Eldorado Wool Co. Sells Over 274 Tons Of Salt During May

Schleicher County Ranchmen Buy Average Of Ten Tons Per Day

During the month of May, the Eldorado Wool Company estanlished what transportation records disclose to be an all time record for Eldorado, and perhaps for other country points in West Texas on receipts and distribution of stock salt for a corresponding period. From May, 2nd to 30th, this firm received and sold to Schleicher County ranchmen 547,450 pounds or over 273 tons of salt. The geographic location of Schleicher county combined with the mild climate of the area is naturally conductive to good health. The high altitude precludes the menace of malaria.

During the five year period, 1931-35, inclusive, there were 281 births and 70 deaths reported, of 211 births in excess of the total deaths in the county. This natural increase in population is above average normal growth for the State.

Opportunities for Deveolpment

Barring the discovery of large pools of oil, the development of Schleicher county will doubtless be gradual and will be restricted to those developments that come from agriculture and the raising of livestock and those lines of endeavor that are complementary thereto.

The governor announced he will veto the appropriation for the prevent fall race meetings before the repeal law takes effect about September 24.

Severe Grasshopper Infestation Threatens

College Station—A grasshopper infestation equal to or worse than that of 1934 threatens a large portion of the State, according to R. R. Reppert, Extension Service entomologist. As the result of counts of eggs deposited last fall, Reppert forecast in April a severe grasshopper infestation, and reports from county agricultural agents indicate that the emergence of grasshoppers will be even more serious than anticipated.

Poison mash scattered around areas of concentrated egg deposits does much to control the insects before they do much damage, Reppert said. A state grasshopper control committee, with Reppert as state leader, has been set up to combat the infestation. 150 carloads of material from federal scources to use against the Texas grasshoppers. Congress recently appropriated a million dollars for this purpose.

A similar program in 1924 resulted in a saving of more than seven million dollars to Texas agriculture.

The federal material for the J. T. Ratliff spent the week mash, which is composed of bran or mill run feed and sawdust, an arsenic compound, and water, would be delivered to centers of infestations and distributed under the supervision of county agricultural agents.

The threatened infestation apparently will center around northwest and central Texas, according to Reppert, who is making a tour of the State to get an accurate estimate of the situa-


