Water Company Must Remove Its New House

The local water company will have to remove its "not-what-it-seems" house on the north outskirts of Memphis.

So said Mayor J. A. Whaley last night when the City Council was presented with a petition signed by H. H. Roberts, Frances Anthony and E. P. Thompson, asking its removal.

The petition asked the removal of "the small structure they have recently placed in the intersection of the public road along the north line of the city limits, with 16th Street."

It alleged the "structure is in a public dedicated street and public thoroughfare of the city of Memphis and is therefore an illegal encroachment which cannot be authorized by the City Council or any of its officers; the structure is unsightly to the citizens of the vicinity and is an unjust imposition upon the property owners in that vicinity."

The disputed structure is a "regulator house."

School Board in All-Day Session

The Hall County School Board met in an all-day session here yesterday. The meeting started yesterday morning and lasted until late last night.

School bus routes and the final classification of rural schools were the main problems before the board.

A weary reporter, after waiting all-day for the meeting to end, called it a day and postponed until this morning an interview with President H. W. Kuhn and County Superintendent Vera Gilreath, only to find that both had left town for the day and could not be reached.

SCHOOL BUS TO TAKE GROUP TO CANYON

Trustees, Teachers, Patrons To Attend School Session

A local school bus will take Hall County school trustees, teachers and patrons to attend a school meeting at Canyon tomorrow.

The school's official conference is for the purpose of discussing the new school laws. All interested persons are invited to attend.

Miss Vera Gilreath, superintendent of county schools, said that she is planning for a bus to leave Estelline and bring trustees, teachers and patrons from Newlin, Salisbury and Memphis. Leaving Memphis at 6 o'clock, the bus will go to Canyon via El, Lakeview, Leslie and Brice. En route the bus will pick up school officials and interested parties at these points.

The bus will leave Memphis at 6 o'clock and will arrive at the following place on approximately this time schedule: El 6:15; Lakeview 6:25; Leslie 6:40; Brice 7:00, and continue from there to Canyon.

The program at Canyon will have, in part, the following principal speakers: Dr. J. A. Hill, president, West Texas State Teachers College; Dr. L. A. Woods, state superintendent of public instruction; C. M. Ewell, State Department of Education; and S. O. Murdock, State Department of Education.

The principal topics that will be discussed are the classification of schools, standardization of schools, new school laws, transportation and high school tuition.

Rhode Islanders Oppose New Deal

PROVIDENCE, Aug. 7.—Rhode Island's first congressional district today turned its back on the New Deal by electing a Republican to the national House of Representatives.

Complete returns of all voting districts gave Charles F. Rish, who campaigned to "repudiate" the administration's acts, had a 12,969 majority over Antonio Prince, Democrat.

In the last regular election, the Democrats won the district by a 21,000 plurality. The district embraces the bulk of the state's cotton mills.

Garment Strikers Destroy Clothing

DALLAS, Aug. 7.—Striking women garment workers in a riot here today stripped four women naked and injured two others.

Forty policemen were called to the scene and arrested 27 women and three men. The women fought, tearing a coat off Patrolman George Cox and scratching him badly. The windshields of two police automobiles were broken in the melee.

The strike began six months ago, women workers walking out of 13 dress manufacturing plants demanding higher wages, shorter hours and union recognition.

HURLEY ADMITS \$100,000 GAS SYSTEM FEE

Says He Represented Stockholders; Denies Lobby

WASHINGTON, Aug. 7.—In a hearing punctuated by frequent clashes, Patrick P. Hurley, Hoover secretary of war, testified before the Senate Lobby Committee today that his law firm received \$100,000 during the last three years from the Associated Gas and Electric System.

Explaining that he represented the shareholders, Hurley asserted, "I've never taken a case from anyone that was incompatible with the public welfare."

Hurley denied he ever lobbied, but he frequently accused committeemen of "putting words in my mouth."

Joseph P. Tammity, secretary to President Wilson, now an attorney here, said he was employed by a number of utility companies for advice in connection with the Wheeler Rayburn bill, receiving a total of \$3,500.

Fire Does Slight Damage Yesterday

The local fire department responded to a call to quell the minor blaze. The fire, which started from a rubbish heap alongside the garage, was extinguished before it had gained much headway.

David C. Moore, father of Zeb Moore of Memphis, died this morning at 8:30 o'clock in a Pampa hospital. It was learned here, Mr. Moore was a resident of Pampa.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Pampa Methodist Church. Mr. Moore had been ill for some time.

Grader Added to Erosion 'Tools'

Preparing for soil erosion work to be done here by members of the Government CCC camp, the soil conservation division yesterday afternoon received a new grader to be added to its list of implements.

The grader is a model 125 Adams power control machine. It was unloaded this morning and moved to the camp site.

Old Settlers To Bring Back 'Good Old Days' Here Friday

Those were the good old days—That will be the general topic for discussion Friday when several hundred Hall County pioneers—the lads and lassies who have lived in the county 25 years or longer—gather at Carnegie Library Park Friday morning for the Hall County Old Settlers Reunion.

It will be an old story in a modern setting—but the trimmings will be of the old west when Hall County was a vast cattle range and cotton hadn't even progressed as far as Huey Long.

Square Dance
Flivvers, Chevys and automobiles will convey the visitors into the city in place of the covered wagon. But the western spirit will be placed to the tune of "The Old Gray Mare."

Even the Continental and Carrioca will give way to the old fashioned square dance.

For this is to be a celebration the old timers, not the moderns. The "old heads" will be the ones staying up late at night.

That's a "figure of speech." Everyone is really invited to take part in some of the events—the noon picnic and the downtown, open-air square dance.

The old timers' reunion gets underway at 9 o'clock with registration at Carnegie Park. Band concerts, talks, discussions and story-telling will be the order of the morning.

At noon a picnic lunch will be spread. A ticket to the lunch for the entire family is a well filled basket of food.

The Memphis City Council last night approved the city budget for 1935-36 at \$27,896.70.

This figure represented a reduction in city expenses of \$3,018 under the cost of city government for 1934-35.

The Board of Equalization appointed by the City Council already had lowered real property values 10 per cent for the coming year.

Despite the lowering of the assessed valuations, however, Tax Assessor W. V. Coursey told the council the tax rate would be no higher and possibly a little under the previous year's 98 cent rate.

Major Expenditures

The major expenditures for the next year included the following: Street department, \$2,650. Police department, \$3,090. Fire department, \$4,202.20. Health and sanitary department, \$1,885.

Carnegie Library, \$995. Park appropriation, \$50. Street lighting, \$1,110. Fire hydrant rental, \$1,275. Interest and sinking funds, \$9,169.50.

Expense on city hall, \$200. And miscellaneous expenses, \$2,000.

The council, in regular session, authorized Mayor J. A. Whaley to pay cash for equipment necessary to the construction of a canteen pool for the CCC camp at the fair grounds. This was done. It was pointed out, in order to receive cash discounts on all purchases.

Councilmen also discussed at length possible city projects under the WPA. Secretary D. L. C. Knard reported on a visit to the district WPA office at Lubbock, during which he studied the working plans of the works administration.

It seemed to be the general consensus of opinion among the city fathers that Memphis should take advantage of WPA grants to make necessary improvements on city property or for "must construction."

The building of a sewerage disposal plant was discussed as a "must" project. However, no official action was taken last night toward application for PWA grants.

Otherwise, the councilmen apparently were of the opinion that the city should not go deeply into debt on expensive projects merely for the purpose of obtaining PWA grants.
