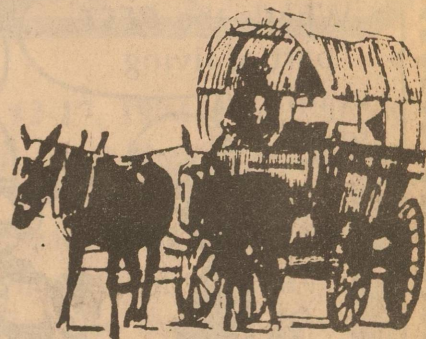

New York, New York

North Korean diplomats notified United Nations officials this week that their nation is dropping out of the International Atomic Energy Agency. The move was in response to American efforts within the United Nations to impose economic sanctions on the Asian country.

Clinton administration officials this week were lobbying United Nations Security Council member nations asking them not to block the proposed sanctions.

Los Angeles, California

NFL Hall of Fame running back and TV personality O.J. Simpson was questioned by police Monday in connection with the murders of his ex-wife, Nichole and a male friend. Simpson, who pleaded "No Contest" to charges of spousal abuse when the couple were married, claimed his innocence but otherwise refused comment. L.A. Police sources state that Simpson is a suspect in the homicides at this time.

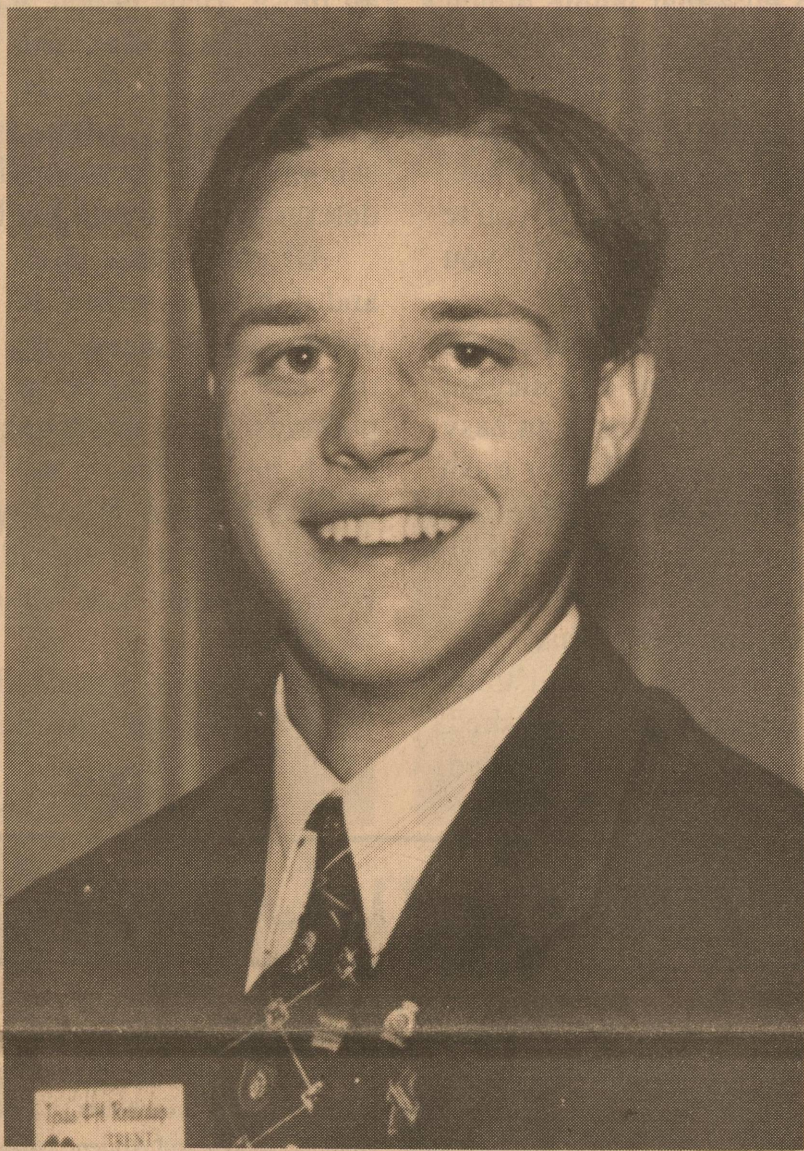
Washington, D.C.

Attorney General Janet Reno announced Tuesday that in considering future requests for political asylum, her office would accept homosexuality as a legitimate excuse for allowing an otherwise unacceptable immigrant into the country. "If an applicant can display satisfactorily that their sexual orientation has resulted or could possibly result in political persecution, that is an acceptable request for admittance and we will allow it." Administration critics called the move "just more evidence of a pro-gay agenda within the Clinton administration."

Washington, D.C.

President Clinton unveiled his long awaited welfare reform package this week. Saying that American must come to grips with an ever burgeoning welfare system, Clinton asked legislators for prompt action on his proposed package. Congressional leaders, however, pointed out that all committees were already busy with the President's health care package and held out little hope for the welfare reform measure being considered in this legislative session.

Local Republicans Attend GOP Convention

Schleicher County Republicans attended the State Republican Convention in Fort Worth at the Tarrant County Convention Center this past weekend. The delegation led by Republican County Chairwoman Barbara Behrens participated in the selection of new state party officers and the adoption of the party's state platform.

Tom Pauken, a Dallas attorney was chosen to succeed outgoing State Chairman Fred Meyers. Pauken a long-time party activist, received overwhelming support during the Senatorial District

Caucuses. Pauken's two rivals for the post, U.S. Representative Joe Barton and Dolly Madison McKenna withdrew from the race well before the floor vote.

Barbara Behrens commented about the convention, "I've been to the last three conventions and this one was by far the smoothest. There was the usual wrangling over party officers positions and a couple of contested points in the party rules and platform but nothing like previous conventions." When asked about all the press coverage of a conservative take-over within the party,

Trent Manning was awarded a \$10,000, four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo 4-H scholarship in special ceremonies held at the Texas 4-H Roundup in College Station on June 7th.

Trent, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Griffin, recently graduated from Eldorado High School and was a member of 4-H for 12 years. Trent was actively involved in the food and nutrition program and recently earned best of show honors at the county food show. He also served on the state 4-H council and received the Gold Star award.

Trent, who plans to major in agricultural education at Texas Tech University, was one of 50 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo scholarship winners hon-

ored.

Members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service chose the 4-H scholarship recipients. The selected students all demonstrated academic excellence and strong leadership skills throughout their high school careers.

All 4-H scholarship recipients must pursue a degree in agriculture or life sciences at a Texas college or university.

"The Texas 4-H produces excellent individuals, outstanding citizens and contributing members of society -- the same type of people that make up the membership of our organization," said Don Jordan, president of the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. "And we both strongly believe we can benefit youth and

support education across the state." Jordan also noted that since its scholarship program began in 1957, the show has provided scholarships to more than 950 4-H members, representing a commitment exceeding \$7.2 million.

The 50 scholarships were funded through net proceeds from the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo and are only a part of the show's annual educational commitment. The 4-H scholarships, combined with another 168 \$10,000 awards, 30 \$5,000 awards, 30 \$2,500 awards and 100 \$1,650 awards, as well as various other contributions to Texas colleges and universities, bring the show's 1994-95 educational commitment to more than \$3.5 million.

New Methodist Minister Arrives

Rev. George E. Lumpkin, Jr. became the new pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Eldorado on June 9, 1994. Rev. Lumpkin comes to Eldorado from Shiner, Texas where he served the United Methodist Church for five years.

A native of Marlin, Texas, Rev. Lumpkin graduated from Texas A & M University with a BBA in marketing. He worked as a salesman and marketing director in the computer industry for five years before entering the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. In 1989 he graduated with a Master of Divinity degree.

Rev. Lumpkin was ordained a Deacon in the Southwest Texas Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church in 1988, and ordained an Elder in 1991. In 1992 he was nominated by his congregation as "Outstanding Rural Minister of the Year."



Rev. Lumpkin's wife, Brenda, also a native of Marlin, Texas, is a graduate of The University of Texas and is a registered pharmacist. The Lumpkins have two children, Angela, age 6 and Daniel, age 3.

Commenting on the prospects of living in a small town Rev.

Lumpkin noted, "We both grew up in small towns and spent the past five years in one. We are looking forward to getting to know the people of Eldorado." Rev. Lumpkin invited everyone to come and visit First United Methodist Church.

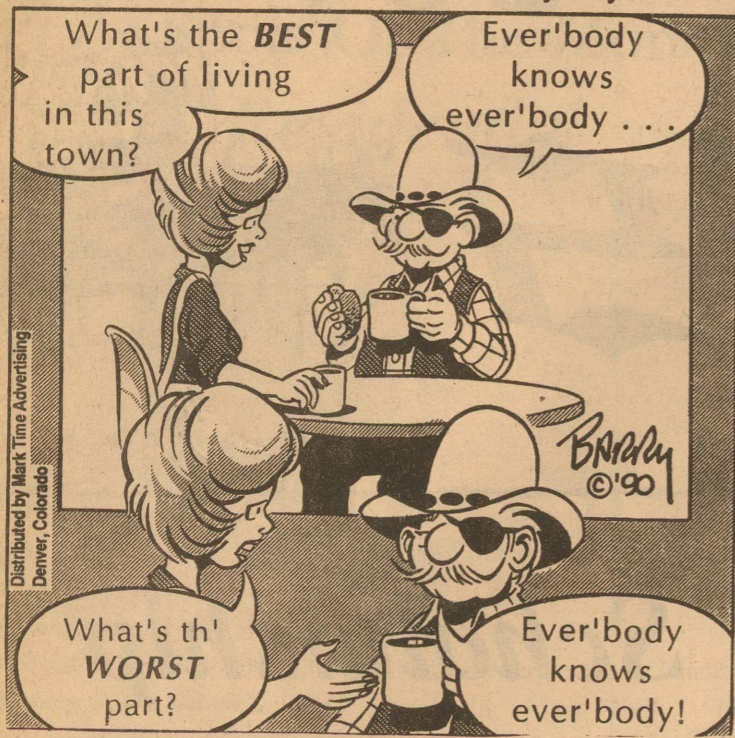

Capitol Comments

Recently, I watched a television show entitled "Are We Scaring Ourselves To Death?" on ABC. Not only was the show well done, but it discussed a reality that is hitting us all in the pocketbook. Now I will say that we must all show respect for our environment so our children and their children will have a safe and healthy world to live in. But an over-reaction to problems and potential problems stands a good chance of leaving them healthily unemployed. The current idea seems to be to create a 100 percent safe and pure environment. Even if we had the scientific technology to do this, which to my knowledge we don't it would not be financially feasible. We must look at the costs of regulations, not just the benefits to see what the real cost to our communities will be. Keeping that in mind, we shouldn't engage in any regulatory enterprise that costs billions of dollars to business and industry without more than a minimal effect on environmental quality. An

example of this is occurring in the area of auto emission standards, with the new federal standards being such that they are pricing car manufacturers out of business as well as us consumers out of transportation.

It is becoming increasingly apparent to me that hyper-reactionary public policy formulated to address perceived health and environmental "boogie men" is getting to be too costly to continue to enjoy. We are slowly but surely increasing the costs to communities and businesses to the extent that we are close to pricing ourselves out of business. I'm not talking about legitimate, common-sense regulations that we have to have for public safety, mind you. I'm talking about the Federal Safe Drinking Water Act (which is up for renewal right now) and the Endangered Species Act two laws that have definitely taken things too far.

Every major project that we now attempt to undertake in this country requires an environmental impact study

(EIS). Roads, new office buildings and factories that will provide jobs for Americans all require these surveys. Perhaps it would help put things into perspective if economic impact studies accompanied the EIS. This way when corrective environmental actions are proposed we can examine the proposed benefits of those actions and weigh them against their corresponding economic costs. What good is a "clean air" environment for our children if we have eliminated the possibilities of them finding a livelihood to support themselves. I seriously believe that all environmental impact studies should be accompanied by economic impact studies so we can judge for ourselves what's in our own best interests.

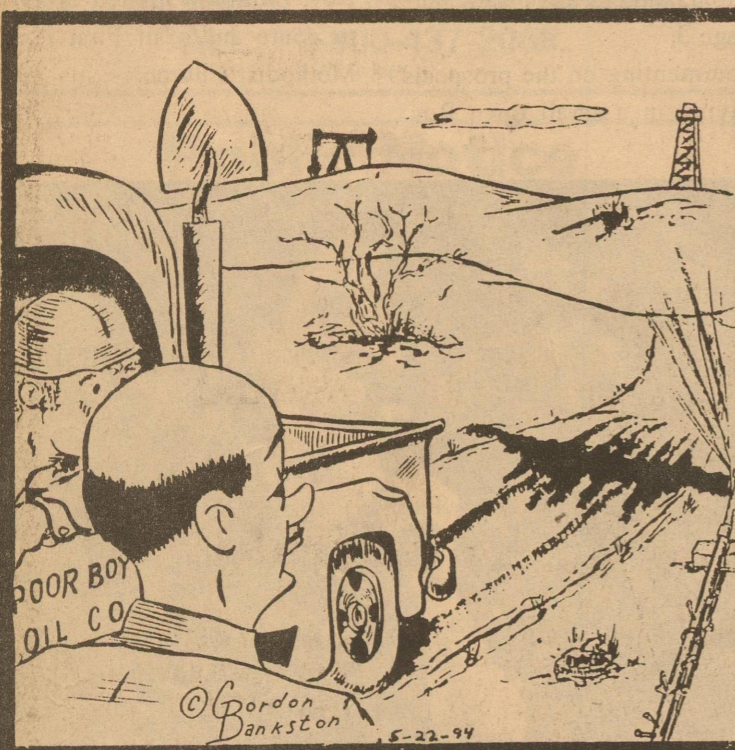
These issues are important to all of us and we should each contact our elected officials to voice our concerns and views on these issues. There are many federal programs (i.e. Clean Air Act, Endangered Species Act, Safe Drinking Water Act, National Biological Survey) that

must be modified or eliminated if we are to continue to prosper as a Nation. How long has it been since you contacted your elected state or federal official? It is a known fact that most folks don't express their opinions anywhere but at home or out somewhere drinking coffee, where the benefits can be questionable at best. The time has come for us all to become involved in what is being done "for" us before it becomes what they are doing "to" us. For a start you might consider contacting the Program Director at ABC Television (77 West 66th, New York, N.Y. 10023-6298) to thank them for their factual TV special that put environmental issues in their proper perspective.

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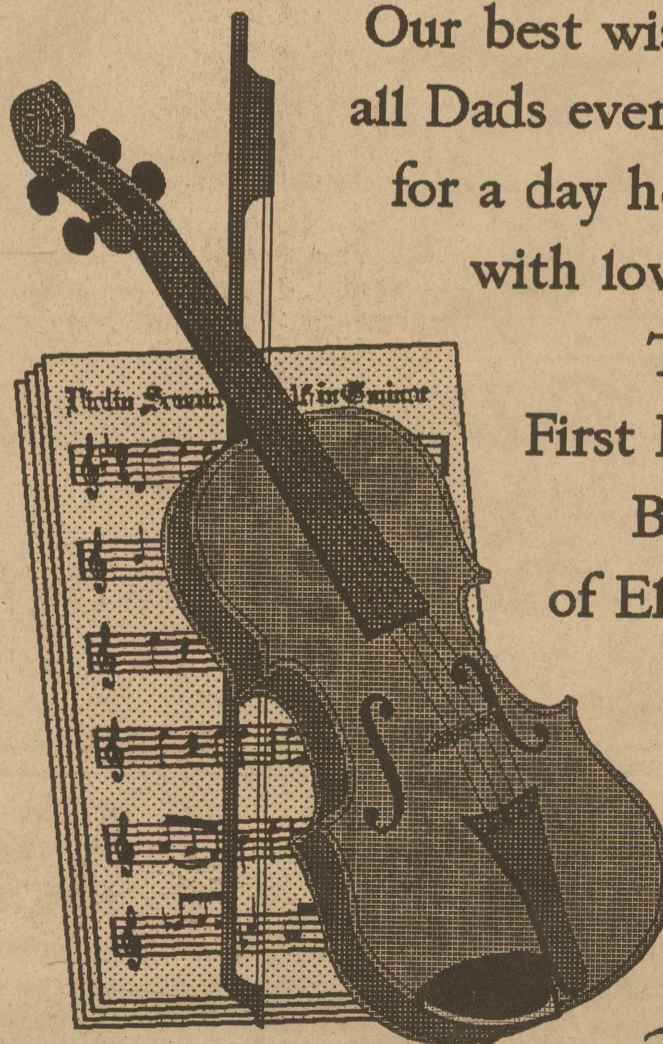

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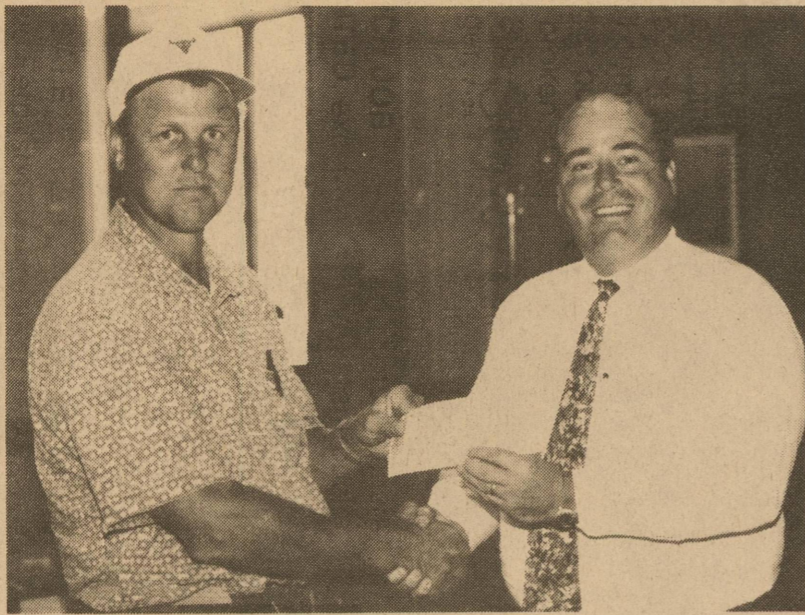


It's a girl!

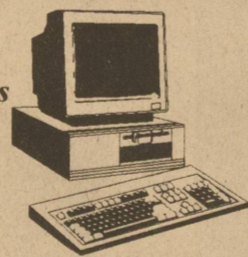

Let the new generation hold their noses and condescendingly call it "The Old-Time Religion" if they choose. But the answer to all who sincerely seek peace is to COME TO JESUS CHRIST. At Calvary He paid the price that we might enjoy the prize. That prize is the peace that passes all understanding.

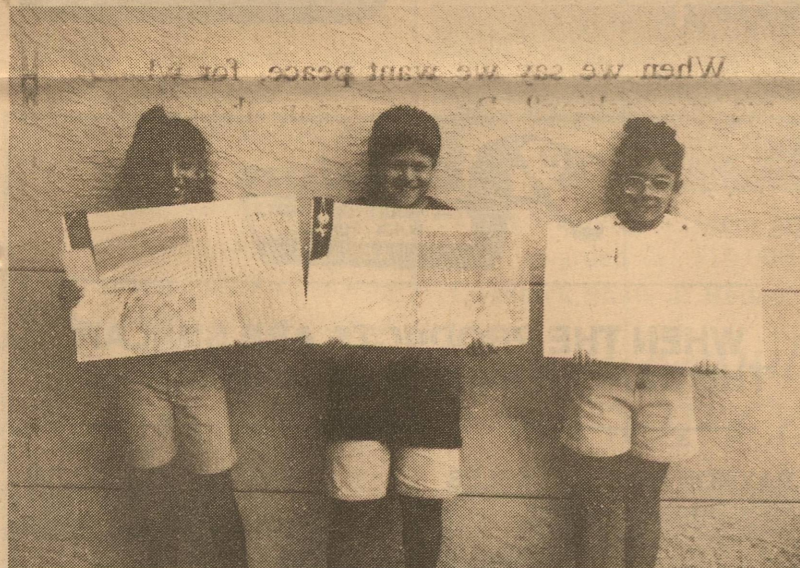
