LT. MONTGOMERY RELATES STORY OF GERMAN TRIP

In a recent letter to her parents, Lt. Kathryn Montgomery related cellent service and dancing. the story of visiting some interesting points in Germany: a trip down the Rhine River on board the palacial yacht of Adolph Hitler; a visit to the old university of Heidelberg; and a three day pass to Salzburg,

She said, "I came down with two nurses from Wisconsin. We arrived at about eleven in the morning. One of the nurses had a Col. friend stationed in Salzburg, who met us at the train and took us to his home for breakfast. Then his chauffeur took us for a drive to see the city and brought us over here to Berchtesgaden. Being in luck we were billeted in the best hotel here, which is probably one of the nicest in

"In the afternoon we went by S. S. Camp and Hitler Youth Camp. on August 19. Hitler's and Goering's homes were once here but everything was bombed flat. Then came the hair-raising jeep ride up the steep winding roads to the Eagle's Nest, which was built on top of a 5,900 foot mountain. The last 400 feet we went up by elevator. At the top is a cement and marble house, which Hitler used to entertain guests and hold secret conferences. The French took all the furniture, but the building is intact. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum.

"In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.


