

Pl asant Breeding.
From Farmers' Review: The rearing of Pheasants in the United States and in fact the most of America is done artificially; that is, art is used in assisting nature, by which means, as in the case of domestic fowls and animals, far more can be reared to maturity, and in a vigorous, healthy state than if nature were unassisted. The feeding, breeding and housing of the birds is the subject on which I will make a few practical remarks. Space will not permit me to give a detailed description of all species, which comprises about 29 known varieties, but a general outline of them as a whole. Of all the birds on the earth, the family of pheasants are the

are all of exquisite beauty, the different varieties widely differing from each other in their style of grace and charm, which makes it possible to find a. ideal bird to suit the taste of every fancier, no matter how versatile. It seems that nature, the greatest of painters, after having tried her apprentice's hand or man and other animals, continued improving, painting the foliage of the trees, shrubs, flowers and the common birds, then reached the acme or her fame in painting a group of birds known as pheasants. In them she displays her finest work, which for perfection, adaptability, as well as fine and beautiful material, far surpasses the wonderful mechanism of the human body; in every muscle, tendon and nerver. We take the perfect eye, that can see the smallest mite or insect hidden the shadow of the shadow of

roof or cefling. The roests should be up about four feet, which will cnable the birds to see each other from persons the birds to see each other from persons when they are on the roosts. The when they are on the roosts. The windows in the pens must be covered with wire mesh, as pheasants have such a strong flight they can go through a pane of glass as eastly as tissue paper. The outside runs can be built up one or two feet from the ground with boards, then inch wire mesh on the sides and top. I speak of inch wire as it keeps out the sparrows, which if allowed in the yard cat as much almost as the pheasants. The size of the pens in the house should be large enough so that the birds are not cramped. If they are not, the males break their tails, which is half their beauty. An inside pen 6x8 feet and a yard running out 6x1 feet is room enough for severa or eight birds and the side of the yard close together provide shelter and shade, which they greatly enjoy. Breeding.—The breeding of pheasants is where many make the failure, and in fact it is the delicate part of the whole thing. Possibly you have read some article, or some friend has tried it and made a complete failure because their knowledge of the right procedure was wanting. The owner had been putting food into these birds to help generate enough heat to keep them alive on the cold nights when they must burn up a vast amount of carbonaceous matter to offset the loss of heat from their bodies. He had been literally "feeding the winds" through the fowls. This is the most extreme case that has ever come under the direct observation of tome under the direct observation of the writer. It is a type of the old style of poultry raising, which permitted the fowls to roost in the top of the apple trees of in any other place of the apple trees of in any other place of the apple trees of in any other place it is natural for fowls to do that way, as that was their custom before they were domesticated, they lived in a warmer clime than that prevailing over the northern United States. We cannot reasonably expect to get whiter eggs from fowls so housed, and should not find fault with the fowls for things directly chargeable to the improvidence of their owner. We are satisfied that many of the mysteries reported to us from the poultry yards of our farms would be made clear could we but look into those yards and see the true conditions.

Municipal Mik Supply.
Conditions surrounding the milk
trade in American cities are bad
enough, but they appear to be still
worse in England. Most of our cities
have fairly effective laws against the
adulteration of milk and the use of
preservatives in the same. But in
England the dealers have been allowed to have their own way very
largely, and the result is seen in increased mortality among infants. City
after city in England has taken up
the matter, especially regarding the
sale of milk for infants' food. Now,
the city of Norwich is attempting to
manage the entire trade in all kinds
of milk. The infant mortality in the
large English towns averages 14* per
1,000, which is considered high. But
in Norwich the rate is 166 per 1,000.
But the people of Norwich have a
further grievance. They say that the
men that have really done the work
of milk selling the selling th big milk selling companies, have been scandalously overworked and underpaid. This has resulted in poor service to the consumers of milk, as well as in hardships to the families of the men actually doing the work. It is proposed to establish depots for the Pasteurizing of the milk, and the payment of living wages to the men that do the distributing. Many other cities of England have taken steps in the matter of either manging or controlling the milk supply. This is justified economically by the fact that milk is more intimately connected with the health of the people than any other article of food.

Feed and Quality of Pork.
