





Officials Predict 29 Persons To Die On Texas Highways Over Holidays

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., direct-or of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the official prediction that 29 per sons will be killed this weekend in Labor Day holiday traffic in

Garrison said some 125 extra patrolmen from the department's other uniformed services will join the regular Highway Patrol force in attempting to halt traffic law violations-which figure in most fatal accidents.

'We hope the driving public will help this Labor Day weekend to prove that we have over-esti-mated the number of traffic fatalities that will occur in the threeday period," he said.

"Department patrolmen and all other law enforcement officers in Baylor President Dr. W. R. White, our state will do everything possible to make the streets and highways safer by removing lawless drivers-but the statistics prove the main job is up to the individual behind the wheel."

"It is significant to note that in each of the 14 fatal accidents which occurred outside city limits last Labor Day weekend, at least one law violations was involved.


