## Schleicher County Pioneer Passes

Funeral services for Mrs. S. W. Holland, 79, pioneer of West Texas, were held Thursday at 3:30 p. m. from the First Presbyterian Church with Dr. W. B. Grey Brownwood, officiating assisted by the Rev. J. A. Carriker, local pastor. The Ratliff Funeral Home was in charge.

Mrs. Holland passed away in an Austin hospital, Wednesday at 1:15 a. m. following a long illness. The body arrived in San Angelo by train Thursday morning and was brought overland by a Ratliff Funeral coach. Interment was in the Eldorado cemetery beside the grave of her husband, the late S. W. Holland who died July 15, 1931.

The deceased was born in Arkansas in 1866 and came to Texas at an early age. She was married to Mr. Holland in 1884 and the couple settled in Runnels County, later moving to Schleicher County in 1901, settling on a Ranch. In

1913, Mr. and Mrs. Holland purchased the Eldo Hotel which they operated until 1923.

For the past two years, Mrs. Holland had resided at the home of a daughter, Mrs. O. M. Smith of Brownwood until she was carried to the Austin hospital several months ago.

Immediate survivors include two daughters, Mrs. O. M. Smith, Brownwood. Mrs. S. M. Oglesby, Jr. of Eldorado; two sons, W. M. Holland, Mineola, and Marks B. Holland, Eldorado; one sister, Mrs. Betty Wood, Paint Rock, and two brothers, W. W. Barbee, Nogales, Ariz. and W. E. Barbee of San Angelo; sixteen grandchildren and seven great grandchildren.

All of the children were present for the services.

The book, with illustrations, contains 1,276 pages of treatments and preventive methods for diseases common to livestock and poultry. It is the last yearbook published by the Department of Agriculture, due to war conditions.

Melt down once a week when your oven's going, add the liquid fat to the salvage can.

Take the can to your butcher as soon as it's full. He will give you two red points and up to four cents for every pound. If you have any difficulty, call your County Agent or Home Demonstration Agent. This message is approved by WFA and OPA, and paid for by Industry.
