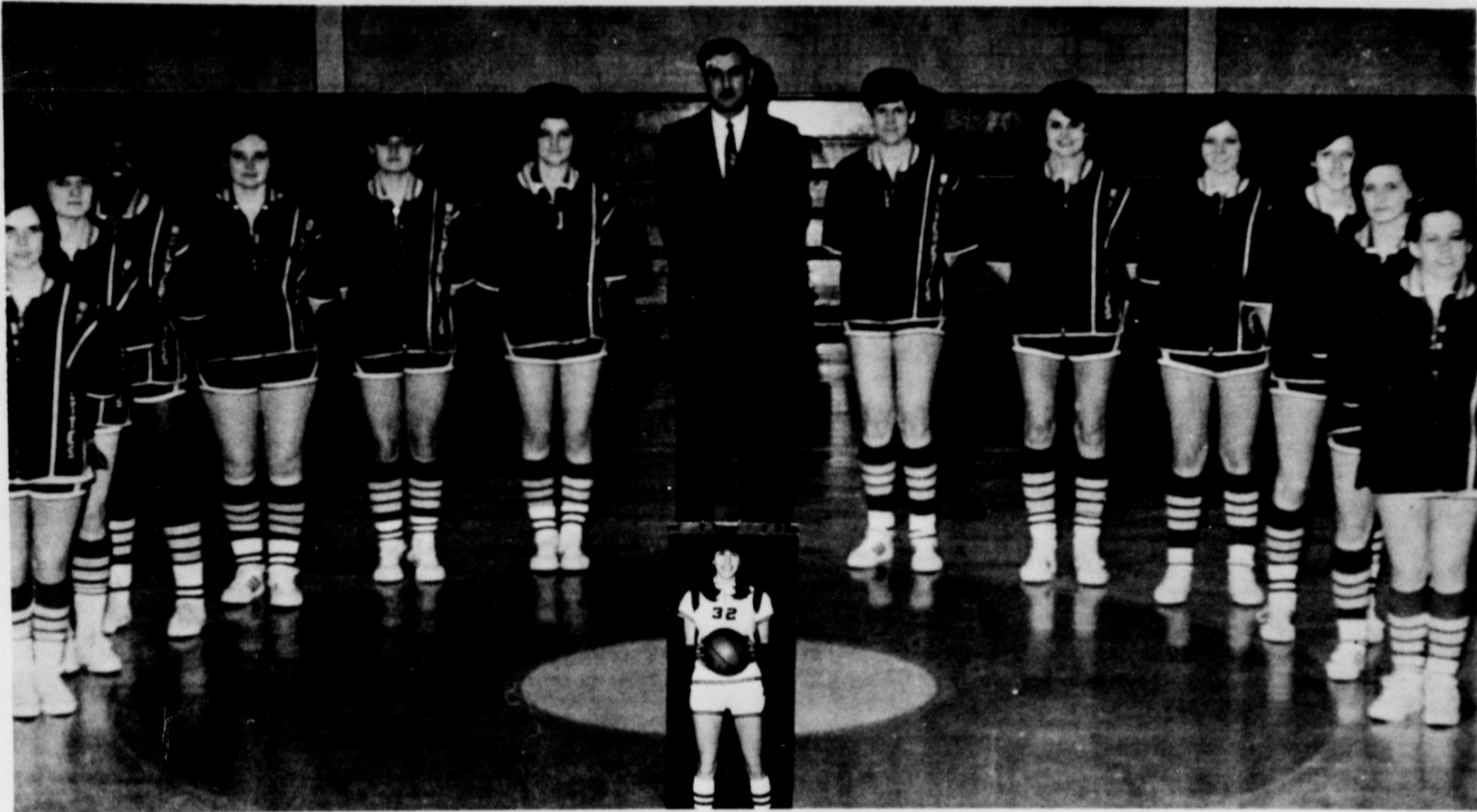

Fued Between Big City and Rural School Districts May Go To Federal Court

Austin, --A feud between big city and rural school districts over the cost of education is expected to go to federal court soon in a major lawsuit.

Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston school boards questioned the "financial fairness" of collection and distribution of the state's minimum foundation funds. They claim that the distribution formula favors rural districts. A bill to correct this brought a storm of protest from rural districts during last year's legislative session. Best the legislature could come up with under the circumstances was a bill creating an 18-member committee to recommend "a fair and equitable basis for a division of financial responsibility between the state and the various local districts of Texas." Suit will seek statewide uniform property tax valuations. Action is due to be directed against the State Board of Education.

Meanwhile, the Texas Research League pointed out that aid to local school districts is the most expensive obligation of state government and most important determinant of future tax requirements.

Expansion of the foundation school program and teacher pay raises voted last year will increase state expenditures for public elementary and secondary education by \$345 million in the current biennium and will produce an additional 50 per cent increase in total state costs during the next six years. Cumulative total increase in state aid for a six-year period is calculated at \$1.6 billion in new state funds. Higher salaries account for 65 per cent of this. Research League predicts that the legislature will have to raise \$298 million in new funds for public schools next year, \$270 million more in 1973 and \$196 million more in 1975.

Dr. Crawford Guest Speaker At Methodist Church

Dr. Howard Crawford of the National Board of Pension of Lubbock, was the guest speaker at worship services held Sunday at the Earth First United Methodist Church.

Dr. Crawford directed his topic to the youth at the Sunday service. He told the congregation how the call to ministry is made and how one must apply himself when making his application to the ministry.

In an address made to the official Board members of the Earth United Methodist Church, Sunday night, Dr. Crawford continued his discussion of the ministry. The topic Sunday evening, however, considered the aspects of what happens to

the minister after he has spent the major portion of his life serving God as a dedicated minister. Dr. Crawford then explained his work and the purpose of the National Board of Pension.

The pension program for retired ministers of the United Methodist Church is something which is supported by the local Methodist Churches.

Dr. Crawford has served in many churches in the Northwest Conference including the United Methodist Church in Plainview from 1954-58 and has served as District Superintendent for the Lubbock District prior to his position with the National Pension Board.

Tax Reports Given

At the January 31 deadline, tax collections for Springlake-Earth Independent School District reached approximately 87 per cent, while those for the City of Earth were an approximate 88 per cent, school and city officials have announced.

Tax roll for the City of Earth for 1969 was \$71,919.79. Collected before the deadline was \$19,429.75, according to Mrs. Betty McAlpine, city secretary. School district's tax roll totaled \$14,410,000. A low for a two-year period of 87 per cent was collected before the deadline.

Mrs. Louise Bridge, school tax assessor-collector, reported approximately 91 per cent in the year of 1968 before the deadline.

A penalty will be assessed those taxes paid after January 31 for both city and school.

Highway Commission Approves Road Program

Austin--In action that will mean better highway facilities throughout Texas, the Texas Highway Commission today approved a \$406-million, two-year Consolidated Highway Program.

The program calls for construction or reconstruction of US- and State-numbered highways.

In all, a total of 1,968.6 miles of non-Interstate highways will be built or reconstructed under the program. Estimated cost of the construction work is \$365 million.

The program also covers the State's portion of the right of way cost on 1,327.9 miles of US- and State-numbered highways at an estimated cost of \$40.5 million. On these highways, the State shares right of way costs on a 50-50 basis with local governments.

In approving the program, the Commission earmarked funds for needed improvement on many routes of the State-maintained highway system. This will permit the orderly development of plans for construction.

Test to Save Lives

Fifty per cent of Texas fatal traffic accidents involve drunken drivers, say the Texas Safety Association.

Enforcement of the new breath test law could cause a dramatic decrease in the number of traffic fatalities during 1970.



Cigarette Smoking Begins To Decline

Several years after the surgeon general's report linking smoking and cancer, Americans are beginning to kick the cigarette habit in record numbers. The National Clearinghouse for Smoking and Health said Thursday a decline in cigarette consumption, which started in 1968, accelerated last year. In 1968, consumption declined by one billion cigarettes although the adult population in-

creased by two million, the clearinghouse said. For the first seven months of 1969, cigarette consumption declined at a rate three times faster than the previous year. The number of Americans who have stopped smoking is not known. The Senate Commerce Committee quoted one estimate that seven million persons may have stopped during the last two years.

Need A Light? Forget Blue

AUSTIN--Blue may be your favorite color, but it might be a good idea to give some second thought to dressing your boat with a blue light. It's against the law. Texas Parks and Wildlife police boats, manned by game management officers, and police vessels are authorized to display a rotating blue beacon, but other boat owners must settle for the standard red, green and white light, dependent upon the class of boat, which are more than mere decorations. Lighting diagrams are included in the Water Safety Act requests accompanying each registration certificate mailed to a boat owner.

Rainbow Trout Go To Guadalupe

NEW BRAUNFELS--The Guadalupe River below Canyon Dam will be the stocking site of 6,000 rainbow trout weighing approximately 1/2 pound each on February 25. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service will furnish the fish from their New Mexico hatchery, and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will do the stocking. This is the third shipment of trout added by the Federal Government. Lone Star Brewery started the project in 1966, and between the spring of 1966 and the spring of 1968 added some 32,000 rainbow trout to the Guadalupe River. This year's fish have one fin clipped to distinguish them from former stockings. Three hundred of the fish are also marked with anchor tags. Fishermen catching a tagged trout are asked to return the tag to one of the area's commercial establishments and fill out data cards available there. The trucks from the Inks National Fish Hatchery near Burnett where the trout were reared will arrive at 12 p.m.

The fish will be stocked at all points of public access areas immediately below the dam. The Parks and Wildlife Department suggests fishermen going after the trout use small spinners, worms or canned, whole kernel corn.

States Increase Tax Burden

Taxpayers in 34 states face higher state tax bills as a result of legislation to date in 1969, and further increases are still being considered, according to a Tax Foundation survey. Enacting of new major taxes and increases in existing levies will mean that the American taxpayer will add \$2.8 billion, or 7 per cent, to state revenues at current levels of economic activity. Still pending is legislation which would add over \$850 million to the amounts approved to date, bringing the 1969 total to \$3.7 billion. The 1960 tax measures will produce a record annual gain in dollar amounts attributable to statutory action. These increases directly affect two-thirds of the nation's population.
