ELDORADO SPLITS DOUBLE HEADER WITH OZONA H. S.

Eldorado High School officially played their first high school baseball Friday by having a double header here with Ozona High. The first 5 inning game was won 3-2 by the Eldorado B team. Walter Jones, the smiling Schleicher Co. right hand chucker seemed to be the outstanding news bit. He was stingy with his allowance of hits to the Ozonans. They got but two hits off him the entire time.

In the second (and main) game, the Eldorado High School Eagles 1st stringers looked quite awkward in their 7 inning go against Ozona who had had some six weeks of steady, after-school workouts. The final score of 12-0 in favor of Ozona plainly showed that if boys are given two or three hours daily practice that they will hit and field that old horsehide just that much better.

Ozona got to the first two Eldorado pitchers, Captain Hal Whitten and Bill Lewis Humphrey, for 12 runs in the first two innings. Then Coach Vance told Gordon Hamm, a husky, but green, seventh grader to take over the mound. He did a good job of it for 3 innings by only allowing one hit. He was Eldorado's hero for the day. He accounted for 2 out every 3 outs against Ozona by fanning them at bat. Following his departure from pitching, Aldrege, Jack Hodges and Eugene Gibson took successive turns at pitching. Each did fairly well against such seasoned competition—at least, they never allowed any more runs and but few and scattered hits.

The most outstanding player of the Ozona team was tall Red Harrison, their pitcher. He not only hurled a 9 strike victory, but hit .500 too, and allowed only 2 hits.

Eldorado plays Ozona at Ozona next Friday for the return game.

Tuesday afternoon the Eldorado high school baseball team played their 3rd game this season, here and lost to Reagan County high school of Big Lake 17-10. Eldorado has played 3 games now and never had more than a noon period or a short P-E period for practice. Their first after school practice sessions of an hour or two duration should see them get farther along in the victory column.

As long as Reagan County used Buddie Jordan as their pitcher for the first four innings it was Eldorado's game by a 7-0 score. Buddie had more than a prayer on his ball but Carroll, Sproul, Hal Whitten, Billy Whitley and Bill McRae were soundly tapping him for good looks. During this same time Walter "Peanut" Jones was doing mound duty for the local Eagle club and doing a bang up good job of it too. He had some good control and was keeping Reagan's hits scattered, and getting out of some bad holes. At the end of the fourth frame Coach Vance benched Jones because apparently he had enough. One pitcher after another came in after this and during this 5th inning Reagan really made up for lost time and nicked Eldorado 8 runs. 4 walks and about 2 hits. Exhausted of pitching material, Coach Vance put Peanut Jones back in in the latter half of the eighth and he still held the score down to marked degree.

S. Vanadore of Reagan was the winning pitcher of the fray. He seemed to have quite a lot of stuff on his ball and he definitely stopped Eldorado's hitting rally. He led both teams in hits by garnering four in seven trips. This boy was his district's best in basket ball and football—and now looks like he is made for the big leagues in baseball. KEY MAN BACK AT HIS OLD JOB IN WOOLEN MILL

Production at the West Texas Woolen Mills will be substantially increased with the return of S-Sgt. Gene McCalla, key man, to his old job at the plant.

Now in Santo, McCalla will be ready in about two weeks to assume his old duties at the woolen mills, after several years of service, part of which was spent in Japan. He has a wife and a 3-year-old daughter.

With the induction of McCalla into the armed forces during the war, the proprietor, J. M. Christian, took over some of his work, but loss of this key employee and all-round mechanic cut production and slowed down the weaving process. With his return, the output of the plant, already on the increase, will be given the biggest impetus of the post-war months.
