

A new sign has been erected in our back door one half mile from our City Limits, one mile in fact from our Main Street a sign painted in black and white which reads, "28 Miles," For The Best Deal, Trade In Littlefield."

I glory in their enthusiasm, that I think is commendable However, it seems they have gotten a little too enthusiastic and forgot the neighboring town to the north in their desparate attempt to grow. We have long been under the impression that we need signs probably along that same place, reading "Have You Shopped Earth First." However in our neglect, Littlefield has gone to work and in their desire to build their town forgotten all consideration for the neighboring town and erected their signs right under our very noses.

I don't think it was at all sporting, and I fail to see any comedy in such an act. Had they erected it elsewhere, giving us a little breathing space, that would have been a different story, but for any town to almost reach one's City Limits to erect their signs, just leaves a lingering bad taste in one's mouth

We of course want to build our home town and ask that each of you give this thought some consideration:

This is your home, this is where your children go to school, where you attend church. This is where you make your living, where you are raising your family. 

Some 87 GPCP contracts have been developed on farms and ranches in the district covering over 40,000 acres with Federal Cost share being provided to the extent of over \$250,000,00 for contract periods of from 3 to 10 years. There are 10 states in which the Great Plains Conservation Program is in effect and the State of Teras has taken the lead in getting the program in operations. From count Lamb County the leading county in the State of some 78 designated counties in Texas, from the standpoint of total number of contracts. When the-se focts are all into consideration, it is indicated that the program is meeting with approval and fill-ing definite need in the Lamb County Soil Conservation Dictrict

The Great Plains Conservation program was designated to emphasize seeding of permenant cover in wind erosion area of depleted rangeland and cropland to be taken out of cultivation as top priority. Several hundred acres of r angeland have been reseeded in the district and many more hundreds of acres are planned to be converted from cropland to pastureland or rangeland. Most of the operators who are converting land to pasture are planning to go into stock farm type of operation along with cash crops. Some 8 sprinkler systems have been planned with federal cost share assistance being provided. On sloping or sandy irrigated land the sprinkler has proven the most and Mrs. L. S.
