Three Constitutional Amend-

ments are being published this week that are to be submitted to qualified voters throughout the State at an election to be held the fourth Saturday in August, which date is August 25, 1945.

House Joint Resolution No. 11 will be presented to raise pay of members of the legislature to a per diem of \$10 a day during their tenure of office, and to allow them \$2.50 for each 25 miles traveled to any regular or called session; but no member is entitled to mileage for an extra session called in one day after a regular or called session.

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7 is an amendment to Article Six of the Costitution of Texas setting out a provision whereby a service A new business institution to be man who has been in the service eighteen months prior to an elec-

State Joint Resolution No. 8 is an amendment to provide for a a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case. No person shall be eligible to be a member of the court unless he shall have attained the age of thirty-five years, and of course at the time of his election be a citizen of the United States.

No Easy Out

Former War Mobilizer James F. Byrnes sums up he debt and taxation picture of the Federal govrnme in a chilling light. In his final report he tated that the Federal debt has reached \$233 bilion-approximately \$2,000 for every man, woman and child.

No nation, even if it has lost a war, has heretofore had saddled upon it a public debt as large as the debt we as victors must pay.

Annual interest alone is now \$4,500,000,000. To appreciate what this means, recall for the fiscal year 1939, the total of all internal revenue taxes was \$5,063,000,000 (not including Social Security funds). To put it another way, total income tax collected for the calendar year 1942 from all persons vith incomes of \$5,000 or less amounted to only \$4,-34,000,000 not enough to pay the interest this ear on our Federal debt.



Subject: Texas 124 Schleicher

Since receipt of your letter of May 10, we have been advised by the Cooperative that any member may have his wiring installed by any wiring contractor he wishes to select, and that no member will be discriminated against in connection with his right to receive service or in any other manner.

It is the definite policy of this Administration, and a basic principle of all Cooperatives, that there shall be no discrimination against any member, and also that no director or officer of a Cooperative shall use his official position for personal profit.

On the other hand, a member may enter into a contract agreeing to the employment of a particular wiring contractor. If the other party to such contract defaults in the performance of its obligations, the member may be released from his; but whether this is the case in a specific instance is a legal question, and the answer would depend upon the exact facts involved. Any member who wishes advice concerning his own obligations should forward to this office a copy of his contract and an explanation of the circumstances. Our Legal Division will then be glad to offer its counsel and assistance.

In no case, however, should a member be deprived of electric service merely because he prefers to use one wiring contractor rather than another. If any member has received a communication from an officer of the Cooperative in contradiction of this policy, such letter should be sent to us for examination.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislatre shall receive from the public Treasury a per diem of Ten Dollars (\$10) per day during their tenure of office. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for each twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel by land regardless of railways or water routes; and the Comptroller of the State shall prepare and preserve a table of distance to each county seat, now or hereafter to be established; and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; but no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of any regular or called session.'

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the the Legislature during their tenure of office" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for continuous salary per diem of all members of the Legislature during their tenure of office."-

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment .-


