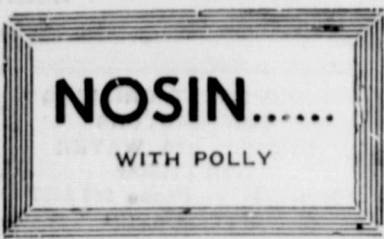

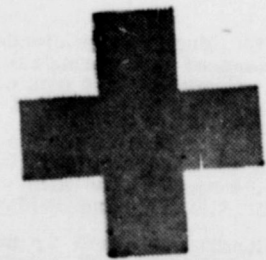

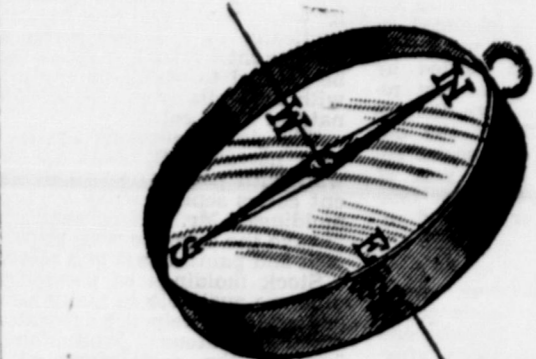
Mrs. Keith Parish Flying to Germany

Social Security Office Representative To Be In Earth Wednesday

"One question we hear a lot," says John G. Hutton, District Manager of the Lubbock Social Security Office "is how much social security credit is needed for people to qualify for old-age or survivors benefits?" Today, this newspaper offered Mr. Hutton the opportunity to give the answer.

Mr. Hutton not only gave us the answer, but it's news. The Social Security act was changed in 1960 and the amount of work covered by the program needed by workers now reaching or past retirement age, or who have died, is less than it was. Under the old law, the worker needed social security credit equal to one year of work for each two years after 1950 and before he died or reached retirement age.

The new law, however, specifies that this worker needs social security credit equal to only one year for each three years after 1950 and up to the year he reached retirement age or dies.

Under both the old and the new law, the social security credit needed can be earned anytime after 1936 — no one needs credit for more than ten years work, and a year and a half of work under Social Security is always required.

Because of the new law, many people who have had their claims rejected because of lack of sufficient work credit, may now be eligible. For instance, all workers who reached retirement age (64 for men and 62 for women) before 1957 need credit for only one and one half years of work under social security to be eligible. Under the old law, only people who reached retirement age before July, 1954, could qualify with credit for only one and one half years of work.

Mr. Hutton urged people who have had application for benefits turned down or who failed to apply or report because of insufficient social security credit, to get in touch with the social security office. They may now be eligible for benefits.

Designer Says:

Wood Trim Sure to Cure Ailing Decor

Difficult decorating problems often can be licked by the discreet use of wood moldings, designer Carl Ficken advises his clients.

Mr. Ficken, a member of the American Institute of Decorators and the National Society of Interior Designers, points out that a room that's too long will appear to have better proportions if wood moldings are applied vertically to the side walls at regular intervals. The strips can be painted to match or contrast with the walls or can be left the natural wood color.

"To give a pleasant lift to a long, narrow hall, break up one wall with panels of two different colors separated by vertical moldings," Mr. Ficken suggests. "Leave the opposite wall unpaneled and paint it just one color."

Stock moldings of ponderosa pine are available in many sizes and styles to help the decorator, whether amateur or professional, improve the appearance of a room at low cost. The designer explains that when it's not practical to make structural changes in a house or apartment, moldings can work wonders.

Here are some additional tips he gives for decorating with stock molding:

Flush doors, plain cabinets, and unfinished furniture: Add strips of molding to give the popular provincial look.

Windows and doorways: Emphasize and add architectural importance by framing with molding.

High-ceilinged rooms: Attach a horizontal strip of molding to walls two or three feet above floor, using contrasting paint or paper below to make a dado.

Fireplace: Make a panel of molding above the fireplace and hang a picture within it to give traditional elegance to the focal point of the room.

For unusual effects, combine various styles of moldings.

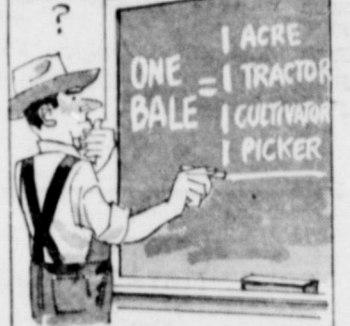
Burial was in Olton Cemetery under the direction of Lemons Funeral Home, Plainview.

Farm Facts

There was a time when a "chicken in every pot" was held out as the goal of prosperity. Thanks to research and its application to poultry production, a chicken is no longer regarded as a luxury item on the food bill.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture points out that the broiler chick is the most efficient converter of grain and other food into flesh, requiring 2 1/2 pounds of feed to produce a pound of gain. Many producers specialize the year-around in growing broilers. Processors use assembly line methods. Cut-up chickens of uniform high quality is a large volume seller in supermarkets.

Between 1950 and 1958, when prices of most food products increased, the retail price of frying chickens dropped an average of 12c a pound.

And in 1959, as compared with the average for the years 1935-39, each of us was consuming 34.8 pounds of poultry instead of 15.6. It took researchers about

We're eating twice as much poultry as 25 years ago.



10 years to perfect a small, meaty turkey, and now some 12 million are sold a year. In 1959, we ate 6 pounds of turkey per person—twice as much as in 1940.

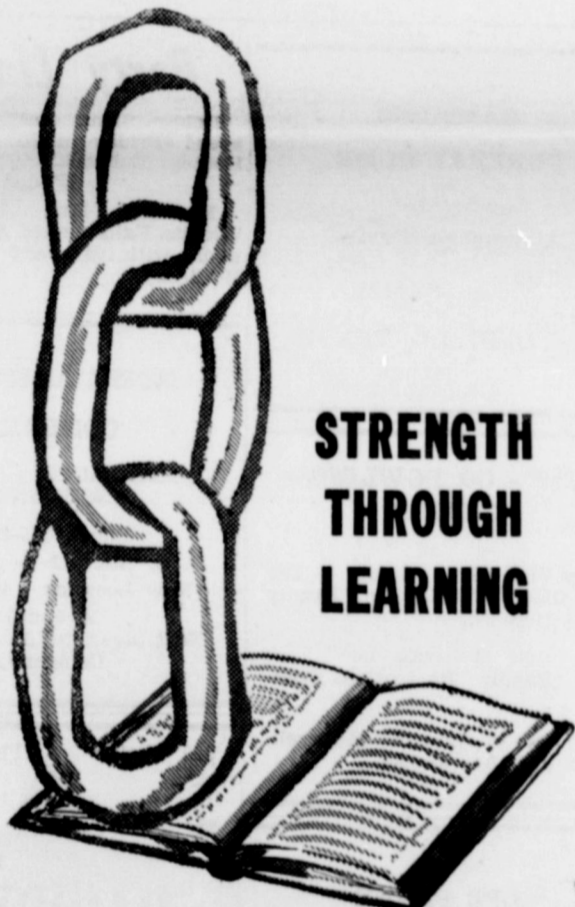

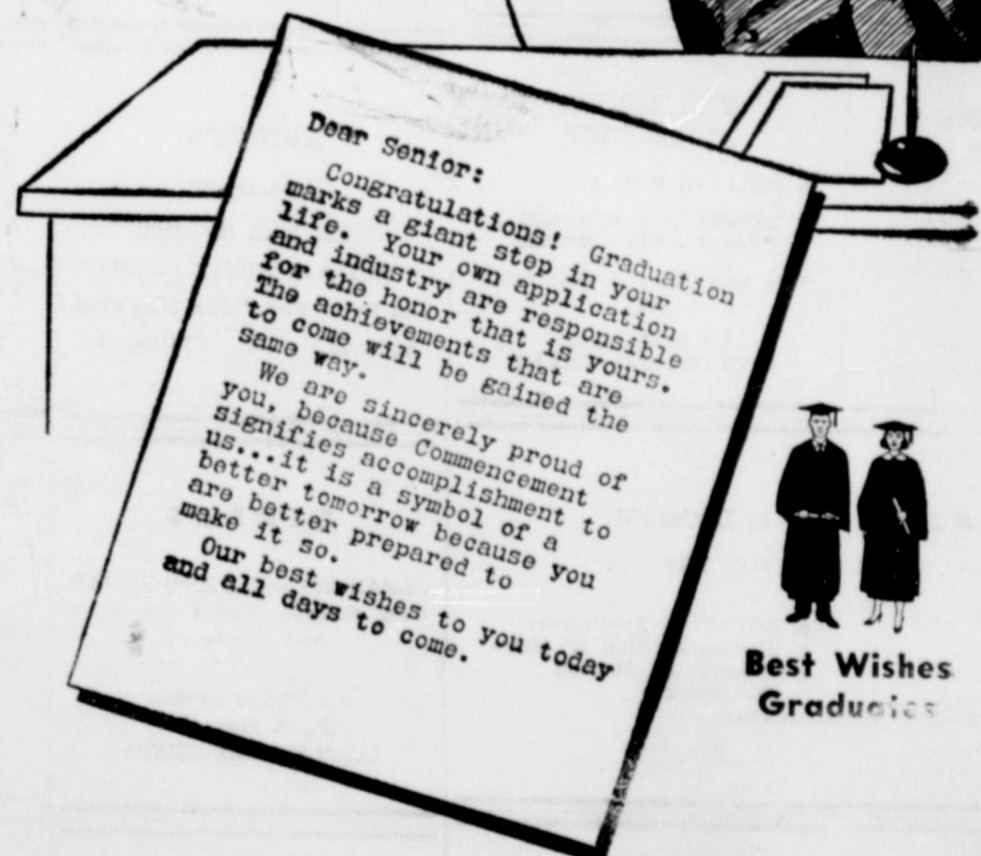

It has been said that a modern supermarket stocks food from each of the 50 states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands.

Wherever we live, we depend on farms and ranches from other sections, providing an important market for their products.

Farms in the nine North-eastern states contain only 6/10 of an acre of crop and pasture land per capita, as compared with the national average of 5.2 acres.

These are the states of Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

People in these states consume 27% of the nation's meat, vegetables, fruits, and nuts, and 28% of the poultry, eggs, and dairy products. They produce only 3% of the meat, 15% of the vegetables and melons, 10% of the fruits and nuts, and about 20% of the poultry, eggs, and dairy products.

They provide a market for the 12 North Central states which produce more than

they can use. The North Central states produce 63% of the meat, 35% of the poultry and eggs, and 44% of the dairy products, while consuming 33%, 26%, and 34%, respectively.

District Board Tells Aims Of County Soil Conservation

By Wiley H. Mudgett
Chairman, Lamb Co. SCD

The objective of your board of supervisors of the Lamb County Soil Conservation District is to furnish cooperators with information that will help them plan and operate their farms and ranches in such a manner that they will accomplish the basic physical objective for conservation. This objective is "The use of each acre of agricultural land within its capabilities and the treatment of each acre of agricultural land in accordance with its needs for protection and improvement."

The Soil Conservation Service through the district, has assistance available to provide land owners and operators land capability maps which serves as an inventory of the land on individual farms. Each producer is urged to become familiar with the different types of land he has, to know them by name just as he knows different kinds of crops such as cotton and grain sorghum, so that each cooperator will be better able to apply and maintain a coordinated conservation program. Many times the difference in types of land and their needs is as great as the different types of crops that producers grow. The land capability map should become a basis for planning and applying conservation on all farms in the district.

It is a known fact that conservation farming pays in increased returns, but more important is that conservation of soil and water resources is a must for the welfare of future generations. Each land owner and operator in the district has an important contribution to make to this great movement.

This is the 13th full year of operations for the district. Our district is a legal subdivision of the State of Texas. It is governed by a five man board which serves without pay. Supervisors

are elected by local landowners. The term of office for soil conservation district supervisors is five years. Regular elections are held in the first Tuesday of October of each year, rotating counterclockwise. The next regular election will be held in Subdivision No. 3 (Sudan). Resident landowners are eligible to cast a ballot.

The District secures assistance from all government agencies in the district. The Soil Conservation Service for technical assistance. The Extension Service for informational program; Farmers Home Administration for conservation loans, and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Administration for Agricultural Conservation cost share assistance.

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Highway Week In Texas May 21-27

Austin (Special) — Highway Week in Texas was officially proclaimed today by Governor Price

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Daniel, and will be observed May 21-27 in conjunction with National Highway Week.

Citizens and groups interested in better highways are cooperating in the observance of Highway Week in Texas — and throughout the nation — following a proclamation of the week nationally by President John F. Kennedy.

State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer called Highway Week "not a week of appreciation but of challenge."

He said Highway Week "is not to brag on what we have done, but to bring more clearly before the public eye the immense highway problems that now confront us."

Foremost among Texas' highway problems, he said, are these: More than one-third of the total Texas highway mileage is obsolete, or about to become so. This is the 25,000-mile system of U. S. and State Highways, which is "almost totally antiquated," Greer said, "by the enormous increase in traffic"

The 33,000-mile system of Texas

Farm Facts

In 1960 there were some 4,770,000 tractors on U. S. farms. This compares with 1,567,000 in 1940 and 3,394,000 in 1950. The value of these tractors totaled almost \$3.4 billion in 1960 as compared with \$503 million in 1940.

The average man is rated at 1/10 horsepower, but when he drives a 20 h.p. tractor he is able to do the work of 200 men.

The tractor era had its beginning in this country in 1889 when a single cylinder Charter engine was installed on a steam traction engine chassis. There were about 1,000 tractors in the U. S. in 1910—huge 10-ton machines used for prairie plowing.

Henry Ford placed a car engine on a light tractor chassis in 1908 and when he mass produced a low cost tractor in 1919, he captured 75% of the market. The independent power takeoff shaft was added in 1941, greatly increasing the tractor's usefulness.

Greater maneuverability, easier transportation, lower cost, and ease of attachment of mounted implements have

stepped up their use since World War II. Tractors, too, have been designed for greater adaptability. They range in size from small garden tractors to giant crawler types.

Farm to Market Roads is still expanding rapidly but there is not enough money to maintain what is built. "Statute permits us to spend a certain amount of money annually building new FM Roads," Greer said, "but none of this money can be spent to maintain what is built, and there isn't enough money to go around."

"The highway dollar is being stretched thinner and thinner," he said, "and it is being constantly bombarded by attempts to divert highway dollars to other purposes."

"The danger of diversion," Greer said, "is that we may be slowly strangled in our own traffic by hardening of our highway arteries."

"We cannot get by with horse-and-buggy highways in the space age," Greer warned, "and I hope that Highway Week in Texas will bring these problems more into the open so that with public support we can meet—and solve—the demands of the most motorized nation on earth."

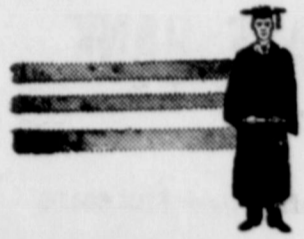
