Cleavinger died about 9:15 p.m. Sunday, October 4, in Lubbock Methodist Hospital after a week-long illness following a heart attack. A na-tive of Leavenworth, Kansas, he came to Springlake with his family, the M. E. Cleavinger, Srs., in 1910, where they operated the original Springlake Post Office and General Store, He served overseas in World War I and attended the University of Texas and WTSTC at Canyon before returning to the Springlake Community, where he taught school and purchased a homestead in 1920. In 1923 he and Gladys Axtell married and to this union were born six children---Carole, Norma, Ronald, Jim, Orville and Lois.

While in the Springlake Community, Cleavinger was active in the Congregational Church; then upon its dissolution he became active in the Methodist Church in Earth, serving in many capacities -teacher, steward, building committee chairman, etc. For 17 years he served as a trustee the Springlake School Board. During World War II, he was active in War Bond and Red Cross Drives in Lamb County, and served on various farm committees and organizations. He held a lifetime membership in Cal Farley's Boys Ranch.

In 1952 Mr. and Mrs. Cleavinger moved to Dimmitt after purchasing C & S Equipment Company, Here he actively supported the Methodist Church, the Little League Baseball program, was a dir ector of the Plains Memorial Hospital, the Castro Memorial Gardens Association, Dimmitt Produce Company and Farmers Grain Company in Hart, He was a member of the Committee of 78 at West Tex-

was very active in politics, having gone as a delegate to the State Convention many times and made numerous trips to Washington, D. C. in the interest of farm legislation. He and Mrs. Cleavinger traveled extensively, having made a trip around the world with Cotton John, and then trips to the Scandinavian Countries, Russia, the Holy Land, South America, and Canada to Expo '67. They al-so made guided Methodist Mission tours of Hawali and Mexico. He was an avid sports fan, having played college baseball, and encouraged young people to participate to their best ability in any sport-baseball, football, basketball, track -- and was particularly encouraging to his grandchild-ren in these areas, following them wherever they played.
