## Three Murder Cases Set For Trial In Lamb County

District Judge E. A. Bills announced Saturday that three murder cases are set for trial at a Criminal term of District Court in Littlefield beginning Monday, July 25, with one case being a change of venue from Bailey County.

He also announced the names of sixty persons summoned to appear on that date as prospective jurors for the trials.

One of the murder cases is against Albert Griffin who is charged with shotgun death of Grover Tapp, on September 13, last year.

Leonard Lockett, Olton negro cafe operator, is charged with murder in connection with the death of James Oliver Mack, last November 29.

Also due to be tried on a murder charge is Joseph J. Stark of Earth, who allegedly fatally wounded Delbert Jackson, September 18, 1958, as an aftermath of a poker game.

## Two Injured At Pauls Super Market

Two employees at Pauls Super Market received minor injuries Tuesday morning just a few minutes apart.

Injured first was Thomas Bryant son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bryant. Thomas was carrying out cases of empty pop bottles when one of the cases slipped and a broken bottle scraped across his left arm cutting the inside of his arm near the elbow.

He was taken to West Plains Hospital, Muleshoe, by Dennis Simmons where several stitches were required to sew up the wound.

He was released and returned to work.

Before Simmons and Bryant came out of the hospital Mrs. H. C. Martin went in with her son, Kermit, who had received a cut finger.

Kermit was slicing meat in the meat Department and when some one said something to him he looked up from his work and the knife slipped cutting the index finger on his left hand. Several stitches were required to sew up the wound.

Mr. Clayton said when Senator Johnson walked into the caucus room, it was a touching scene, almost to the point of tears, not because they had been unsuccessful in getting the nomination, but because of the attitude Johnson showed his home state people. He did not act defeated in the least, but told the delegates he felt sure each of them had done as much as was in their power to do for him, and never seemed to feel defeated in the least, because he had Texas as people behind him 100 per cent and was so proud to have them for him.

Clayton said the Johnson people never did give up and were hopeful until Kennedy went over the top, he said they all realized if they had had another day or one more voting tabulation that Johnson would have beyond a doubt received the nomination. He said several delegates from California and New York were planning to switch to Johnson but were obligated at the first voting.

When asked why he thought Johnson went on the Democratic ticket for vice-president after saying he would remain in the Senate if he were not the Presidential nominee, Clayton said "I do not think it was for personal gain, but strictly for the Democratic party and for his country. Johnson, he said will probably strengthen the Democratic ticket far greater than anyone else could possibly do.

Clayton said he felt that Texas would vote the Democratic ticket. However he was not sure it would carry in the immediate area. Clayton when asked what he thought about the Democratic ticket said, "Well, of course you know it would have been a much better ticket if LBJ headed the ticket with Kennedy as vice president."

He said Johnson gained respect and admiration from the convention delegates, and several delegates from Kennedy's states realized Johnson was the most qualified man.

He said, Johnson did not go about making promises to all the states as to what he would do for them, or of promising the vice presidency to several in order to get the votes from their states. He did not try to play bad politics or make deals, but seemed to stick to fair play.

Clayton worked on security the second day there. He was in the group to escort Senator Johnson to the various state caucuses held in various hotels where he was invited. His job was to see that crowds did not hold him up or

Raymond Rudd was seriously burnt about the face and eyes last Friday, about 4 p.m., while fertilizing with Anhydrous Ammonia.

The accident occurred on the Pete Parish farm, four miles north and one and one-half mile east of Springlake.

Rudd, being blinded by the ammonia, walked about one and one-quarter miles, guided by the sound of a tractor.

The farm hand, who was driving the tractor took Rudd to the home of Louis Bolinger, who brought him to Earth. He was then taken to the Muleshoe Hospital and Clinic where he remained until Sunday morning, when he was taken to Lubbock to an eye specialist. He was treated and released and is reported to be slightly improved, although the extent of the damage to his eyes is still unknown.

He also recalled being co-captain in leading and organizing the demonstration Wednesday afternoon for Johnson. He said Texas delegates worked real hard each day, almost around the clock usually from 6 a.m. until 3 or 4 a.m. the next day most of the time. One night he recalled he didn't even as much as turn back the cover. He pointed out that there was always much work to be done at a National Convention. He spent much time in company with Governor Daniel and Lt. Governor Anderson of California in regard to California delegates and what could be worked out for LBJ.

When asked about what he thought about the convention be-

ing rigged, he said he'd hate to just plain put the blame on anyone, but Texas was supposed to have 129 tickets and Mrs. Frankie Randolph had been given 60 of those tickets.

He said he also talked with Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt, and remarked that a spry lady she was, and was real impressed by her and her utter interest in politics.

He said he rubbed elbows with Kennedy, but did not meet him, he was interested chiefly in working for his candidate rather than anything else while there. He said he felt Kennedy was a smart man, but felt that if the Democrats were elected that L. B. J. would give a lot of good advice to Kennedy and that he felt that though Kennedy had proven he was smart at organizing groups, he felt he would be smart enough to take some advice from L. B. J. (Our man from Texas).

He said the convention had been a great experience to him, and that no one could know the strain that goes on at those conventions, on the candidate, the long hours, speeches at the various caucuses, and at the home delegates themselves spent working in behalf of their candidate. However he said he would not have missed it at all.

He summed up his review of the meeting, that after being in company with Senator Johnson he felt more enthusiastic for his chances in the next four or eight years and that most of all he felt he was "Truly a man that Texas could be proud of."

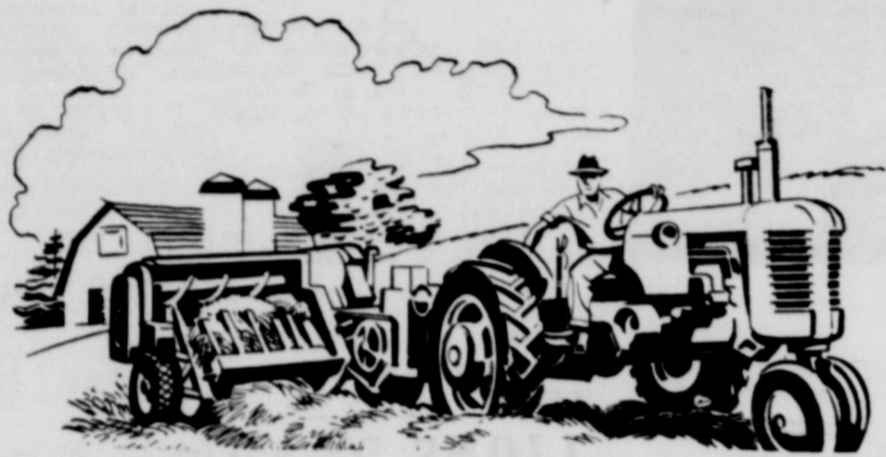

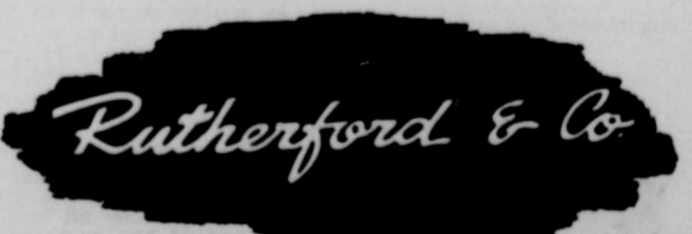

## Governor Price Daniel Proclaims As July 24-30 Farm Safety Week

Governor Price Daniel by proclamation has designated the week of July 24-30 as Farm Safety Week in Texas. This same period has also been designated as National Farm Safety Week by the President of the United States.

In his proclamation, Governor Daniel said: "The Nation's economy is dependent upon the continued well-being and progress of our State's agricultural population. Accidents from farm work cause needless suffering, distress and loss of life each year among our rural families.

"By directing the attention of our rural residents to safety education, such worthwhile programs now being conducted can greatly reduce accidents. I urge all Texas farm families to increase their vigilance against needless accidents and further encourage interested organizations and individuals to participate in this program."

The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council points out that the purpose of the special week is to focus attention on the year-round need for reducing the number of farm accidents, and to cause those who can do something about the problems, to act. The farmer and his family, says the Council, must carry safety into their everyday lives. Nationally, they add, farm accidents cost one and a quarter billion dollars annually, a sizeable sum any way you take it.

The ever-tightening cost-price squeeze faced by agriculturists makes accident prevention even more important, says the Council, because a single costly accident can just about squeeze out the profits from most farm enterprises.

The Council joins Governor Daniel in urging rural residents and organizations to make safety their number one project for the months ahead.

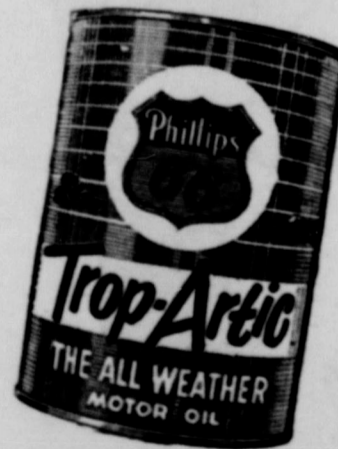

## Hi-Plains Hi-Lights

NEWS from the High Plains Research Foundation

Recent rains, which totaled 12 inches, filled the recharge lake at the High Plains Research Foundation with an estimated 110 acre-feet of water. Recharge of the well was started the night of July 4 and has been recharging at the approximate rate of 850 gallons per minute since that time. During the eleven day period ending the night of Friday, July 15, a total of 43.5 acre-feet of water has been recharged. The well is pumped for one hour every 24 hours and is surged 3 times at 15 minute intervals during this hour to clean as much as possible any silt which may be caught in the underground formation.

A filter system installed before the rains to study methods of removing sediment from the water has been of little value. The water level in the lake raised to more than 3 feet over the top of the filter.

After the water had been in the lake 8 days, a form of marine life commonly called "desert shrimp" increased to such numbers that they interfered with recharging by clogging the screens. This requires cleaning the screens every 4 to 6 hours since the screens will become completely clogged within this time.

## KNOW YOUR INSECT ENEMY

### THE COTTON LEAFWORM

This troublesome insect cannot survive wintertime weather in the United States. Each year, migrating moths invade cotton growing regions from tropical areas where they spend the winter.

Leafworm infestations can become serious by August. Moths that have flown up from southern areas deposit their eggs on cotton plants. Pupae are often found attached to leaves and stems by silken webs, or within folded leaves.

The greenish cotton leafworms soon multiply. New moths develop and move on to attack other areas. Some years, leafworms invade all the cotton states except California.

Small worms generally feed beneath the leaves. Larger worms devour entire leaves. They'll completely rag cotton plants, including squares, bolls and bark, if not controlled.

Calcium arsenate and DDT have been widely used to stop leafworms in the past. In 1959, a new material, Sevin insecticide, was introduced. This carbamate insecticide has good residual properties, even in hot weather. It provides growers with positive long-lasting protection, and is safer to use than many other insecticides. Entomologists recommend con-



trolling leafworms when they are young and tender. For economy, they suggest a broad-range pesticide that gives effective kill of all cotton insects, including weevils and leafhoppers that have developed resistance to older chemicals.

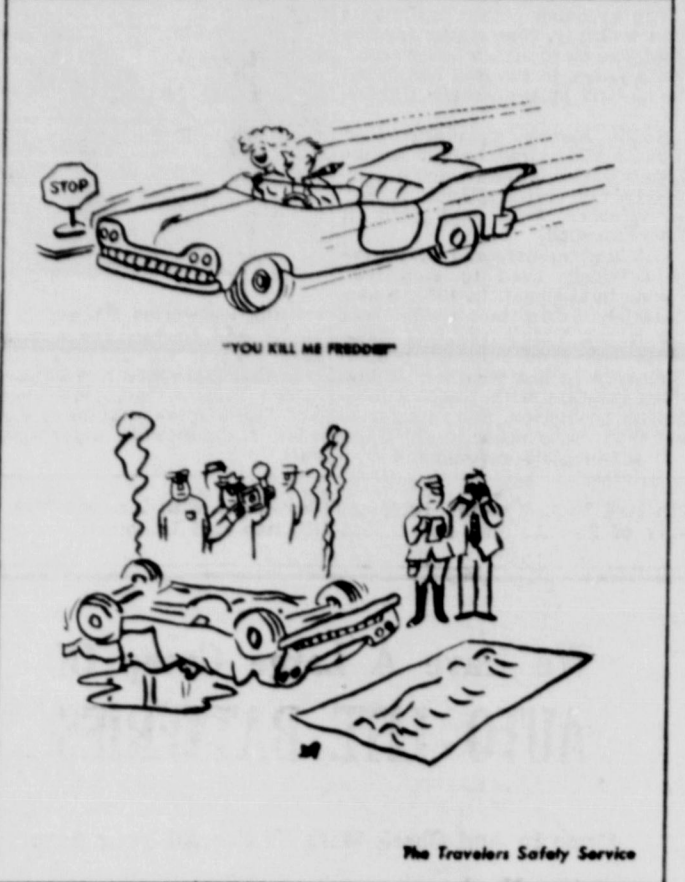

## Too Many Fatal Farm Accidents

College Station. — Farm people have a slightly higher percentage of fatal accidents than do other population groups, reports the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council. The rate of accidental deaths from work and recreational activities on farms is increasing slightly each year, as is the death rates associated with machinery, drownings, firearms and electricity. Accidental deaths due to animals, falls, lightning and burns are decreasing, however.

According to a recent survey made by the National Safety

Council, Texas ranks in the top ten states in the number of deaths caused from drownings, firearms, burns and electricity. The Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council points out that a little care and caution on the part of rural dwellers could help remove Texas from these unpopular lists.

During the week of July 24, an intensive safety campaign will be conducted in Texas, and all over the nation. The Texas Council urges all rural residents to participate in the activities of National Farm Safety Week—not only for that week, but for the entire year.

"A little bit of caution could prevent a lot of grief," reminds the Texas Council.

### Texas Farm Workday 10.1 Hours June 1

College Station. — Texas farmers and ranchers had an average workday of 10 hours, 6 minutes on June 1, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

That's a half-hour less than the average for farmers in all states of the nation, more than two hours less than the Wisconsin farm workday, but a full hour more than Nevada and Florida farmers put in.

This was brought out in the farm labor report issued by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, based on reports from federal-state Crop Reporting Service offices in each state.

The national average was 10.6 hours. Wisconsin led with 12.2 hours, while Nevada and Florida were lowest with 9.1 hours. Colorado farmers averaged 11.2 hours; Kansas, 10.9; New Mexico, 10.7; Oklahoma, 10.2; Texas, 10.1; Arkansas, 9.8; and Louisiana, 9.3 hours.

Farm operators in the nation averaged about an hour more each day than their hired hands.

Seasonal length of the farm workday has changed very little in this area during the last three years, although a slowness in the crop season was evident in some locations when the June 1 survey was made. The June 1 average for Texas in 1950 was 11.6 hours. In the war year of 1943, it was 12.8 hours.

Weather at this season seems to have little effect on the amount of time the farm operator works, even when he can't be in the fields. The number of seasonal hired workers is more sharply influenced by weather conditions, but the workday length for regular hired help is more consistent, even in undesirable weather.

## Expand Program For Grain Market Development

The entire feed grain industry including corn producers, the grain seed industry, export firms and cooperative and independent grain dealers, it was announced this week, are mustering forces behind the foreign market development program which the Grain Sorghum Producers Association of Amarillo, Texas initiated and has been administering the past two years. It is expected that this new and broader interest in financing and directing the export promotion program will increase activities in this connection as much as five times over the present program.

The announcement relative to the expanded program was made after an area Directors' Meeting of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association in Tulla, Texas July 6, 1960. The Board acted on the recommendation of R. G. Peeler, Director of Hereford, Texas and Bill Nelson of Amarillo, Texas, the Association's Executive Officer who have been negotiating with the other grain interests the past several months.

Organizations joining with the Grain Sorghum Producers Association are the Hybrid Corn and Hybrid Sorghum Divisions of the American Seed Trade Association, Chicago, Illinois, the National Corn Growers Association, Boone, Iowa, The North American Export Association, New York City, Farmers Grain Dealers Association of Des Moines, Iowa, Continental Grain Company, New York City and Cargill Grain Corporation, Minneapolis, Minnesota. All of these grain industry groups are combining forces for this effort through a newly formed organization which is to be known as the U. S. Feed Grains Council. The expanded Council program is to remain under the administration direction of Bill Nelson who is to serve as the Executive Director.

It is expected that this Council approach will provide for an increase in the exchange of county agents and other agricultural leaders in potential U. S. grain market areas, as well as allow for the bringing of an increased number of foreign feed grain users and processors to the area to study grain sorghum and other feed grains, and provide greater understanding of our grades, standards and trading practices.

In addition to Frank Moore of Plainview, Elbert Harp of Abertathy, R. G. Peeler of Hereford and Sam Glibreath of Dimmitt who will represent the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, on the Council's Board of Directors, other officers are: Walter Goepfinger of National Corn Growers Association, Boone, Iowa, Nelson Urban, Pioneer Hi-Bred Corn Company, Des Moines, Iowa, Fred Maywald,

Farmers Grain Dealers Association of Des Moines, Iowa, Bill Pierce of Cargill Grain Corporation, Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Other business at the Grain Sorghum Producers Association meeting in Tulla included a report from Charles C. Gidney, Jr., from Rome, Italy who is administering the European feed grain market development projects. He is encouraged at the potential for expanding grain sorghum and other U. S. feed grain exports to the European area if continued efforts are made toward removing or lessening trade barriers, import duties and licensing restrictions. He further praised the work of area county agents and other agricultural leaders who have served as consultants from this area at the agricultural trade fairs and other education programs throughout Europe.

Martin Gossett, Moore County Agent from Dumas, reported on the expanded efforts of grain sorghum producers in his county in attempting to interest livestock feeders in establishing feed-lot operations in their area. He pointed out that the first result of this effort will be seen with the opening in August of at least one big feed-lot now under construction.

## Nematodes Serious State Cotton Pest

College Station. — Nematodes damage cotton in all areas of Texas. The small microscopic worms are more damaging in sandy or hilly soils.

Nematode injury is often overlooked or mistakenly diagnosed as drought damage and poor soil. Damage may vary from slight to as much as 30 percent of the crop.

The root knot nematodes are the most damaging and most easily recognized. Damage by these nematodes result in knots or galls being formed on the roots. Young cotton seedlings can be attacked by the parasites causing them to die or be weakened.

Nematodes damage the roots and provide a gateway for the fusarium wilt fungus to enter. The fusarium wilt disease once thought of as only an East Texas disease has been moving west in recent years. It has been observed in the Wichita Falls, O'Brien and Muleshoe areas.

Other nematodes that cause damage are the dagger, a stubby root and stilet nematodes. The root lesion, lance and true spiral nematodes are suspected as causing damage.

Nematodes are controlled by the use of certain chemicals prior to planting. Contact your extension agent for additional information and ask for a copy of MP-356, "Plant Nematodes, Their Identification and Control."

## Plow Deep To Reduce Root Rot

College Station. — Drying out the soil for 2 weeks or more after deep plowing can reduce cotton root rot to as low as 2 percent or less the following year, according to Dr. Harlan E. Smith, extension plant pathologist.

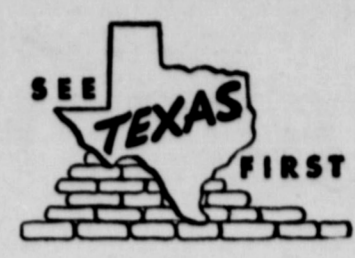
Deep plow 10 to 14 inches or more. It is best to use a mold board or disc type plow. Bedding and listing are ineffective. Plow in the summer if possible. If not, plow as soon in the fall as possible, advises Smith.

Drying out the soil helps reduce the root rot by lowering the number of fungus seed bodies or sclerotia in the soil. It also kills old cotton roots and roots of susceptible weeds on which the fungus lives over-winter. The fungus has been found at depths of 8 feet; however, most of it is concentrated in the top 12 to 20 inches of the soil.

Deep plowing is most effective if no rain occurs for at least 2 weeks after plowing.

Check the long range weather forecast. Try to select a time when dry weather is expected. Do not irrigate after plowing for at least 2 weeks to allow soil to dry. A combination of practices carried on for a number of years is necessary for best results.

Local county agents can supply additional information on recommended cotton root rot control practices, Smith says.
