

George Clarke, managing director of the Texas Safety Association says that a recent survey of juvenile automobile drivers indicates a need for safety education courses.

The survey showed that in 15 high schools with a total enrollment of 8,625 students, 97 per cent drove cars and only 18.4 had driver's licenses. In 20 junior high schools with an enrollment of 9,000 it was found that 95.5 of the students drove cars and 4.4 per cent had driver's licenses. 

Lichens Everywhere

About 200 different kinds of lickens are common in northeastern United. States, and an extended search would probably increase that number to a total of 500 to 600 species. Lichens occur everywhere -from the arctic regions to the tropics, from the highest mountain tops to the seashore, and from the driest of desert rocks to the beds of freshwater brooks. They form a large part of the plant growth on the treeless tundra of northern Canada, for instance.

Business Shrinkage

Following the last war, the birth rate of new business enterprises jumped rapidly to an all-time high of 496,000 in 1925, but thereafter kept just ahead of the failure rate until 1929. In the latter year, business births were 453,000 but deaths were 483,000, and by 1941, the number of going concerns in existence had dropped back to the number we had in 1926. During the war years there has, of course, been a further substantial shrinkage.
