First Corn Harvested

The first load of corn was harvested in the Springlake-Earth area this week, although harvest county-wide is not expected for another two weeks.

Ed Haley cut a load just east of Earth early this week, but it was not determined what the moisture content was. He sold the load to Springlake Farms.

County Agent John Farris said Wednesday that overall, county-wide, the corn crops will have about average yields this year.

"I've talked to some farmers who say they will make better than last year and some who say they will make less," Farris said. "Some crops in the Earth area which received hail earlier won't do as good."

Farmers with early maturing varieties of corn will start trying to cut this week or early next week. Most corn shows moisture at 25 percent now and this should be down to 20 percent by next week.

"Of course some farmers have their own corn dryers," Farris said. "They will start to cut pretty quick."

Some corn in Lamb County is still in the milk stage. Farmers will have to wait as long as four weeks on some of this later corn. The results of the harvest, when it is completely finished, will be spotty, good in some areas and below average in others.

Hiroto has been here almost 4 weeks. In this time he has been very busy not only learning to speak the English language, but the customs and modes of living of the American people. Some of the things that he has done are touring Carlsbad Caverns, he was invited to go on an extended trip to some of the Mid Eastern states, as well as learning to set irrigation tubes.

This young man is a self taught pianist, and a rather accomplished one at that. His main interest is centered around classical music. He listens very closely to records and in this way he is able to play the number on the piano. In addition to the piano, he also plays the violin and other hobbies include skiing and hiking. He has mastered a talent of folding paper into various objects such as birds, flowers, etc.

Hiroto has one sister and his father is an accountant and also sells office furniture. His mother is a homemaker. While Southwestern Public Service Company is considered a medium-size utility company, its service area belies that description. Lubbock, saving thousands of gallons of fresh water per day.

In 1970, in order to prepare for the future, SPS made the decision that coal instead of natural gas would be used as the primary fuel supply for future plants. Both the long range price outlook and the supply outlook were better for coal than for natural gas.

Plans were immediately begun for the company's first coal-fired unit, Harrington Station, located northeast of Amarillo. The first unit of Harrington Station began operation in June, 1976, the second unit in June of this year, with the third unit scheduled for completion in June, 1980.

Long-term contracts were made with Atlantic Richfield for low-sulphur coal which is delivered in 110 car trains from Gillette, Wyoming. Each of Harrington's units burn approximately 4,000 tons of coal per day.

In July, 1977, the SPS board of directors authorized the construction of a 543,000 kw unit in Lamb County about nine miles from Plant X to be named Tolk Station in honor of chairman of the board and chief executive officer Roy Tolk. Scheduled completion date for this unit is 1982 with a second unit scheduled for 1985.

Each Tolk unit will burn approximately 296 tons of coal per hour; 7,104 tons per day; 2,592,960 tons per year. This coal, like coal for Harrington Station, will be low-sulphur coal from Wyoming and will also be delivered in 110 car trains directly from the mine site. The first unit will require three trains and the two combined units will require five trains.

Baghouse filters, resembling huge vacuum cleaners, will be installed to meet environmental requirements for clean air.

The first unit of Tolk Station will cost in excess of \$200-million and will require approximately 600 skilled craftsmen to construct. About 150 permanent jobs will be created.

The main steam will travel through the pipe fast enough to finish the Boston Marathon in about twelve minutes. The turbine rotor will be whirling at such great speed that, if placed on the highway, it would travel from Amarillo to Lubbock in about six minutes. If the condenser tubes were placed end to end, they would extend 278 miles.

Lamb County was chosen for the site of Tolk Station because of land and water availability and because Lamb County is the general area where the company's load is increasing the most.

A campaign caravan representing gubernatorial candidate John Hill stopped in Dimmitt Tuesday afternoon, August 15 for a rally with county Democratic officials and Hill supporters at the Castro County courthouse.

The caravan was one of five traveling across the state, headed by state representatives and other elected officials in support of Hill.

State Representative John Bigham from

District 44, in the Dimmitt caravan, said the tour's purpose was to show that elected officials consider Hill's campaign important enough to take time out from duties to travel for him.

Highway construction workers were plagued with more woes Saturday morning when their water truck dropped into a hole on east Bedford, re-breaking a water main and turning a section of the street into a lake. Ned Smith, city director of public works, said the two inch main already had been ruptured once, and that the city had repaired it Friday afternoon and packed it in concrete Saturday morning, leaving a 6x8 foot hole for the construction company to pack with dirt after the concrete dried. But the concrete was still wet when the truck fell in. The East Bedford phase of the project has been plagued by broken water mains, several telephone cables and a rash of traffic accidents.

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco appealed to local producers Monday night to recognize the Castro County Farmers Union and help in the fight for better farm legislation in Austin and Washington. Naman spoke to an audience of 45 in the Hart High School cafeteria. A second organizational

meeting has been called for Monday night at 8 in the Farmers State Bank Community Room in Hart.

County Vice President, Doug Higgins appointed James Welch, Theron Morrison, Vic Nelson and Weldon Jones to a nominating committee and urged all interested farmers to attend the Monday, August 21 meeting.

At this week's meeting, Naman gave an extensive report on state and federal legislation affecting farmers, and outlined the Farmers Union stance on bills pending in Congress.

"We are not in favor of deregulation of gas prices," he said. "We are opposing the gas bill, and it looks like it will be defeated."

The new \$190-million dollar funding of the Agriculture Conservation Program "is a big victory for the Farmers Union," he said.

On the Farm Credit Bill, he said "Although we support this, we don't advocate it as a substitute for farm income." He said the Farmers Union supports the Melcher Bill, which would require foreign beef to meet the same standards as domestic beef, "but it looks like this bill is not going to pass the House." Altho the Farmers

Union supported the original Disaster Aid Bill for farmers, Naman said, it is opposing the Administration's revised version.

The Sugar Act now before the House, which sets quotas and a 16 cent target price, "isn't as good as it should be, but we're supporting it," he said.

Naman said the Feed Grain Program "will be announced very late this year, probably in October. We are faced with a big crop this year, and we have to get our representatives to get busy and try to force the President to approve an adequate support level. A stable market of \$3 on grain sorghum and a little over \$2 on corn is just not adequate."

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

Cash prizes, composed of the entry fees, will be awarded to winners in each event. Spectators are welcome and there is no admission charges.

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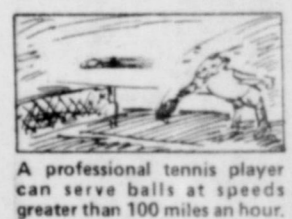
