# Film Tips

Camera buffs are urged to properly prepare film being sent through the mail for processing to help preserve those precious summer photographic memories

Each year, according to Postmaster Miller. thousands of film packages end up in dead letter offices throughout the country because of careless wrapping and addressing, often resulting in a missing pictorial record of vacation trips.

The following tips will help ensure safer handling of film while in the mail stream.

Place film cartridges in sturdy envelopes. When possible use the envelopes usually supplied by film

processing companies. Make sure that the processor's mailing address as well as a return address are written legibly on the outside

envelope. Use Zip Codes. As an extra precaution, tape your name and address to the film roll or cartridge before inserting it in the envelope. Your name and address should be written also on the back of any photographs being sent in for retouching, copying or other purposes, Postmaster Ford

## Deach Children Jo Avoid Molesters

The sick, sad subject of sexual abuse of children often is ignored because it is so unpleasant. Yet parents need to tell their children more than 'don't take candy strangers' in order to protect them adequately, the Texas Medical Association (TMA) says.

Since a child molester an be almost any age and ften knows the child, the tereotype of the dirty old man in a raincoat in the park often does not apply. One survey showed that most females molested were related to the molester by blood or marriage. Most males molested knew the molester but were not related. Other surveys said molesters often were between ages 1867 (with concentrations in the

teens, 30s and 50s), had varied educational backgrounds and often had good jobs. About the only thing surveyors all agreed on was that most molesters were male with only rare examples of female molesters occurring.

Protecting a child from such a shadowy cloud of suspects can be difficult without making the child afraid of all adults. TMA offers these suggestions; drawn from sources ranging from Lady's Circle magazine to a handbook by the county prosecutor's office in Minneapolis.

When talking with a child, parents should be open, unembarrassed and willing to discuss sensitive subjects. Honestly answering questions on a child's level of understanding can help keep the atomosphere clear of fear or guilt. Since a child may be too young to understand molestation, parents' attitudes can

shape the child's understanding of the subject. Parental hysteria has a greater chance of emotionally harming the child than a calm explanation that some situations and acts should be avoided just like hot stoves or other common hazards

If the child is too young to understand what sexual perversion is, he or she can be told to avoid situations or actions for common sense reasons. For instance, a parent can say that some body parts should be touched only by specified people such as parents or medical personnel because the parts otherwise may become infected.

Accepting rides gifts or jobs without telling parents should avoided, even if the child is acquainted with the person who offers.

FARM INCOME PROSPECTS PERK UP-Net realized farm income in Texas may be up some 15 to 20 percent in 1978 from the depressed level in 1977. Brisk demand and less-than-expected production have substantially boosted prices and potential earnings for livestock producers. Improved earning prospects for crop farmers are due to larger benefits from government programs, deteriorating production prospects because of drought conditions in some areas and too much moisture in others, and strong export demand.

PLAN FOR THIS WINTER'S FEED-Cattlemen should be looking for available sources of protein supplement and keeping a close check on prices. Smart and early shopping for supplemental feed can mean longrange production savings. Protein sources hit seasonal lows as pastures green up and then show higher prices in the summer and early fall. Protein supplement is one of the largest out-of-pocket expenses in a cattle operation.

MEAT IMPORT SITUATION-Although the meat import level for 1978 was recently increased by President Carter, U.S. cattlemen are still the net winners through foreign trade. Income effects on producers from the greater imports of 1978 should be minimal. The U.S. exports more beef and cattle by-products in dollars and cents than it imports. The majority of exports are hides, tallow, variety meats and by-products which have a low

COTTON STUDY ON WATER AVAILABILITY-Certain soils have "shallow reserviors" of available water that must be replenished frequently while cotton is blooming and fruiting to avoid yield reductions. Such soils include the medium-textured types of the Rolling Plains and the fine-textured ones found in South Texas. These soils have limited water-holding capacity and can restrict root growth Increasing organic matter and certain tillage techniques help.

CONTROL WHITE GRUBS IN LAWNS-May or June beetles are emerging from the soil and starting to swarm late in the evening. The females are laying eggs and the white grub worms that hatch will soon be feeding on the roots of bermudagrass and St. Augustinegrass in home lawns. Once the grubs begin feeding, control measures should be taken.

Treatment time varies with the particular area of the state and ranges from early July in South Texas to mid-August in the Panhandle. Homeowners in Lamb County will need to treat between July 20-August 5, 1978. Timing of application is critical for adequate control.

White grubs in excessive numbers can heavily damage lawns. Check for white grubs by cutting a square foot section of sod with a shovel and examining all of the roots and soil to a depth of 4 inches. Examine at least one square foot of sod for each 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Chemical treatment is needed if there are more than four grubs pe. square foot of sod.

Diazinon provides adequate control and should be used at the recommended rates given on the chemical container label. The granular form is easier to apply and easier to wash into the soil than the liquid or spray formulations. After using granules, drag the grass with a tow sack or water hose to knock the granules down to the soil. Then apply enough water to soak the granules into

Apply diazinon sprays at the rate of 25 gallons of water, including the insecticide, per 1,000 square feet to wash the insecticide into the soil. Wetting the lawn before spray application also helps. Always keep children and pets off the treated lawn until the grass is

The key to white grub control in home lawns is proper timing of chemical applications and getting the insecticide through the grass to the root zone where the



are designing or remodeling facilities to accommodate the handicapped," Cook said. "Parks are for people and that means ALL the people

Cook said the book points out exact locations of raised or recessed print interpretive plaques, push-button audiovisual stations and taped messages which are available at wayside stations or along trails and park roads.

#### Purchase Safe Sunglasses

Consumers purchasing sunglasses may blinded by fashion and But price appeals. overlooking safety considerations could damage their eyes, the Texas Medical Association says.

Buyers may get eye strain, altered depth perception, a distorted view of surroundings, and a chance for physical injury if they purchase the wrong kind of sunglasses. The American Society for the Prevention of Blindness recommends holding goal of providing beneficial, comfortable the sunglasses at half an arm's length and looking at an object with strong horizontal and vertical lines. If the lines waver when you move the glasses sideways, up and down, then the lenses are distorted. Also check to see that the lenses are equal color and density or they can cause eve strain due to altered depth perception. Any altered view

surroundings could contribute to accidents. Colors can be altered if the lenses are an odd shade. Gray or smoke color, followed by green or brown tints, recommended. TMA says other colors do little or nothing to cut glare. One color, inteneded to sharpen contracst and

percent of available light. This special shade of yellow sometimes is used by skiiers and hunters to help them see under dull or hazy conditions, according to literature from the Bausch and Lomb lens

company. How much light a lens lets in is one of the most critical factors to consider when purchasing sunglasses. The society recommends that no more than 30 percent of light should pass through the lens. Bausch and Lomb says sunglasses do not provide adequate protection if a person can look in a mirror and see his or her eyes very well while wearing the glasses.

Some people favor wearing glasses that get darker in sunlight and lighter under dim conditions. An Austin optician says these lenses may need to be changed after about three years because they tend to stay dark as they get older. People with thick lenses may not be able to wear the special glasses at all because the amount of coloring in thick lenses may make the glasses too dark all the time. Wearing dark lenses when they are not needed can decrease vision so much that people can fall or have other accidents.



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


