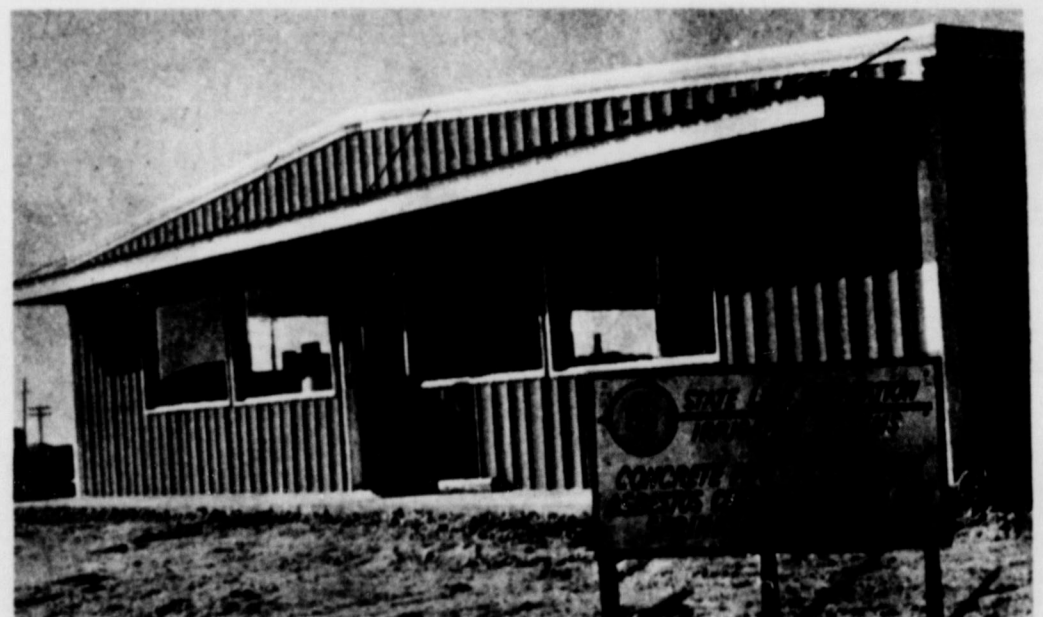

The yellow team of the girls major league little dribblers were honored Saturday night May 19, by their coaches, Jimmie Bradley and Cathy Jones.

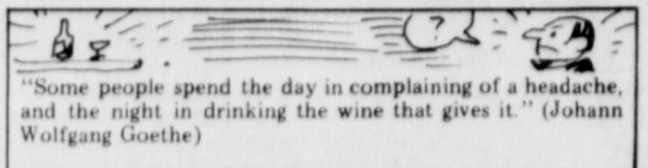

Power Mower Can Be Help On Hazard?

Twelve-year-old Tommy was mowing the lawn for his parents when he lost control for a moment as he pulled it back toward him from a little incline. But that moment, when the machine rolled against his foot, cost him two toes--and a lot of grief.

Power mowers are a big help when the grass is shooting up in the spring and early summer. But they demand a lot of respect. Their powerful motors driving heavy, sharp and fast-turning blades cause a lot of unnecessary injuries every summer.

Even middle-aged dads and innocent bystanders can be victims. One man, leaning down to pull out some debris clogging the chute, lost his balance--and most of his right hand.

Perhaps you know of a horror story from your own neighborhood. Every year hospital emergency rooms treat hundreds of these needless power mower victims.

Here are precautions you can take to cut the risk of injury to yourself and your family.

First, don't let young children run the power mower. They aren't mature enough to appreciate the danger. Remember that the mower case hides the equivalent of a 21-inch machete blade. Would you allow your youngster to swing one of these?

Wear heavy shoes. Never use a power mower while you are barefoot or wearing sandals or canvas shoes.

Always shut off the motor before adding gas, before oil-

ing or adjusting it. Always shut off the motor to clean out the chute or to remove grass or debris. Clear the area of sticks, stones, bottle caps or other small debris before you mow. Small objects can be picked up and hurled like bullets, injuring children or pets in the area.

Keep children out of the yard while you are mowing. This will keep them from being hurt if an object is propelled in their direction or if they should fall in front of the mower. On an incline, stand at the top and mow down the hill, pulling it back--or better yet, mow "sideways" to the hill. If you stand at the bottom and put the mower up, your feet are in danger every time the mower rolls back.

Community injury control specialists of HEW's Bureau of Community Environmental Management (part of the Health Services and Mental Health Administration) also remind you to read and follow the instructions of the machine itself. They are for your protection. These simple and sensible precautions will allow you to enjoy the convenience of a power mower without needless injury.

Homemaking Tips...

Pamper the Small Patient with Special Get-Well Extras!

Although a sick child needs the same general care as an adult who is ill, a mother can provide special "extras" to ease the anxiety and boredom of the small patient.

It's pleasant for a child to be near a window where he can look out. Place the bed so that no draft will cross if the window is open. A gaily-patterned bedspread can perk up spirits. Have two on hand, preferably the easy-to-laundry kind, so you can interchange them easily.

CHILDREN AND CLOWNS GO TOGETHER. Create a happy atmosphere for a child with a whole parade of clowns performing their antics on a coordinated set of sheets, bedspread, towels and shower rug. The colors bounce back from machine washing as bright and gay as ever.

AND STILL MORE CLOWNS: On the inflatable furniture scene, there is a clown chair for youngsters. His happy face serves as a headrest and makes a squeaking sound when squeezed. Sticky smudges and paint or crayon marks are easy to wipe off the vinyl surface. And the chair is so light, the tiniest tot can pull it around without damage to floor or other furnishings.

When you give medicine or any treatment, briefly explain what you are going to do so he will be prepared and may even be more cooperative. Never leave any medication at a bedside table; bring it into the

room only when you are going to administer it.

Avoid asking how he feels too often as you can cause alarm by showing too much concern. Should you detect any changes in his condition, try to be casual about it and continue with your usual tasks while in front of him.

Pick a favorite toy animal or doll, of the unbreakable, washable variety, to share the patient's bed. A potato bag pinned to the bedspread can hold other favorite playthings within easy reach.

A good morale builder for a little girl is to arrange her hair in a glamorous way, perhaps adding a fresh ribbon. You might have one cute pair of special pajamas laid back for these special times.

Don't get so involved with household duties that you don't allow time to play with a sick child. You can combine some of the work with visiting. Take the ironing in and tell stories as you work, or straighten dresser drawers; paste photos in family album; bring it up-to-date. The patient can even help. How about letting him help paste in trading stamps.

When appetite lags, try brightening up the meal tray. Put meat and vegetables on skewers, cut an orange like the petals of a flower, form circles, squares and triangles out of toast. A special fun drink can brighten spirits. Try this vitamin C and protein special called Orange and Egg. Beat an egg in blender or mixer until frothy. Add 1/2 to 3/4 cup cold orange juice and 2 teaspoons of

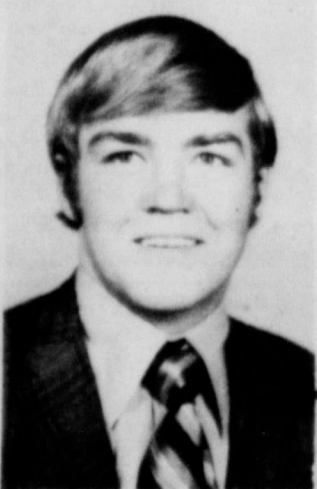

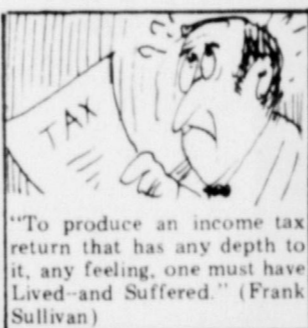

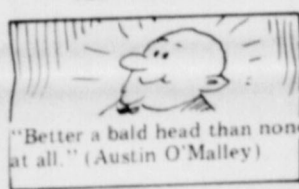
Number Of Area Businesses Down In Past Year

The number of businesses listed by Dun & Bradstreet in Earth is down 5 per cent compared to figures released at the same time last year. According to Jesse L. Patterson, manager for the business information company in Amarillo, there are 35 concerns listed in the March edition of D & B's Reference Book compared with 37 reported 12 months ago. Mr. Patterson also announced that Dun & Bradstreet is sending computer prepared forms with the key facts on file on a scheduled basis throughout the year to companies who are listed in the Reference Book so that the information can be reviewed and verified. Com-

panies also are being asked to provide current financial statements. "The program", Mr. Patterson said, "augments regular calls by business analysts to update information and is one more example of D & B's continuing practice of improving the accuracy of the facts it supplies." Out of the total of almost three million manufacturing, wholesaling and retailing businesses listed in the current D & B Reference Book, Mr. Patterson said that there are just slightly over 21,000 companies with a financial strength of \$1 million or over. Yet, they are responsible for one-third of the nation's sales and

more than two-thirds of its employment. However, Mr. Patterson pointed out that half of the names rated by D & B have an individual business worth of less than \$75,000 and 28 per cent are worth less than \$20,000. The U. S. Economic structure, he explained still depends on small business as a user and supplier of goods and services, able to make safe, rapid business credit decisions, as a key ingredient in the success of the overall company. Mirroring the dynamic nature of the American economy an average of 5,000 daily changes occur among the businesses listed in the D & B Reference Book. The six volume book is

revised every two months to keep pace with this constant movement and update credit and marketing facts. The D & B Reference Book does not include non-commercial services and professional businesses, Mr. Patterson said. Therefore, the figure for total businesses in Earth, as well as the three million number quoted for the United States, is actually somewhat higher.

Could You Pass A Test On Aging?

Remember that May is Senior Citizens Month. Could you pass a test on aging? See how much you really do know? Just answer true or false to the following statements: In our time it is not extraordinary to live 10, 20 or 30 years past 65 and still have full possession of one's faculties. It is never too late to plan for retirement; however, the earlier the better. People who do nothing with their leisure time "rot" out their 60's and 70's.

The Government feels that aging and retirement are a problem in our country. In 1971 the first White House Conference on Aging was held. Older people lend more stability to the labor force. There are many opportunities today for retired people. Older people can become involved and can undertake projects without leaving their homes. Your County Extension home economist can use volunteer help.

All of the above statements are true. If you didn't get all of them right, don't be discouraged--there are many unfounded myths or assumptions about aging. One common myth is, "You can't teach an old dog new tricks." But an "old dog" can learn new tricks, if he wants to. Many Senior Citizens are involved in all kinds of classes; some are finishing high school and others are in college. Another myth is that additional years of life naturally mean increased disease. Doctors and investigators report that as a person grows older,

he doesn't necessarily withdraw and become senile, and that good health is common to many Senior Citizens. Retirement from work, then doesn't mean retirement from life. It's best to retire to something instead of from it. In retirement, free of leisure time of an older person may provide his first opportunity for creativity and social and civic services. Society has the responsibility to help make such opportunity available. "Time-killing" amusements and "do-good" activities provide little satisfaction for anyone. A sound, balanced program can offer opportunities for self-expression, service and pure enjoyment of living. Involvement in program or activity is the key to success in use of leisure time with senior citizens. A display or exhibit of creative activities, changing periodically, can stimulate experiments with familiar or with new activities. The opportunity to "do-with" or "participate-in" can also stimulate involvement. Good ideas for recreation are almost limitless. Physical activities can be selected for each individual; they are not taboo for the senior citizen. An older citizen can derive fuller satisfaction from leisure time if he is doing something for someone else or working with another person. Activities based on the felt needs and interests of the older person are more rewarding. These activities are for senior citizens and others to share with them. Avoid any semblance of charity or paternalism in offering programs. Making decisions and being creative and useful are most rewarding uses of leisure time by senior citizens.


Senior Citizens Food Guide

COLLEGE STATION---As a person grows older, his nutritional needs change, one authority pointed out. "The senior citizen requires nutrients and food energy just like a younger person-but in different amounts," Karen Kreipke, foods and nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, explained. "When selecting foods during May--Senior Citizens Month--and throughout the year, the Daily Food Guide is beneficial. Choose foods from each of its four basic food groups--milk, fruits and vegetables, meat, and bread-cereal--for a balanced diet." Senior citizens need two or more cups of milk daily--either as fluid milk or a combination of milk group foods--all kinds of milk, cheese and ice cream. "An older person needs fewer calories in his diet. Knowing this, many could utilize skim, lowfat and butter milk--which provide calcium to keep bones strong, yet are low in calories. "Other calorie-wise choices include cottage cheese--lower in calories than either cheddar or cream cheeses--and ice milk, which has fewer calories but more calcium than ice cream. "The fruit and vegetable group offers considerable variety for diets. Of four servings daily, utilize one which provides vitamin C and another which supplies vitamin A. The recommended serving is 1 cup or a usual portion. "Cantaloupe, grapefruit, oranges, strawberries, watermelon, asparagus tips, broccoli, greens, potatoes cooked in their jackets and tomatoes are good sources of vitamin C. "Vitamin A-rich foods include dark green or deep yellow fruits and vegetables--apricots, broccoli, cantaloupe, carrots, pumpkin, greens and sweet potatoes." Persons having difficulty chewing should cook chop or mash foods that cause problems, Miss Kreipke suggested. "As for meat group foods, senior citizens need two or more servings each day to provide protein for body repair. Meat, poultry, fish, eggs, dry peas or beans, nuts and peanut butter fill this requirement. "One serving consists of two or three ounces of lean cooked meat, fish or poultry. Or, two eggs, one cup cooked dry beans or four tablespoons peanut butter. "Less expensive meat cuts are just as nutritious as expensive ones," the specialist emphasized. "Either have such meats ground or cook in liquid to make them tender." The final group consists of bread and cereals. "Bread-cereal foods include

Lamb County Produced 177,215 Barrels of Oil Last Year

DALLAS--In the face of unprecedented demand, Texas oil fields last year produced almost 1.3-billion barrels of crude oil, an all-time record for the state. This figure was tops among the nation's oil-producing states and represented some 38-percent of total U.S. production, according to statistics compiled by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

These figures show an increase of more than 67.8 million barrels over production in 1971. They reflect that during the last nine months of the state's 254 counties, was valued at some \$4.5 billion. year, the Texas Railroad Commission maintained a maximum efficient production rate for Texas fields. This marked the first time Texas wells had produced all-out since 1948. Last year's crude oil production, recorded in 203 of the

In 83 years of recorded production, Texas has produced nearly 37-billion barrels of oil, about 36-percent of total U. S. production.

Lamb County, which has had recorded production since 1945, last year produced 177,215 barrels of oil at the rate of 484 barrels a day. Production in 1972 boosted Lamb County's production total through the end of the year to 12,021,447 barrels.

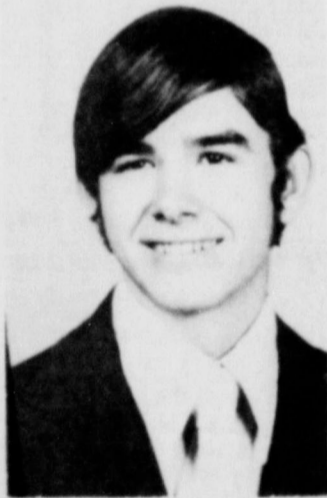

Pavement Marking Take On New Color

AUSTIN--Inside line pavement markings on divided highways will take on a new color soon, the Texas Highway Department has announced.

Soon the inside edge line will be yellow to conform to changes in the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices issued by the U. S. Department of Transportation.

Previously both the inside and outside edge lines were painted white. Painting the inside edgeline yellow will correspond with the solid yellow center line on undivided highways, which denotes a restriction against passing. Thus, the yellow edgeline will serve as a reminder to avoid crossing the median into opposing lanes of traffic.

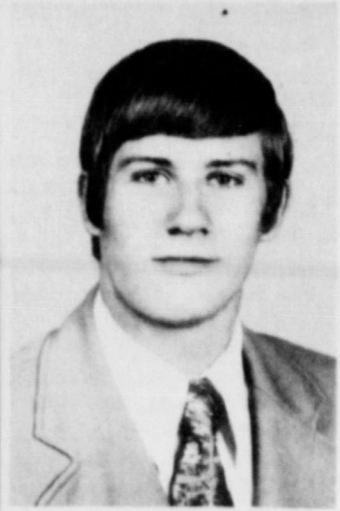

of Agriculture inspection seal on it," Commissioner White stated.

The weights and measures inspectors of the Texas Department of Agriculture are responsible for making unannounced checks on gasoline pumps to encourage pump owners to keep them in proper working order. "But there are several precautions the consumer should take," Commissioner White said.

A good way to check the accuracy of the pump price and gallon computer is to note the price when the pump has dispensed 10 gallons of gas. If the price is 36.9 cents per gallon, the computer should register \$3.69 when the 10-gallon mark is reached.

Also if the capacity of the gasoline tank on the car is

only 18 gallons, and the pump reads 20 gallons, the pump may not have been reset to zero, or it may be malfunctioning.

The date of the latest inspection appears on the seal. "If you suspect that the gauge is incorrect, notify the district office of the Texas Department of Agriculture immediately," Commissioner White said. The station is in violation of

weights and measures laws if the pumps are inaccurate.

Commissioner White also advised the consumer to make sure the attendant reads the right pump, especially at rush hours. This also means checking the credit card sales ticket.

A gas tank cap accidentally left at the station also adds dollars to gasoline expenses and replacement costs. Make sure the attendant replaces the

cap. Any irregularities in gasoline sales should be reported to the Consumer Services Division, Texas Department of Agriculture, Austin 78711, or to the district office located in Lubbock, Odessa, Stephenville, Tyler, Houston, San Antonio, or Pharr.

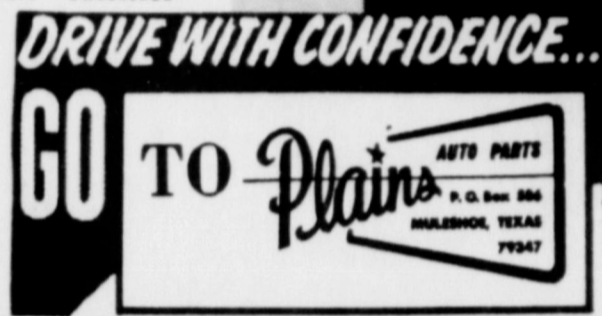

'73 Cotton Contest For 4-Hers Opens

Young People Apply For SS Cards Long Before Job

Young people should apply for their social security cards several weeks before they'll need a social security number for their first job, according to John G. Hutton, social security district manager in Lubbock. "They can apply at any social security office," he said. An application for a social security card is generally screened against files at the national record center in Baltimore to make sure no other social security number has been previously issued to the same person. "This

screening can take time," Hutton said, "but it's important to keep your social security record straight." A young worker builds disability, survivors, retirement, and Medicare protection for himself and his family by work and earnings credited to his social security number. "A worker should show his employer his social security card so his name and social security number can be correctly copied for the employer's records," Hutton said. "You should never give your

"Your social security number is yours alone and remains the same for life," Hutton said.

The social security card stub or a record of the social security number should always be kept in a safe place, according to Hutton. If you lose the social security card you carry in your purse or wallet, you can get a duplicate faster if you have the stub or a record of your number," he said.

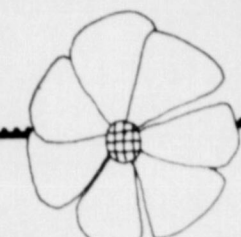

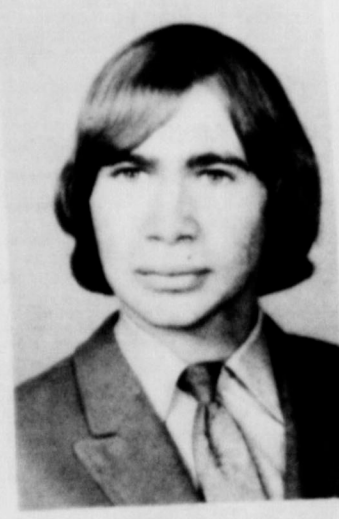

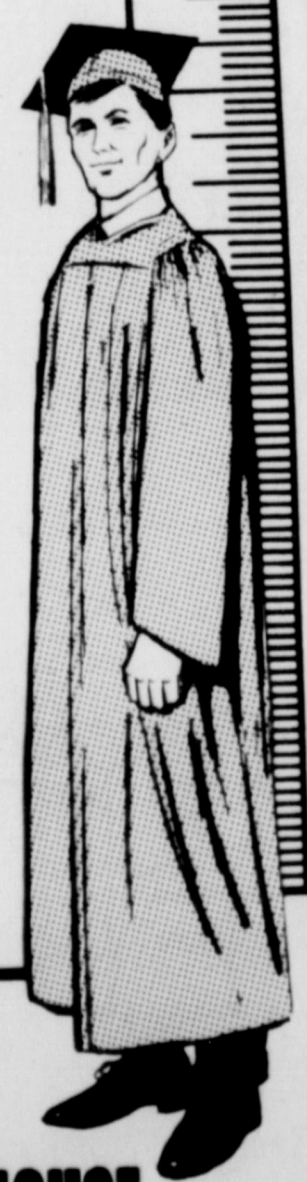

Third Suit Filed in Train Bus Accident

A third suit was filed in district court here Friday against the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe Railway Company, the Littlefield Independent School District and Artis Ray Johnson, Mr. and Mrs. George Davis filed a \$40,000 suit against the railroad, school district and the bus driver in the February 6 train-bus collision which killed the couple's 10-year-old daughter Julia Ann, and injured 11-year-old Jennifer Leigh and 7-year-old Clifford. The suit filed by Mr. and Mrs. Davis, individually and on behalf of their children, is the third suit filed in District Judge Pat Boone's 154th judicial court, and brings the total to almost \$2 million.

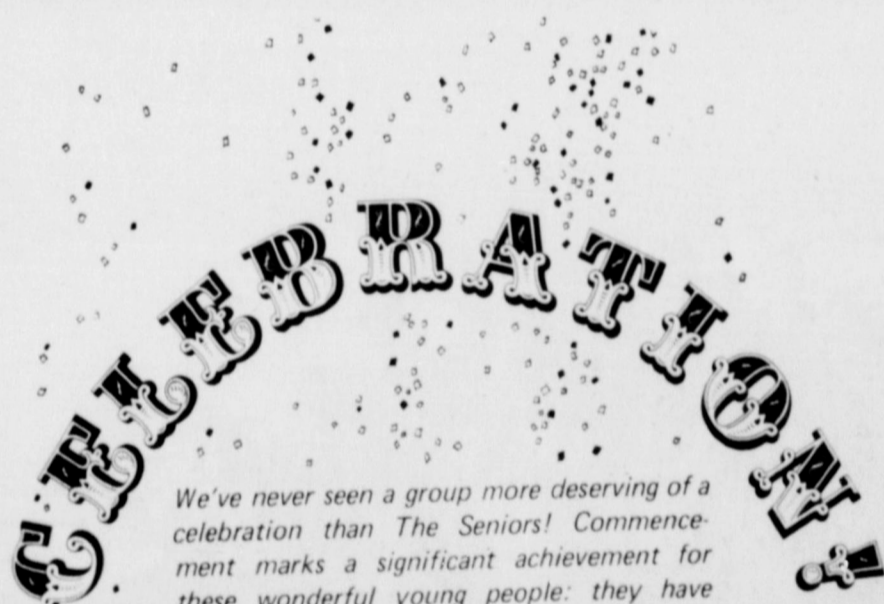
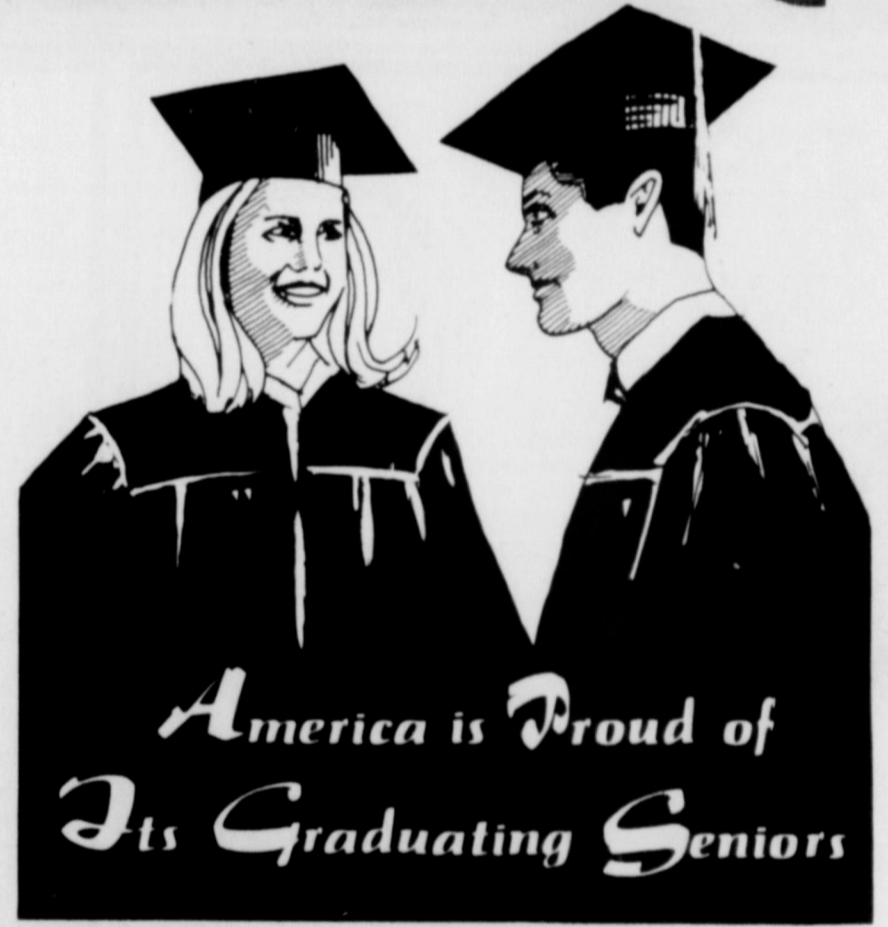
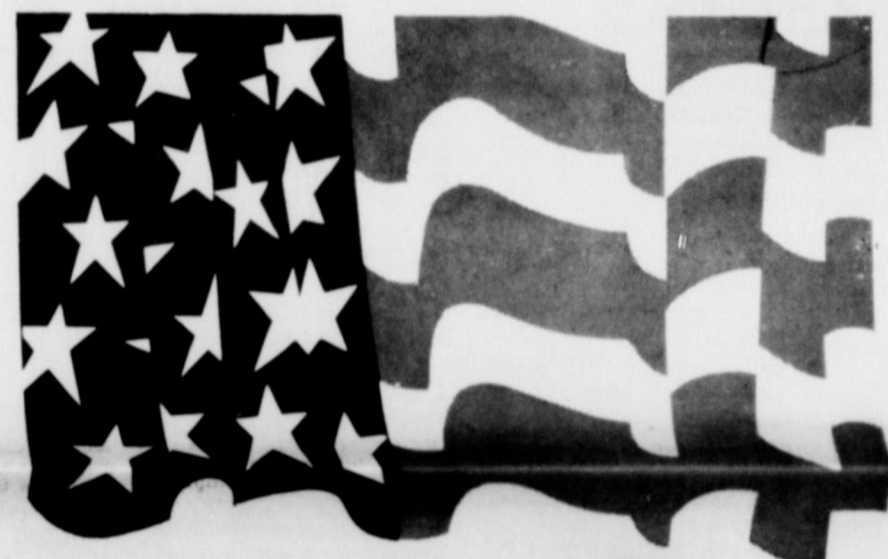
School District was negligent in certain acts or omission they were under a duty to perform or guard against; and that the driver of the bus, Artis Ray Johnson, was negligent in certain acts or omissions which he was under a duty to perform or guard against.

In addition to the \$40,000 damages for the death and personal injuries, the Davises seek court costs and other and further justly entitled relief.

In the first suit filed here, three of the families whose children were killed and injured asked for \$600,665 plus \$28,709 in future medical expenses. The first suit was filed by Mr. and Mrs. Andres Medina Sr., Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Diaz Sr., and Mr. and Mrs. Pablo Martinez Sr. The Medina's 16-year-old daughter, Maria, died in the crash. The other families' children suffered injuries.

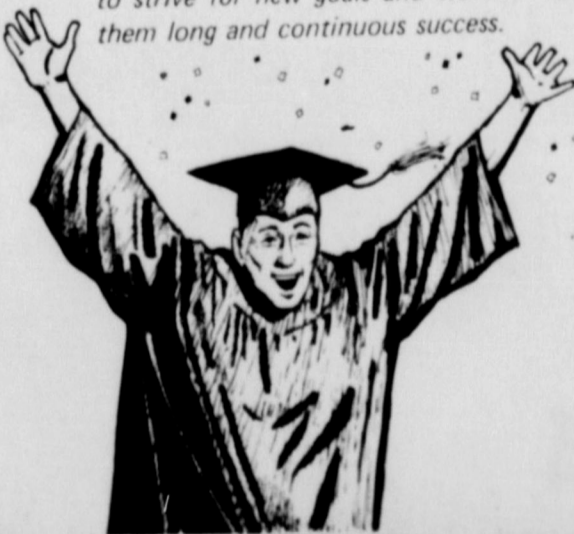
The second suit was filed by Mr. and Mrs. Larry Ortiz and Mr. and Mrs. Don Foley and asks for \$1 million plus \$300,000 future medical expenses.

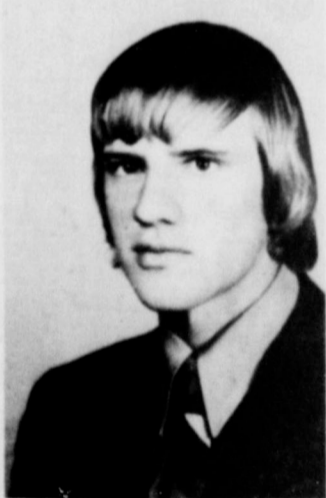

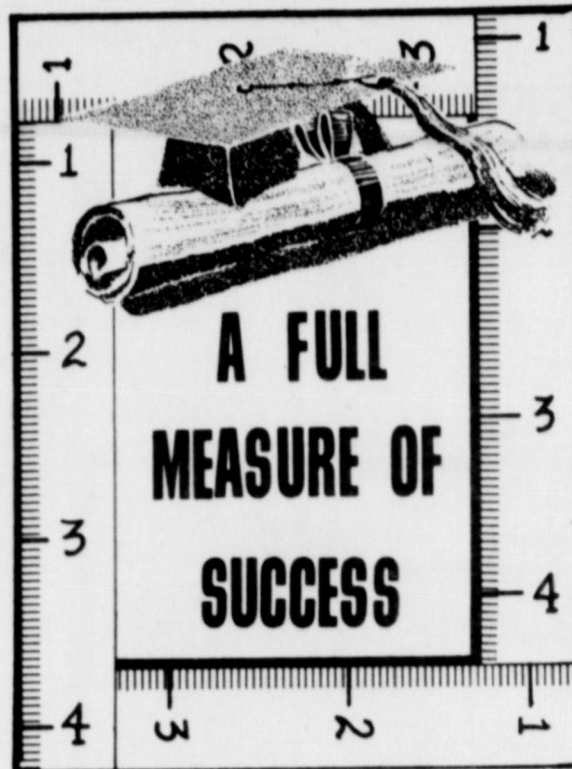

Trailers Used To Control Air Pollution

In its continuing effort to control air pollution, the State Health Department's Air Pollution Control Services has gone into the trailer business. The trailers actually are portable air monitoring stations, which will monitor all major air pollutants in the urban areas of the State. The first of the stations, designed to detect dangerous pollution buildings, went into operation in April at an elementary school in Jacinto City near the Houston Ship Channel. Super sophisticated instruments in the movable trailer-like station measure about a dozen different pollutants continuously and automatically. The station teletypes instant pollution readings to the State Health Department's Air Pollution Control Services headquarters in Austin during periods of air stagnation. Roger Wallis, chief air quality evaluator, said the station's continuous readings also will help determine steps needed

to comply with federal air standards. Additional monitoring stations will be set up in the Houston region, probably by next fall. Eventually, 12 stations will be put in operation throughout the State. Wallis hopes the full 12-station network can be operating by fall. By early summer, stations are expected to be set up in Beaumont, Corpus Christi and Dallas. All major urban areas of Texas will have at least one station. Wallis said the staff of Air Pollution Control Services is designing and assembling the \$60,000 stations itself after determining that each would cost at least \$85,000 if built by an outside contractor. Using gas chromatographs and other instruments, the new station monitors carbon monoxide, hydrocarbons, methane, sulfur compounds, ozone, nitrogen oxides and other pollutants. Wallis said the station will

be manned for several hours a day during a break-in period, but it is designed to function automatically without technicians being present. It will be manned during air stagnation periods, he said, to keep close check on the data that is printed out electronically every five minutes. Although the station, built with state and federal funds, is on a trailer, its location at the Jacinto City Elementary School is at least semipermanent. "The idea is to be able to say whether conditions are improving or growing worse, and you can't do that very well if you move the station around," Wallis said. The Jacinto City location was chosen because of its proximity to the Houston Ship Channel, "where we figure to get the maximum concentration of pollution," Wallis said. "This installation is going to show people in an area where air pollution has long been a

problem that the people of Texas are trying to do something about pollution control," Fred C. Hartman, a member of the Texas Air Control Board from Baytown, said. Charles R. Barden, deputy commissioner for air pollution control and executive secretary of the Texas Air Control Board, called the new station "a giant step toward an important statewide network for air pollution control."

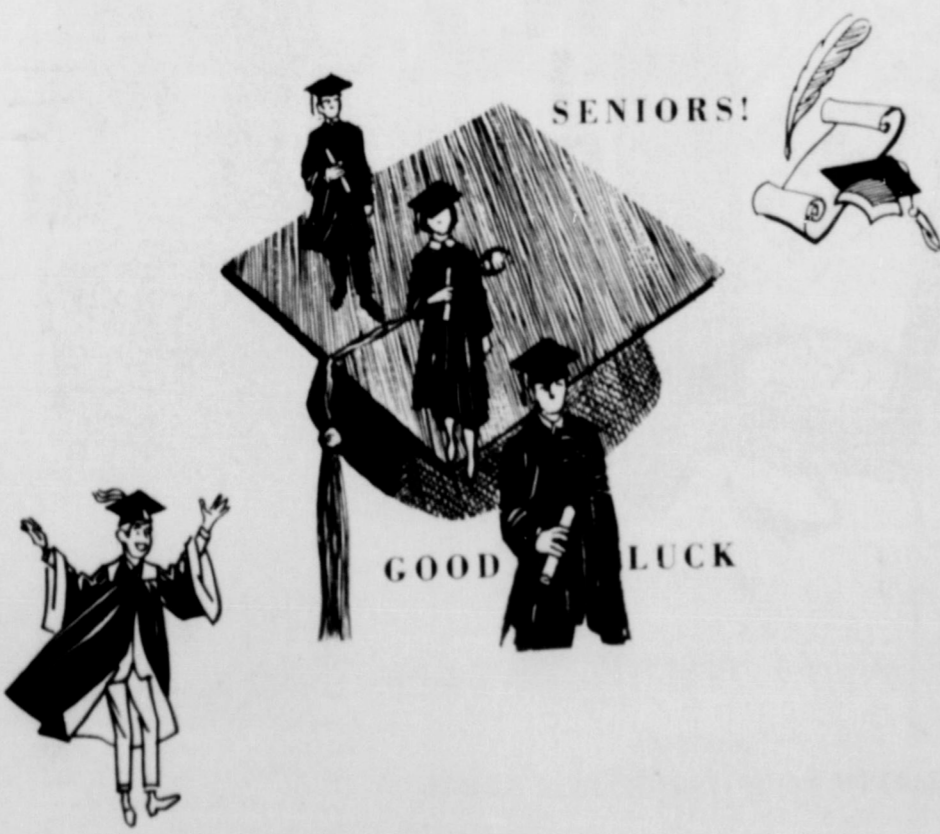

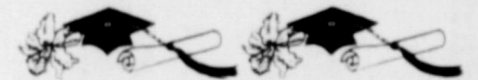
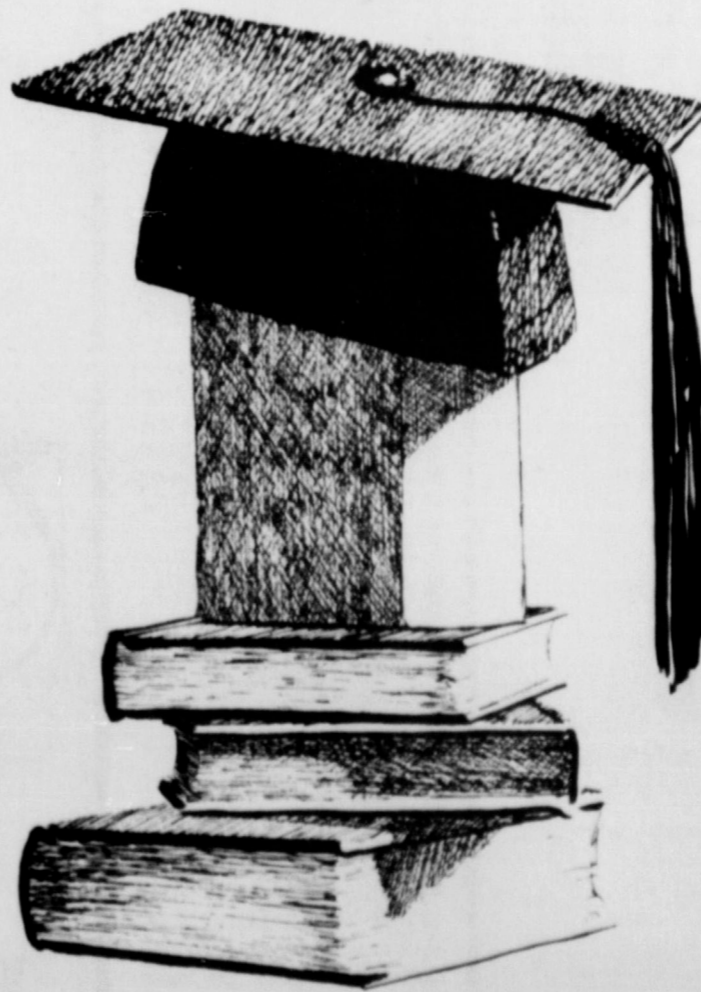

Children's Sleepwear Must Be Flame Flame Resistant By July 29

A sweeping move to make all small children's sleepwear fire resistant moves into its second phase in July, says the State Health Department.

On July 29, all children's sleepwear through size 6X must be flame resistant. Earlier, on June 7, mattresses and mattress pads must meet a flame resistant criteria.

The sleepwear standards are included in the Hazardous Substances Law which was repealed and replaced by the Texas legislature last year. The law became effective on January 1,

1973, but the July 29 date was selected by state health officials for compliance to keep state regulations compatible with federal flammability standards on sleepwear.

Incident after incident in Texas point up the need for flame resistant fabrics--not only in children but in adults and the elderly. When a person's clothing ignites, there's more than a good chance that the person will be burned--horribly, sometimes fatally, but always painfully.

Education and Welfare estimates that the annual toll of fabric ignition fires in this country is between 3,000 and 5,000 deaths, along with 150,000 to 250,000 injuries and directly related financial losses exceeding a quarter-billion dollars.

In clothing, it is the quick-ignition fabric which causes the greatest human losses, says Harold R. Ray, director of the State Health Department's Bedding and Product Safety Division, which is charged with enforcement of flammability standards.

Usually, this soft, highly-flammable material is put into children's clothing as well as nightgowns and robes worn by adults.

The new Texas law established requirements regarding flammability of liquids, solids, self-pressurized containers (aerosols) and children's clothing in certain size ranges, in addition to any other hazardous household articles accessible to small children.

Texas has a provision in its regulations moving into larger sizes, 7 to 14, and children's outer clothing through size 14, which will be implemented at a later date.

"When these go into effect, there will be regulations on all children's clothing through size 14 except diapers and underwear," said Ray.

Compliance dates for larger sizes of sleepwear and outer garments will be announced, and manufacturers will again be given 12 months to comply following the announcement. The dates will be in compliance with the new federal Consumer Product Safety Commission, once that body is appointed and functioning.

The early need for sleepwear standards is apparent. Tests have shown that flimsy, night apparel burns faster, for instance, than the body-fitting knit garments when worn. Thus, the sleepwear may become more of a torch than regular clothing when they catch on fire. And, in many cases, trim on the garments led to quicker ignition than similar garments without trim. It also makes a difference whether a garment is tested on a mannequin or a clothes hanger, which will vary the amount of oxygen circulating freely around the fabric.

Leading safety and health authorities are aware of burn studies conducted in Texas and other states--including studies made on fabrics and the results of burns on humans caused by clothing ignition.

"The conclusions of all," said Ray, "attest to the severity of burns when clothing is ignited, and point to the need of flame resistant fabrics in clothes, bedding, draperies, and upholstery."

Flammable clothing was involved in 61 percent of the patients treated at the Shriners Burns Institute in Galveston. The most tragic aspect of this, say institute officials, is that 79% of these injuries could have been avoided, if flame-resistant clothing had been available, these tragedies might never have occurred.

The long frilly nightgowns that little girls wear, and look very pretty in, are so flammable that if they come in contact with a flame, within

ten seconds the child will be severely burned. Such apparel easily goes up in flames when it comes in contact with an open space heater.

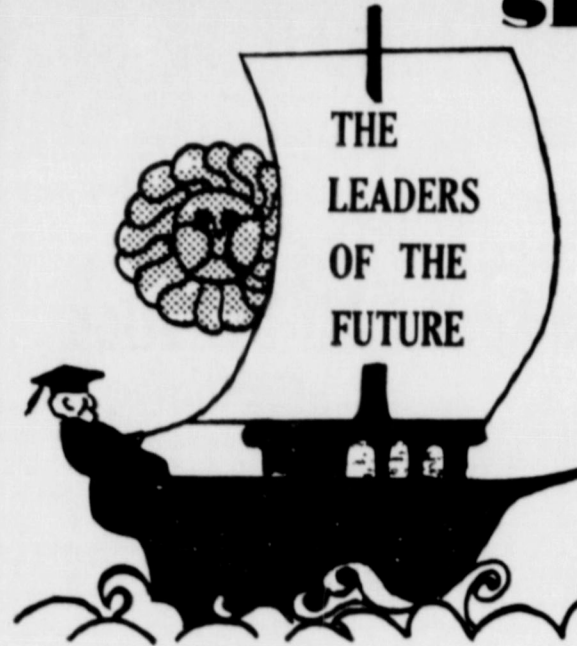
The National Burn Information Exchange, is one of their studies, reports that the injury severity differences between clothing and non-clothing burns are shocking. Clothing ignition victims are four times more likely to die than those spared clothing fire. Their burns covered nearly twice as much body surface, and six times more skin was burned full-thickness (totally demolished, requiring grafting). They spent an average of 21 more days from burn to hospital discharge, and their medical costs were \$5,000 higher than the average no-clothing-ignition patient.

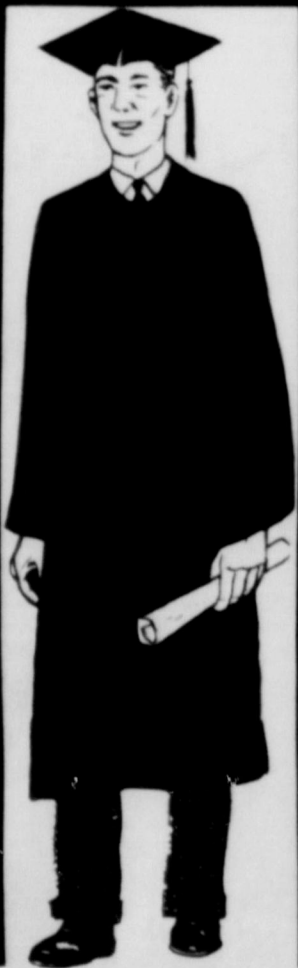

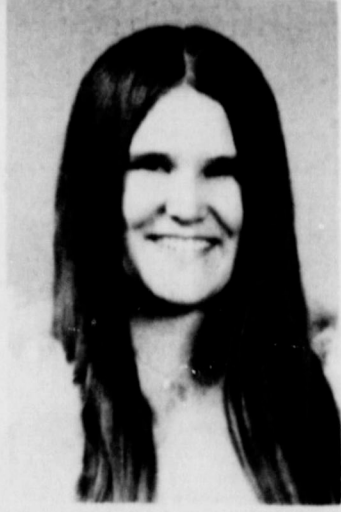
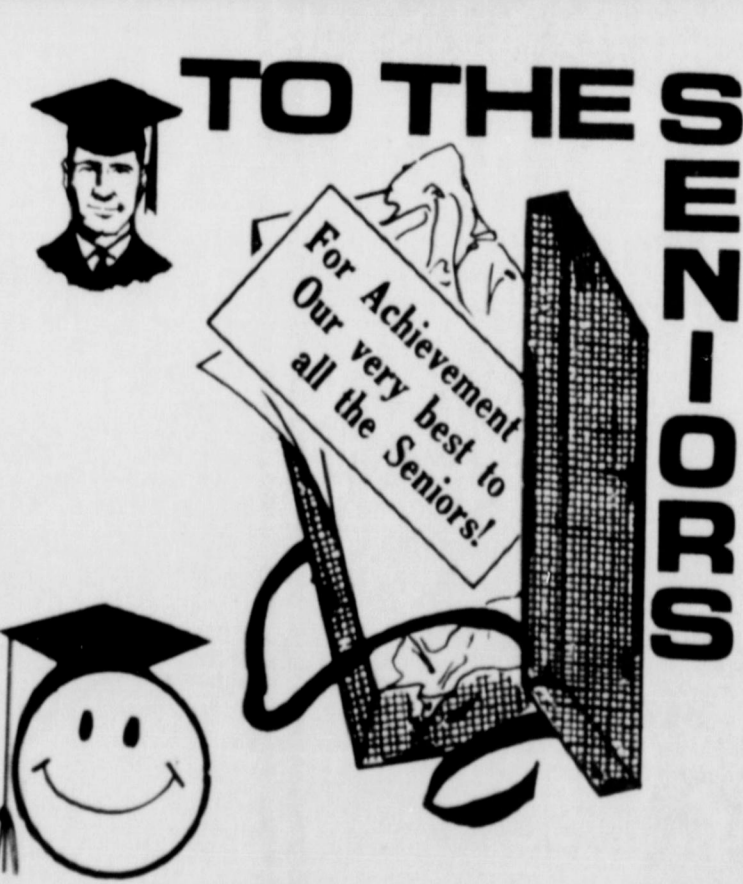

Clayton Sets Record In Passage of Legislation

State Representative Bill Clayton set a record in the House last week with the passage of 15 major pieces of legislation presented and passed by one individual in one day.

The legislation, all of statewide importance, included 13 bills relating to water districts one constitutional amendment to be presented, to the voters, and one banking bill. Rep. Clayton, obviously tired after the record-setting effort, stated it had been his busiest day ever spent as a member of the House of Representatives.

If voters approve the constitutional amendment proposed by Clayton, rural water supply co-operatives which furnish water to rural customers for domestic use only, will be exempt from ad valorem taxes. Clayton noted that all the legislation was of concern to his area, as well as the entire State.

The House has been working a six-day schedule for the past three weeks, and over 300 bills have been approved, including the school finance bill and other measures of major importance. Final day for the

session will be May 28, and Clayton stated that the penal reform bill was yet to be debated, as well as other bills of great significance to the State.

Rep. Clayton also noted that the school finance bill, though passed in the House, was yet to be approved by the Senate, and could face a veto by the

Governor if not certified to by the Comptroller.

Also on the Agenda this week was the appropriations conference committee report, to be presented for House approval. Clayton said that with approval of this report, the House would have completed all its essential work.

To Avoid Cold, Listen To Grandma And The Doctor

Sometimes it turns out that Grandmother's medical advice is right whether she knew why or not. Take the old maxim, "Bundle up and wear your rubbers," to keep from catching cold.

Medical experts will tell you now to avoid chilling and wet feet—now that these actually will cause colds but the practice will keep cold germs from getting a good foothold.

Since there are no scientific preventives and cures for the common cold, the best advice for a cold is not to catch one in the first place. Cold shots still are only effective against a small percentage of the many respiratory diseases lumped under the heading of colds. A multi-purpose cold vaccine is probably years in the future. And the wonder drug to cure a cold hasn't been found.

So we go back to the best preventives the communicable disease specialists with HEW's Health Services and Mental Health Administration can give. Basically it boils down to (1) Keep your body resistance up and (2) keep away from cold germs.

And some of the ways to do these may sound as homey as Grandma, but they're best advice scientists have come up with to date. In addition to the advice about dry feet and warm clothing:

- Stay away from those with colds; avoid crowds during cold epidemics.
- Avoid towels and dishes of those with colds.
- Wash your hands often, always before eating.
- Eat well-balanced meals, with emphasis on fruits and vegetables. Some experts feel that large doses of Vitamin C will help prevent colds although there is no positive proof.
- Get plenty of rest and sleep. Fatigue lowers resistance.
- Take a normal amount of exercise to keep blood moving freely and get fresh air.

Cold pills? They won't do a thing to keep the cold from coming. And if you have a cold, they won't cure it. The best they can do is relieve the runny nose, watering eyes and nasal congestion while the cold runs its course. The same is true of nose drops and gargles. The best and safest medicine for a cold is aspirin.

What else can you do if you have a cold? Don't proudly brag about being able to "keep going." It is no kindness to your associates nor to yourself for there can be serious complications following a cold. Go to bed if possible.

Forget another of grandmother's old maxims: "Feed a cold and starve a fever." You should eat lightly with emphasis on li-

quids, especially fruit juices and soups. Digestion of heavy food taxes the body's energies. A few other tips: when you blow your nose, gently to prevent forcing infection, into sinuses and ears; use paper tissues and discard them in a paper bag so they won't be handled again; don't use med-
