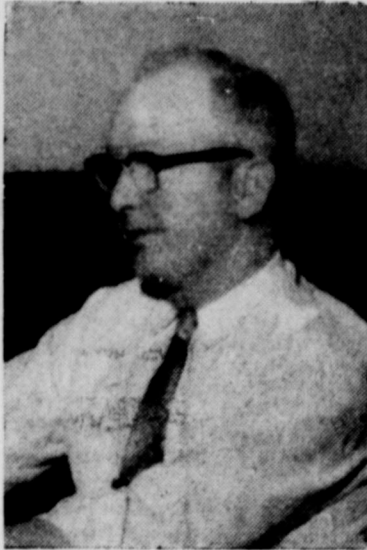
Red Cross First Aid Course Begins Monday At Faust Clinic

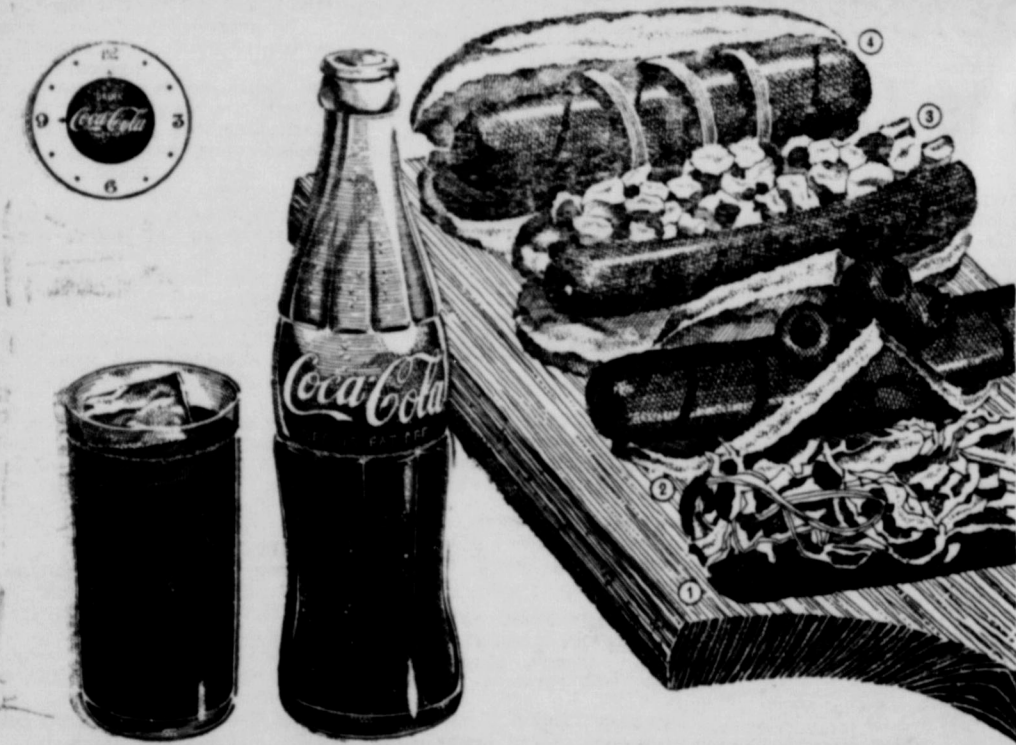

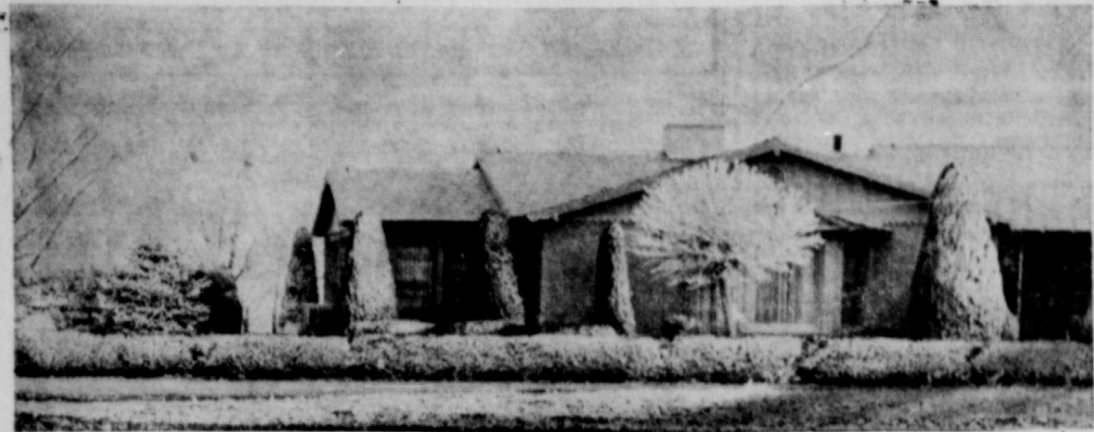

You can catch crappie any time, but it's easier in the spring.

At this season of the year the crappie, notably a roamer, settles down closer to home . . . with thoughts of spawning.

They swim in tight groups, all at the same depth. Find one of these schools, and you can get your limit before breakfast.

Crappie abound everywhere — in rivers, lakes and streams. But it was with the advent of big dam building in Texas that they really came into prominence. Dammed up water submerged many a tree and that is the kind of habitat crappie like most.

All you have to do is locate such a spot.

If you're on the lake, look for a stump sticking out of the water. Go there and tie your boat to the stump. If it's the top of an old submerged tree, you're in business.

For bait, use minnows, or any bait that resembles a minnow. Small spoons, spinners, or jigs will get results.

While the lure or bait must be small, the hook should be large. The crappie's mouth is big, but tender. So he must be handled with care to avoid tearing the hook out.

A small hook will work through the delicate structure of the crappie's mouth. On the other hand, a big hook grabs more of the light gristle, therefore holds better.

A good rule to follow is to figure that the crappie is just off the bottom. So let the minnow down until it touches, then

pull up a couple of turns of the reel.

Stay right there for a couple of minutes. If nothing happens, start reeling up very slowly. It won't hurt to jiggle the bait lightly, because a crappie loves a slowly moving target.

It's important to note the depth where the first crappie takes hold. That's where all his brothers and sisters are. Also it's a good idea to put a blue or red pencil mark on your line to indicate where to stop letting out line.

Spinning gear is ideal for crappie fishing. To begin with, the crappie is a small, sporting-type fish. He requires no big rig. He wants his food presented in a natural way, and a spinning outfit is tops.

Although a big hook is recommended, it can be the wire kind — light, without restricting the minnow's movement.

If there is room, the angler can let his minnow swim free, without any sinker. But if necessary or desirable, he can put a split shot in the line, say a foot and a half above the minnow. That gives the live bait a little room to move around.

Some crappie fishermen use bobbers. That's all right, provided the rule is observed that the bait must get down to the depth where the fish are.

A bobber will mark the distance, and you can rig up your crappie outfit so the bobber will keep track of the depth.

My preference is to get the crappie by feel, not by movement of the bobber. A crappie strike is very light, very gentle. He may even touch the minnow or lure a couple of times before he decides to take it. When he does, he often swims up with it, so that you have to reel in to find out if he's on there.

Once you feel his weight on the line, don't set the hook as you would with a bass. A hard pull would be likely to tear the hook out. Simply pull up, reel in enough to keep the tension on, and you'll get him.

Somewhere between the depth where he's hooked and the place where you are, he'll offer a little resistance, but not much. Nobody ever called the crappie a fighting fish.

He makes up for that deficiency by being a willing feeder and by his excellent flavor when properly cooked.

The crappie, like most fish, lives where he finds the most cover and the most food. In his hiding place, such as an old sunken tree, he is in the midst of branches where you're going to foul and lose hooks, sinkers, and line.

That's part of the game, and is to be expected.

So when you go crappie fishing, take plenty of equipment, because you're going to lose part of your rig now and then. If you don't, you are in the wrong place for crappie.

But the loss is small compared to your gain, if you get a string of these silvery beauties.

There sure are a lot of fellows who can't play the guitar — who do.

Breed Heifers By Weight

Most dairymen are gradually accepting the theory that dairy heifers should be bred by weight rather than age. Yet, when an exceptionally fast-developing heifer calf comes along, some dairymen hesitate to follow the breed-by-weight theory on the possibility that early breeding may in some way endanger the heifer's productive potential.

In the fall of 1955, a fast-developing Holstein heifer in the Ralston Purina research farm herd reached the breeding weight of 750 pounds at only 11 months of age. She had her first calf at the age of 21 months and 12 days. Most dairymen, the country over, who visited the Purina research farm and saw the heifer at that time have inquired about her subsequent production record and development.

Early breeding of this heifer has been most satisfactory. Her weight at calving the first time was 1,005 pounds; the calf weighed 77 pounds. In her first lactation, she produced 9,979 pounds of milk with 377 pounds of butterfat.

She dropped her second calf only 11 months after her first, at the age of 32 months, 10 days. During this lactation she produced 9,126 pounds of milk, 228 pounds of butterfat. Thirteen months later at the age of 45 months, 10 days she had her third calf. During this lactation she produced 14,017 pounds of milk, 502 pounds butterfat. She had her fourth calf at the age of 57 months, 10 days. She is now in her fourth lactation and has produced more than 4,000 pounds of milk in the first three months. She weighed 1,320 pounds at her fourth calving. Her dam was a small cow but she produced 180,417 pounds of milk during her lifetime.

This cow, at the age of five years, has already produced approximately 40,000 pounds of milk and her records indicate that her productive capacity is still developing. It is interesting to note that her production per day of life is above 20 pounds and will increase significantly during this lactation, because she is now milking about 60 pounds per day.

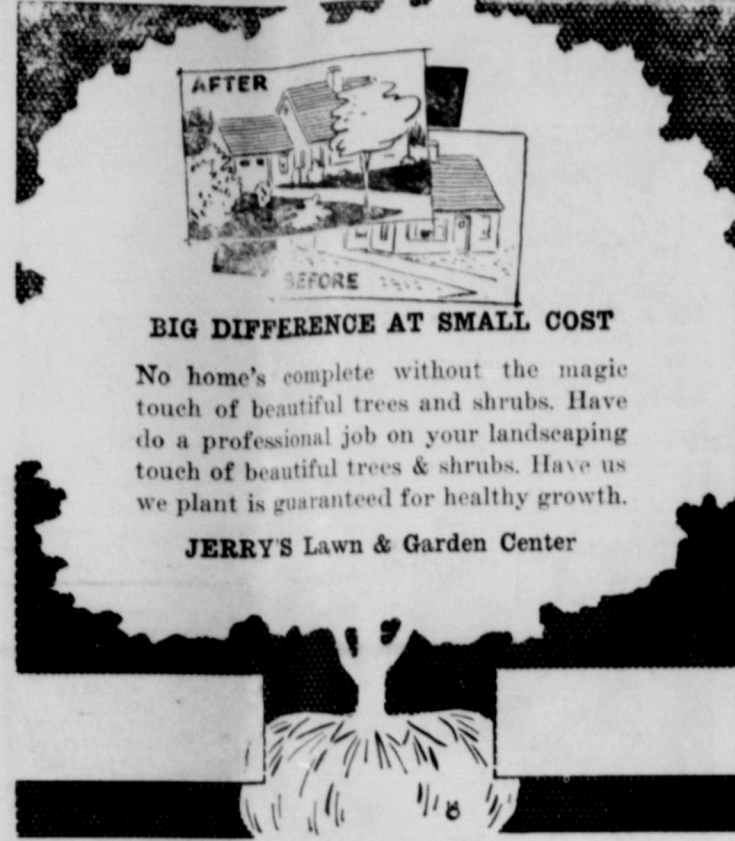

Results Of 1959 Corn Tests Available Farm and Ranch

COLLEGE STATION — Texas 30, Harper 3 and Texas 28 produced average yields of about 70 bushels per acre to lead all hybrids in the 1959 Texas corn per-

formance tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

These hybrids showed a wide range of adaption by ranking as or near the top in each of the individuals tests.

The highest yielding white hybrid was Texas 17W. Among the yellow hybrids, Texas 34 and 30 were more resistant to insects and diseases and are therefore, recommended particularly for areas where insects and diseases cause serious damage to corn.

In the tests corn was planted at 20 locations under dryland and 2 locations under irrigation. Four of the dryland tests were lost because of unfavorable weather conditions.

Growers should consider the performance of the hybrids at the nearest test location, and also the average yield for their area. Recommendations for the various areas are based on previous years results as well as those during 1959.

Progress Report 2117 contains a complete summary of the tests and is available free of charge from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas. The report contains charts showing the performance of the varieties tested at various locations and gives recommendations for each

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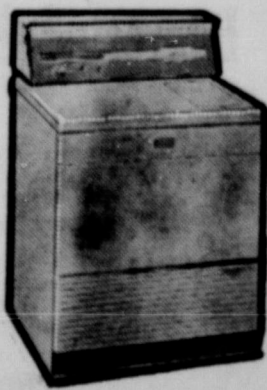

Potatoes Added To Vegetable Research At High Plains Sta.

Potatoes will be added to the 1960 vegetable research program at the High Plains Research Foundation. This experiment to find varieties better suited for chip production will be conducted in cooperation with Allen Bros., Halfway, and the International Potato Chip Institute of Cleveland, Ohio, Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director of the Foundation, announced today.

Mr. Henry Allen of Allen Bros. stated in making the research request on behalf of Allen Bros. and the Institute that "there is a great need for a potato that meets the specific gravity and other quality requirements of the potato chip industry."

The Foundation is conducting this testing program as a part of its search for crops which will add to the area income and permit greater diversification of farm crops and in developing industry.

Eight varieties of potatoes will be included in the testing program. One-half acre will be assigned to each of the varieties. The Foundation will conduct the tests and the quality analysis will be made by the Potato Chip

Two Million Vehicles To Be Inspected Before Deadline

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr. director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that more than two-million motor vehicles remain to be inspected before the April 15 deadline. He urged all Texas motorists to obtain their new inspection stickers at an early date.

Garrison reported that more than 4,300,000 will be inspected in Texas this year. To date only about half that number have gone through inspection lines at some 4,400 inspection stations located throughout the state.

The DPS Director pointed out that inspection stations cannot inspect vehicles during wet, rainy weather, a condition normally prevailing during late winter and

early spring. To make sure every vehicle owner is able to obtain his 1960 inspection sticker in time, Garrison suggested that plans be made now to visit an inspection station, before inspection lines grow long.

Each land occupier would be required to comply with the control measures prescribed by the Board of Directors and would have to enter upon the land and determine if the control measures prescribed by the Board were carried out.

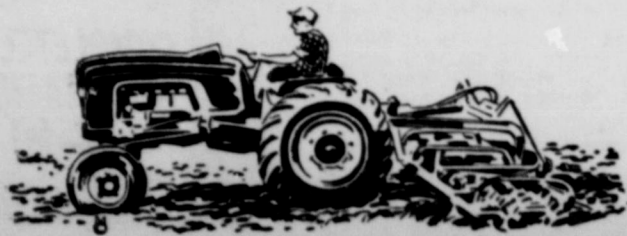

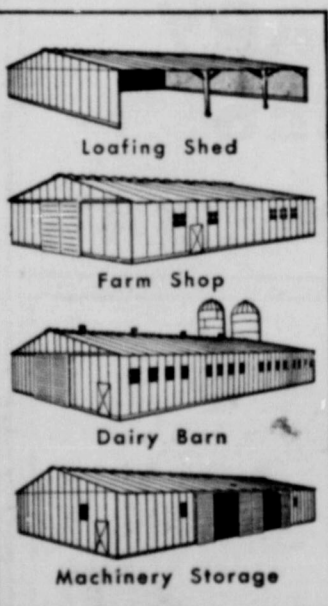

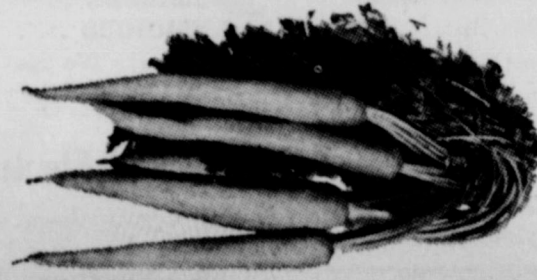
