Thirty-seven area high school bands participated, with the spectacular half-time shows beginning at 11 a. m., each show lasting 8 minutes.

The panel of judges were three well-known band directors, Fran Piersol of Iowa State University, Jim Jacobsen of Texas Christian University, and Dr. Ted Crager of West Texas State College.

Class A, the largest of the five classes include Tahoka, Hale Center, Kress, Sundown, Sudan, Seagraves, O'Donnell, Springlake, Petersburg, Crosbyton, Idalou, Plains and Ralls. Of the 90 members in the Springlake Band 77 participated in the Tuesday Contest.

Adrian Store Damaged by Fire

Earth Volunteer Firemen stubbornly fought, in nearly freezing temperatures Friday night, a major fire which partially gutted the rear interior of the Adrian Food Store.

V. L. Smith, Jr., fire chief, reports the fire occurred about 10:30 p. m. and was thought to have been caused from an overhead gas heating unit in the southwest corner of the building.

The wind, blowing from the east, helped keep the fire from spreading to the adjoining Blair Dry Goods. Dense clouds of smoke forced firemen to use smoke masks before entering the burning building. All intersections within a block of the fire were closed to traffic.

A number of residents braved the icy weather and watched the fire from a distance. Both Earth fire trucks were called to the scene.

John D. Adrian, owner of the store, says the damage is estimated at \$16,000. As soon as the debris is cleared away, repairs will begin. The business will open as soon as repairs are completed.

Cotton Market Quotas To Be Voted on Soon

The 1963 Cotton Marketing Quota referendum will be held December 11, 1962. Farmers who were engaged in the production of Upland Cotton in 1962 will be eligible to vote in the referendum. At least 2/3 of those voting must approve quotas if they are to continue.

If Marketing quotas are approved, marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton of producers who do not comply with their acreage allotments, and price support to those who do comply will be available at a level within the range of 85 to 90 percent of parity. If quotas are not approved, the allotment program will remain in effect with price support at 80% of parity available to growers who comply with their allotment, but if allotments are not complied with there will be no penalties.

Mrs. David Johnson and Pat Montgomery of Earth are cousins of Mrs. Garraway.

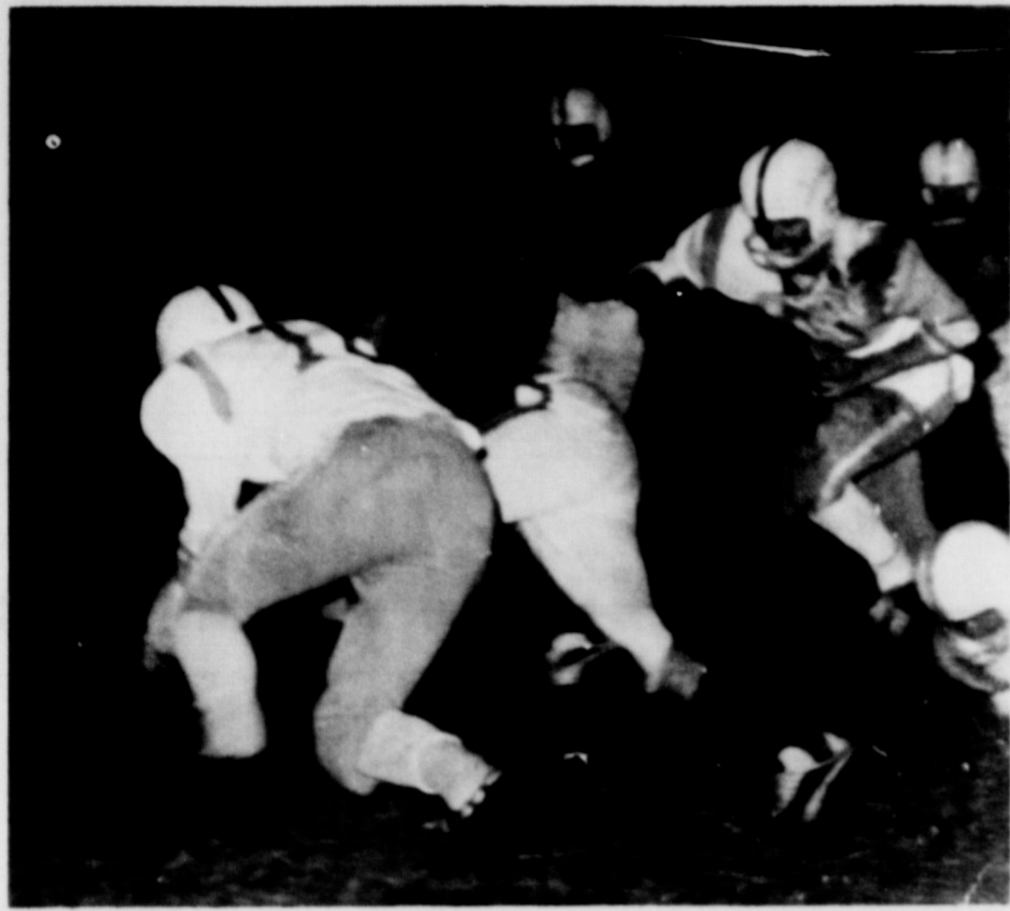
Calling All Boys and Girls

Wolverines Upset Farwell Steers 15-7

Springlake started the night off in grand style Friday by winning the toss of the coin and electing to receive. Don Sanders took the kick off and returned the ball back 15 yards before being dropped on the 33 yard line. With Cary Latham at quarterback, the handoff went to Jerry Been who picked up 4 yards. On second down the chain had to be brought in from the sidelines to check if Dale Dent had the first down. Shy about three inches, Cary kept the ball on a keeper and gained the necessary yardage for a first. Dale Dent gained one yard and Latham could not do any better, only getting one yard from the stubborn Farwell line. On a third down, Latham dropped back to pass and found all receivers covered and had to take a 12-yard loss. With 4th down and twenty needed, Latham punted the ball out of bounds on the Farwell 48 yard line.

Farwell started with Lindop gaining 4 yards and Actkinson hitting the middle of the line for 8 yards and Farwell's first down of the night. The play worked good, and Lovelace tried the same play and Actkinson was held for 2 yards gain and a pushing penalty set Farwell back 15 yards. Lovelace on a keeper gained 3 and a pass to Anderson fell incomplete and Farwell was forced to punt.

Lovelace got off a nice kick that landed on the 11-yard line with Been taking the ball and heading to the sideline, getting run out of bounds on the 26-yd. line. On first down, Been picked up 5 yards and Latham, on a keeper, racked up 12 yards and another first. Dale Dent gained only 2 yards with Troy Layman adding 4 yards. On third down, an off-sides penalty against Springlake moved

the ball back with 9 needed for a first. Latham on an attempted pass play, again ran into trouble and lost 3 more yards.

On 4th down, Latham kicked a nice high sparrow that was high enough to give the Wolverines time to come downfield and nail Childs as soon as he caught the ball. On first down, Lovelace handed off to Lindop, who was nailed by the entire center of the line for a 1-yard gain. Actkinson rolled out for a 4-yard pickup and on a keeper, Lovelace gained 4 yards and another first for Farwell. Actkinson tried center of the line and found only 1 yard, thinking he might go again, still found it rough and stopped for only 2 yards gained. On third down, Lovelace failed to move and Farwell received a 15-yard penalty for holding. With 4th down and 22 yards needed, Lovelace booted the ball out of bounds as the first quarter ended.

To start the second quarter, Springlake was on their own 17 yard line. Cary ran the ball out 5 yards. On second down, Latham fumbled but recovered his own fumble at the line of scrimmage. Been tried to move but got only 4 yards for his trouble. Cary Latham kicked on 4th down, and the ball was blown dead on the 32-yard line of Farwell.

Actkinson tried the end and found rough going with a loss of 2 yards. Trying again, received only 1 yard for his effort and with 3rd and 11 needed, Lovelace went to the air and threw incomplete, forcing him to punt.

Springlake took over on their own 35-yard line. Deciding to go to the air, Latham over-shot Been and on 2nd down found all receivers covered and again had

to take a loss of 10 yards. Staying in the air, Latham hit Been who was unable to hold onto the ball that left 10 yards needed, for a first.

Latham kicked to the 35-yard line of Farwell and a fumble gave the ball back to the Wolverines on the Steers' 27-yard line. On a first down, off-setting penalties left the ball on the 27-yard line and going to the ground attack once again, Latham handed off to Been who was held for no gain but on the 2nd down, Been found clear sailing after Lonnie English threw one of the prettiest blocks of the night that took the only defender out of the play. Go-

ing for 2 points on a pass that fell incomplete, Springlake took a 6-0 lead with 6 minutes and 31 seconds left to play in the second quarter.

On the kickoff, Latham really put his foot into the ball and sent it into the end zone. Farwell elected to take the ball on the 20-yard line. McCuan carried the ball for the first time of the night and netted 4 yards for his effort. Actkinson gained 13 yards and set up a first and ten situation for Farwell. Lindop started around end and found rough going, causing him to fumble and Springlake recovered the ball on the 33 yard line.

Don Sanders was trapped for a one yard loss and on a pass that fell incomplete, Springlake went to the air again but a pass to Layman gained only 1 yard, as he was hit at the line of scrimmage.

Latham kicked to the 8-yard line and Farwell received a penalty on first down that carried them half way back to the goal, which was the 4-yard line. McCuan gained 2 yards followed by Actkinson who hit the center of the line and found Patterson, Munoz, Dent and English all over him, and received no gain for his effort. Lovelace, on a keeper, gained 5, but still 3 yards short of a

first, was forced to kick out of bounds on the 45-yard line.

The Wolverines moved with Latham going for 5 yards and Dent breaking loose up center for 15 yards and a first and ten. On another keeper, Latham gained 2 yards and a pass to Don Sanders fell incomplete, & Jerry Been was held for no gain. Cary Latham decided to try for a field goal, but missed by a couple of feet to the left side.

Farwell took over on the 20, and on first down fumbled, but recovered. On second down, elected to pass and had it intercepted by Cary Latham who returned it to the 3-yard line. With 4 seconds left to play in the first half, Cary tried a roll-out, but was trapped before he could move the ball to pay dirt. The first half ended 6-0 in favor of the Wolverines.

The second half started with Latham kicking to Lindop, who returned the ball back 15 yards. Actkinson gained two yards, but Lindop was stacked up at the line of scrimmage by the entire front wall. On third down, Lindop gained 2 yards and forced Lovelace to punt out of bounds.

On first down, Been galloped 15 yards before being run out of bounds. Latham handed off to Troy Layman, who found running room for a nice 7 yards. Latham, on a keeper and a 15-yard penalty gave Springlake third down and 14 needed for a first. Latham failed on a pass, and kicked on fourth down to the 20-yard line of Farwell.

On a series of downs, Actkinson gained 3, Lovelace 4, and Actkinson getting a first and ten around end. Lovelace, on a keeper gained 3, but a penalty for pushing gave Farwell first down and 25 needed for a first. Lovelace went to the air to try and get the yardage needed, but had two passes knocked down, incomplete. Finally forced to punt, which gave Springlake the ball on the 31-yard line.

Been went off tackle for 8 yards and Layman followed with enough to give the Wolverines a first and ten. Cary, on an attempted pass, found running room up the middle and knocked off 14 yards before getting dropped on the 22-yard line. Been was dropped for no gain and on a keeper, Latham was able to pick up only 1 yard, on another keeper, Latham was dropped for a 3-yard loss. On fourth down, Latham attempted a field goal from the 18, and sent the ball right down the middle for his first field goal of the season, putting the Wolverines out in front 9-0 with 2 minutes and 28 seconds left in the third quarter.

After the kickoff, Farwell took over on the 45-yard line. Going with Actkinson, who gained 8 yards, Lovelace tried Lindop for 4 yards, and Fullback Harrington carried for the first time all night, was dropped after a 2-yard run. Lovelace gained 2 yards and a first and ten for Farwell. Harrington picked up 4 yards, but had it called back and a 15-yard penalty called off against him. With first down and 25 needed, Lovelace broke loose for 13 yd, and a pass to Anderson netted 1 yard. On third down, Lovelace passed to Anderson for 3 yards but got knocked off his feet as soon as he caught the ball by Dent, who came up hard and fast, to end the third quarter.

Lovelace tried to move, but was dropped at the line of scrimmage. On second down, Lovelace was dropped for a 3-yard loss. Deciding it was too rough on the ground, tossed a 25-yard pass to Anderson, who went in standing up. Lovelace booted the extra point, leaving Springlake a 9-7 margin, with 9 minutes and 37 seconds left to play in the ball game.

On the kickoff, Jerry Been headed for the sideline and with good down field blocking ran the

ball 40 yards before being rolled out of bounds. Dale Dent started things rolling with a five yard gain but Latham was dropped for a loss of 3 yards, on third down, Latham carried for 10 yards, but a clipping penalty against the Wolverines gave them third down and 19 yards needed. Dale was able to pick up only 3 yards and forced Latham to kick.

Farwell took over on their own 39-yard line. On first down, Farwell received a 15-yard penalty and McCuan gained two yards. Lovelace went to the air but had 2 passes knocked down forcing him to punt back to Springlake.

Jerry Been took the ball on the 30-yard line, but returned it to the 40 before being brought down by Actkinson.

Troy Layman started the Wolverines to moving with 4 yards gained up the middle. Latham ran end for 14 yards, and decided it was a good play, carried through on the same play again and received a nice 15 yards for his second effort. Handing off to Dent through center for 5 yd, and on the second try, Dent picked up three. On a keeper, Latham got a first and ten, with Been getting 4 yards. Latham, on a roll-out, netted 2 with Layman getting through, but with fourth and one needed for a first, Latham tried the center of the line and received 2 yards and first and goal to go for the Wolverines. On a keeper, Latham carried the ball to the one yard line and on the second down, Latham dove over center for the T, D, with 8 seconds left to play. The try for extra point failed, giving Springlake the 15-7 margin over Farwell.

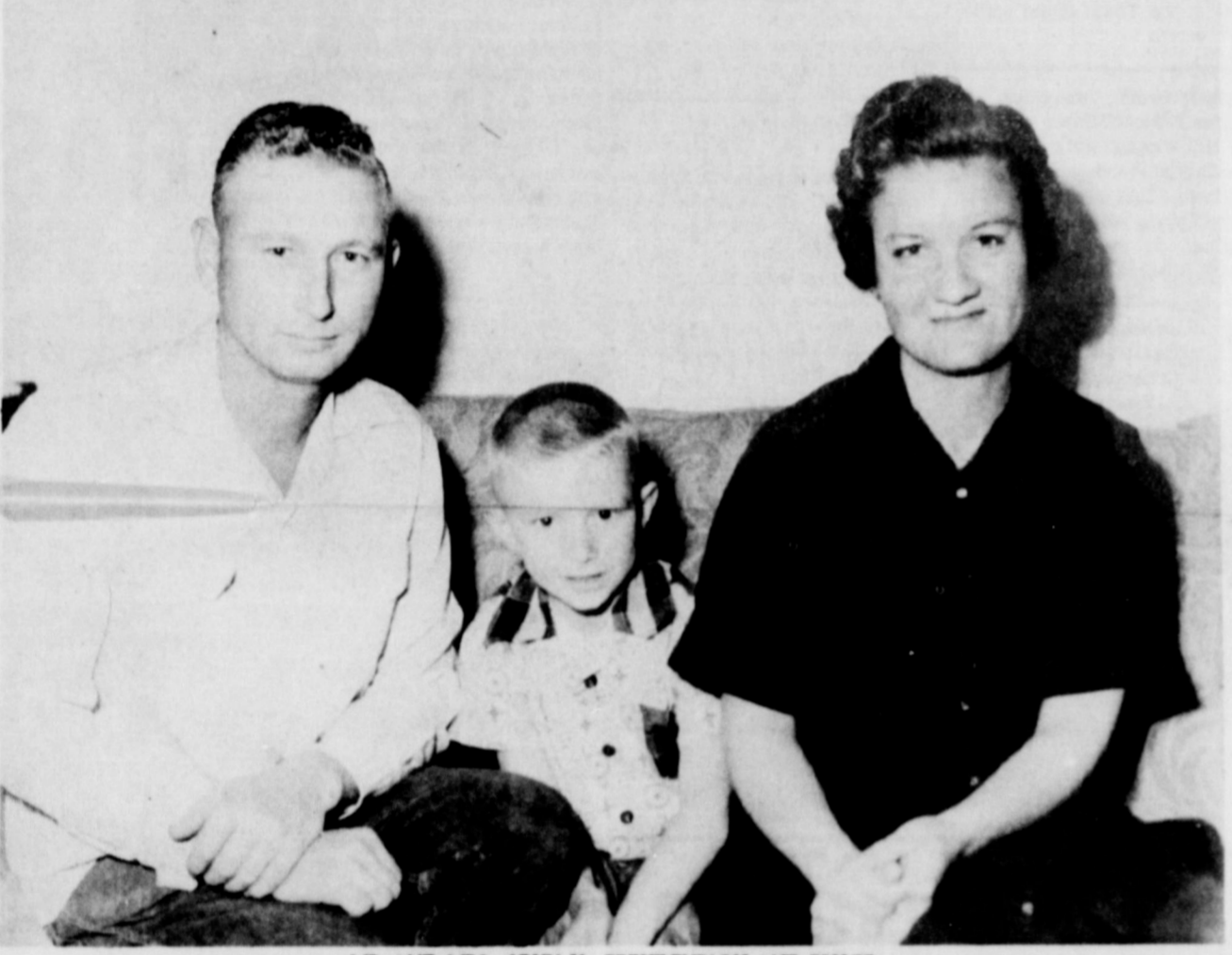

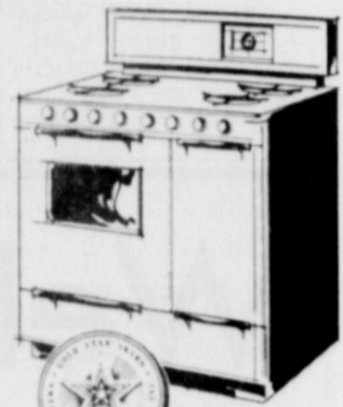

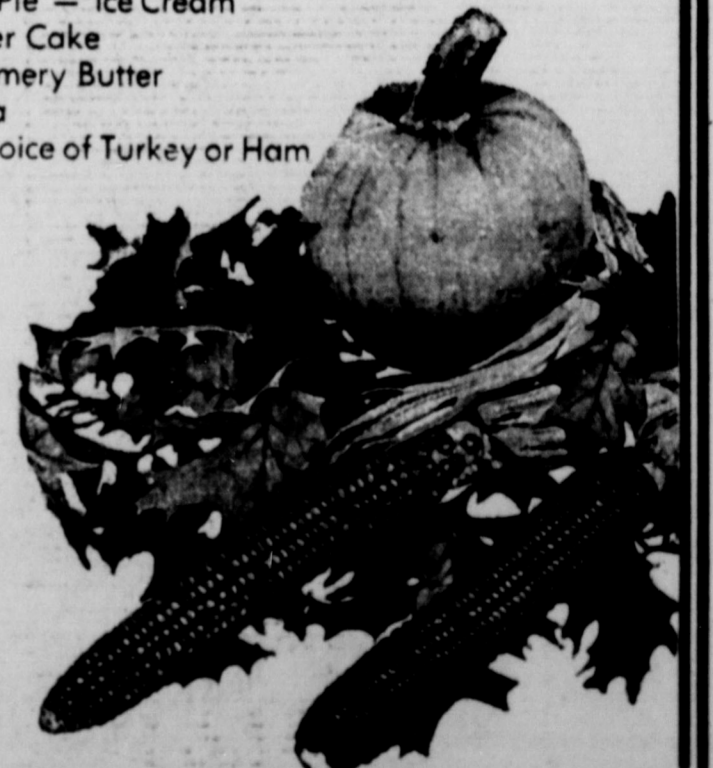

Farm Facts

Labor costs, the U. S. Department of Agriculture points out, are the largest single component of the bill for marketing domestic farm foods to civilian consumers. They amounted to 46% of the total cost in 1961, or about \$19 billion.

Of some \$62.2 billion spent for farm foods, farmers received \$20.8 billion and the marketing bill amounted to \$41.4 billion. Rail and truck transportation cost \$4.3 billion. Corporate profits came to \$2 billion before taxes and amounted to \$1 billion after income taxes. Other costs—including fuel, electric power, containers, advertising, depreciation, rent, etc.—were estimated at \$16.2 billion.

Costs per unit in marketing have been increasing since 1950, the USDA explains, due to wage increases, transportation charges, prices for machinery, equipment, fuel, containers, packaging materials, etc., and taxes, rents,

both are higher than necessary. Also at the show were a number of new designs in the skipjack-type of hulls. These are fast little boats, made of fiberglass, which skim over the water apparently with the greatest of ease. Many fishermen like them because they can get into the shallows. And the racing crowd goes for them like they do a sports runabout.

One thing is for sure, boating has become a way of life in Texas. There are more boats among Texas families today than there were automobiles just a few years ago. In recognition of this the Boating Trades Association, which sponsored the Fort Worth show, is working with its dealers to provide capable merchandising.

Boat manufacturers in Texas have gone through the wringer. A dozen different plants sprang up in a hurry when the boating craze first took hold. Most of them were under-financed and failed to survive. Others went through several reorganizations. But there were a few that remained solid, by making good boats and doing a good selling job.

It is expected that something like 20,000 new outboard motors will be sold in Texas during 1963. New York will sell only 32,000; Michigan 26,000; California 25,000; and Florida 19,000.

These states all have abundant water. Texas generally is not recognized as a state with too much water. In fact, every ounce of boating water in Texas is behind a dam that has been built to impound it. There is no natural lake among the 400 in Texas.
