
Young Explorer to **Make Hazardous Trip**

Within the next few weeks, Henry G. Slaughter, 28-yearold naturalist and explorer of Washington, D. C., will trundle a bicycle out onto the new Pan-American Highway and begin an expedition down the continental divide. He will attempt to conplete the first overland journey in history from the United States to Panama.

This will be the second time that young Slaughter has attepted the hazardous trip. His first venture took place last winter, but was thwarted by the combined efforts of the Guatemalan rainy season and the Guatemalan government's "red tape".


Slaughter left Texas last December, equipped with tent, hammock, two revolvers, one rifle, ax, knife, machete (a murderous weapon used in this instance for cutting through underbrush), first aid material, snake antitoxin, cooking utensils, emergency water, concentrated food capable of ing". 



While on his first trip he was unable to reach his ultimate destination, Slaughter feels that it provided him with much essential knowledge of the Central American countries and people that will assure him of future success.

NEW RULINGS ANNOUNCED BY STATE COMMITTEE

College Station-Land owners having mutiple tenants on a contiguous block of farms may fill out a master work sheet instead of seperate work sheets for each farm, it was announced by the State Soil Conservation Committee.

They also pointed out that payments will be protrated among all tenants similar to the way old parity payments were distributed and the land owner will be held responsible for compliance.

Of great importance to Texas farmers, members of the State committee commented, is the new rule that two rows of corn or grain sorghum interplanted with one row of cowpeas will count as two thirds soil-depleting crops and one-third soil-conserving. The county committee will determine the percentage of land occupancy.




