



Meat: Set-asides of meat by pac king plants for Government pur chase reduced to zero.

The Department said that the following orders and programs will continue in effect:

Set-asides on evaporated milk, cheddar cheese, and nonfat dry

War Food orders relating to fats and oils.

1945-Crop program contracts for soybeans and peanuts.

Sugar rationing and allocations. Dairy production payments to producers will be continued if price control is renewed and if Congress makes money available for the payments. The same situation prevails for supporting the price of 1946 flaxseed at \$3.60 a bushel (Minneapolis basis) on sales made after July 1.
