Annexation Vote Coming Up Monday

Angelo Air School Trains GI Pilots at Eldorado Air Field

The Eldorado Air Field is coming into its own as an important phase of civilian life for a group of Schleicher County veterans who are learning to fly here, under direction of the Southwest Air College of San Angelo.

As ex-GI's, the boys are enrolled under the government training program, and will receive free flying lessons from beginners' instructions to receiving of a commercial license. Instructors from San Angelo come to Eldorado daily to give the lessons, enabling the boys to go to school at the home field. Those who continue long enough to require advanced training will take their final instructions at San Angelo.

In addition to practical lessons on the field, Angelo instructors are conducting night classes each Wednesday and Friday night in the fire station.

Classes opened Monday with the following enrollment: Floyd and Lloyd Spurgers, Sam Henderson, E. Meador, Jack Whitten, Jack Montgomery, Tom Bradley, "Punk" Bridgeman, Red Butler and others.

It is expected that the enrollment will grow. Others who are not G. I.'s may pay their fees and take the lessons also if they so desire. Application may be made to Chester Wheeler in Eldorado, or the instructor at the field.

An event of utmost importance to the schools of this county will take place Monday, when qualified voters will go to the polls, August 19, and vote for or against annexation of six common school and Eldorado Independent school districts.

The voting date of Monday, Aug. 19, is the earliest the election can be called legally, following ordering of the election. If the vote is favorable to annexation, another election will be called to set a uniform tax rate.

In a page ad calling attention to the pending election, voting boxes are listed, the purpose of the proposed change is explained and the advantages and disadvantages of annexation are set forth. All voters are requested to read the explanation and vote their convictions.

A representative vote would be a majority vote, state school officials, who stress the necessity of obtaining a fair expression of sentiment, regardless of the outcome.

CRITICAL STAGE IN DEVELOPMENTS IN KOY NO. 2

Koy Oil test No. 2 will undergo intensive testing during the week end, as crew members prepare today to acidize, following setting of casing Saturday night.

As formations have followed in general those found in the discovery well, it has been taken for granted that No. 2 will also be a producer. Enthusiastic reports that No. 2 is "even better than No. 1" will or will not be verified during the coming weekend—but it is generally thought that No. 2 will also be made into a well.

Location for Koy No. 3, made several weeks ago shortly after the discovery well was brought in, is receiving attention this week, as the bulldozer clears away brush and prepares the location for spudding in operations, which will take place soon. The test is located west of No. 1.

Globe's No. 1 Tom R. Henderson, searching for the zone from which the Koy No. 1 draws pay, failed in the attempt—and the well will eventually complete as a gasser, for which it was brought in in 1943 as an extension to the Page field. Gas is produced through tubing set at 5,584 feet.

Work proceeds on the No. 1 John I. King Sutton wild cat, near the Sutton-Schleicher line, in which gas has been encountered. In view of the favorable prospects for this well, several lease deals are pending in the locality.

Dono Currie Enters Waco Vet Hospital

Dono Currie, World War veteran, left Wednesday morning for the veteran's hospital at Waco, for observation and treatment after several days in the county jail, where he had been placed Monday morning for safe keeping.

His mind had shown signs of failing for a week or more, and it was at last found necessary to put him in the jail while arrangements could be made for treatment. No definite time limit is placed on his stay in Waco, but it is hoped that with proper care he will show improvement. He was accompanied to Waco by Sheriff Sweatt, Skeet Mace and John Lueddecke, fellow Masons.

He had an attack of jungle fever while working for an oil company several years ago in South America, and later went into service. A discharged veteran, he is the son of Mrs. A. P. Currie.

CO-OP SELECTS 2 NEW DIRECTORS AT MONDAY MEET

Exercising their REA voting privileges for the first time, members of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op Monday elected two new directors and attended a barbecue and a show of electric appliances.

Registration, which started at 4:00 p. m., was followed by the business session, at which seven directors were elected: W. W. Sheen of Ft. McKavett and Joe B. Edens, replacing Ed Willoughby and D. C. O. Wilson, and P. K. McIntosh, W. R. Bearce, T. W. Johnson, J. Forest Runge, and J. V. Drisdale being re-elected for another term.

P. K. McIntosh, who heads the board of directors, opened the meeting, then turned it over to Lewis Gayer, Co-op attorney of San Angelo, who presided for the remainder of the meeting.

G. W. Haggard, manager of the Texas Power Reserve, of Austin, talked on the benefits of REA. J. J. Higdon of Corsicana, management division field representative of Corsicana, explained new methods of letting contracts. Present also were B. W. Chesser, service field representative who approves loans, of Waco, and Carroll Land of San Angelo, manager of the Concho Valley Electric Co-op. Don McCormick, manager of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op, reported on membership and progress made during the Co-op's brief period of operation.

At 6:00 p. m. the group dispersed to the courthouse grounds, where a barbecue supper was served, after which the members and families attended an electric show at the McWhorter building.

Prizes were awarded to Mrs. W. F. Meador, a General Electric churn presented by Eldorado Hardware; Mrs. J. W. Davis, a heating pad presented by Topliffe; and Chester Biggs, a Westinghouse Electric roaster and cabinet, the gift of Elder Oil Co. and Sonora Appliance Co. The night show was open to the general public.

Possibility that the city paving project may start next week is expressed by officials concerned, who report that overhauling of a tractor in the local water works building must be completed before the work can begin.

The entire paving project may require three months to complete, and will start in one of two localities—the school, or the southwest area.

Good progress on the sewer extensions and new water lines is reported, with an estimated 2 months of work remaining to be completed.

Sewer extensions include blocks in which houses occupied by the following are located:

East side: Mrs. Whitten, Topliffes, Flora Riley, Wade King, Butlers, Bob Evans, Jack Griffin, Mrs. C. T. Sprull, Vernon Hazelwood, Presbyterian church, and other lots now vacant.

West side: H. T. Finley, Mrs. Putnam, Mrs. Dabney (half block along highway), Methodist Church, L. L. Baker, Dr. Wiedenmann office, Mrs. A. H. Green, A. T. Wright First Baptist Church. All lots in Glendale will have sewer service with the possible exception of a few. From the highway, along which some of the new lines are being laid, a line goes east toward the old sewer line, crossing the highway.

Water extensions include:

6-inch line into Glendale with fire hydrants.

4-inch line into the Mexican settlement with one new fire hydrant.

6-inch extension into Keeney addition with two hydrants.

Taylor Construction Co. has contract on water and sewer extensions, and Swope Brothers on the paving, a bond issue to cover both having been voted.

Part of the paving equipment arrived here Monday.

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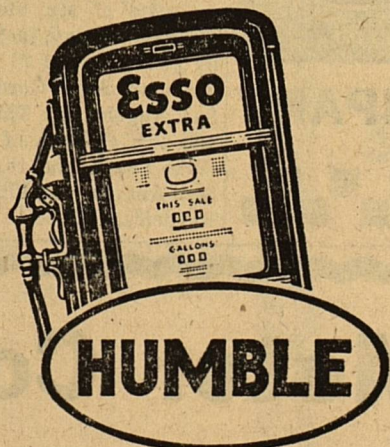

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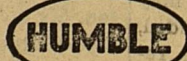

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto Section 62 providing a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; limiting the amount contributed by the State to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits hereunder from receiving other direct aid from the State; authorizing counties to provide and administer such a Fund for appointive county officers and employees after favorable vote in a county election for such purpose; limiting the amount contributed by the county to such Fund; providing for investment of Fund with certain exceptions; prohibiting recipients of benefits from said Fund from receiving other direct aid from the State; and providing for an election, necessary form of ballot, and publication on the question of adoption of this Amendment.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 62, which shall read as follows:

"Sec. 62 (a). The Legislature shall have the right to levy taxes to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the State; provided that the amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person, or by the State of Texas, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid.

"(b). Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county, and shall in no one year exceed the sum of One Hundred and Eighty Dollars (\$180) for any such person.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this State, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds

shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund; and provided that the recipients of benefits from said Fund shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless the Fund, the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held throughout the State in November, 1946, (being the 5th day thereof*) at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation System for the officers and employees of the State of Texas and authorizing counties to provide such system for the appointive officers and employees of the counties of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as "Section 7-a"; providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from the taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose; providing for the submission of this amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; and providing for the proclamation of the election and the publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as 7-a and to read as follows:

"Section 7-a. Subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction, all net revenues remaining after payment of all refunds allowed by law and expenses of collection derived from motor vehicle registration fees, and all taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, on motor fuels and lubricants used to propel motor vehicles over public roadways, shall be used for the sole purpose of acquiring rights-of-way, constructing, maintaining, and policing such public roadways, and for the administration of such laws as may be prescribed by the Legislature pertaining to the supervision of traffic and safety on such roads; and for the payment of the principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible prior to January 2, 1945, for payment out of the County and Road District Highway Fund under existing law; provided, however, that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; and, provided, however, that the net revenue derived by counties from motor vehicle registration fees shall never be less than the maximum amounts allowed to be retained by each County and the percentage allowed to be retained by each County under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945. Nothing contained herein shall be construed as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held in November, 1946, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less

revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that subject to legislative appropriation, allocation and direction all net revenues derived from taxes, except gross production and ad valorem taxes, levied on motor fuels and lubricants and motor vehicle registration fees shall be used for the sole purposes of acquiring rights-of-way for and constructing and maintaining public roadways; for the administration of laws pertaining to traffic and safety; and for the payment of principal and interest on county and road district bonds or warrants voted or issued prior to January 2, 1939, and declared eligible for debt service prior to January 2, 1945; providing that one-fourth (1/4) of such net revenue from the motor fuel tax shall be allocated to the Available School Fund; providing and insuring that each county shall never derive less revenue from motor registration fees than the maximum amounts and percentages of such fees allowed to be retained by each county under the laws in effect on January 1, 1945; and negating any interpretation of this amendment as authorizing the pledging of the State's credit for any purpose.

"Each voter shall strike out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting FOR or AGAINST said proposed amendment."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto. (Aug. 1-8-15-22)

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such College pursuant to deficiency authorization of the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows: "The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000.00) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31, 1937."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the next general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1946, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE"; and

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PAY FOR BUILDING CONSTRUCTED FOR JOHN TARLETON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. (Aug. 1-8-15-22)

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b, creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows:

"Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance by said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3%) per annum. "In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization.

"The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation.

"All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of the Veteran's Land Fund.

"The lands of the Veteran's Land Fund shall be sold by the State to Texas Veterans of the present war or wars, commonly known as World War II, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and such rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as may be prescribed by law; provided, however, that any such lands remaining unsold at the expiration of eight (8) years after the effective date of this Amendment may be sold to anyone as shall be prescribed by law.

"All moneys received and which have been received and which have not been used for repurchase of land as provided herein by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of lands and for interest on deferred payments shall be credited to the Veteran's Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II, in like manner as shall be provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds, provided for herein, for a period of eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on the bonds herein provided for shall be set aside for that purpose. After eight (8) years from the effective date of this Amendment, all moneys received by the Veteran's Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on deferred payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for the retirement of said bonds and to pay interest thereon, and any of such moneys not so needed shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Thursday in November, 1946, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

Those opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Fund for the purchase of lands in Texas to be sold to Texas Veterans of World War II."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date of the determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

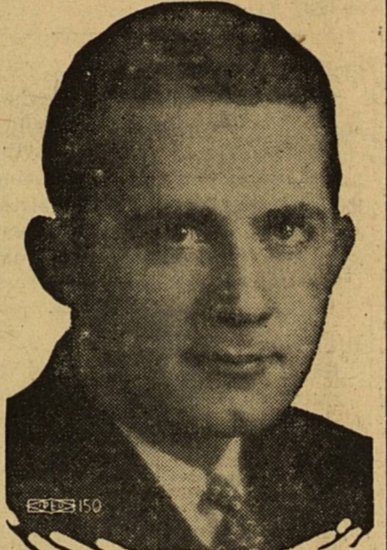

"I will not be swayed by these radical, minority groups—the C. I. O. noisemakers in particular. My opponent is welcome to the support they are giving him. I will continue to fight for the right and welfare and progress of our people who make up the backbone of Texas."
