#### IS THIS BAD ?

The Wall StreetJournal has something important to say about the farm problem - and the ever-changing agricultural scene

"If turn-of-the-century politicians had decided the village smithy must be preserved as a way of life," the Journal observes," They could have preserved it - for a while anyway - by having the Government buy up all the surplus horseshoes." Instead of course, the blacksmith shops simply disapeared, and the blacksmiths went into other lines of work, as a part of a normal and inevitable evolution.

There is a parallel in the current concern over small or family farms. These are not disappearing. But their number is going down - just as the farm population as a whole, regardless of the size of the farms, is going down. And here the Journal says: "Why is the farm population . . . declining ? Because for more than a generation American agriculture has been steadily producing more and more with fewer and fewer hands

"But is this ability to produce abundance with little manpower a bad thing? Of course not. It is the dream of every underedeveloped country in the world. It is precisely the mark of a highly advanced technology and industrial civilization."

One tractor can do the work of many men. So can the other machines now used to cultivate, harvest, and conserve the soil. That means we need fewer farmers - and that total farm income is divided among a smaller number I people, with a larger proportionate share going to each. Over the long run, whatever the temporary difficulties, the result cannot help but be enormously beneficial to all concerned, including the family farm




