# County 4-H'ers Qualify For State Roundup

# Registered Nurses Speak To Senior Citizens Chapter Troop 309 Prepares For Rio Blanco

The Good-Earth Chapter of Senior Citizens met Wednesday, May 5, in the Community Building for their regular monthly luncheon. After the group visited and

ate a delicious covered dish meal, a very informative program was presented. Mrs. Marie Milliken, R.N., and Mrs. Mary Williams, R.N., of the West Texas Home Health

Agency in Lubbock, spoke to the group on the benefits which are available to anyone over 65 years of age through the agency. These include Home Nursing Services (bed baths,

enemas, surgical dressings, injections, etc.) available upon orders of an attending physician. Mrs. Milliken stated that visits were usually made 1-5 times weekly, depending on the doctor's orders.

Other services available are physical therapy, speech therapy, equipment (hospital beds, wheelchairs, walkers, crutches, whirlpool baths, oxygen, etc.) No drugs or medicines are supplied. The family or patients purchase these. It was brought to the attention of the group by Mrs. Williams that these services helped the aged to be able to stay in their own homes much longer than was otherwise possible. Usually, there was no other alternative than send the patient to homes for the aged to get the proper care, before the services of the Agency were brought to the attention of the family. Medicare and Medic-Aid pay 100% of the cost if the patient is registered with the Agency within two weeks of his discharge from the hospital. If there are persons who have not been hospitalized, but need the services of the Agency, 80% will be paid by Medicare and Medic-Aid. The other 20% will be taken care of if the patient is on Old Age Benefit.

Mrs. Williams showed some very interesting slides of patients in their care and of volunteers delivering the nutritionally-balanced meals to subscribers on their Meals on Wheels route. The meals are taken to patients who live alone or with someone else who cannot prepare one nutritionally-balanced meal a day. The noon meal is delivered Monday through Friday to 82 patients who may or may not be receiving medical attention through the services of the Home Health Agency. These meals consist of one meat, two vegetables, roll or cornbread, dessert and milk or tea. The meals are prepared and packaged individually according to the type diet prescribed (bland, diabetic, low salt, diabetic) and are placed in thermal bags to be delivered by the 16 volunteers in one hour. Once a week the subscribers are taken three fresh carnations which are donated by the college students who sell the flowers on the streets of Lubbock. Mrs. Milliken told the group that not only were the meals and flowers a great joy to the patients, but most important was the social contact that many would not have otherwise.

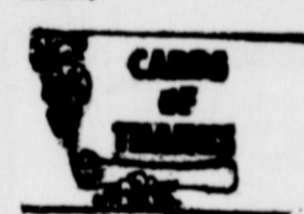

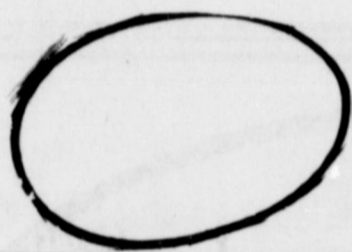

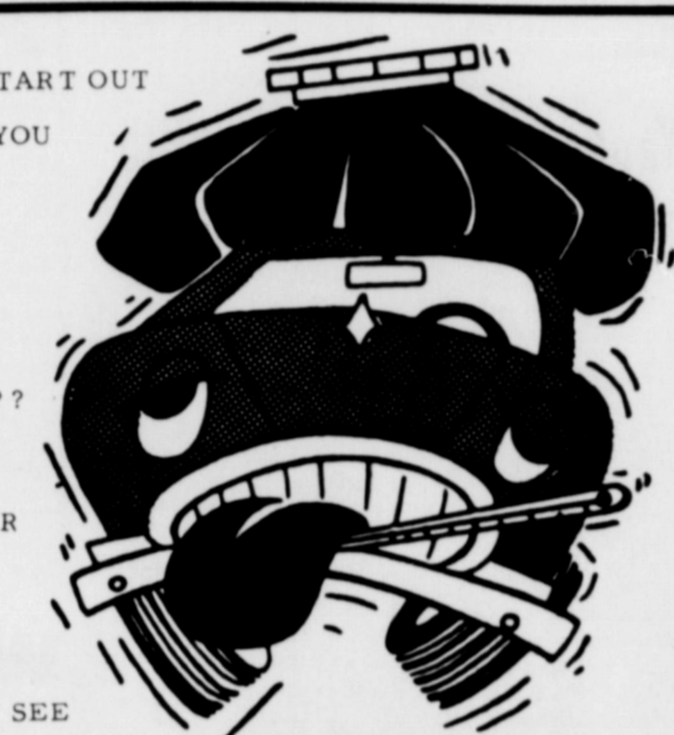
