Salaries Upped in Local School for Coming Year

Miss Nora Koen of Mineral Wells has been employed to teach Language Arts in the Elementary school, according to Supt. C. A. Reynolds. Miss Koen is now attending school at Sul Ross College.

Wendell Hall, who has been teaching in Washington, Okla., and was hired early in the spring as High School English and Speech instructor, has been shifted to the Principalship of the Elementary school. Vacancies now existing are: High School Mathematics, High School English; Commercial Arts, Public School Music, and Girls' Physical Education.

Salaries for these positions will be up to \$1,950, depending upon the degree and number of years of experience.

Junction to Hold Billy Sale August 8

A three-day celebration at Junction, August 8-9-10 will open with a street parade at 10:00 a. m. the morning of August 8, featuring the showing of outstanding quarter horses for which Kimble County is famous.

On Friday and Saturday, the 10th annual Hill Country Billy Sale will be held starting at 9:30 a. m. For many years this has been the largest Billy Sale in the world, and the place where many ranchmen get their top goats.

Other features of the 3-day event will include horse racing each day, amateur calf roping, a ladies barrel race, a helicopter demonstration in front of the grandstand on Saturday, carnival attractions on electrically lighted grounds, and dancing each evening on the outside dance pavilion at the fair grounds. Acres of shade and clear running water provide an ideal setting for the annual celebration which is one of the outstanding events in this section of Texas.

Twenty-Four Planes At First Air Show

Hundreds of Schleicher County residents and motorists from other places attended Eldorado's first Air Show, held all day Sunday at the local airport.

In spite of a blazing sun the crowd stayed at the field until the 24 planes participating in the show flew away to their home destinations: San Angelo, Ft. Stockton, Lubbock, Menard, Coleman, and other places.

Ten of the planes took up passengers, and many people in this locality took their first plane ride with the visiting flyers.

A high light of the afternoon's events was a stunt in which "Grandma Smith" (Woodrow Wright of Coleman) got into a plane, "accidentally" started the motor and took a spectacular plane ride.

At 1:00 about 60 visitors were served barbecue by the Lions Club on the courthouse lawn. Arrangements for this show were made by the Lions Club, committee members having worked on the project for weeks.

Lewis Ballew is resting well at his home here following an accident at the Cooper rig where he is employed, Tuesday afternoon, when he was caught between two pipes which he was placing in the hole. He was taken to a San Angelo hospital for examination but as no broken bones were found, he will be confined to bed for several days.

Ballew's injuries consisted of mashed ribs and muscles and painful bruises, which although not serious, have caused a great deal of soreness.

T. B. and Bangs Tests Scheduled in This County

Those producers interested in having their milch cows tested for T. B. and Bangs Disease may do so by turning in their names and the number of cows to be tested to the County Agent's Office not later than Saturday, Aug. 3, 1946.

Dr. Granzin of San Angelo will do the work. Dr. Granzin stated that he would gladly co-operate with the producers wanting their cows tested by charging only \$1.00 per head.

The County Agent urges that every producer that has not had the family cow tested for T. B. or Bangs Disease do so, in order that he may be positive that none of the family will contract tuberculosis or undulant fever should there be a re-actor.

New Sheriff & 1 New Commissioner Chosen in Saturday's Primary

Koy Well No. 1 Allowance is 120 Barrels Daily

A discovery allowable of 120 barrels per day has been allotted Cooper Gas Co. of San Angelo, for No. 1A Jess Koy, this county's first major producer. The new allowable is for 18 months unless 5 wells are completed earlier. The well had previously been allowed 90 barrels per day, pending a recent Railroad Commission hearing in Austin.

Request for dual completion for the well was denied. The company has contended that the gas and oil are from separate zones, and had hoped to turn the gas into Lone Star's line.

Tension increases this week among interested officials and crew members as drilling on No. 2-A Koy oil test, a short distance from the big producer, nears what may be pay depth. The discovery well produced heavily at 5605-40 feet and 5520-70 feet.

KERR IN MARINES

Marine Master Technical Sergeant Louis E. Kerr, of Eldorado is a member of the Marine fighting squadron, "The Flying Devil Dogs," which rang up an impressive record in a recent mock air attack staged to test the defenses of the base at Ewa, Oahu.

Kerr serves with the material section. The Marines kept every plane in operating condition for more than 12 continuous hours of simulated combat flying to successfully repel the realistic assault.

Kerr, veteran of the Midway, Guadalcanal and Russell Islands campaigns, was on the aircraft carrier Bunker Hill when it was hit by two Jap kamikaze planes within 30 seconds. He arrived in Hawaii last April for duty with Marine fighting squadron 513 at this base.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Kerr of Eldorado, Kerr was graduated from Eldorado High School in June 1936. Prior to enlisting in May 1941 he was employed by the Houston Light and Power Company at Houston.

Born on Nov. 1, 1881 in Burnet County, Mr. Finnegan moved with his parents when a small child to McCullough Co. where he resided until coming to Schleicher County in 1921. He had been engaged in farming here since that time.

County School Annexation is Put to Vote

Qualified voters of Schleicher County will go to the polls August 19 and vote on the question of annexing six common schools with Eldorado Independent School, to form a new rural high school district.

Order for the election has been posted in the voting boxes of the county, and election officers have been appointed as follows:

Eldorado Independent: W. N. Ramsey.

Mayer No. 1: H. M. Freund. Mayer No. 2: Joe Ruff, Jr. Adams No. 3: Webb Montgomery. Cliff No. 5: J. F. Runge. Bailey Con. 6: Archie Mittel. Kaffir No. 7: J. F. Oglesby.

The question concerns proposed annexation of Mayer 1 and 2, Adams 3, Cliff 5, Bailey and Kaffir with Eldorado Independent.

Calling of the election is the result of a recent county board meeting, which V. H. Humphrey, C. C. Crosby, Lottie Reynolds and Ira McDonald attended.

If this election carries the next step will be an election setting a uniform tax rate for the new district.

Voting for annexation and passing of a new tax rate will place upon the new school district the obligation to transport the children to and from school.

Work in Coming Year On East-West Road

That the new Menard Eldorado highway, for which the counties have voted bonds, will not be ready for a year is indicated by recent reports from officials concerned in the project.

It is planned to let the 14 1/2 mile strip in Menard County and an equal amount in Schleicher at the same time in the fall leaving about 14 1/2 miles to Eldorado for a spring letting.

About six miles of the road west from Menard is now under construction by Schwobe Bros. of San Antonio and with favorable working conditions this section will be completed by fall.

It is understood that black topping will be in another contract, to be let after construction is completed.

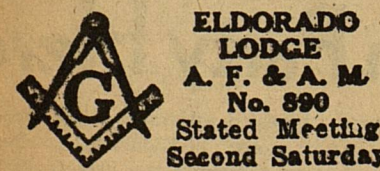

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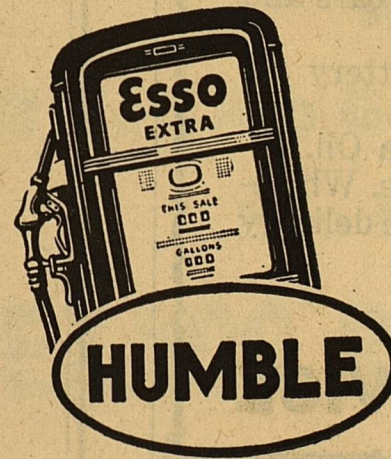

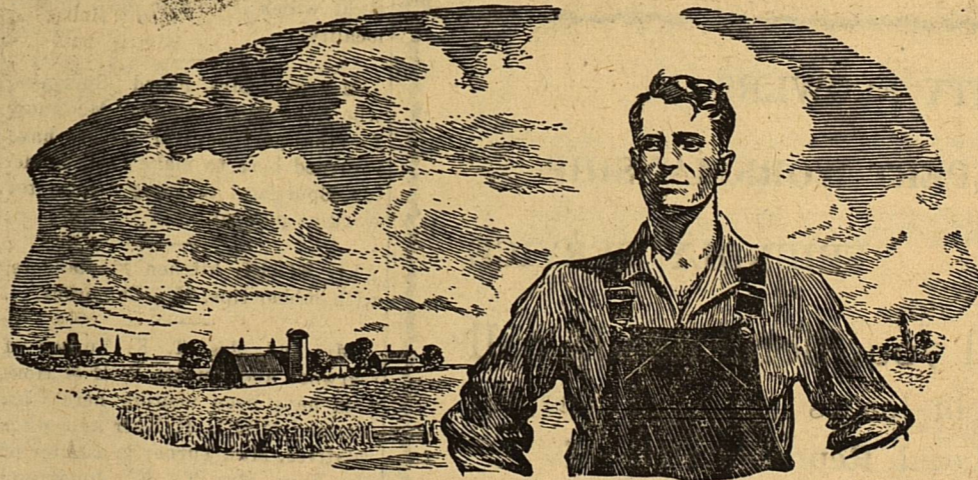

H. J. R. No. 10
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows: "Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds

shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less

revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3 the Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto. (Aug. 1-8-15-22)

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. (Aug. 1-8-15-22)



SOME CHANGES IN P.M.A. PROGRAMS JULY 1st

The expiration of OPA regulations at midnight June 30 brought several changes in farm commodity programs handled by the USDA Production and Marketing Administration.

A statement by the Department of Agriculture explaining the changes said additional announcements concerning these programs will be made as soon as the price situation is clarified. Some of the more important program changes announced as of July 1:

Wheat: Immediate suspension of the requirement that farmers must sell one-half of the wheat they deliver to country elevators. The Commodity Credit Corporation will continue to offer to buy wheat at market prices not exceeding the ceilings existing June 30.

Meat: Set-asides of meat by packing plants for Government purchase reduced to zero.

The Department said that the following orders and programs will continue in effect:

Set-asides on evaporated milk, cheddar cheese, and nonfat dry milk.

War Food orders relating to fats and oils.

1945-Crop program contracts for soybeans and peanuts.

Sugar rationing and allocations. Dairy production payments to producers will be continued if price control is renewed and if Congress makes money available for the payments. The same situation prevails for supporting the price of 1946 flaxseed at \$3.60 a bushel (Minneapolis basis) on sales made after July 1.
