REVIEW OF RAIL LINES FA-**VORS MEMPHIS**

Summary of Railway Situation In West Texas Gives Memphis Route Preference.

Under a heading of the railway ituation in West Texas, an article, written by Curtis A. Keen of Lubbock, appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Monday of this week, in which the proposed Memphis-Lubbock Short Line Railway was given the preference of the many routes under consideration in this section of the state. 


