



This system has four component parts: financial and production data, inventory and depreciable schedule, profit and loss statement and enterprise analysis. Financial and production data are processed each month while other parts of the system are processed annually.

> According to Parker, the basic difference in the two systems is that the Farm Record System is totally manual while Tel-Fac is computerized. However, the computer does not compensate for incomplete or inaccurate data, emphasizes the economist. County Extension agents can assist producers with either of the two systems.

In addition to these accounting systems, several others are available from lending institutions and commercial concerns. "Which system a producer uses is not important, but some system definitely should be used, " believes Parker.




