TREE FISHING

We've often heard of "nigger" fishing, and according to reports made to us, you can do more fishing with less work that way than any other way. But now the bunch that went to Devils River last week are telling a new one. "Tree fishing" would be a very good name for it.

OUR ROADS ARE BETTER

We had occasion to drive over quite a few of our county roads recently, and the change which has been made in them is hardly believable if we had not actually known it. When we came to this county a year ago, there was not a county road that was in what could be called pretty good shape.

Today, Schleicher county people are traveling roads which they shunned several months ago—roads which they believed could not possibly be traveled when a rain came.

We noticed that our recent rains did comparatively little damage to our roads if you stop to compare that damage to what such a rain a year ago would have done. And just as soon as the roads were dry enough, our county maintainer was being put over them just as fast as possible, putting them back into just as good condition as they were before the rain.

Schleicher county people have begun to comment on the way our county roads are being maintained. They have found that in even reasonably muddy weather travel over these roads is comparatively easy. They have learned that it is not purposed that these roads be neglected. They have learned that roads have been built where such a task was thought impossible—and this has come about by giving a little thought to road construction and road maintenance in this county.

The people of the Reynolds community are soon to have a road which they can travel into Eldorado. Work of widening this lane and putting up a road bed is now under way, with the lakes being filled and caliche being placed on them.

This work will serve one of the best agricultural sections of our county—and a people who heretofore have gotten very little returns out of their tax money which has gone into the road and bridge fund of our county.

There's much yet to be done in road construction in this county, but we're glad to see such rapid improvements being made in our road situation.

13,544 Acres Are Signed In County For '37 Program

Only 71 farmers of Schleicher county signed preliminary work sheets for entering the 1937 soil conservation program, but this number took up a majority of the acres allotted to this county.

County Agent W. G. Godwin reported this week that only 41.04 percent of the farmers of this county had signified their intentions of entering the program, but this number took up 82 percent of the county's acreage quota. The state committee set aside 16,500 acres as Schleicher county's quota, and 13,544 acres have been signed up by the 71 farmers who entered the program.

The closing date for signing work sheets was May 10th, with May 15th set as the last date on which the work sheets would be accepted at the state office.

Etchings Presented To Local School By Seniors Of 1936

Fourteen Texas Centennial Etchings have been ordered by the Senior class of 1936 which they are going to present to the school. They are 10 by 12 inches and are framed. Each etching is inscribed with the following words, "Presented to the Eldorado Public Schools by the Members of the Senior Class of 1936." They are to be hung in the various class rooms.

Texans To Vote On Six Amendments To State Constitution

SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD OVER STATE ON AUGUST 23

The Success this week begins publication of amendments to the Constitution of the State of Texas, which will be voted on by all qualified electors of Texas at a special election on Monday, August 23, 1937. The amendments, which were sent us from the Department of State, are resolutions which have been passed at the present session of the Texas Legislature.

There are six amendments in all. Briefly, they are as follows:

S. J. R. No. 16, providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds.

S. J. R. No. 19, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks.

H. J. R. No. 23, providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value and providing that the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before they become delinquent.

H. J. R. No. 26-A, providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of 14 years.

H. J. R. No. 26, providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one years.

H. J. R. No. 24, providing for authorizing the Legislature to fix the manner and basis of compensation for all District, County and Precinct Officers.

Schleicher Wool Is Being Tested At College Station

Mr. W. R. Nesbit from the department of animal husbandry of the Extension Service, was in Schleicher county last week-end, securing fleeces from sheep of this county to be tested at A. & M. College.

Mr. Nesbit, accompanied by County Agent Godwin, visited 25 ranches of this county and secured 25 fleeces and 25 samples of wool to be used in the test.

The test is being made to determine the percentage of shrinkage between the entire fleece and the shoulder fleece. The wool is to be scoured at the scouring plant of A. & M. College and then tested for shrinkage.

Mr. Nesbit was well pleased with the fleeces secured from local ranchmen and with conditions in general over the county.

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CONGRATULATIONS

Within a week, eighteen young people of Eldorado will embark from the portals of their high school into another phase of life. THINGS ONE REMEMBERS

There are many simple things that could be done to reduce automobile accidents.

Recently, a small trailer with lumber in it was seen to tear loose from the pleasure car that was towing it. It dashed out into the oncoming traffic, then swerved around and ran into the bank on the side of the road where it broke loose. It missed oncoming cars by a split second, and came just as near causing a wreck with the car that was following it.

The trailer had been fastened to the pleasure car bumper (which was never made to haul

a trailer) with an insecure bolt that simply jolted out. It was only a miracle that it did not cause serious or fatal accidents. The owner of the trailer re-fastened it to the bumper with some bailing wire and started out again.

What excuse is there for laws or regulations governing automobiles, that permit such potential death-dealing contraptions on the highway? A traffic officer would immediately stop a driver without a license plate. Why should not laws be passed whereby a traffic officer would stop every car towing a trailer that did not have some form of identification attached showing that it complied with rigid regulations as to its safety, and arrest the driver?

This is merely one potential law to aid in automobile accident prevention, that could be as easily enforced as automobile licensing requirements.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Article 16, Section 61, providing for the abolishing of the salary method of compensating all District, County and Precinct Officers of this State and further providing that such Officers shall be paid in such manner and on such basis as may be prescribed by the Legislature; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; providing for proclamation of said election by the Governor; and providing for the necessary appropriation to defray necessary expenses for the submission of this amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 61 of Article 16 of the Constitution be amended so as to hereafter read

as follows:

"Section 61. All District, County and Precinct Officers shall hereafter be compensated in such manner and on such basis as may be prescribed by the Legislature."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at a special election to be held on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots these words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize the Legislature to fix the manner and basis of compensation for all District, County and Precinct Officers."

And those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots these words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize the Legislature to fix the manner and basis of compensation for all District, County and Precinct Officers."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election.

WHY SCREW WORMS MUST BE KILLED IN WOUNDS

One of the most familiar of nature's daily miracles is the transformation of caterpillar into moth. Quite similar but less publicized is the evolution of a screw worm into a striped green fly. Unlike the caterpillar, which spins its cocoon or pupal case aboveground, the screw worm buries itself about an inch underground, contracts, and hardens its outer skin to form a shell. In this brown case it rests and, unseen, the maggot evolves into a fly. Books have been written on how a fly larva contracts, how eyes, legs and wings develop, or how form and color emerge. But only the prying eyes of the scientist have witnessed this phenomenon. The metamorphosis complete, the fly breaks the end of the pupal case, crawls out, pushes up to the surface of the ground, dries, expands its wings and flies away. On a fresh wound it lays its eggs—eggs which in an unbelievably short time hatch into hungry screw worms larvae burrowing into the wound.

Obviously, it would be impracticable to try to kill screw worms in the pupal stage, because they are inaccessible. Either the fly, the egg mass or the worm itself must be destroyed. Traps for screw worm flies have

not as yet proved efficient because no bait has been found which is as attractive to a screw worm fly as is an open wound. Killing the worms or eggs remain the only alternatives and the only places the worms or eggs are found are at the wounds of animals. (The few minutes in which the grown worms are migrating out of the wound and dropping and burrowing into the ground offer no opportunity for destroying them.)

Benzol placed in an infested wound kills the worms. Pine tar oil brushed on and around the wound unattractive to flies and prevents blowfly eggs from hatching. These are the only two materials recommended by the United States Department of Ag-

riculture, Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine, for the treatment of screw worm cases.

Work on the National Youth Administration project in Arcadia Park at Dallas is nearing completion, NYA youths having installed drinking fountains, four picnic units, a tennis court, grubbed and sodded 34 acres, laid water lines, straightened the creek bed, and graded and sodded 10,000 square yards of ground for a play field, C. P. Little, Jr., district supervisor, has reported to J. C. Kellam, state director.

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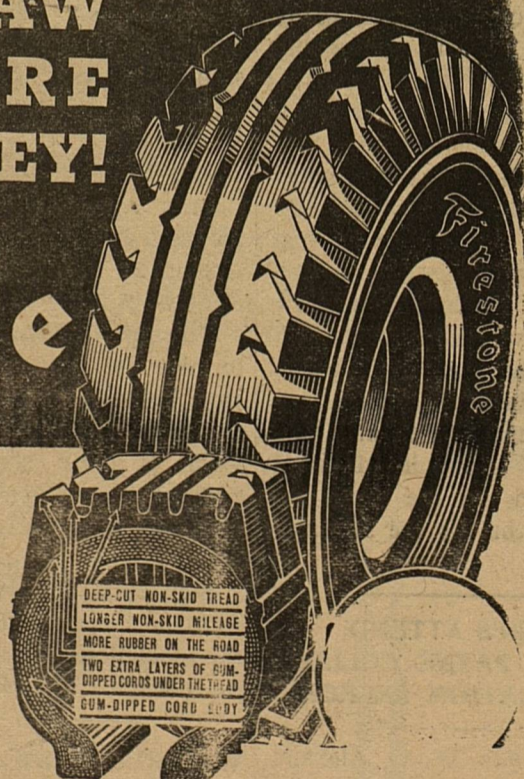
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Constitutional Amendments

To Be Submitted To Texas' Voters Aug. 23rd

H. J. R. No. 23

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:

"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be

assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing, that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

The above is a true and correct copy.

S. J. R. No. 9 A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas; providing that the Legislature shall authorize the incorporation of banking bodies and provide for the supervision and regulation of same; providing for all of the capital stock to be subscribed and paid for before charter issued; restricting foreign corporations from doing banking business; restricting corporate business to one place.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The Legislature shall by general laws, authorize the incorporation of corporate bodies with banking and discounting privileges, and shall provide for a system of State supervision, regulation and control of such bodies which will adequately protect and secure the depositors and creditors thereof. "No such corporate body shall be chartered until all of the authorized capital stock has been subscribed and paid for in full in cash. Such body corporate shall not be authorized to engage in business at more than one place which shall be designated in its charter. "No foreign corporation, other than the national banks of the United States shall be permitted to exercise banking or discounting privileges in this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937. At this election all voters favoring the proposed amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"For the amendment of Section 16 to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Those voters opposing said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"Against the amendment of Section 16 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Tex-

as, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and the amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay expenses of such election.

proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 52d; providing that the Legislature may authorize by law, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, the adoption of a plan for the construction of paved roads and bridges or both in Harris County and in road districts therein; providing for the levy of a tax to pay for such construction; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52d: Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for constructing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund. "At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder. "The provisions of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road

plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words; "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall provide that the Legislature shall have the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient for assistance to destitute children and for the payment of same not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) for one child or Twelve Dollars (\$12) for the children of any one family per month; further providing that the Legislature may impose such restrictions and regulations as to it may seem expedient; providing that the amount to be expended out of State funds in any one year for such assistance shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) and providing that the Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States financial aid for assistance to destitute children; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of such amendment and making an appropriation therefor; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof, and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 51d, which shall read as follows:

Section 51d. Subject to be limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may be provided by law, the Legislature shall have the power to provide for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years; such assistance shall not exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family; provided that the amount to be expended for such assistance out of State funds shall never exceed the sum of One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year. The Legislature may impose residential restrictions and such other restrictions, limitations, and regulations as to it may seem expedient.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial assistance to

destitute children as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided."

"For the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to destitute children under the age of fourteen (14) years not to exceed Eight Dollars (\$8) per month for one child nor more than Twelve Dollars (\$12) per month for such children of any one family, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial assistance for such payment."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."

NOBODY'S BUSINESS

Austin.—Speeding down the last mile toward adjournment of its regular session, set for Saturday, May 22, the regular session of the 45th legislature was prepared to devote most of its time to the appropriation bills, with some doubt existing as to whether all would be passed. That there would be no tax legislation appeared a certainty. But the need for a tax session later is revealed by a glance at the appropriation bills which have passed one house or the other already.

Here are the comparative figures of the 1935 biennium, and for the new two-year period starting next September. For education, \$10,786,860 and approximately \$15,000,000; for the judiciary, \$3,898,256 and approximately \$5,500,000; for the state departments, \$13,134,422 and approximately \$24,000,000

for eleemosynary institutions, \$10,870,727 and approximately \$14,000,000. This gives a total tentative increase for the new biennium of about \$19,800,000. The increases probably will be reduced substantially in the conference committee this week, where the bills will be finally written, but with constitutional amendments already submitted calling for participation in additional features of the federal social security program to aid blind persons and dependent children this fall, there seems to be no other answer but to raise some \$15,000,000 to \$25,000,000 of additional revenue.

A veteran congressman once gave as his formula for remaining in office indefinitely, faithful following of the rule to "vote against all taxes and for all appropriations." Evidently a good many members of the 45th legislature went to that same school.

About Special Session

Gov. Allred reiterated his determination at the week-end to call a special session on Monday, May 24, to which he will submit only race track gambling repeal, if no vote is had at the regular session, and a vote appeared very unlikely. The governor pointed out that it will take 90 days for the repeal to become effective, if it is adopted, and he would cut off the fall race meets at Texas tracks. Incidentally, he used the words "at the first called session" in referring to his plan, indicating quite clearly that he considers a tax session later as absolutely necessary.

The general impression here was that there will be no tax session until fall, because until the voters pass on the constitutional amendments in the fall, nobody knows how much revenue will be needed. Then, too, there is a strong probability that Gov. Allred will have been appointed to the federal bench by that time.

and Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodul will have to shoulder the burden of persuading the recalcitrant legislature to raise some tax money. This undoubtedly will please the representatives of the special interests, who are "fed up" on Allred's efforts to tax them, and it probably will please the governor just as well, too, since he has struggled manfully but in vain to jam thru tax legislation. The legislature itself is quite willing to go home for a while during the hot weather.

Senate Gets Going

The senate settled down and passed two measures this week which are calculated to improve conditions, without spending a large sum of tax money. The first of these was the tightened drivers' license law, requiring examination of new applicants and permitting suspension of licenses for driving offenses, the bill being changed but little from the house version, already adopted. It goes to conference for final ironing out.

The other was the tightened liquor control bill, granting greater authority to the liquor enforcement division to close up beer joints selling whiskey, and generally tightening restrictions. It will prevent violators operating under protection of court injunctions when they are caught violating the liquor laws. The senate refused to re-insert the provision killed in the house prohibited "chain bottle shops" in Texas, in which beer shipped in bulk from other states is bottled and distributed in small bottling plants within Texas.

Ad Bill May Get Up

Sponsors of the \$3,000,000 five-year state advertising constitutional amendment passed by the senate under sponsorship of Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodul, have the resolution in a strategic position on the house calendar, and probably will bring it up for another test before final adjournment. The bill would submit to the voters the proposition of authorizing Texas to advertise for tourist trade and industrial development, spending \$600,000 a year for a five-year period on the project. It has the active support of the Texas Press association and virtually all newspapers in the state. It narrowly missed defeat in the house on its first test, Speaker Bob Calvert saving it by breaking a tie vote. It will require 100 votes in the house to submit it, and the outcome is doubtful.

NOTES

Louisiana will have an opportunity to join the oil states' compact in the near future, when Gov. Leche calls a special session and submits the proposal, members of the compact were told by the governor at the recent quarterly session, held in New Orleans. Enlistment of Louisiana will mark the greatest forward step in petroleum conservation since the compact was inaugurated in the opinion of Rail Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson, who is also compact chairman. . . Drys are still strong

Frank Adams, Austin newsman, has written, in collaboration with half a dozen other distinguished authorities, a "History of Texas Democracy" just published, which reviewers are praising as a distinctive and accurate work. . . B. E. Quinn, veteran Beaumont legislator, was at liberty under \$1000 bond, following the shooting to death of another guest at Quinn's Austin hotel, after a dispute that arose after Quinn complained guests in an adjoining room were disturbing his sleep.

TYPHOID FEVER IS BRANDED AS NATIONAL DISGRACE AND EVIL

Austin, Texas.— Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, characterized typhoid fever as a National disgrace and an unnecessary evil, while discussing this preventable disease. He said, "Each year about four hundred Texans die of this disease and approximately four thousand are sick with it. The average duration of illness is about six weeks; this means that the disease is responsible for the loss of 168,000 days in Texas each year.

Typhoid vaccine is a harmless solution. This is injected under the skin in the upper part of the arm, in three doses, usually at weekly intervals. It ordinarily protects against the disease from two or three years or longer, although one who is definitely exposed to infection should be revaccinated more frequently.

Typhoid fever can be controlled by the use of pure water, pasteurized milk or clean milk, clean foods, proper disposal of sewage, screening against the fly and destroying its breeding places, by search for and care of human carriers, and by the general practice of vaccination.

Certain people, apparently healthy, carry the germs of typhoid in their intestines or urinary tract and cause many cases of typhoid each year through handling foods with unwashed hands. They are called typhoid carriers and many cases result from personal contact with these carriers.

When camping it is best to boil water used for drinking, unless you know that it is pure. Clear, sparkling spring water may be polluted by drainage.

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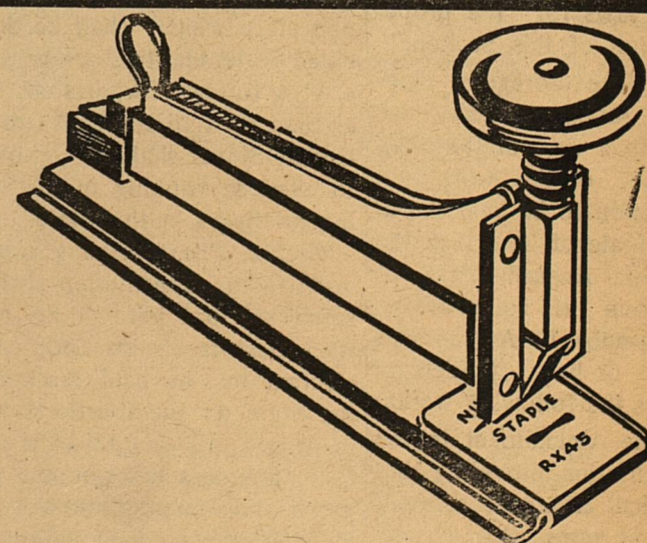

Senator Connally Favors Extending Low Interest Rates On Federal Farm Loans

Washington D. C. — Senator Tom Connally declared early this week that he will actively urge the extension of the 3½ per cent interest rate on certain federal land bank farm loans.

House Bill Number 6763, which would extend the 3½ per cent interest rate, has been favorably reported to the House of

Representatives. Unless this or some similar bill is passed before July 1st, the interest rate on such loans will automatically revert to the original higher rate of 4½ to 5 per cent.

Senator Connally's views on the matter are set forth in the following statement:

"I strongly favor and shall in-

sist upon the passage of a bill to continue and extend the 3 1-2 per cent interest rate on federal land bank farm loans. It would be utterly unwise to increase the interest rate on loans to the Federal Land Banks at this time. One of the greatest services which the government can render is to make it easy for farmers to become the owners of the land which they till. The establishment of farm homes ought to be one of the cardinal policies of the federal government. Those farmers who have purchased homes and have loans on them in the federal land banks are making earnest efforts to complete their payments and become the absolute owners of the land upon which they live.

"The government can afford to continue the 3 1-2 per cent interest rates on such loans. By doing so it may enable farmers to meet interest payments and to also pay a portion of the principal indebtedness. To increase the interest rate at this time would have the opposite effect.

"In the Senate I shall advocate strongly the enactment of the bill providing for the extension of the 3 1-3 per cent rate."

Students Who Plan Summer Work Should Apply For Social Security Account Numbers

Austin, May 17.—High school students who plan to enter industrial and commercial employment for the first time this summer should apply now for social security cards, M. D. Dewberry, field representative of the Social Security Board, said today.

"Many boys and girls will be finishing school within the next week or two, and will take regular employment. Some not graduating this year will work during the vacation period and others will be employed part time. As monthly retirements benefits, payable at age 65, are determined solely on the basis of wages received in included employment, it is important that these young

men and women apply now for account numbers, so that wage records may be set up for them," Dewberry explained.

Employers are required to make complete reports to the Bureau of Internal Revenue showing the name and account number of each worker they employ, and the wages paid in each case. For this reason, Dewberry declared, many employers are refusing to give jobs to those who do not have account numbers.

Applications for account numbers may be obtained from any postmaster prior to June 30. After that date, they must be obtained from the nearest field office of the Social Security Board.

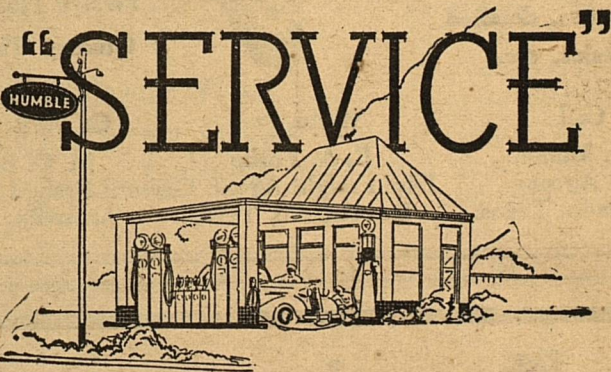

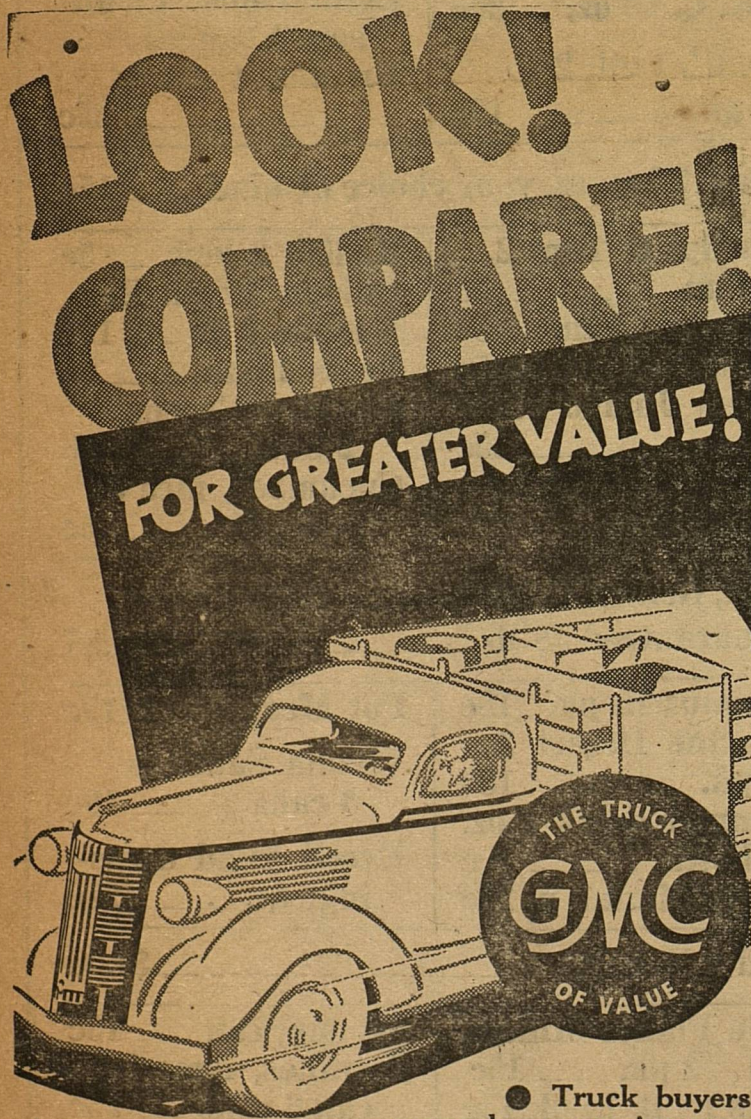

3. With the present changes, the course of study adequately meets the needs of the community, with the single exception of fine arts. Some courses in high school music (orchestra, band, or choral music) should be added.

4. With few exceptions, the faculty is doing very good work. Teaching conditions are favorable and conducive to a progressive school program.

5. The high school faculty is to be commended for directing the students in group activity: such as athletics, school paper, year book publication, and auditorium program. Excellent classroom work is being done in general, but especially in English and the commercial subjects. The board of trustees is to be

commended for cooperating with the superintendent and teachers in sponsoring and maintaining an active, efficient, and progressive school system."

The official notice concerning subject offerings for the ensuing year may be quoted as follows:

"The state supervisor who visited your school system reports that your school is doing standard work in all departments and recommends that your subject offerings be increased as follows:

Junior business training, 1 unit; secretarial training, 2 units; typewriting, 1-2 additional unit; and that your subject offerings be decreased as follows; Ancient history, 1 unit; algebra 2, 1-2 unit; advanced arithmetic, 1-2 unit; trigonometry, 1-2 unit; stenography, 1 unit; vocational agriculture, 1 1-2 units."

These changes in the local high school curriculum leaves the credit offerings of the school distributed as follows: English, 4 units; math, 3 units; science, 4 units; history, 3 units; commercial, 6 units; public speaking, 1 unit; home economics, 2 units; Spanish, 2 units.
