Dr. W. C. McKenzie New Head Of Music Department at Wayland

Dr. Wallace Chesley McKenzie Jr., New Orleans, becomes head of the department of music and art at Wayland Baptist College in September, according to an announcement from President Roy C. McClung.

Dr. McKenzie, who will have the rank of associate professor of music, came from New Orleans Baptist Seminary where he has taught music theory composition and musicology since 1955. During the summer of 1949 he taught music at Louisiana College.

A native of Louisiana, Dr. McKenzie was graduated from Louisiana College with a B. A. degree and then earned the M. A. degree from State University of Iowa in 1950. He has also studied at Louisiana State University and earned the Ph. D. degree from North Texas State University in 1960.

For the M. A. degree requirements Dr. McKenzie composed "Cantata No. 1" for baritone, small chorus and orchestra. His Ph. D. dissertation subject was "The Music of Anton Webern," which led to membership in the International Webern Society.

Among his writings and compositions are two anthems for mixed chorus and organ; "The Church: One Foundation" which was published in 1957 by the Broadman Press, and "We Would See Jesus," published by Broadman Press in 1958. The University of Washington Press, Seattle, in 1964 has published his "Webern's Technique of Choral Composition," a homage to Anton Webern.

In addition to his teaching, he has been director of St. Charles Avenue Baptist Church, New Orleans, since 1961, and prior to that of Carrollton Presbyterian Church, New Orleans, 1956-58, the First Christian Church, McKinney, Texas, 1954-55.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT**

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

An Extremely Dangerous Biology Textbook Is Coming

There is a new Biology textbook up for adoption by the State Education Agency that is so filled with the theory of evolution that it comes in three different versions. The book is the most vicious attack on the Christian religion that is possible. Christian people are facing the toughest fight to retain faith that they have faced in this country since the days of George Washington.

The textbook comes in three versions and a teacher can take her (or his) choice. The Green version, entitled HIGH SCHOOL BIOLOGY is the least offensive of the three. Yet, it is simply a textbook on the theory of evolution. Over 14% of the entire text is strictly evolution. Most of the rest of the text is ground work for this atheistic 14%.

The Yellow Version is entitled BIOLOGY: SCIENCE AN INQUIRY INTO LIFE. It is a bold and aggressive pressuring of students. Every chapter in the book teaches evolution.

The Blue Version is called BIOLOGICAL SCIENCE: MOLECULES TO MAN. It is pure evolution from cover to cover; completely materialistic and completely atheistic. Unless something is done quickly those are the texts your children will be studying in Biology next fall.

Because of law concerning the teaching of religion in the schools every biology teacher who attempts to teach these texts without agreeing with them completely will be a great disadvantage. The statement was made in a workshop held at Texas University earlier this year that any biology teacher who did not believe, and who was not willing to teach evolution was "intellectually deficient and educationally inferior." A university professor, who is old by reliable authority, told a freshman class of several hundred, "If you have come here with any faith in the Bible and in God, you had just as well junk it now, for I am going to take it away from you." These are the kind of men who prepared this book for your children.

This is not the end of the project. It was determined from the beginning to provide a biological program from primary school through university level. Note the following quotation

from BSCS Newsletter No 1 p. 1 "It should be emphasized at the outset that the BSCS is concerned with biological education at all levels: elementary, secondary, collegiate, professional, and graduate. It is also interested in biological education outside the formal classroom situation: books, magazines, botanical gardens, television and motion pictures. To provide focus, however, the BSCS is first turning its attention to the secondary school level which it regards, as do many others, the pivotal level in America today."

Bruce Stewart in his article, "On Teaching Evolution" (The American Biology Teacher, April 1962, p. 273) has this to say:

"A good theory in science is one which tells us what to do with the maximum hope of success. In other words, SCIENCE IS ACTION, AND ACTION DEMANDS TAKING SOME RISK. THESE AS IF IT WERE TRUE even though we know it can never be more than an approximation of reality. Since the final test is operational the critic of evolution must have something workable to replace it."

It is certainly a black mark on the people of this great nation when the law tells us we have to learn about atheism in our schools but that we CANNOT learn about God. I would advocate that we should quit being hypocritical and either trust in God or completely forsake Him. On our coins are printed the inscription, "In God We Trust", but I am afraid this is becoming a great farce.

We are not afraid that atheism will destroy all faith. Faith has outlived many atheists before and will this time with faith shackled in the classroom and materialism and atheism running wild we have a hard fight on our hands. But then I am sure no one wants an easy one.

We would encourage everyone concerned with the education of our children to write in protest to Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education, Texas Education Agency, Capitol Station, Austin 11, Texas, and also the same message to the Textbook Committee, Texas Education Agency, Capitol Station, Austin 11, Texas.

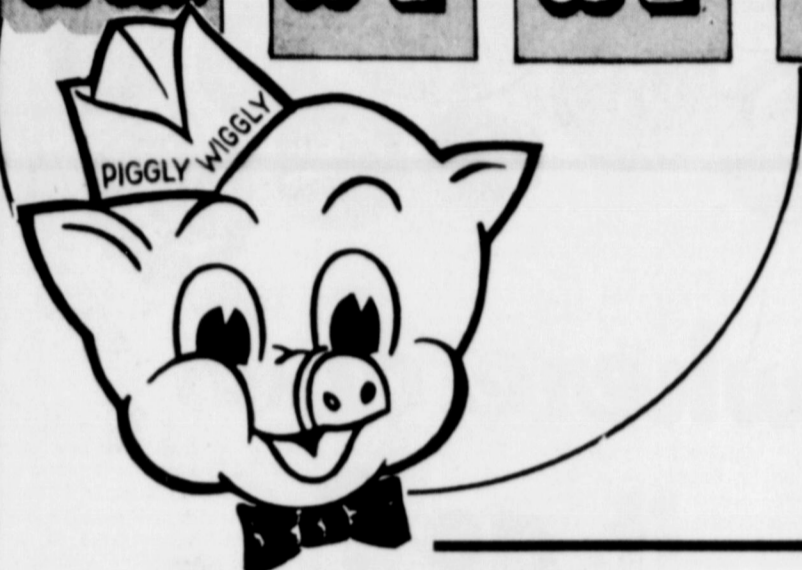

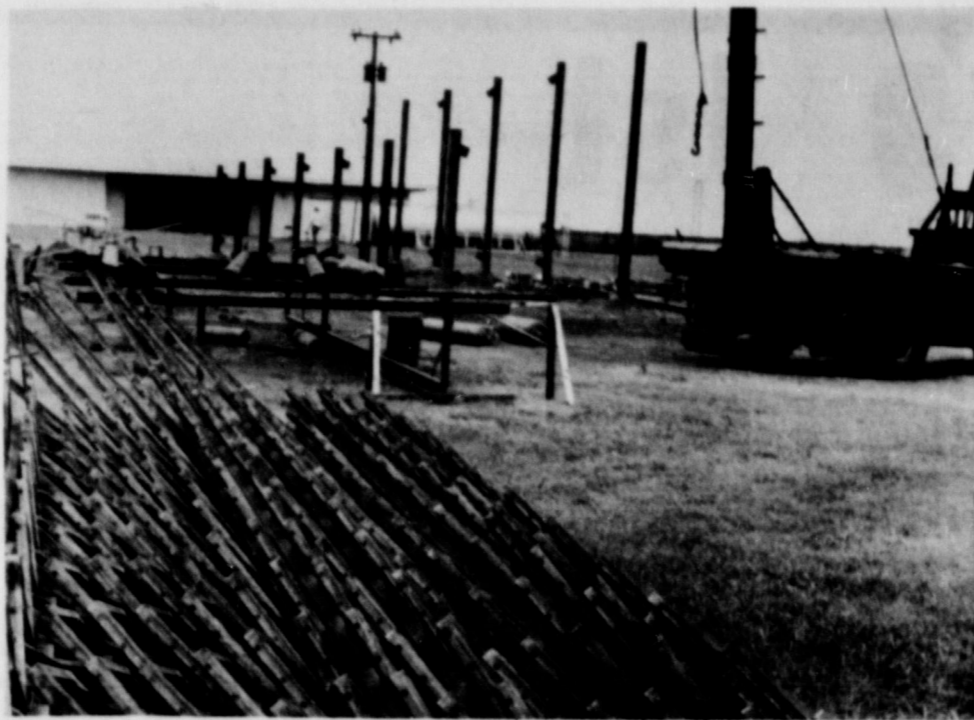

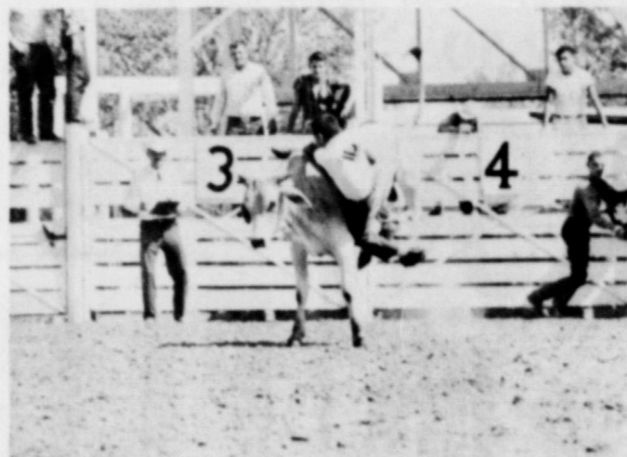
Annual Boys' Ranch Rodeo, September 6-7

Proceeds from the rodeo will be used for the expansion of the Ranch.

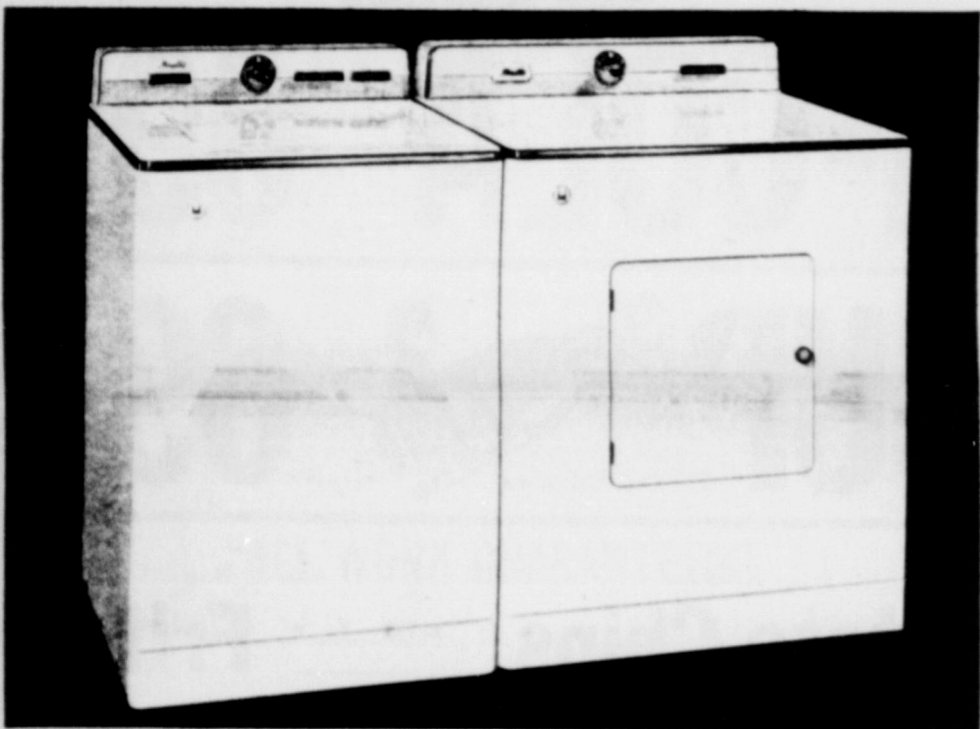

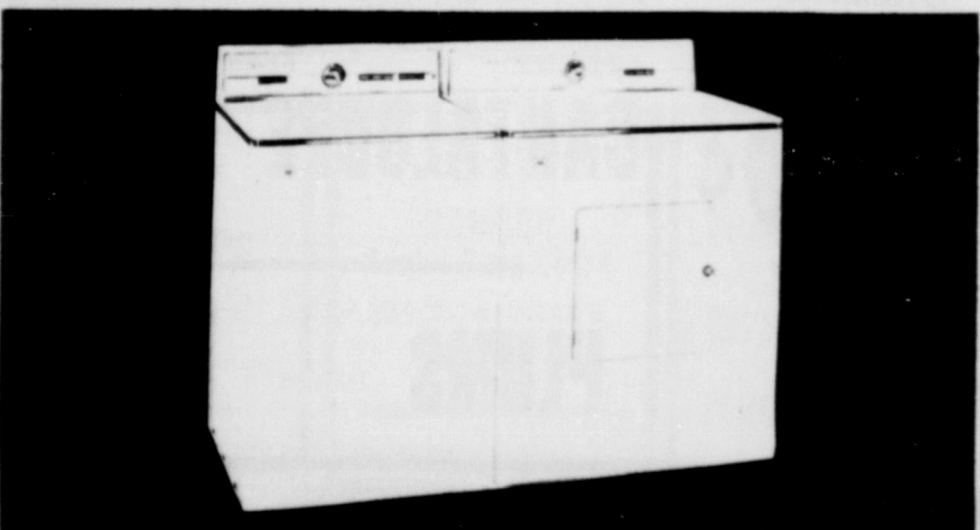
