## 1946 C. C. C. WOOL CROP **CLEARED OUT**

Clearing of the decks for accommodation of the 1947 wool and mohair clip has been under way recently, with moving out of the balance of the 1946 CCC clip from the Eldorado Wool Company's ware house. Several days of loading concluded Tuesday with clearing out of the warehouse, except for the new 1947 product which is beginning to move in.

It is estimated that at least 70% of Schleicher County's mohair has been sheared. The crop is reported to be average both in tonnage and in type.

A little wool from West Texas has already been shipped in, but Schleicher County's sheep will keep their wool for several weeks, when the annual spring shearing will start.
