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
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
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




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### Two New Members Join Rainbow Girls

# **OSNA** Extends Date For **Machine Guarding Standards**

According to the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), the June 7 effective date has been extended to October 25, 1976. This coincides with the scheduled effective date of the standard for roll-over protective structures on tractors. 'In assessing the importance of educational material to employers and employees, it is necessary to consider the uniqueness of agriculture as regards occupational safety and

### Tips On Safe Trailer Towing

"First of all, use a trailer hitch that is strong enough for the amount of weight you plan to tow. You may need heavy duty springs and shock absorbers for extra weight.

"Make sure the trailer hitch is properly attached to the car or truck with safety chain in place and lights hooked up, " Logsdon adds.

Load the trailer with 60 per cent of the weight in front of the trailer axle. This makes both the car and trailer more stable.

The amount of VA financing for adaptive equipment is not fixed but depends on the needs of the individual veteran. Eligibility for benefits under this program is limited to ve-

terans of World War II and thereafter and current service personnel having service-connected loss, or permanent loss of use of one or both feet or hands, or permanent impairment of vision of both eyes to a prescribed degree.

# Dwarfed Sweet Corn Plants Worry Gardeners

may get a backache picking their early crop of sweet corn this year. The problem seems to be that varieties which normally bear their ears at waist height are pushing the ears out than knee high on plants three and nutrients are applied proto four feet tall.

Several weather factors combine to cause this phenomenon. Day length is one factor. Most will attain nearly normal size. sweet corn varieties are not acutely sensitive to day length, ... and late hybrids should be sidethough some hybrids seem to be quite sensitive when planted early.

In the sensitive hybrids the period from plant emergence to flowering (tassel and silk formation) is shortened by short days and lengthened by long days. Practically speaking, this means that when these hybrids are planted in March and April, the plant flowers when the day even if the plants are still small.

Temperature exerts a marked effect on corn growth. Active growth occurs in sweet corn only when the air temperature rises above 50 degrees Fahrenheit. There were many cold nights and cool days in April and May. and sweet corn made

little or no growth. Sweet corn is very sensitive to

As long as the earlier plantings are fertilized and watered adequately, the ear Later plantings of midseason dressed with nitrogen fertilizer at the time of tassel exertion. Ammonium nitrate\_sidedressed at the rate of 100 to 125 pounds per acre (about one pound per 100 linear feet of row for home gardeners) will provide an ade-

quate supply of nitrogen to the plant during the critical period of ear formation. In addition, irrigations must be scheduled only several days apart to prelength reaches 12 or 13 hours vent drought stress during ear development if rainfall is inadequate.


