

#### Industry Graduates More Than 2,500 **Defensive Drivers**

Business firms ranging from stove makers to auto assembling plants have turned more than 2,500 employees into defensive drivers in 1966 and '67.

These drivers number among nearly 800,000 persons who have completed the National Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course (DDC) since it began in 1964. The Council expects to have trained 1,000,000 motorists by its October 1968 convention.

"We are nearing our goal of training 1,000,000 drivers every year," says Chris Imhoff, Director of the Council's Driver Improvement Program. 'But we can only hit the mark with the help of industry." Already the Council has half the teaching force needed to reach its target

#### Local Opportunity

According to Imhoff, Defensive Driving is "a people's movement" in which volunteers, trained by the Council, help organize and teach the classes. "Every citizen has the chance to fight traffic accidents." says Imhoff, "by setting up driver improvement courses in his own community group, church, company or similar organization." Students must be licensed motorists who can give eight hours of time to the course.

Using films and visual aids from the Council, teachers outline the six situations that can cause a two-car crash. These collisions account for 42 per cent of all traffic fatalities, 67 per cent of all disabling incauses 79 per cent of the total motor-vehicle accident costs and involves 88 per cent of the drivers who are in accidents.

#### **New Methods**

DDC tries to combat this waste by teaching new driving methods that are based on the scientific analysis of thousands of accidents. "We can show the driver patterns of safe mooring behavior that he alone couldn't possibly discover in a lifetime," says Imhoff. "Once he recognizes these situations and learns to handle them, he'll be a better driver the rest of his life.



#### An Irish Stew Is Different

A classic beef stew is made by first browning the meat. For an Irish stew (sometimes called a white stew) the meat is cooked without browning. In this particular recipe for Irish stew, tomatoes are added.

- 1 pound lamb (1-1/2-inch cubes)
- 1 pound beef (11/2-inch cubes)
- 1 (1-pound) can tomato
- 2 cups stock 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 teaspoon pepper
- 6 to 8 white onions, whole 6 to 8 potatoes, pared and quartered
- 3 to 4 carrots, pared and thickly sliced
- 2 stalks celery, sliced
- 2 tablespoons corn starch 1/4 cup cold water

Mix meat, tomatoes, stock (canned bouillon or bouillon cu and water may be used), salt and pepper in large kettle. Cover and simmer until meat is almost tender, about 45 minutes. Add vegetables. Simmer until meat and vegetables are about fork tender, 45 minutes. Reduce heat to slow simmer. Blend corn starch and water. Gradually add to stew, stirring carefully so vegetables are not crushed. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens and comes to boil. Season to taste, if needed. Simmer a few minutes to blend flavors. Makes
