## Thousands Expected at Game Friday

### Bids Are Advertised On Menard Highway

That dirt will fly by December, on the first stretch of the Eldorado-Menard road is virtually assured with the publishing of contractor's notice for bids in this issue of the Eldorado Success.

Bids on the 14½ mile stretch east from Eldorado will be received in the office of the Highway Department at Austin up to 9:00 a. m., October 23 and then opened and read. Another section, leading to the county line, will be received at another time. It is the opinion of some highway officials that by next summer we will be travelling all the way to Menard on a brand new road.

The Highway Department brought in a bulldozer Monday to cut a temporary road, thru the rocks and brush so that bidders could get through to see what they were to bid on!

This construction road will also be used to take fencing materials to location. Starting at 8:30 Monday morning, the bulldozer, just released from a similar project at Menard, smashed its way by quitting time through two miles of seemingly impassable rocky and brushy hill country. The road will be built to the county line, and may require about 7 working days for completion.

By the end of the week the first of the bidders may be expected to arrive, and others may be expected during the coming two or three weeks or more.

The road runs east of here, following the old route for a few miles. From there on it follows a new route—mainly directly east. None of the route in Schleicher County will call for bridges, but several draws will be crossed.

As planned at present, the road will be 18 feet wide, and will come into town to the post office corner. It will be so constructed as to allow for city development.

There is possibility, and probability, officials state, that the actual construction on this 14½ mile section will start in early December—and possibly in November.

The State Highway Department has established an office here in the Schleicher County courthouse, with Dept. Official Strup in charge. Transferred here from a recently completed job in Glascock County, Mr. Stroud will supervise the construction of the new highway in Schleicher County, and also the Sonora-Junction road, contract for which, it is expected, will be let next month. The 14½ mile strip here will require about 4 months' time to build, it is estimated.

While there is no official announcement to be made at this time, it is rumored that preparatory plans for the Eldorado-Barnhart road may be made while the east stretch is under construction—which would assure immediate start on that road when the Menard highway is completed.

Study of a map shows the need of a highway between Menard and the Ozona-Barnhart highway, giving traffic from the west a direct route to points in central Texas. The new highway will ultimately carry traffic from Brady on west, passing through Menard and Eldorado—a project on which the coming year or two will undoubtedly see much progress. Schleicher County is taking care of the right-of-way from Eldorado to the Menard County line, and has funds from its recent bond issue to finance the road through the western part of this county.

Frank Meador of Eldorado recently sold the state a caliche pit, for use in road construction.

### BAND UNIFORMS TO BE ALTERED FOR THIS YEAR

After placing a number of telephone calls during the week end in an effort to locate band uniforms for the Eldorado school band, the Band Parents Club and Bandmaster C. F. Jones may abandon the idea of buying the uniforms before the fall of '47. They found in consulting with factory officials that the uniforms could not be obtained at this time and have decided to work over the present uniforms to serve this year.

By Friday, when 52 musicians will march in the school band at the Eldorado-Sonora game here, alterations on the required number of uniforms will have been made. The uniforms will have gold tops and blue trousers and for the first time this year, all of the uniforms will be alike.

Meanwhile, the Band Parents' Club are soliciting donations, with the expectation of buying new uniforms later this year or early next year.

### Eagles Win Over Yellow Jackets By Two Penetrations

Playing their first conference game of the season, the Eagles found the going a little tough at Menard last Friday night. The Eagles somewhat outplayed the Yellowjackets, making more penetrations, first downs and yardage.

The first quarter found Eldorado receiving the kickoff on their own 40 yard line. Ochsner did most of the running for the Eagles this quarter. He was good for several long gains. At the close of this period Eldorado lost the ball on downs inside the 20 yard line in Yellowjacket territory. During the second quarter the Eagles gained much ground with Stanford, Mund, and Ochsner running through holes gaped open by a hard blocking Eldorado forward wall. The half ended with Eldorado in possession of the ball one yard from the goal and 2nd down.

The last half began with Menard kicking to Eldorado. Eldorado outplayed Menard through most of this period. The Eagles got one break when they recovered a punt. The stands were brought to their feet late in the fourth period. Menard recovered a fumbled Eagle ball and then with a series of quick opening plays marched from the 50 yard line to the Eagles 4 yard line. The Eagles then held them there for four downs. The ball went over to Eldorado; they punted out and Menard ran one play before the game was over.

### All of Sutton and Schleicher Counties Expect to Converge on Eldorado As Ancient Enemies Lock Horns; Fire Department Enlisted to Handle Record-Breaking Crowds

"Count the total population of Sutton County and Schleicher Co., add a few hundred—and you will know how many will attend the Eldorado-Sonora game Friday night!" This is the guess of the man-in-the-street, as the two teams gird for action in what promises to be the most exciting game staged here in the history of football.

While the two teams have been rivals for many years, the outcome of the games since 1929 has been one-sided—Eldorado has won them all. This year the Sonora boys, specially hand-picked and recruited from the crags and gullies of Sutton County, have encouraged their home folks to think they have a CHANCE of winning! According to advance dope, the able-bodied will all be here, and will bring along the lame, the halt and the blind, to provide 100 percent backing.

The game chalks up a first—for the first time in the history of Schleicher County football, there will be a loud speaker system in operation, so that play-by-play explanation of events may be broadcast from the speakers' stand. This will enable the uninformed to understand plays, penalties, identity of incoming and outgoing players, and the various technical points

which confuse the uninitiated.

For the second time in the history of Eldorado football—the first was the bi-district with Ft. Stockton several years ago—there will be official regulation of traffic to provide maximum efficiency in the handling of the crowds. In charge will be the local fire boys, who will keep cars back 9 feet from the fence, police the enclosure so that no person is inside who is not connected with the game, and line up vehicles for rapid clearing of the grounds after the battle.

(It is also assumed that the fire boys will referee fights between overly excited fathers and uncles of the opposing teams, and see that bets are paid off.)

Visiting football delegations from other places, returning home from afternoon games, are expected to swell the ranks of the sidelines, several such groups having indicated their intention of attending.

While it has been impossible to get a general expression of opinion concerning the outcome of the game here, several concede, in speaking of Sonora, "We've seen them worse."

### AIR SHOWS AND DEMONSTRATIONS HERE SUNDAY

The Southwest Air College which has been giving training to students here, will sponsor an all day Air Show Sunday, Oct. 13 at the local field. Three planes will be on hand including the Aeronca, a trainer for school; the Aeronca Chief, for demonstration—an ideal rancher plane which features low cost, low expense, long cruising range, and only needs a short space for landing and take-offs; and the Waco UPF-7, an open cockpit bi-plane, for pleasure rides.

In the afternoon at approximately 2:30 o'clock, the pilot will present an acrobatic air show, followed by free demonstration rides.

Billy Frank Blaylock, World War II amputee, has received his certificate entitling him to a new car at government expense, cost not to exceed \$1600.

The new car will be specially fitted for his particular use, after he has selected his automobile, the government to take care of all costs connected with the deal.

Billy Frank has secured this car through the efforts of the Veterans' Administration, after the local officials had been working on the case about two months. The gift was made possible by act of Congress, in which a designated amount was set aside to provide transportation for disabled veterans. He owns and operates Blaylock's Saddle Shop, having learned this trade as a disabled veteran.

### WOMAN DRIVER ASLEEP AT WHEEL HURT IN WRECK

Mrs. W. L. Gantzer and her 15-year old son were injured when the car in which they were riding overturned early Monday morning on the Christoval - Eldorado highway, about 8 miles this side of Christoval.

Mr. Gantzer, who is a drag-line shovel operator for the Schwope Bros. paving job, his wife and son had spent the week end in LaGrange, returning to Eldorado about 3:00 a. m. Monday. Mr. Gantzer remained here for his job, while Mrs. Gantzer and the boy, who have had an apartment in San Angelo while he is working here, had started in to San Angelo so that the boy might return to his school at Junior high. Having had very little sleep, Mrs. Gantzer fell asleep at the wheel, and the car overturned several times after leaving the highway. The vehicle was heavily damaged. J. L. Neill and his sister Mrs. Reuben Dickens, who were on their way to San Angelo, reached the scene of the wreck shortly afterwards, and carried the injured woman and boy to the hospital.

Mrs. Gantzer, the more seriously injured, suffered severe lacerations about the face and head and bruises about the body, but it was not thought that her injuries were very serious. The boy received abrasions on his arm, and a sore back where a box had fallen and struck him.

After several weeks of harrowing experiences, during which Glendale residents, surrounded by mounds of rocks, have been unable to use streets and driveways, peace and quiet has been restored, and roads are leveled and again open for traffic.

After official inspection of the Glendale sewer extensions Monday, final okey was given the project, and the city approved it for private use. Only an 800-foot strip between the King and Patterson places remain today unfinished, and other residents may connect with the sewer at any time.

In the future, state officials, each main sewer line will be opened as it is completed, so that connections may be made at once by property owners.

Schwope Bros. have practically completed work throughout Eldorado on the roadbeds of city streets scheduled to be paved, and equipment for which they have no further use, such as scraper, cat, etc., has been shipped out to other jobs. Only a maintainer and rollers will remain here during the week end.

The topping crew will start their work Monday, and with favorable weather should make good progress on the streets, most of which are ready for surfacing.

# Eagle Scratches

**FLASH! McGURK INELIGIBLE** Eldorado, October 10, 3:00 p. m.—The Eldorado Eagles suffered a stunning blow this afternoon when the administration released a statement that Dan McGurk, rugged tackle for the locals, was ineligible for the conflict Friday night with the Sonora Broncs.

"McGurk simply isn't passing his work," Supt. Reynolds said. "He must pass at least three out of the four subjects he is taking."

"McGurk is failing all his subjects," Mr. Cain, high school principal, stated. "It is true that his average is 69 3/4, but we cannot allow McGurk to play."

Coach Sutherland commented through tight lips, "McGurk's attitude has been bad since his injury October 2. We hope to use him next week."

McGurk's only comment was, "The teachers were partial." His parents could not be reached for an interview.

The hole left in Eldorado's forward wall will be filled by Frank Doty, a promising candidate for starting Eagle line-up.

### Report of RSS

Eldoradoans who wondered about the mysterious ambulance that sped into and out of this city Saturday morning, 3 o'clock a. m., October 5, will be saddened to know that this ambulance was necessary to convey the entire staff of the RSS to the third floor of an undisclosed hospital in Dallas. This floor is reserved exclusively for patients suffering from nervous breakdowns, strain, and over worry.

The following is their report, received by short wave radio: "Expect explosion resembling that of atomic bomb in Eldorado Friday night when Sonora's 'Four Horse Men,' Boughton, Bond Chalk and Street, collide with the immovable Eldorado 'Big Five,' McAngus, Speck, Doty, McGinnis, and Whitley. The issue is as follows: How could these men drop these subjects and yet fulfill Interscholastic League requirements to pass three subjects while participating in athletics. Sonora High School records show that these men were passing three subjects the first and second semesters of the 1945-46 school year.

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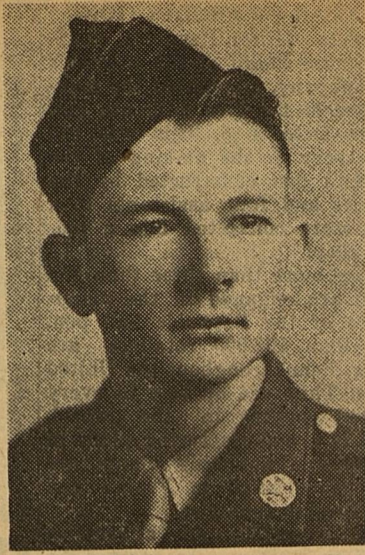
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### McDONALD DISCHARGED

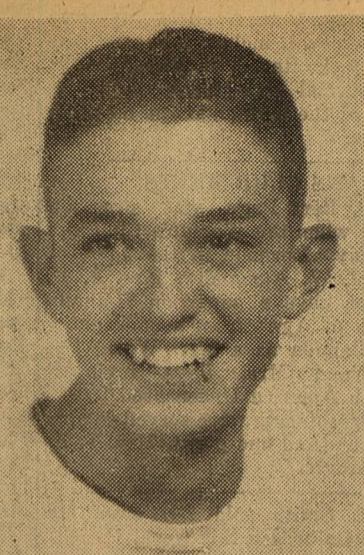
### METHODIST W. M. S.

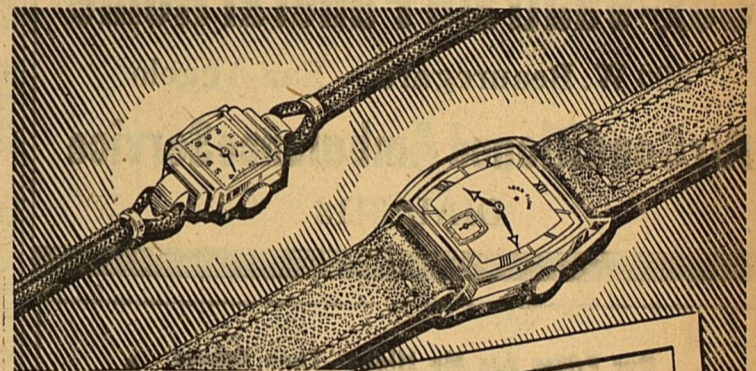

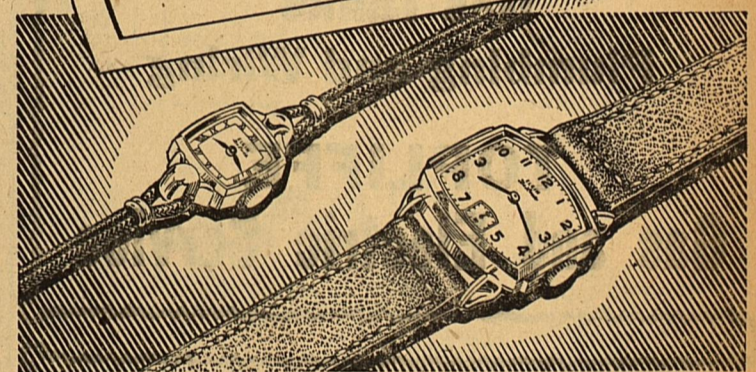



**VETERANS TO GET TERMINAL LEAVE BONUS CHECKS**

Of interest to Schleicher County veterans and others throughout the nation, is the fact that on Monday government machinery started pouring out about \$2,700,000,000 in terminal leave payments to veterans of World War II.

All Army finance offices are to receive this week the newly engraved five-year treasury bonds they have been waiting for to pay off millions of applications already on file.

Bonds must be used in settling most claims totalling more than \$50 for the accrued leave World War II servicemen and women earned but did not get before their discharge. Only small claims could be settled in cash, until the bonds were distributed among the 29 Army finance offices and the disbursing offices of the other services.

They were expected Sept. 20 but distribution started a week later. Despite the delay, Army officials still hope to pay claims within 60 days of the date of application. The delay gave reinforced office staffs an opportunity to compute individual amounts due so that actual disbursements could be speeded.

An estimated 15,000,000 veterans are eligible.

C. V. Carroll went to San Angelo Tuesday evening to visit Mrs. Carroll, who is ill in the Shannon hospital.

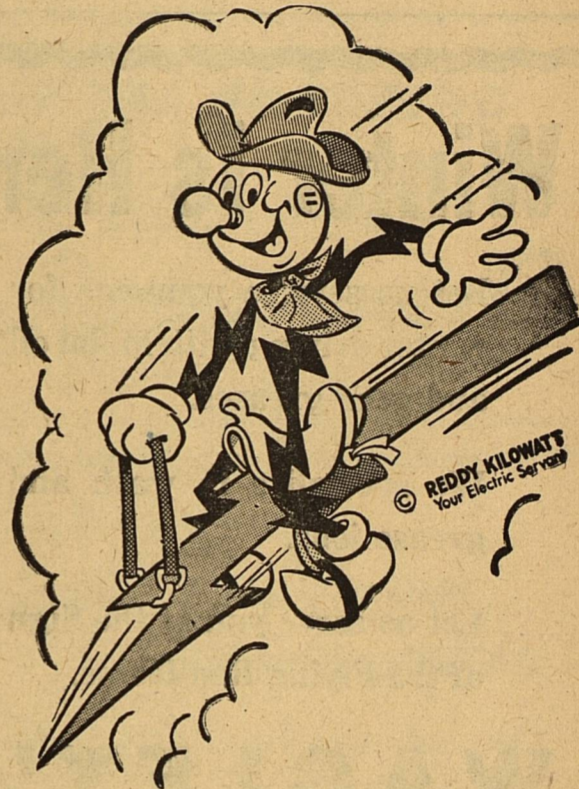
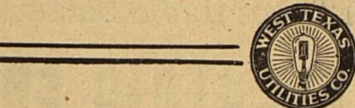

## 3rd Koy Well Being Being Tested Today

First perforations in the 7-inch casing, set during the week end in Cooper-Koy No. 3 are being made today, after a 24-hour delay due to mechanical difficulties.

Cooper-Koy No. 3A, south offset to No. 1A Koy, Schleicher Co., is the C SW SE 38-L GH&SA.

The acidizing crew is on location this morning, Thursday, and the 7-inch casing will probably be perforated today and the well tested out in the coming few days. Rumors from the field persist that No. 3 promises to be at least as good as the producers No. 1 and No. 2. No. 3 has been logging higher than any other test in the field.

Cooper 2-D Page, Schleicher Co., C NW NE 39-L GH&SA, has cemented surface casing on the bottom and will be ready for the Parker Drilling Co., to make the rotary on to location and take over, as soon as they are through with No. 3 Koy. It is assumed this well will be drilled next, though no official announcement to that effect has been made.

A recent development in the field is the announcement that Cooper Gas Co., will begin this week digging cellar and pits for a fourth outpost to the 1-A Koy, which is a north-northwest extension to the Page field.

The new test will be No. 4-A Jess Koy C SE SE 38-L GH&SA, and will be located a quarter mile east of No. 3A Koy. Parker Drilling Co., will drill this well too—it will probably be their fifth job.

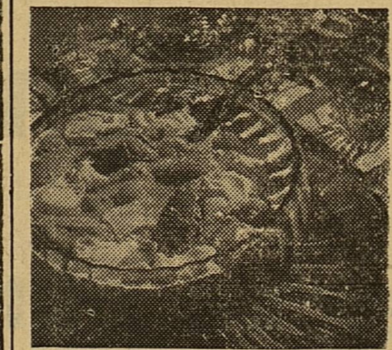

1 1/2 c. cream  
1 tsp. vanilla  
3/4 c. black walnuts  
Soften gelatin in the 1/4 cup of milk. Add remaining milk to pudding mix; place over low heat and stir until it boils and thickens. Stir softened gelatin into pudding to dissolve it. Remove at once from heat. Add sirup, cream and vanilla. Pour into refrigerator trays freeze until slightly firm. Then scrape from tray into bowl; beat with rotary beater till smooth but not melted. Stir in chopped nuts. Return to tray and freeze. Serves 4
