Community Not Destroyed Because Buildings Are Gone, Spirt Alive

Both Sunnyside reporters were in the tornado which overshadows all other news of the week. I was at choir practice at the home of Mrs. Howard Bridges. Others there were Mrs. Ezell Sadler, Mrs. Robert Paschal, Keith and Janie, Mrs. Milburn Haydon, Mrs. Bridges, and Mrs. Percy Hart, Mrs. Milton Sharp, and Mrs. Preston Upshaw of Hart. While we were singing the electricity went off and we visited while Mrs. Bridges lit a lamp. It was raining and hailing, then it suddenly stopped. The calm caused me to become suspicious. I made my way thru the dark to the south east bedroom and watched the cloud as it began to look more and more like a tornado. I called Mrs. Ezell Sadler to the bedroom and we realized soon it actually was a tornado coming, but didn't think about it being right on us. They were singing again in the living room by lamp light. I went through the living room and told Mrs. Bridges a tornado was coming. Several ran to the bedroom to see. I ran to the garage to find my shoes and told everyone to get their coats. I had just made it back to the living room when it hit.

Most of us fell to the floor along the inside wall just as the west picture window blew out. Mrs. Bridges had gone to the coat closet to get our coats and she stood holding to the door knob as the den to her left and entrance to the right collapsed. Mrs. Sadler was caught in the hall also. Mrs. Hart had gone to the piano to blow out the lamps so she dropped to the floor behind the piano. When it was over we began to ask who was hurt and to our amazement found nothing more than one or two minor glass cuts. I remember no sound except the shrill whistle of the wind. My first thought after seeing we were alright was why don't the men come see about us. Then it began to register that maybe the church had been hit too. I ran across the debris in the den, through the garage and out across dozens of wires and in the flash of lightning saw the old building but I couldn't see the auditorium. I waited until another flash of lightning and knew it just wasn't there. It was raining hard and I got real wet. I ran back across about half of the wires and then became aware of a spewing or sizzling noise and I thought of hot wires. An explosion went off and I still thought of a transformer or something to do with electricity. I ran into the house and told the others the church had collapsed. I could just see men lying everywhere under those cinder blocks and I wanted to go over there, but we were afraid of the hot wires. I wondered about daddy and mother and ran back out with the one flash light we had to pick my way through the wires and I saw their house still intact. I still did not think about any other house being involved. About this time Robert Paschal came to see about his family. He encouraged us to stay in the house and not try to come to the church. He said there might be some seriously hurt, but not many. Ezell Sadler came to check on us, and we learned from him the electric wires were not live. Neither of them had seen L. B. at the church. Mrs. Sadler began to worry about her boys who were home one mile north. I did not know at this time whether L. B. had gotten to the church or not. I looked at my watch and it was twenty minutes until 8:00 and I felt better since he had ask the preacher what time the program would start when he left me at the church. The preacher had told him 8:00. Mrs. Sadler and I ran across the ditch full of water onto the highway and ran down the highway to see about our parents. Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Louder and get a car to go see about her kids and to see if L. B. was at the church home. As we left her house we saw L. B. approaching and stopped him. He knew nothing of the storm. It wasn't until we got back to daddy's that we saw Leslie Louder and his family and learned that they had survived the storm too. They had seen it coming but not in time to do more than fall to the floor. They covered the girls bodies with their own and escaped injury as the entire roof was blown off and other damage done. We began to hear reports of the injured and dead. Some of these were not true, but we heard right away that Mr. Hogan had been killed and Mr. Kidd from Plainview. When we could see by the lightning heard the store was demolished that Embree Roy Sadler's house looked different we ran across over there and tried to find them. It was a long time before we heard

"You've got to create and provide opportunities. It's not enough to just take advantage of your opportunities. Plan your work and work your plan."

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Messer Holds Mayor's Position, Kelley Named Alderman In Run-Off Saturday

Marcus Messer was named Mayor by a slight margin Saturday in the largest tabulation of votes in the history of the City of Earth. E. C. "Shorty" Kelley was elected alderman in this same election.

There were 330 people cast their vote in this, the first run-off election for City Officials in Earth.

Messer (incumbent) received 175 votes and Carroll Blackwell polled 151. Kelley received 211 votes for Alderman and John Welch received 116 votes.

Election Judge Carroll McDonald said, "He was glad to see so many people turn out for the election, indicating interest in our City Government."

He said "out of all the votes cast, one person didn't vote for Mayor, and three voters did not indicate a preference in Alderman." In the absentee box there were 17 votes polled.

Clerks for the election were Mrs. J. B. Newton, Mrs. Faye Starkey and Mrs. Minnie Pate.

Seed
In explaining the parable of the sower, Jesus said, "The seed is the word of God" (Luke 8:11). The heart is the soil into which the seed of the kingdom is sown. As there can be no life in the natural soil till seed is planted, so there can be no spiritual life in the heart till the word of God is sown. Concerning the spread of the word in Corinth, Paul said: "I have planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase" (I Cor. 3:6).
