



#### Got Troubles? — Albany Ready For Fandangle

ALBANY -- The city of Albany in Shackelford County is getting ready for its annual presentation of "Fandangle," a historical musical depicting the early pioneer history of Albany and nearby Fort Griffin, now a state park.

The show is scheduled for June 17-19 and June 24-26. Fandangle is an outdoor spectacle held in its own prairie theater, carved from a hillside one mile west of Albany. It is written, directed, lighted, costumed, sung and danced by Albany residents.

The show was started in 1938 by a group of high school senfors wishing to raise money and has grown to be one of the nation's most ambitious and successful community projects, entertaining more than 10,000 persons annually.

"Fandangle" was awarded the Texas Historical Association's Coral H. Tullis Memorial Prize for "Outstanding contribution to Texas History."

#### **Fuel Cell Experiment** Seeks Use in Homes

An experimental home in Farmington, Conn. has been equipped with home appliances powered by a natural gas fuel cell. It uses concepts learned in manned space flight.

The Pratt and Whitney Aircraft Division of United Aircraft Corporation and the Institute for Gas Technology produced the fuel cell, which is about the size of a home air conditioner. It combines methane with air to produce electricity. The program is being sponsored nationally by 32 utility companies at a cost of \$50 million.

If successful, the program is expected to cut energy costs and pollution substantially.





## Jerky, A New Snack Food

A food American Indiansused long before this country was settled, and that ploneers and prospectors carried with them along western trails, is mak-Ing a comebace as a snack

"Charqui," as early Andean people called it, Istoday called "jerky" and is becoming more and more popular, reports Sally Springer, Extension foods and nutrition specialist at Texas A & MUniversity.

Jerky, sold in food stores and by mail order, is thinly-sliced lean beef that has been spiced and air dried, oven dried or smoked. In pioneer days it took 2 to 3 months to naturally cure the mest. But jerky can now be made with-In 24 hours with advanced processing techniques.

U. S. Department of Agriculture's inspection standards of sanitation and processing are applied to jerky, as for all meat products that are shipped interstate. USDA in-

spectors also closely examine labeling of jerky and check for the appropriate moisture-protein ration, which allows the product to be stored without refrigeration.

Because jerky doesn't require refrigeration, it is a convenient "take along" snack or between-meal treat that is both tasty and nutritious. The meat supplies high quality protein that is needed for building and repairing tissues.

#### mum set by the committee for Spiders Enjoy Camping Trips

San Angelo -- The wise camper will treat spiders with healthy respect, says the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. On camping trips the corner of a tent or bedding is likely habitat for the black widow, a spider with the ability to deliver lethal venom.

Look inside boots and shoes, shake out sleeping bags or bedcolls and be very careful wherever the glossy black spider with the red hour-glass marking may be found. While black widow spiders are not common, they are found over a wide area, and their venom has accounted for a mortality rate

Normally a healthy adult is in no danger of death, but the bite is serious and deserves immediate pahyician's care. There may be cramps, some pain, partial paralysis and some secondary disturbance of speech or respiration after a bite.

The department says children especially should be warned about the spider, and never should an attempt be made to capture a black widow.

In clothing or bedding, a balck widow may bite before the victim is aware of its presence.

#### Pickerel Land In State Book White Bass Incubation Underway

SAN ANGELO -- The second phase of a project to artificially hatch white bass is underway at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Fish Hatchery in San Angelo.

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Superintendent Wallace Clary said only 75 of 40,000 fertilized eggs in the first phase of the experiment grew into fry. A much higher yield is expected this time, he said, because of knowledge gained in the first phase.

The white bass is a prolific species, but so far biologists have not been able to find the right combination to effectively deplicate the natural spawning process.

In the wild, white bass don't build nests for their eggs. Rather, they locate a clean, rocky or sandy area on the bottom of a flowing stream and scatter the eggs in a helter-skelter manner. There always is a high egg mortality, but since each female white bass can produce up to 500,000 eggs spring there usually are survi-

Heretofore, white bass stocking has involved only mature

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
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
