Farm Safety Week July 22-28 Designated gelo Telephone company has stat-

The President has designated this week-July 22 through July 28-as National Farm Safety Week. We are all familiar of the fact that farming is one of the most dangerous of all occupations. Deaths from farm work accidents in 1943 totaled more than in any of the other five major industries and amounted to 25 percent of all occupational deaths. More farm people were killed by accidents ir the first two years of the war thar the number of fighting men killed in the war itself.

It is since the beginning of the war that the danger of accidents has increased, due to the pressure under which the farmers have been working, having to use old machinery, and the increased employment of boys and girls, elderly people and inexperienced workers. It is always of the utmost importance that you prevent accidents; but it is especially important now, because of the increased danger and of the great need for all-out food production, that every effort be put forth by each individual to reduce our farm accidents.

The chief cause of farm work accidents is the careless use of farm machinery. Forty percent of the total farm accidents occur ir the home, with falls and fires the most common cause. A farm home or building catches fire every 15 minutes during the day and farm cost \$273,972 each day. In 1943 farm fire losses were higher than for any year since 1932.

Now, more than at any other time, every farmer is being called on to make every acre produce as much as possible for the war effort. Soil conservation practices will improve the efficiency of your land, and safety practices, if applied to each member of your family will insure efficiency of the work ers. This extra care will aid in the continued essential production of food and other farm products for our nation and the world.

On Saturday of this week at 10:30 A. M. listen to Senator Arthur Cooper discuss the Farm Safety Week Activities.

Start now to promote safety on the farm, not only for this week but for this year. In this way each person will help to reduce the present unnecessary heavy toll of accidental deaths and injuries. As we work toward this goal let this be our motto: "Soil Conservation Is Safety For The Land; Safety First


