## School Enrollment Shows Slight Increase, ADA Down

The local school board met last Monday night in regular session and reviewed the delinquent tax roll, with the tax collector, Mrs. Dallas Clynch, and bookkeeper, Mrs. W. F. Bearden.

Because of the late hour, the session was continued until Wednesday night, when the group met again to discuss the current enrollment, average daily attendance records, and to approve two teachers.

The current enrollment figure is 934 and shows a slight increase over the last six week figure of 918. The breakdown in enrollment is as follows: high school, 221, junior high, 164, elementary 513 and special education classes, 36.

Reviewing the average daily attendance figures as compared to that of last year, the board found they would in all probability, lose one teacher. Last year at this time, the ADA figure, without the special education class enrollment, showed 802 white students and 53 colored students. This year, the current figure shows 781 white students and 61 colored.

The over all Average Daily Attendance for the entire year of 65-66 showed 914 students. The average ADA for this year, up to the present six week period, shows 880 students, which figures a loss of one teacher in the Springlake-Earth Schools.

The group approved the hiring of Mrs. Terrell Bell and Mrs. Mrs. Buddy Hedges. Mrs. Bell will be the certified librarian and Mrs. Hedges will probably teach in the elementary grades.

The group selected the local Citizens State Bank as the depository bank to be used by the school for the next two year period.

A drivers education course to be taught by Coach Dallas Clynch was okayed by the board. Tuition for the course will be \$27.50 for each student. The 20 day session requires 30 hours of classroom time and 6 hours per student driving time.

Classes for the first session are slated to begin at 9 a.m. on May 22, and the second class will begin on May 29 with ses-

sion called to order at 10:30 each morning.

The group selected a three-man equalization board composed of Ardis Barton, Kenneth Hinson and Gene Templeton. The threesome have not set a time to meet, as yet.

The group discussed the possibilities of having a seven period classroom day next year, instead of the regular six period day. The board made no concrete decisions on adopting this longer school day, but tabled it until further study could be made.

## Dogs To Be Vaccinated Today

Thursday, (today) is the date designated for area dogs to be vaccinated. Dr. Jerry Gleason of the Muleshoe Animal Clinic, will be in Earth from 2 to 5 p.m. for the vaccination project.

The city work shop is where area residents are asked to bring their dogs. Tags can be purchased for \$1 each at the City Hall, following the vaccination. Earth residents have been warned that any dogs roaming the city's streets, without a tag, will be exterminated.

## Memorial Services Will Be May 30th At Cemetery

The Earth Memorial Cemetery is planning a Memorial Day Program at the Cemetery, May 30 at 10 a.m. There will be a business meeting. The election of officers for the coming year, and the new directors will be elected to replace the outgoing directors. Financial reports will be given along with the minutes of the meetings of last year.

Everyone is urged to attend.

## Citizens Urged To Clean Up City May 20

Saturday is the final day in the "Clean up Earth Week" and all civic minded citizens of Earth and the area are urged by Mayor E. C. Kelley to meet at the City Hall at 8:30 a.m. to add the final touches to beautifying the city.

Everyone with trucks, trailers and pickups are asked to join in the clean-up day, and help get the town cleaned up. Also invited to participate in the work are others, who are asked to come equipped with hoses, rakes and similar tools.

The mayor said much of the health hazard here could be eliminated if city residents would take pride in the town and clean up their premises. Kelley also added that city spraying would be more effective if the town were cleaned up thoroughly.

Clean up week officially began Monday in Earth, with many citizens in the town co-operating, by cleaning up their premises, and hauling away the debris, in an all out effort to eliminate the unnecessary trash and debris within the city limits.

The dump grounds will be left open all week long, so that Earth and area residents can take trash there. All trash except car bodies, refrigerators and ranges can be discarded at the dump ground.

The entire group went on record as being one hundred percent for the creation of an Earth-Springlake Hospital District and the building of an accredited hospital in Earth. The group is currently working to inform the public of the small cost involved in financing the local hospital. A round table discussion on the over-all plan of the proposed hospital district and the means of financing it highlighted the evening.

A second public meeting has

been set for Friday, 8:15 p.m. in the school lunchroom to encourage another such question and answer session, for the purpose of encouraging all eligible voters of the area to know the actual facts concerning the proposed hospital district.

The group discussed the credit problem that merchants in both towns share, and made a decision to add a service charge on past due accounts.

The group discussed the length of time merchants should carry credit customers before making arrangements to collect the account.

The Association set their meeting dates for the second Thursday of each month, to discuss ways and means of helping each other and of better service to the public.

## Tractor Stolen April 8 From Lynn Glasscock Recovered Near Decatur

The 4010 John Deere tractor stolen during the early morning hours on April 8, from the Lynn Glasscock farm northwest of Earth, has been recovered. Deputy Sheriff W. A. Hatfield recovered the tractor on Saturday, May 13.

Hatfield, who had been working on the case since the disappearance of the tractor, became suspicious when he heard that Bobby Charley Tiner, 35, of Lubbock was held in the Ft. Plainview jail, suspected of the theft of a ditcher, stolen near Plainview.

Hatfield went to the Plainview jail to talk to Tiner, but received no cooperation from Tiner, who denied any knowledge of the theft of Glasscock's tractor.

Hatfield could not give up, and in his attempt to further search for proof, he brought Tiner's boots back to Earth with him, where he gaudied and

compared pictures of footprints made at the scene where the tractor was loaded on a truck, with that of Tiner's boots. The heelmarking seemed to be one and the same.

The following day, Hatfield returned to the Plainview jail to talk with Tiner and to tell him of the new evidence. Hatfield said that during the long talk, Tiner admitted his connection with the local theft and admitted he sold the tractor to a dealer in Lubbock.

Hatfield continued in pursuit of the tractor, and discovered it had been sold in Lubbock to a dealer in Decatur, Texas. Further tracing proved the tractor had been sold to a farmer near Decatur, where Hatfield found and recovered it.

Hatfield believes there is a second man involved in the theft and is continuing on the case in hopes of bringing him to justice.

With the advent of Medicare, a hospital could be a deciding factor for a couple selecting a community where they wish to retire. By incorporating a nursing home in conjunction with the hospital we could keep our elderly citizens close to home, and close to their families. Let's explore at this meeting every possibility we could achieve, and the potentials involved.

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## Potpourri...

Reading serves for delight, for ornament, for ability. The crafty condemn it; the simple admire it; the wise use it. These words of Sir Francis Bacon, one of the world's truly great writers, carry an impact I wish every student could or would fathom.

Adolph Hitler stated that the voice swayed more opinions than anything in the world, then contradicted himself by having all the books in Germany burned. Today in the Soviet Union, one of the largest fears in the government is the printed word without censorship.

Without reading there would be no mental giants; no successful personages. Without books there would be no schools and certainly no mass exchanges of ideas. Without the printed page, there would be complete vacuum.

One of the greatest delights that comes to me in the halls of our schools is the number of students I see carrying books. Not just text books, but books of their own selection to be read for the joy of reading and the delight in learning.

One of the best examples I can give of this is seventh grader Criss Dent. She is something of a phenomenon. She reads more avidly and sincerely than any person her age I have ever known. Her selections certainly surpass her years.

Criss has come to me many times this year and discussed books, books of great merit and

with intellectual content. She had me order what is considered by many authorities to be the greatest American novel ever written, and I assure you it was no two-pager.

Recently she asked for and received two novels to read during the summer. They are novels of exceptional intellect, and one cannot browse through them in a moment's time. Each has been given literary awards since their publication, and I personally had the most difficult time with one of them. I believe Criss will not have too much trouble.

Criss does not stand alone in this category. Other junior high students have borrowed books from me and read them with gusto. Others I have seen with books they have purchased themselves, and all of them are of great value and merit. The public need have no fear, in most cases, that only trash is read by our young people.

This is all very good. Though not the case every time, it is usually true that the person who is fond of books is a person of lofty thought and of elevated opinions. They are usually the people who cannot be easily swayed into mass anti-isms, simply because some haranguer speaks to them. They are usually the people who maintain their American individualism.

Inasmuch as the last day of this school season is on us, I would like to add one final word to Criss and the students like her. Maintain this interest in books; maintain this search for knowledge; maintain this desire for the betterment of your mental intellect and there is no question but what you will be among the leaders of society when the appropriate time arrives.

A representative of the XII Study Club presented the top seven scholastic ranking students in the junior class with academic sweaters.



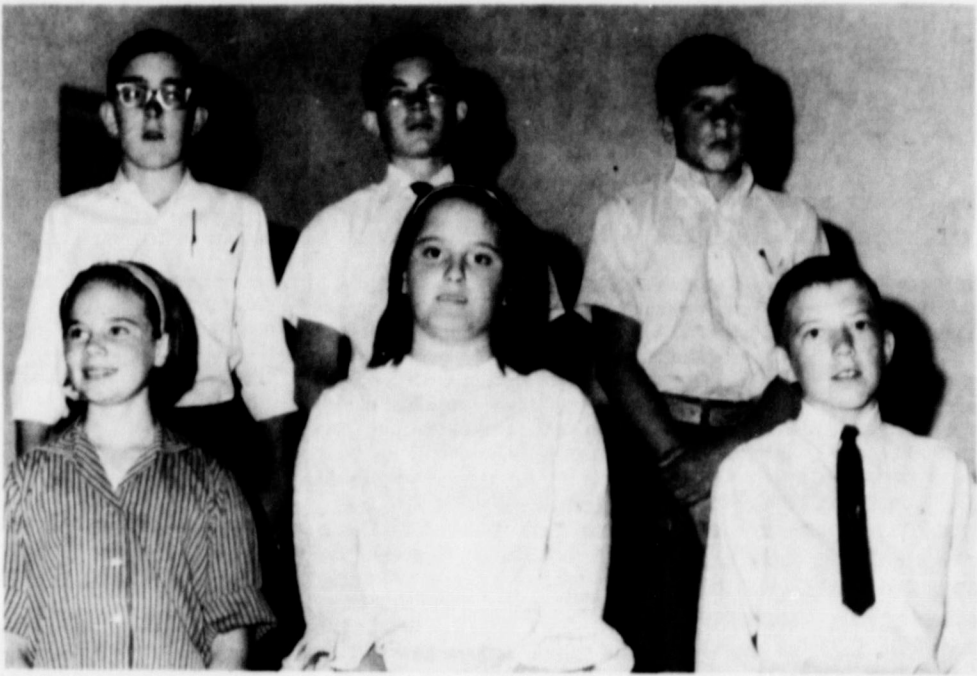

Public Meeting May 24 In Lubbock To Form Water, Inc.

The program is now set for a public meeting on May 24 to form Water Inc., a planning organization which will work toward the importation of water to the West Texas area for use in agriculture, industry, cities and recreation, according to J. D. Smith of Littlefield.

Smith, who is president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., is serving as chairman of the Membership and Organization committee of the new water organization. He said the meeting would begin at 2 p. m. in the Koko Palace, Lubbock, and emphasized the importance of the meeting to all who have a stake in the future of West Texas.

Purpose of the meeting is to inform the general public of progress already made toward securing imported water, to formally adopt a charter and by-laws for Water, Inc., and to elect its directors.

To accomplish the first part of this purpose, Smith said four speakers, each highly informed on a particular phase of the work being done, have been

chosen. They include Marvin Nichols of the Freese, Nichols and Enders engineering firm, Ft. Worth; Joe G. Moore, Executive Director of the Texas Water Development Board, Austin; Leon Iffitt, District Director of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, Amarillo; General W. T. Bradley, Division Engineer for the southwest Division of the U. S. Corps of Engineers, Dallas; and Chas. Verner, president of the First National Bank, Lubbock.

With the exception of Verner each of the speakers will relate his remarks to the part played or to be played by his particular agency in the importation of water. Verner will speak on the economic impact that imported water will have on the area.

George McClesky, Lubbock attorney, will explain the proposed charter and by-laws.

The following is a reprint of "Tolbert's Texas" a column appearing daily in the Dallas Morning News, written by Frank X. Tolbert. This column in the May 3 issue, I'm sure, will be of interest to readers of the News-Sun.

Tolbert's Texas

CROSS EYES FAMILY NOT IN LARIAT

By Frank X. Tolbert

This was a day of wanderings along the New Mexico line around Clovis, N. M., and Farwell, Texas, and the ghost town of Lariat. (Well, Lariat DOES have a big grain elevator.) I was looking for an Indian couple named Mr. and Mrs. Cross Eyes. Mr. and Mrs. Cross Eyes

had lived in both Clovis and Farwell. I was told, although they never tarried in Lariat (who does these days?). But I couldn't find the Indian couple. And there wasn't really much reason for this search, anyway. I just wanted to meet a Mr. and Mrs. Cross Eyes, said to be Apaches and related to the old warlock, Geronimo.

From somnolent Lariat I drove a long some back country roads passing through Lazbuddie, Texas, only I didn't stop until I came to the City of Earth, Lamb County, west of Plainview. Some one had written me a letter, challenging me to "find a slum" in Earth. I didn't have any better luck finding a slum in Earth than I did find Mr. and Mrs. Cross Eyes in Clovis, Farwell, or Lariat. An illustrated map, which

may be used as a place mat, published by the Lamb County Historical Committee refers to Earth town as "The Money Belt" because of "the good, fertile land on which it stands." Big signs on the outskirts of Earth call it "The Richest Irrigation District in the World." The chamber of commerce literature claims there is "unlimited shallow water."

About half the homes in Earth (population 1600) seem to be in the \$20,000 to \$50,000 price range, although there are also neat, new-looking more modest houses and two or three real estates. Most of the proprietors of the surrounding lush farmlands live in Earth.

In the Earth Chamber of Commerce office, Mrs. Zou Wilson told me: "We did some figuring a year or so ago and found that the average annual income of heads of families in Earth was around \$8,000."

"Income has fallen off in the

last year because of lower farm prices and higher production costs," said Henry Lewis, a county commissioner, who was in the CC office at the time.

Earth became a post office in 1925. The keeper of the general store and postmaster, C. H. Reeves, turned in the suggested town titles of Fairleen or Tulsa. When Postmaster Reeves received a notice from the postal authorities that both Tulsa and Fairleen had been rejected, there was a sandstorm in progress.

"The earth's really moving around here" commented Mr. Reeves, "We'll call this town Earth."

Besides being one of the richest farm towns in the Southwest, Earth is also making a big pitch for industry. For one thing, it is hub up to a big power plant called Plant X, which produces 478,000 kilowatts.

The Earthmen and women seem very happy people.

I know it doesn't sound very gourmet-like but chicken-fried steak, when it's properly prepared the way the old range cooks did it, is one of my favorite entrees. When I was a child in Littlefield, Lamb Co. (Littlefield is 21 miles south of Earth), you could get chicken-fried steak at Shorty Thornton's cafe which still haunts me it was so good.

Now Shorty's son, Fly Thornton, has a beautiful modern cafeteria in Littlefield. And Fly is said to be just as capable a steak fryer as his papa. Only I didn't have time to sample the fare at Fly's.

I know chicken-fried steak is a risky thing to order at most cafes. It's usually tasteless or tough or both. However, it was wonderful at Mrs. Bromley's dining room last Thursday night in Clarendon, Texas. Just like the old chuck wagon cooks used to do it. Incidentally, Clarendon is 300 miles northwest of Dallas. But Mrs. Bromley offers a fresh copy of the Dallas News with her meals.

WHEREAS, this Commissioners Court officially finds and determines that said Petition is signed by more than one hundred (100) resident, qualified, property-taxpaying electors in the territory of Earth-Springlake Hospital District, in Lamb County, Texas, as described in the above mentioned Legislative Bill, and that said Petition conforms with law in all respects; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court officially finds and determines that there are no outstanding tax-supported bonds issued for hospital purposes by Lamb County, or any City located therein.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF LAMB COUNTY, TEXAS:

1. That an election shall be held at the Earth-Springlake

High School Building in Lamb County, Texas, on the 27th day of May, 1967, on the proposition of whether or not a hospital district shall be created with authority to levy annual taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on the \$100 valuation of all taxable property within the district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the bonds of the district, its maintenance and operating expense, with said hospital district to have its boundaries in Lamb County, as follows:

BEGINNING at the Northwest corner of Lamb County, Texas; THENCE East along the North line of Lamb County to a point in the East line of Section 32, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, said point also being in the East line of Block 1;

THENCE South along the East line of Section 32 and Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, to a point in the North line of Section 6, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey, Lamb County, Texas, said point also being the Northerly Southeast corner of Section 32;

THENCE West along the Northerly South line of Section 32, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision and the North line of Section 6 and Section 7, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey to the interior Southeast corner of Section 32 and the North West corner of Section 7;

THENCE South along the East line of Section 32 and Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision to a point in the East line of Section 31, Block 1, W. E. Halsell Subdivision, said point also being the SW corner of Section 59, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey;

THENCE East along the South line of Sections 59 and 58, Block T-2, R. M. Thomson Survey and the North line of Section 1, Block T-1, T. A. Thomson Survey, to the N. E. Corner of said Section 1;

THENCE South along the East line of Block T-1, T. A. Thomson Survey to its SE corner, said point also being the SE corner of Section 40 of said Survey; THENCE South along the East line of Section 6, Block A-5, Lamb County, Texas, to the SE corner of Section 6 and Block A-5;

THENCE West along the South line of Section 6 and Block A-5 to the SE corner of Tract 21, League 244, Dickens County School Land;

THENCE West along the South line of League 244, Dickens County School Land and Leagues 239 and 238, Cottle County School Land to the SW corner of Cottle County School Land, said point being the SW corner of Labor 29, League 238, Cottle County School Land;

THENCE North along the West line of League 238, Cottle County School Land, to its NW

corner and the NW corner of Labor 5, League 238, Cottle County School Land;

THENCE West along the South line of League 234, Dallas County School Land, Leagues 221 and 219, Castro County School Land, League 206, Ochiltree County School Land to a point in the West line of Lamb County, Texas, where the South line of League 206, Ochiltree County School Land intersects with the West line of Lamb County, Texas;

THENCE North along the West line of Lamb County, Texas, to the NW Corner of said County and the place of beginning; and on the question of whether or not bonds for said District shall be authorized in accordance with the following proposition:

"Shall the Board of Directors of Earth-Springlake Hospital District have the power to issue the bonds of said Hospital District, in one or more series or issues, in the aggregate principal amount of \$350,000, with the bonds of each such series or issue, respectively, to mature serially within not to exceed 40 years from their date, and to bear interest at rates not to exceed 7% per annum for the purpose of purchasing, constructing, repairing, and equipping buildings for hospital purposes, and shall said Board of Directors be authorized to levy and cause to be assessed and collected annual ad valorem taxes in an amount sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund to pay the same at maturity, within the limit prescribed by law?"

2. That the proposed Earth-Springlake Hospital District shall constitute a single election precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold said election at the aforesaid polling place:

L. K. Anderson, Presiding Judge; Phil Raught, Alternate Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint two qualified voters who are residents of the precinct to serve as election clerks and shall appoint as many additional clerks as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of election. The maximum number of clerks at the election precinct shall not exceed four (4).

3. The County Clerk of Lamb County shall be the clerk for absentee voting for said election and the office of the County Clerk in the Courthouse is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election, during the regular office hours of said County Clerk.

4. That the following are hereby appointed as the Special

5. That the official ballot for such election shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR THE CREATION OF THE EARTH - SPRINGLAKE HOSPITAL DISTRICT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF ANNUAL TAXES NOT TO EXCEED 75 CENTS ON THE \$100 VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT."

"AGAINST THE CREATION OF THE EARTH - SPRINGLAKE HOSPITAL DISTRICT, AND PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF ANNUAL TAXES NOT TO EXCEED 75 CENTS ON THE \$100 VALUATION OF ALL TAXABLE PROPERTY WITHIN THE DISTRICT."

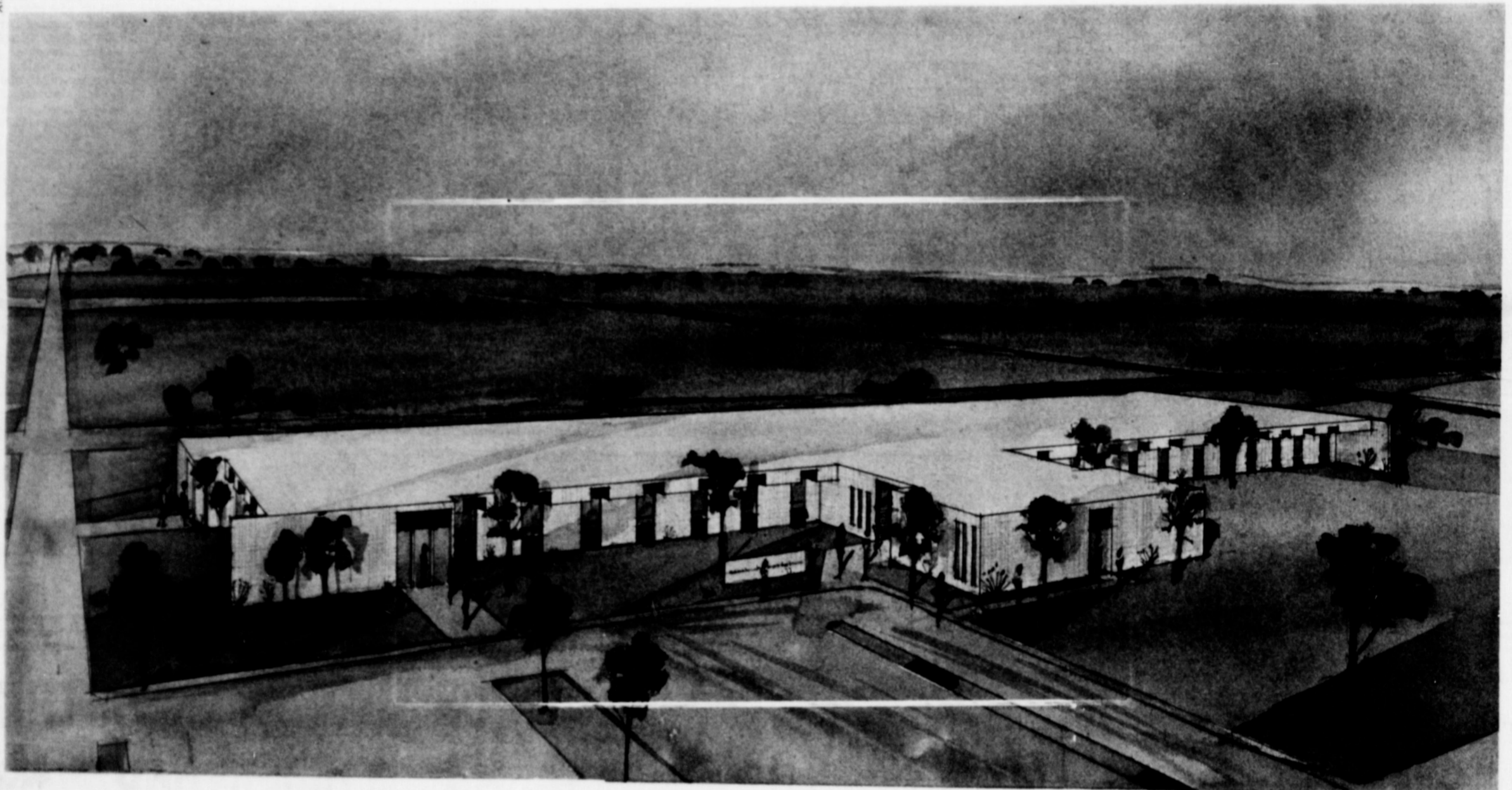

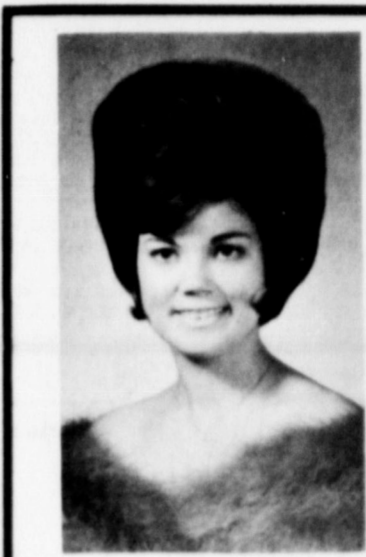

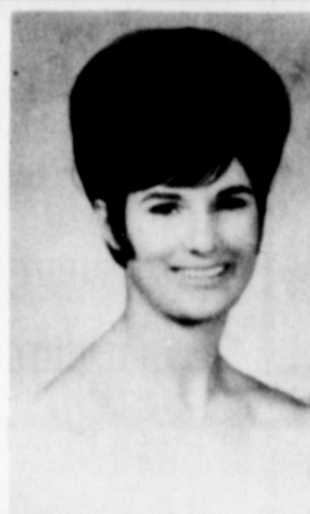

## Getting Married in Lamb County Easier Today Than in Past

Lamb Countians are more inclined today to take that long trip down the church aisle to the altar of marriage than did their predecessors, according to official figures from the Department of Commerce.

The latest official figures show that approximately 74.2 percent of the Lamb County population over age 14 are married.

A breakdown of this figure reveals that 74.6 percent of all men in that age bracket and 73.7 percent of all women are married.

In other parts of the United States, the marital ratio is 67.5 percent, and in the State of Texas, 69.1 percent.

Another generally-held belief, regarding marriage and divorce is upset by some recent figures, released by the Census Bureau.

They show that, contrary to the popular impression, the nation's marital rate has been ris-

ing faster than its divorce rate. The survey, covering 1966, indicates that 3.2 percent of all women over age 14 and 2.3 percent of all men of that age group have been divorced and have not remarried. This compares with the low figure of 0.4 percent of women and 0.3 percent of men divorced in the year 1890.

On the other hand, during the 76-year span, the proportion of married people rose 8.3 percent, more than making up for the increase in the divorce rate.

Along with these changes, there was a sharp drop in the proportion of single people. The decline in single men amounted to 8 percent and, in single women, 5 percent.

Lamb County's divorce rate, reflecting the national trend, is higher than in the past. The latest figures for the local area show a total of 148 men and 117

## Information Kit Available For Medicare Beneficiaries

Medicare beneficiaries who signed up for medical insurance protection can now obtain an information kit to help them keep a record of their doctor bills so they will know when they reach their yearly \$50 deductible, John G. Hutton, Lubbock, Social Security District Manager, announced today.

The kit includes a record-keeping folder and two leaflets which explain the two methods of payment for medical insurance claims, and what medical expenses count for the \$50 deductible. The folder has pockets on the inside for holding doctor bills and space to write in the date and amount of each bill so that the beneficiary will know immediately when he reaches the \$50 each year. After that, the medical insurance plan pays 80 percent of the

reasonable charges for covered expenses for the remainder of the year.

Hutton said "that all new medicare beneficiaries will receive the kit when they sign up for medical insurance. Those who already have medical insurance coverage should write, telephone, or visit the social security office to obtain this free kit. The office is located at 3428 Avenue H, telephone PO 5-8541. Extension 384.

Also, people who need help in completing a medical insurance claim are urged to get in touch with the social security office. "We know that these claim -- especially the first claim -- can be confusing to people," said Hutton, "and we will be glad to help in every way possible."

## Treatment for Iron Chlorosis In Sorghum Given by Specialist

Iron chlorosis of grain and forage types of sorghum can reduce yield if the condition is severe enough.

"This iron deficiency is characterized by a yellowing between the leaf veins and often occurs on calcic spots or high lime soils containing free calcium carbonate," says Dr. Charles D. Welch, Extension soil chemist at Texas A&M University.

Iron deficiency usually is observed early in the season soon after emergence, and spots and irregular patterned areas are most common. The crop tends to grow out of the condition as soon as the soil temperature rises, but it often is seen on a second growth of forage sorghum.

If land has a history of producing sorghum with this disorder, Welch advises trying a foliar application of 2 1/2 percent iron sulfate, commonly called copperas. The principle involved is to get iron into the plant through the leaves.

Prepare the solution by dissolving 10 pounds of iron sulfate

in 50 gallons of water.

According to Welch, the light blue or blue-green solution will become yellow and less soluble after prolonged exposure to the air.

A wetting agent of detergent should be added to insure good coverage of the leaf surface. Welch said that approximately 20 gallons of the wetting solution per acre should do the job. The first application should be made within 10 days after emergence if plants show severe deficiency. Another application should follow in about two weeks. Should yellowing continue or occur later in the season, a third application may be necessary.

If zinc or other micronutrients are included in the treatment, slightly reduce the iron concentration to prevent leaf burn from too much salt. In applying micronutrients, Welch advises using only those that are lacking, and in amounts that will meet the plant requirements and yet not cause injury to the plant.

## Lemons Healthful, Helpful To American Homemakers

The common lemon can be a big help for the harried homemaker, says Frances Reasonover, Extension foods and nutrition specialist with Texas A&M University.

Lemons, while most frequently used in the form of juice, can also enhance the flavor of pies, meats, and beverages.

Lemon juice helps prevent the browning of cut fruits such as peaches, apples, and pears. Potatoes stay white if they are cooked in water to which a little lemon juice has been added. Don't add too much lemon juice, though, it will harden the potatoes. It is best to add the juice halfway through the cooking period.

If you use lemon juice to flavor

vegetables, add it just before serving. Green vegetables cooked with acids turn an unattractive olive green and require longer cooking to become tender.

To prevent curdling, always add lemon juice to milk--not milk to the lemon juice.

In pudding and pie fillings, add lemon juice to the mixture after it has been cooked to prevent thinning of the filling.

Lemons, a member of the citrus family, are an excellent source of vitamin C.

# Importing Water To South Plains Is Something More Than Pipe Dream

"I have never been associated with anything so exciting, stimulating, or offering greater potential for the South Plains than the prospect of importing water to the area for agricultural and other uses," says J. D. Smith of Littlefield.

Smith is president of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., and a member of the organizing committee for Water, Inc., the formation of which is one of the first steps toward bringing water to West Texas from areas of surplus.

"Engineers and others who have studied the situation have convinced me that imported water for this area is not only possible, but practical," Smith said, and added "It has often been said that with plenty of water the Plains could be the garden spot of the world, and I now expect to see it become just that."

The organizational meeting of Water, Inc., will be held at the Koko Palace in Lubbock at 2 p. m., May 24, and members of the organizing committee are urging that people from all walks of life be on hand.

A charter and by-laws for the organization have been drawn up and approved by the organizing committee and these will be submitted for membership approval May 24.

"Too many people are looking on imported water as a pipe-dream," according to Smith. "They just don't realize how close we are to the day when the Texas Water Development Board, the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U. S. Corps of Engineers may say 'the water is available, we can get it to you at a reasonable cost, and if you want it sign this contract to pay for it.' And if we are going to be ready when that day comes, we've got to start now."

The TWDB, Bureau of Reclamation and Corps of Engineers along with three prominent engineering firms, have conducted engineering and cost studies already and indicate the feasibility of transporting water up the hill to West Texas from Northeast Texas and areas outside the State. Other studies are now in progress to outline possible storage sites in the area, a distribution system and other details.

These will be discussed at the May 24 meeting, as will the possible cost of the water once it arrives and the economic impact on the area.

Initial studies indicate the definite possibility of importing from three to five million acre feet each year to the Plains within the next 10 years, followed by another 10 to 15 million acre feet annually in about twenty years.

This compares with about 5

million acre feet now being pumped annually for agricultural use from the Ogallala formation which underlies the area.

Smith said "This is something which could mean tripling the irrigated acreage on the Plains, extending the life of our irrigation indefinitely, broadening the range of practical crops to be produced and other benefits. Just the announcement that a contract would be signed for imported water would cause an immediate jump in land values. So I feel PCG, as a producer organization, should do all in its power to move the project forward as fast as possible--which is just what we are doing."

## SENSING THE NEWS

In appearances before the Congress and the American Newspaper Publishers Association, General William C. Westmoreland appeared as vigorous and dynamic as he is on the battlefields of South Vietnam. Indeed in every way the Westmoreland appearances on the home front had a tonic effect on the nation.

Sometimes the Johnson administration is said to suffer from a 'credibility gap'. But there was no question of disbelieving Gen. Westmoreland when he reported on the fighting spirit of American servicemen or when he spelled out their concern about defeatism among a small, but articulate, group in the USA.

The general was frank to say that the fighting men in Vietnam are deeply disturbed about 'the unpatriotic acts of demonstrators against the struggle in the Far East. The soldiers, sailors, airmen, marines and coast guardsmen on duty in Southeast Asia are risking their lives while a minority of kooks wave placards, insisting that the United States withdraw before the forces of communism.

More to be condemned, perhaps, is the small congressional faction, typified by Senators J.W. Fulbright (D-Ark), Robert Kennedy (D-NY) and Charles Percy (R-Ill) who are making careers of being "doves". These men, holding important posts in the legislative branch, surely

must know that their dove-like sounds give aid and comfort to the enemy. As General Westmoreland pointed out in his speech to the publishers, the North Vietnamese communists can't win the military battle, but they hope to win in the world arena.

It is no wonder, however, that the Congress and the people are impressed with General Westmoreland. What a contrast he presents with Senators Fulbright, Kennedy, Percy and other defeatists.

Everything about the general suggested the "win" philosophy which always has been characteristic of the American people. He didn't come before the Congress with any easy promises, but with realistic description of the requirements of victory in a protracted struggle with communism. The general proved to be the very embodiment of determination and resolution, of sober analysis and intelligent confidence in the capacity of the United States to triumph over the enemies of freedom. Gen. Westmoreland represents, in other words, all the zeal and energy and honesty that so many Americans long for in their national leadership and which they have so often been denied in recent years.

The general's forthright appearance before Congress, which was interrupted 19 times by rousing applause, gives hope that the military professionals, who were muzzled by the Kennedy administration, at long

last are being unmuzzled. Certainly, it is refreshing to hear words of leadership--words of challenge--from a leader who not only plans but bears responsibility for action on one of the supreme testing grounds of life--the battlefield. And hearing General Westmoreland speak, many Americans no doubt thought of the upstart "whiz kids" of the Kennedy administration who once usurped authority in the Pentagon. Today, however, as the nation engages in real warfare, the job at hand takes men, not "whiz kids". Courage and honesty become more important than a Ph.D. in data-processing.

Among the important observations made by Gen. Westmoreland was the remark that the men fighting in Vietnam one day will return to leadership in this country. Indeed they will, and this is a bright promise. After each war in which the U. S. has engaged, the veterans have played an immense and constructive leadership role. The Vietnam veterans are badly needed to give the nation the dynamism characteristic of General Westmoreland and to counter the pernicious effects of the beards and weardies who are bent on plunging this country into anarchy and social revolution.

Truly, the Vietnam veterans are the hope of America. A. E. "Pete" O'Hair and L. T. Smith fished at Lake Kickapoo near Electra, last weekend.

## Chairs That Fit Aid Good Posture

The chair chosen by the homemaker in which she will sew and perform kitchen tasks will influence her posture, according to home furnishing specialists.

The specialists recommend that the homemaker learn to use her body with the same skill and efficiency as she does her automatic washer or electric range.

Guides for selecting a chair include these basic considerations: Choose a chair that supports the upper and lower back with the hips well back on the chair's seat. The depth of the seat and the height of the chair must be correct to provide this support.

The proper chair seat has a depth that permits you to bend your legs at the knees and rest your feet flat on the floor. A chair that is too deep causes pressure on the calves of the legs. Select a chair with height approximately the length of the lower legs so that the feet rest flat on the floor as you keep your knees and feet together. If the chair is too high, there will be pressure on the thigh just above the knee and a resulting reduction of circulation.

Plans were discussed for the annual June meeting, at which time volunteers will be recognized. The monthly meeting will be combined with the regular meeting.

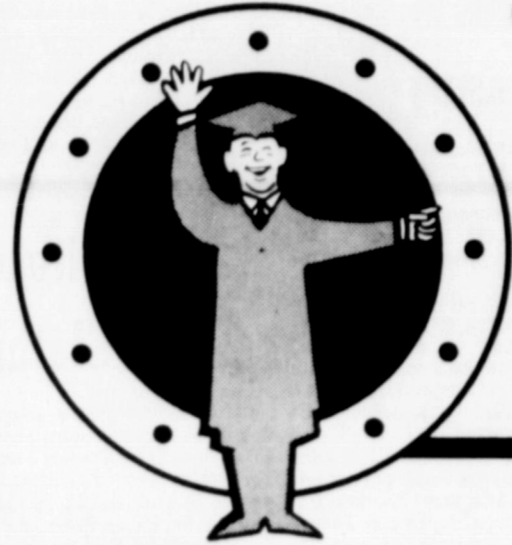

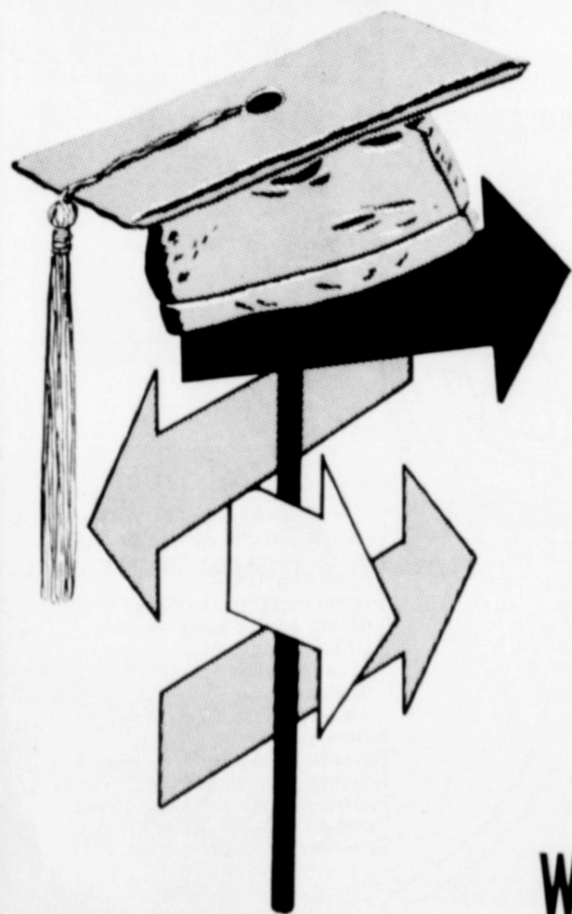

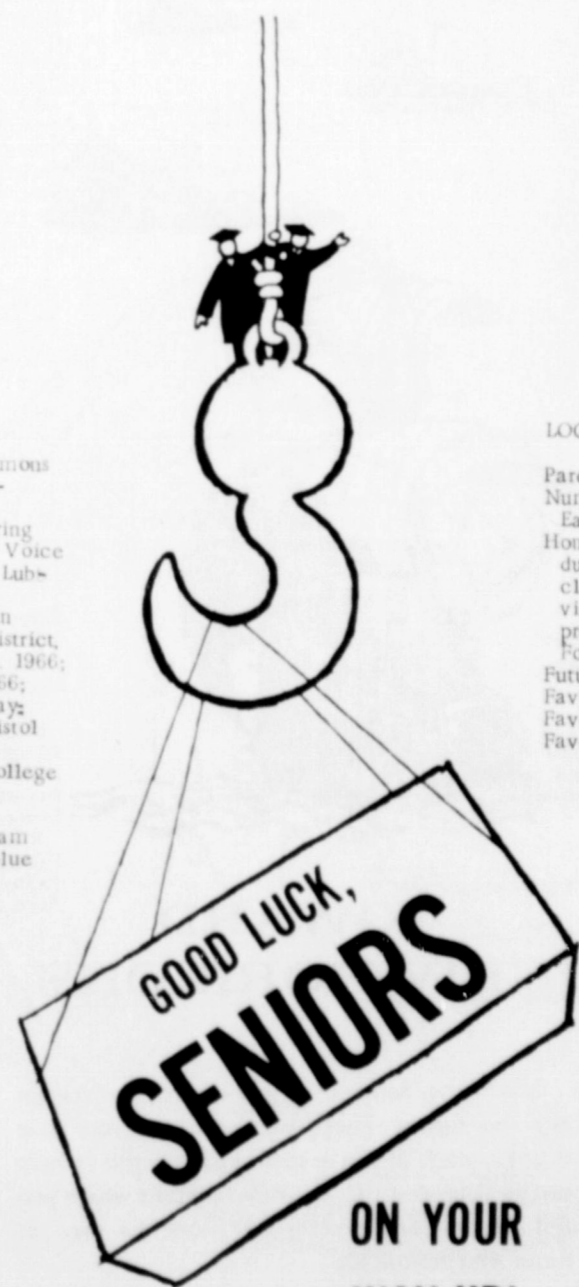

## Cattle Feeding In Texas Is Increasing

Cattle feeding has boomed in the past few years, and is now big business in the State of Texas. However, several states in the nation feed out more cattle than does the state of Texas.

Nebraska is said to be the top cattle feeding state in the nation, feeding out about twice as many as the state of Texas. California is second in cattle feeding with Colorado and Texas following.

In Texas, there were 592,000 head of cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market on May 1, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This is 12 percent above a year ago but 9 percent below a month ago.

Feedlots of 1,000 or more capacity held 556,000 (94 percent) of the total being fattened for slaughter market. This size group is up 18 percent from May 1966, but 8 percent below a month ago. Of these large feedlots, there were 204 that reported having cattle on feed May 1.

Feedlots with less than 1,000 capacity held 36,000 head. This size group is 37 percent below a year ago and down 22 percent from a month ago.

Placements into Texas feedlots during April totaled 102,000 head. These placements are 11 percent below April 1966 and 16 percent below March 1967 placements. Marketings of fat cattle during April totaled 163,000 head. These marketings are 39 percent above April 1966 and 10 percent above March marketings.

## Popularity of Bold Designed Paper Clothing Increasing

We once thought a garment had to be old and worn out before it could be thrown away--but not any more. That was before the debut of paper clothes, explains Rhea Boyles, Extension clothing specialist with Texas A&M University.

Paper dresses in bold designs and colors were first introduced as a gimmick, but their popularity is increasing. Designs are becoming more creative, and many are embossed in gold and silver for party wear.

One of the latest innovations is paper underwear. Garments of this type are available for both men and women. Men who travel find paper undershorts especially convenient since they don't have to take home a bag of dirty laundry at the end of a week.

Lingerie for the ladies is gay and more frivolous. Panties, bras, and slips are available in bold, gay colors. Garments like this are usually sold in kits, the price varying with the number of items in each kit. These same garments can be worn as beach or playwear--but don't go swimming! No guarantees are made that the garments will stay together if wet.

Disposable garments are also used for utility and convenience. Current usage includes aprons, bibs, hospital lab coats, gowns for food processors, surgical gowns for nurses and physicians, and examination gowns worn by

patients in doctor's offices. Such household items as sheets, pillowcases, towels, and wash cloths made of paper will probably be used in the near future. Getting the price of garments and other items at a competitive level with laundry costs of the cloth equivalent has been a problem.

Manufacturers do not plan major production of paper garments until newer and simpler processes are developed. The paper used in the present-day paper garments is a sturdy cellulose product reinforced with rayon or nylon. Both fire and water resistant finishes can be applied. A luminous effect can be added, making it useful for such items as highway workers jackets.

## Information Released On Social Security Benefits

Recently a man who was earning \$2400 per year reached age 65 and filed a claim with the Social Security Administration so that he could establish his entitlement to medicare.

He had no intention of retiring because he enjoyed his work and felt he had many good years left.

Consequently, he was surprised when he started receiving social security checks about the middle of the year.

What he did not realize was that he did not lose all of his social security checks because his earnings were over \$1500 per year.

The law provides that one dollar for every two dollars earned between \$1500 and \$2700 is deducted for the total social security payable each year. An additional one dollar for every dollar earned is deducted for any earnings over \$2700.

Thus, the man who earned \$2400 would have only \$450 deducted from the total social security benefits payable to him for the year.

Even if a person's earnings exceed the limit for possible payment for the year, he can still draw a check for any month he does not earn more than \$125, or if self-employed, does not render substantial services in a business.

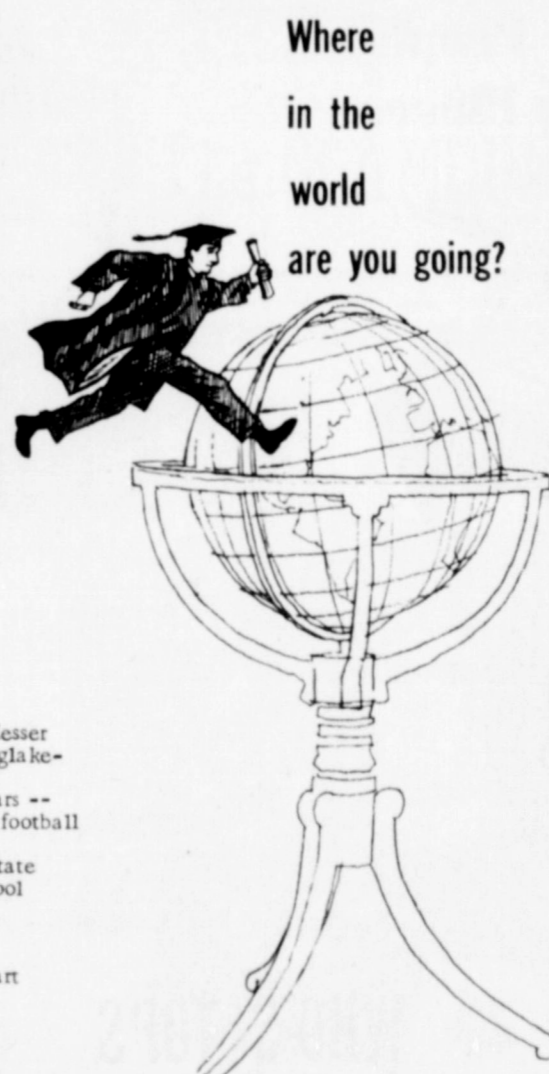

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# Texas Leads Nation in Total Number of Tornadoes Annually

AUSTIN... Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texans to review tornado safety precautions. "While tornadoes can occur any time of the year," Garrison said, "April, May and June are the peak months."

U.S. Weather Bureau records indicate that Texas leads the nation in total number of tornadoes per year. The annual average of 80.7 is based on a record of 1,210 confirmed tornadoes from 1951 through 1965.

"It is especially important for every school, church, hospital, hotel, business house, and industry to establish an emergency plan," Garrison said. "To know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death."

A circular on tornado safety is available from most local Civil Defense offices.

## Toys Should Be Tools For Learning

Picking out toys for seldom-seen youngsters can be a frustrating experience, but the American Toy Institute has produced a few guidelines for all toys.

Family life education specialists have found that a good toy will challenge but not frustrate the youngster. He won't have much fun, or learn anything either, if it's so complicated he can't satisfy his curiosity about "what makes it go."

A normal child wants a toy he can "do" something with. To have continuing play value, a toy must challenge a child and offer built-in variety -- many

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possibilities he can imagine into many play situations. Most authorities divide play into four different types and recommend that a child of any age have toys that give him the whole range of play experience.

Toys of the active, physical type, such as bicycles and scooters, require physical exertion and result in muscular development. Any kind of ball falls into this category. Push-and-pull toys are ideal for toddlers.

Creative, constructive, manipulative, or scientific toys embrace a broad range. They extend from a toddler's first blocks to complex electronic assembly sets. Coloring books and painting supplies encourage expression of individual ideas, initiative, and observation for different age groups.

Play that is imitative, imaginative, and dramatic is great fun for children. Toys for this kind of play include stuffed animals for babies, dress-up costumes, toy trucks and miniature tools.

Shared or social play helps children learn to get along with each other, understand fair play and healthy competition. All games and sports equipment are in this category, as are board games such as checkers, chess, quiz and word games, and others.

Toys are "tools of play" and like any good tool, must work effectively -- not just as an amusing gadget.

## Spring is Here, Protection Against Tetanus Should be Considered

With the advent of the spring season of 1967 most of us are beginning to get out of doors again. There are gardens and lawns that need work and outdoor chores of all sorts that have accumulated during the winter.

With the return of outdoor activities comes once again the hazard of minor accidents, cuts and scratches. Most often these aren't serious and will heal quickly if properly cleaned and protected.

But sometimes these little scratches can be more serious. Sometimes they are the channel

through which you could get tetanus (lockjaw).

Tetanus-producing spores lie dormant in the soil of your garden, the dirt of your garage, and the dust inside your house. These spores can infect you through the tiniest wound--a pin scratch, a bee sting or a small cut, says a pamphlet of the American Medical Association.

Tetanus spores may remain in your body for long periods without producing the disease. Or, they may produce poison effects in five to fourteen days, even though the wound has healed.

First signs of tetanus are irritability and restlessness. Muscles rapidly become rigid, eventually causing a clenched-jaw leer that gives tetanus its nickname--lockjaw.

When symptoms appear, the outlook is grim, even with the best treatment. To avoid the deadly consequences, be sure you are immunized with tetanus toxoid. When you are immunized, your body manufactures antibodies that will fight tetanus toxin. A booster is needed every ten years and whenever you are injured.

## Bulls Outgain Steers In Feedlot Test

In the "hurry-up" beef program bulls out-performed steers in both weaning weights and feedlot gains.

This is the first year to compare bulls to steers in the program, according to Walter Kruse, of Texas A&M University's Livestock and Forage Research Center.

Kruse started the Hurry-up program several years ago--its goal is to raise 1,000 pound beef animals in a year.

This year, ten bulls and ten steers were tested. They were two-breed crosses and three-breed crosses. Weaning weights at eight months averaged 626 for the steers and 633 for the bulls.

After 121 days in the feedlot, the bulls weighed an average of 1,015 pounds. They had a feedlot gain of 3.14 pounds per day.

The steers weighed 934 pounds at the end of the feeding period. Their average feedlot gain was 2.56 pounds per day.

Kruse says there will probably be more and more bulls put in feedlots. He pointed out the steers and bulls were close together in weaning weights, but the bulls really stood out in the feedlot performance.

Other research has shown that rate of gain is closely related to feed efficiency. Although feed efficiency records weren't kept, Kruse figures the bulls made the gain on less feed per pound of gain.

Kruse says the bulls brought 60 cents less per hundred weight at the market, but the extra weight and better efficiency more than made up for the slightly lower price.

Tests at Texas A&M by Dr. G. T. King of the Animal Science Department, indicate that young bull beef is perfectly acceptable as far as tenderness, taste and "eatibility" are concerned.

## Home Safety Care Urged

With spring housecleaning and early gardening, city apartments and suburban homes have more potential poison hazards at this time of year than at any other, the Greater New York Safety Council cautioned householders.

Mrs. Marjorie B. May, the Council's director of home safety urged that poisons and caustic substances such as detergents be kept where small children cannot reach them and that precautions be taken against mistaken ingestion by any member of the household of medicines not intended for their own use.

## Insecticides Can Be Dangerous

Are the bugs eating up your garden? Most insects can be knocked out with sprays, powders and other poisons, but the unwary gardener sometimes can suffer from the effects of bug sprays, too.

Some tips on use of insecticides are offered in Today's

The Earth News-Sun, Thursday, May 18, 1967 - Sec. 2, Pg. 5

Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association.

- Read the directions on the container carefully and follow them. The manufacturer spells out the proper usage and safety precautions.
- If the directions call for rubber gloves, protective clothing or goggles, leave this alone, unless you are an expert.
- Store the insecticide in its original container, with original label, in a safe, locked compartment, away from children and pets.
- Destroy empty containers immediately.
- Apply downwind, to avoid inhaling sprays and dusts. Stay

- out of freshly sprayed areas.
- Don't smoke while spraying or dusting. Some of the chemicals are flammable.
- If chemicals are spilled on the skin, wash immediately and thoroughly.
- Cover bird baths, dog dishes and fish pools before spraying. Pour left over spray down a drain or into the soil. Don't leave it around in pans or pails.

## Zinc Deficiency in Some Texas Soils Studied by Specialist

A great deal of concern has developed over possible zinc deficiency and the need for its addition to some Texas soils, reports Dr. C. D. Welch, Extension soil chemist at Texas A&M University.

In some instances, he adds, zinc has been included in fertilizers containing other plant nutrients and improved crop growth has been noted. But, he explains, unless a check plot is fertilized in a similar manner without zinc, the improved growth cannot always be attributed to the addition of the zinc.

There are conditions under which zinc deficiency has been found and these may serve as a guide. Alkaline soils, those with a pH above 7.5, show a higher incidence of zinc deficiency due to the lower availability of zinc in alkaline soils. Such soils are generally found from the Blacklands westward, Welch says.

Corn appears to be one of the better indicator crops, says the chemist. Also, rossette on pecans for many years has been identified as zinc deficiency. Deficiency of the chemical has also been found on grain sorghum and cotton.

If zinc deficiency is suspected

it can be corrected on the present crop by a foliar spray. Welch suggests the use of a one-fourth to one-half percent solution of zinc sulfate or chelated zinc along with a detergent as a wetting agent. Dissolving from one to two pounds of either zinc sulfate or chelate in 50 gallons of water will give proper solution, he says. Do not make the solution too concentrated, he warns, since leaves can be more easily damaged with zinc compounds than with iron. The addition of one-fourth pound hydrated lime to the solution will lessen the chance of leaf burn, Welch says.

A standard practice in most regions in Texas is to add two pounds of zinc sulfate per 100 gallons of the regular pecan orchard spray, especially those on alkaline soils.

If a zinc deficiency is suspected on field crops, confirm it through the use of a foliar spray this year and prevent it next year by including suitable zinc compounds in the regular fertilizer, advises Welch. Soil tests are being developed to assist in identifying those soils which should receive an application of zinc, he says.

## Greenspan Program A "Big Hit Says USDA

Greenspan, a part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Cropland Adjustment Program, is becoming increasingly popular. Reports show that cities, counties, and other public entities confronted with conservation, recreation, and open-space problems are turning in increasing numbers to the Greenspan program for help.

The Cropland Adjustment Program (CAP), authorized by the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965, is divided into two parts. One part applies to farmers, the other to public entities. For farmers, it provides adjustment payments and conservation cost-sharing to help to shift land out of certain crops and into conserving uses for periods of five to ten years.

The Greenspan provision of CAP authorizes equivalent help to public entities--local, state or Federal--desiring to buy cropland for permanent conversion to non-farm uses such as the preservation of open spaces and natural beauty, wildlife

habitat and recreation, and the prevention of air and water pollution.

Greenspan rates of assistance are based on the smaller of 50 percent of the cost of the land diverted from eligible crops or what a farmer would have received under a 10-year CAP agreement. The grant will be determined by the number of acres and the farm yield per acre.

Greenspan help is being applied to a wide variety of uses--wildlife ponds, fishing and boating waters, nature trails, beautification areas; picnic, camping and wilderness areas; children's playgrounds, football fields, baseball and softball diamonds, golf courses; tennis, badminton and basketball courts, and swimming pools.

## Good Housekeeping Deters Fabric Pests

The protection of clothing and many household furnishings during the summer months against insect pests can be a part of the spring cleaning job.

Extension entomologists at Texas A&M University say two of the most destructive pests of fabrics in the home are clothes moths and carpet beetles. The beetles are more abundant in most localities and often do the damage blamed on clothes moths. The larvae of both pests feed on anything containing wool or other animal fibers. The adults do no damage, explain the entomologists.

The larvae of the clothes moths are white with a brownish-black head. They are about one-half inch long and can be found developing in a silken feeding tube or a hard protective case often on fabrics. Carpet beetle larvae crawl about and are often found on cotton goods or other things on which they do not feed. They are carrot-shaped, golden to chocolate brown in color with tufts of very long hairs at the tail end of the body. They may reach almost a half-inch in length, say the entomologists.

Both feed on wool, mohair, bristles, fur, feathers, and down. Household articles commonly attacked include blankets, comforters, rugs, carpets, drapes, pillows, air mattresses, brushes and upholstery.

The use of preventive measures is recommended by the entomologists. These include the application of protective treat-

ments to susceptible articles, practicing good housekeeping and when needed, spraying insecticides on surfaces over which the insects are likely to crawl.

Paradichlorobenzene crystals or naphthalene flakes are effective against both pests provided the container in which the articles are stored is absolutely airtight. The mere odor of the chemical does not repel the insects. Oil-solution insecticides containing DDT, methoxychlor, Strobane or Perthane are fine for protecting clothes and blankets.

Rugs and carpets may be treated with a 5 percent DDT oil-solution every 12 to 18 months, using 1 1/2 to 2 quarts of spray on a 9 x 12 rug. Special attention should be given to the parts of a rug or carpet under furniture not often moved and around heat registers and under radiators, emphasize the entomologists.

Furs should be stored only in commercial facilities where they will receive professional care and can be insured against damage.

The entomologists recommend a spray containing 2 percent chlordane, 3 percent premium grade malathion or one-half percent diazinon for the treatment of surfaces over which insects may crawl. These and other recommended sprays may be purchased in ready-to-use pressurized containers or as liquids for application with a hand sprayer. All hard-to-clean

places should be sprayed. Closets may be treated after clothing has been removed.

The entomologists advise cleaning the home often enough to prevent the accumulation of lint, dust and hair. Close attention should be given to rugs and carpets, drapes, upholstered furniture, closets, cracks, baseboards and moldings and other hard-to-reach areas. Rotation, if possible, of rugs and carpets is suggested since insects usually feed under heavy furniture where cleaning is difficult. Woolen articles in the home which are not worth protecting should be removed since they often harbor infestations which can spread. The vacuum cleaner, say the entomologists, is the best tool for doing most of the necessary cleaning.

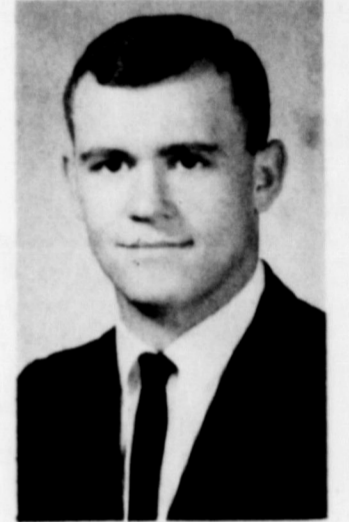
