Glen Smith, pastor of the Springlake Baptist Church gave the benediction.

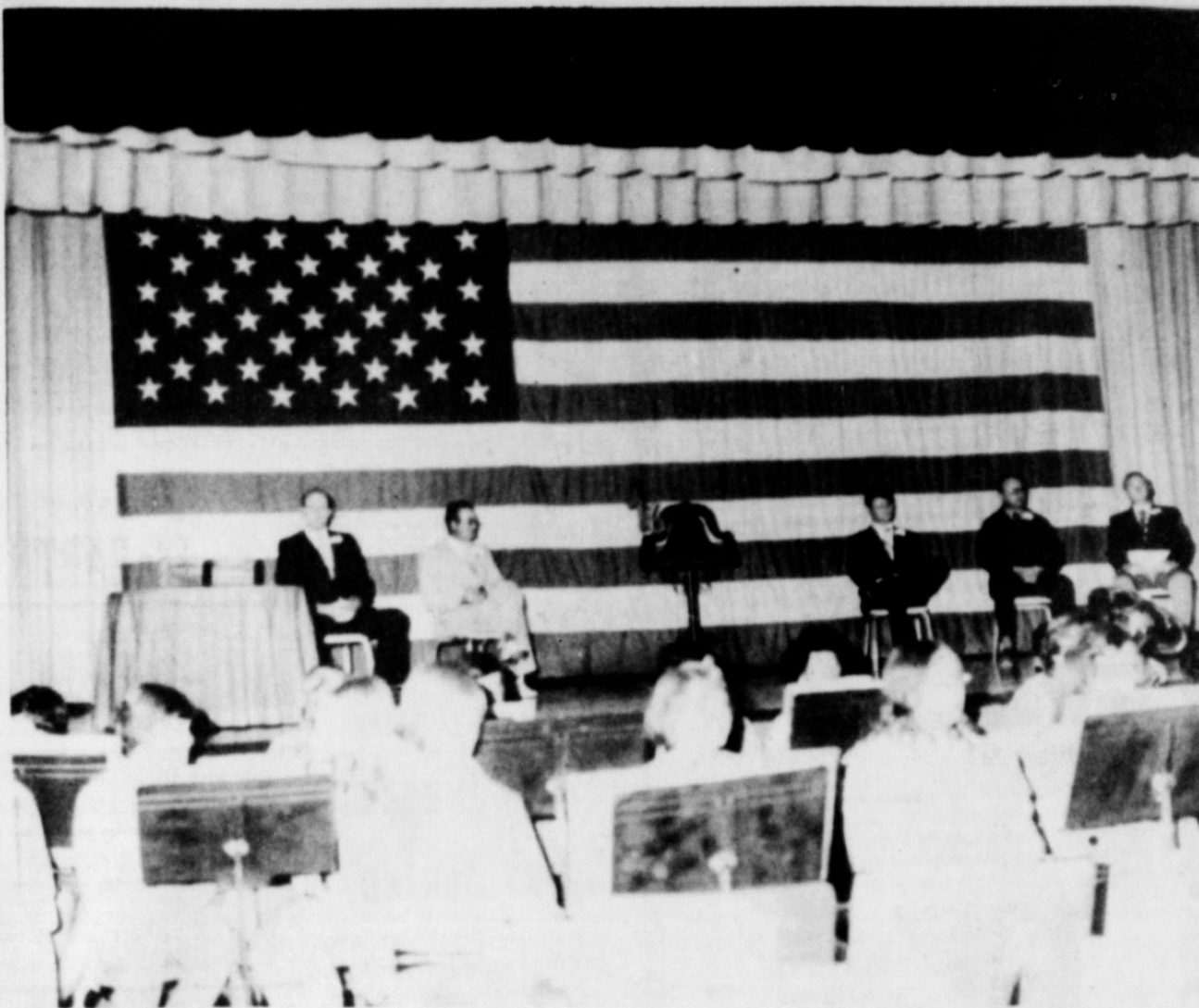
Before the class marched out the class sang the school song for the last time as a group.

Commissioners Conduct End-Of-Month Business

Several business matters received the attention of the Commissioners' Court Friday when they met for the end of month session. The meeting was held Friday because Monday was Memorial day and a legal holiday for courthouse employees.

Discussion centered on a planned use report for Revenue Sharing funds for the next six months. Among the projects funds may be allocated to include \$15,000 for operation of ambulance service. This would be for a six-month period with the Littlefield Police Department operating the service south of the sandhills, and Parsons Funeral Home of Olton handling emergency calls north of the sandhills.

Other needed areas include a landfill machine, and purchasing right of way if funds are available.

The board of equalization was organized, then recessed until 10 a. m. on June 25.

The only other vote taken granted General Telephone Company right of way for buried communication lines five miles west of FM 168 on FM 1842 and two and one-half miles north of a county dirt road, right of way was also granted for a line one mile from the Amberst City limits on the south side 2,500 feet to the microwave tower.

Lamb County Civil Defense coordinator, Wayne Cole of Olton, was given a go ahead to purchase 100 litters. Cole said in the event of a disaster in Lamb County, the present hospital and emergency medical services probably would not be sufficient to take care of the injured.

There are four full time ambulances in the county with about six vehicles which could be used to transfer patients. The three hospitals report their total emergency capacity is 154 patients. This is only 51

above their normal capacity. Cole said the purchase of 100 litters would increase the emergency capacity of the hospital by 100 patients, making it possible to set up a 100-patient hospital in a gym or other building in the county. The litters would also provide minimal equipment for converting 100 station wagons and/or pickups to transfer patients.

These litters will be distributed to fire departments and to hospitals if they desire them. Fire departments have been contacted and agreed to store, maintain and use the litters.

The next regular session of Commissioners' Court will be June 14.

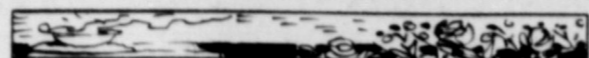

Glen Smith, pastor of the Springlake Baptist Church gave the benediction.

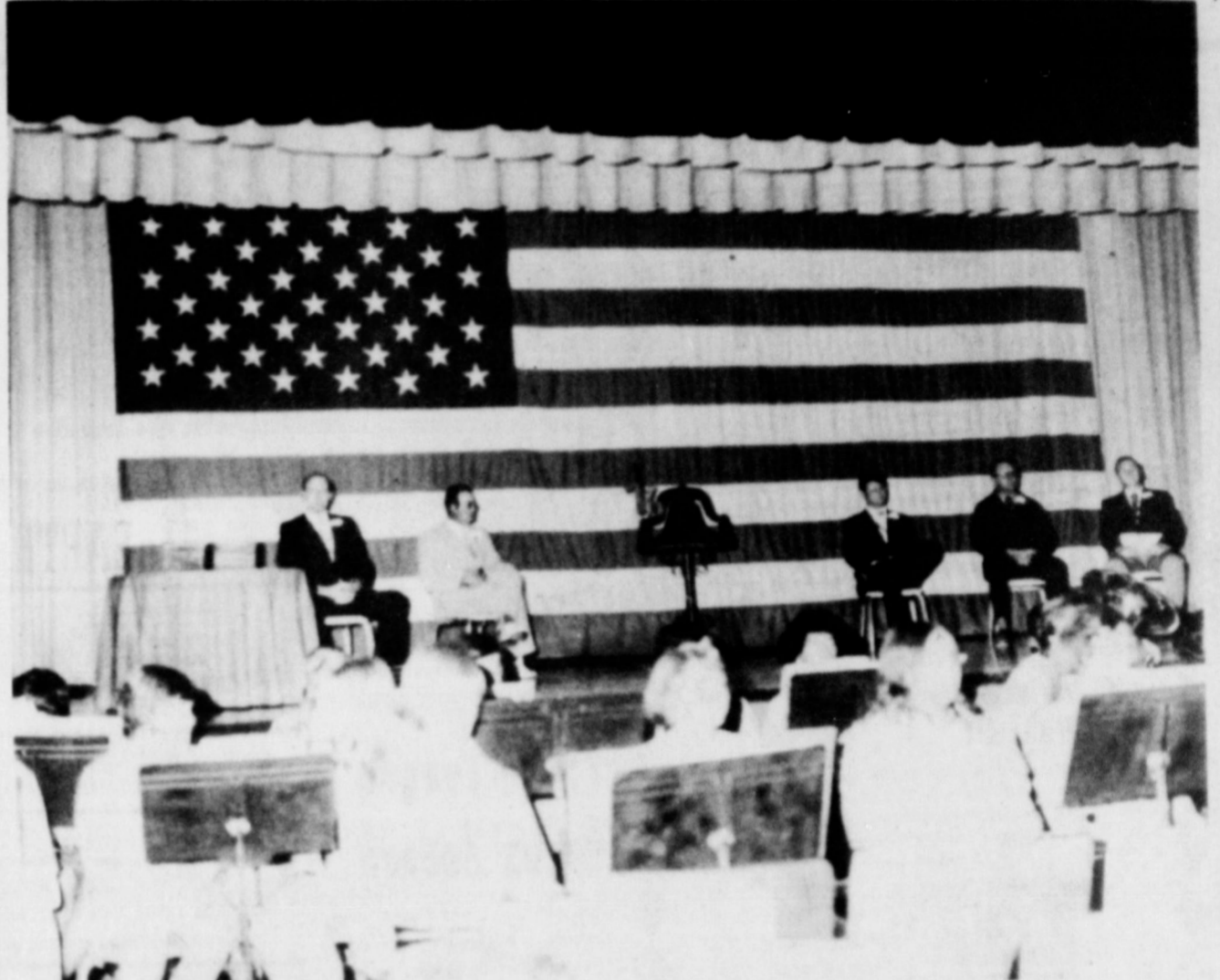
Before the class marched out the class sang the school song for the last time as a group.

Commissioners Conduct End-Of-Month Business

Several business matters received the attention of the Commissioners' Court Friday when they met for the end of month session. The meeting was held Friday because Monday was Memorial day and a legal holiday for courthouse employees.

Discussion centered on a planned use report for Revenue Sharing funds for the next six months. Among the projects funds may be allocated to include \$15,000 for operation of ambulance service. This would be for a six-month period, with the Littlefield Police Department operating the service south of the sandhills, and Parsons Funeral Home of Olton handling emergency calls north of the sandhills.

Other needed areas include a landfill machine, and purchasing right of way if funds are available.

The board of equalization was organized, then recessed until 10 a. m. on June 25.

The only other vote taken granted General Telephone Company right of way for buried communication lines five miles west of FM 168 on FM 1842 and two and one-half miles north of a county dirt road. Right of way was also granted for a line one mile from the Amherst City limits on the south side 2,500 feet to the microwave tower.

Lamb County Civil Defense coordinator, Wayne Cole of Olton, was given a go ahead to purchase 100 litters. Cole said in the event of a disaster in Lamb County, the present hospital and emergency medical services probably would not be sufficient to take care of the injured.

There are four full time ambulances in the county with about six vehicles which could be used to transfer patients. The three hospitals report their total emergency capacity is 154 patients. This is only 51

above their normal capacity. Cole said the purchase of 100 litters would increase the emergency capacity of the hospitals by 100 patients, making it possible to set up a 100-patient hospital in a gym or other building in the county. The litters would also provide minimal equipment for converting 100 station wagons and/or pickups to transfer patients.

These litters will be distributed to fire departments and to hos-

pitals if they desire them. Fire departments have been contacted and agreed to store, maintain and use the litters.

The next regular session of Commissioners' Court will be June 14.

Thursday, June 3 the Red, White and Blue team will travel to Anton for their game against Anton.

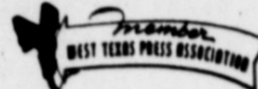

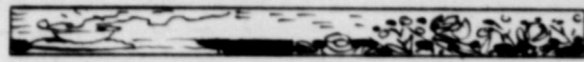
