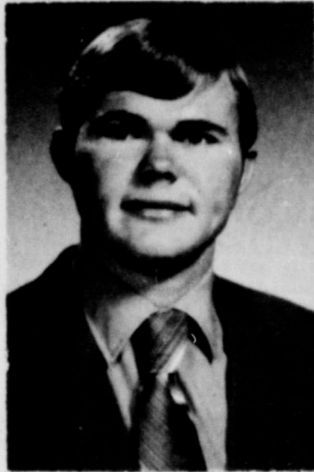

Shotgun Kills Local Youth In Bed

Robert Lamar Richardson, a 17 year old high school senior at Springlake-Earth, died of gunshot wounds about 7 a. m. Friday when a shotgun in his bed accidentally discharged while his mother was attempting to awaken him.

Justice of the Peace, W. G. Finney of Olton, who ruled the shooting accidental, said the youth was sleeping with the loaded shotgun in his bed when his mother went in to awaken him. When she attempted to move the shotgun, he said, the youth apparently rolled over, struck the weapon and caused it to accidentally discharge.

Finney said he was struck with gunshot below the rib cage on the left side. He apparently died instantly, the Peace Justice said. Richardson was born in Lubbock. He was on the starter team at Smiley Wilson Junior High in '67-'68. While in Lubbock, he was a member of the Pony League Baseball Team, a member of a bowling team and a Boy's Club.

He and his mother moved to Springlake 14 years ago. He was a member of the local FFA. During the summer, he was employed by area farmers, learning how to operate farm equipment. He hoped to be partially self supporting.

Richardson was a poet at heart and carried along a notebook where he jotted down his innermost thoughts.

Funeral services were at 2:30 p. m. Saturday in the United Methodist Church in Earth with Rev. Johnnie Williams, pastor, and Rev. David Hartman, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Earth, officiating.

Palbearers were Gary Buck, Steve Bushy, Donald Templeton, Perry Don O'Hair, Eddie Sam Jones, Eddie Alair, Mike Burress and Bruce Bridges.

Honorary palbearers were senior boys and other friends. Survivors in addition to his mother, Mrs. Thelma Richardson, include two brothers Glenn T. of Lubbock and Tommy Joe of

Burlington, N. C.; one sister, Mrs. Peggy Temple of Springlake; and a grandfather, J. A. Taylor of Lubbock.

Burial was in the Resthaven Memorial Park in Lubbock, where he was laid to rest beside his father who preceded him in death. Parson-Ellis-Singleton Funeral Home in Earth were in charge.

Postmaster Gives Tips On Overseas Mailing

Postmaster Harold D. Miller today listed six tips on how residents of Earth, Texas can help meet tight Christmas budgets this year by careful mailing of cards and parcels.

For the most efficient mailing, Mr. Miller suggested the following steps:

1. For servicemen overseas - "SAM" (Space Available Mail) Christmas parcels can be sent until November 20 for only the small domestic parcel post charge involved from Earth, Texas to East or West Coast points of embarkation for military mail. Parcels up to 5 pounds and 60 inches in combined length and girth are accepted at this low rate.
2. Larger parcels (up to 30 pounds with the same length and girth limitations) can be sent as "PAL" (Parcel Airlift) mail, provided they are mailed by November 27. The charge is only \$1 per parcel, plus the regular domestic parcel post postage. Much less than charges that would apply later if straight airmail service must be provided.
3. For all packaging, invest

in good quality, sturdy wrapping materials. This small investment can help insure undamaged delivery of valuable gifts and prevent delays which might result if rewrapping were required in transit.

4. Insure parcels realistically to cover full value but do not overinsure. A \$10 gift, for example, can bring only \$10 compensation, if lost, even if "insured" for \$100.

5. Get plenty of stamps on your first trip to the post office to avoid the time and expense of additional trips.

6. Use ZIP code as a tool for economy in mailing. When it is used consistently on parcels and cards, ZIP code helps prevent errors in delivery and expedites handling. If only a few Christmas cards go astray, an investment of several dollars may be lost, for example.

"The key to efficient Christmas mailing," Mr. Miller commented, "is to mail early and carefully. Clear addressing, with the ZIP codes, proper packaging and early depositing can prevent most problems and provide the greatest value for money spent for postage."

Hale Center Man Charged With Murder

SHOOTING AT OLTON

A feud of several years climaxed early Sunday when a 30 year old Dumas man was fatally shot outside an Olton roller rink. Elias Leyja Valenzuela was dead on arrival at Olton Community Clinic about 1:15 a. m. after being shot nine times with a .22 caliber pistol.

Paul Luevano, 20, of Hale Center, has been charged with murder with malice in connection with the shooting.

Luevano surrendered to Hale County Sheriff's officers about 8:50 a. m. Sunday at Plainview. He was accompanied by his attorney, Joe Cox of Plainview.

Lamb County sheriff's officers, armed with a warrant for Luevano's arrest, took the man to Littlefield and placed him in jail. Bond was set at

\$7,500 by Lamb County Judge G. T. Sides.

Another man, Lucio Arban, received a gunshot wound in the same incident. He was treated and released at the Olton Hospital.

Investigating officers said the argument began outside the Merry-Go-Round Skating Rink. Officers said the men had carried on a feud for several years.

Police questioned a young Mexican American man Sunday in connection with the fracas, but no charges were filed.

Valenzuela's body was transferred to Morison Funeral Directors in Dumas, where services are set for 4 p. m. Tuesday in Saints Peter and Paul Catholic Church in Dumas with the Rev. Kevin Hand, pastor, of-

ficiating. Burial will be in Dumas Cemetery.

Survivors include his wife, Margarita; two sons, Joe and Johnny, and two daughters, Diana and Julie, all of the home; five sisters and six brothers.

The committee is composed of a pastor or a layman from each of the seven conferences of the state.

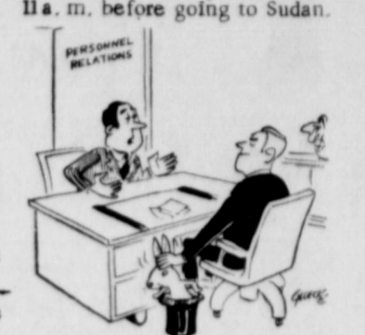

BEN FRANKLINS FUGIO

Have you ever heard of Ben Franklin's fugio? Chances are you have a couple in your pocket or purse right now. Today we call them pennies.

The latter phrase had an endless chain of 13 links circling it. By popular demand, the name "fugio" was changed to "century". Later still it was shortened to "cent".

In 1787, five years before the United States established a thorough monetary system, there was money taming in the colonies. The only available stable coinage came from other countries.

In an effort to ease the shortage, Franklin devised the "fugio". It was made of bronze and worth approximately one hundredth of a dollar.

We now have a Savings Account program available.

Among other details, there was a Franklin admonition on each side of the coin. One side had "Mind your Business" on it and the other "We Are One".

Have You Considered Fall Fertilization

With the grain sorghum harvest completed and cotton harvest well under way, County Agricultural Agent Buddy Logsdon suggests giving some thought to next year's fertilizer use program.

Research conducted by Texas A&M University together with farmer experience strongly supports the practice of fall fertilization for next year's crops, points out Logsdon. Fall application is especially advantageous on the heavier irrigated clay loam soils.

No appreciable loss of applied nitrogen in the form of ammonia or ammonium carrying fertilizers can occur through leaching after soil temperatures drop to 50 degrees. Temperatures on November 3 were slightly below this level and will now decrease rapidly.

Phosphorus and potash can also be fall applied to advantage ahead of land preparation, adds Logsdon. This assures incorporation into the soil so that the relatively immobile phosphorus will be deep enough in the root zone to feed the crop throughout the growing season.

Weather conditions are generally better for fall application when the soil is dry enough to hold it.

Provision that if a veteran or support heavy equipment with less hazard of soil compaction. Also, the fertilizer dealer is not as rushed now as he will be just before the planting season. So he can give more personalized attention to your particular operation.

Having your fertilizer applied in the fall will save you time and bother next spring, particularly if the season is wet, contends Logsdon. If the soil is dry, fall application will conserve moisture for planting.

If you have doubts as to the kind and amount of fertilizer needed, Logsdon suggests to come by his office for information on soil sample collection and mailing. The \$2 spent on a soil test now could make a real difference in your crop yields in 1971.

This information comes from Jim Valentine, area soil chemist.

VA Finance Mobile Homes

Jack Coker, Director of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, announced today that VA loans to finance mobile homes for veterans and servicemen will be available starting December 22. He said PL-506, which President Nixon signed October 23, authorizes VA to guarantee or make direct loans for this purpose.

Earlier this year, the President's Committee on the Vietnam Veterans, of which Donald E. Johnson, Administrator of Veterans Affairs, was chairman recommended legislation on mobile home financing. The committee said the legislation was needed to provide "low cost housing for low and moderate income veterans."

The law which provides financing for mobile homes also restores expired GI loan benefits to some 8.9 million World War II and Korean Conflict veterans. The law also preserves these benefits for all veterans who served after January 31, 1955, until they are actually used.

Another provision eliminates the .5 percent funding fee VA formerly required Post Korean veterans to pay on guaranteed and direct home loans. It was emphasized this provision does not affect loans made before October 23, the date the bill was signed.

The law also makes direct loans for specially adapted housing available to seriously disabled veterans in all parts of the country.

Coker noted these specific provisions of the law on the financing of mobile homes: Establishes a special mobile home loan guaranty or direct loan benefit for veterans and servicemen who have not previously used any of their \$12,500 home loan guaranty eligibility to purchase conventional home loan entitlement, he may not otherwise use his \$12,500 home loan entitlement until he has repaid the mobile home
