Wiedenmann, local doctor, and Steve Manitzas of Steve's Ranch House, bought Arthur Mund's champion calf at the Stock Show Sale in San Angelo Monday, and presented it as a gift to the Schleicher 4-H boys who will sell chances on the calf in order to help defray expenses for the local 1948 stock show.

The Angus calf bred by Jess Koy and fed by Arthur Mund, Jr., weighed 868 pounds after 3% shrinkage was taken. It was reserve champion in the local show and placed third in the heavy Angus division of fat steers at the San Angelo show. It brought 44c a pound.

The prize animal will be on exhibit each of the following Saturdays, March 8, 15 and on the date of the sale, March 22. Sale of tickets at \$1.00 per chance will begin this Saturday, and the animal will be given away at 5:00 p. m., Saturday, March 22.

The calf will be processed free by Frozen Foods.

## WORLD TRAVELER STRESSES NEED FOR JEWISH AID

Dr. Joseph L. Cohen, of Los Angeles, Calif., world traveler, author, student of the Bible and a Christianized Jew, addressed a representative group of church people at the First Baptist Church Wednesday night, in the interest of orphaned Jewish children.

He opened his address with a synopsis of Bible history, and pointed out the famous documents of the world in history and literature, which have been based on Bible teaching. Stressing the appeal which simple religion makes to the educated or uneducated man, he pointed out the universal attraction of Bible teachings. He advocated stricter observances of the Sabbath, and spent the remainder of his time on Jewish history.

He traced the history of the Hebrew nation from ancient days, and pointed out the various nations which had experienced their own downfall after intensive persecution of the Jews. He gave detailed description of the plight of the Jews during and since World War 2, and based his appeal for aid on the desperate condition of the Hebrews and possibilities for rendering of help, especially to the children. An offering of about \$125 was collected toward the close of the meeting.

## GAS EXPLODES IN CALCOTE BLDG. DAMAGE SLIGHT

F. B. Calcote narrowly escaped serious injury late Monday evening when a match which he lit in his new office building caused a gas explosion.

The accident occurred after he had moved his Magnolia office to his new location, and lit a match when it became too dark to see—the electricity not being turned on. Gas had been turned into the pipes only 15 minutes before—the explosion would have been serious if it had occurred after a night's accumulation of gas.

Mr. Calcote, who had recently had minor surgery to remove several small tumors from the back of his head, was nervous from shock, but returned to work Tuesday. Breaks in the new wall of the office were repaired Tuesday.

## HIGHWAY CREW MAKE GOOD TIME ON MENARD ROAD

The Highway Department construction crew is cutting through the new right-of-way for the Menard road. The road bed to the Tisdale corner, following the old route, has been widened and prepared for caliche. From there the road goes straight on through hilly country covered with mesquite and rocks which have slowed construction.

Recently the crew have been applying caliche to driveways, at approaches to each residence and cross street, starting at the West Texas Utility corner.

## NEXT GAS BILLS TO BE PAID AT CITY OFFICE

Recent bills mailed out to Eldorado gas consumers are the last which will be paid to the Rio Gas Co., as the City of Eldorado is now the official owner of the gas system and will mail out the next bills.

The bills will be henceforth payable at the city office, as are water and sewer bills. Deposits which are being transferred to the city by the Rio Co., will be credited to the consumer.

Some improvements in the distribution system are planned for the future—to expand the business and to provide better service, especially in low areas where pressure is weak on cold days. Palmer West is in charge of the new municipal gas system and is already on city pay.

The building was unloaded Wednesday afternoon on location. Another will join this one at the rear and a third will be placed to make the entire court L-shaped, delivery on these to be made next week.

He has not completed plans as yet, but expects to add composition roof, and stucco the exterior and paint it white to match the trailer camp bath house. Each barracks building can be divided into two 2-room apartments or four single rooms.

Mr. Sofge, who owns a block along the new highway, started a short time ago to build the unit. He recently completed a trailer camp near his filling station, and he will re-open the station also as soon as repairs have been made. He is doing much of the work himself.

The highway department, which is building approaches to all residences and cross-streets along the new highway, was working Wednesday on two caliche approaches to the station, and Mr. Sofge hopes to add a third to the lots.

## WOOLEN MILL ONLY BLANKET MILL IN TEXAS

The West Texas Woolen Mill of Eldorado has reverted to its original status as Texas' only blanket mill, with the closing recently of the San Marcus Woolen Mill.

J. M. Christian, L. E. McCalla, Alvin Farris and B. E. Carr spent two days at San Marcus last week, dismantling and loading some of the machinery which has been bought by the Eldorado Mill.

The equipment which Mr. Christian has bought includes large and small pieces of machinery which will help to step up production and increase the output of the local mill.

The San Marcus mill after changing hands several times in efforts to keep in operation, could not make the business pay and finally decided to give it up and sell out the equipment.

According to newspaper files and other records, the Eldorado mill produced its first blankets in 1940 and the San Marcus mill was expected to start blanket production in June, 1941, the following year, though it had done some wool scouring several months earlier while it was set up as a scouring plant only. Until the San Marcus mill closed recently the two mills were the only ones in operation in the state. Thus the West Texas Woolen Mills is not only Texas' first woolen blanket mill, but now reverts to its original status, as the first and only woolen blanket mill in Texas.

A variety of weights, sizes and colors has been coming off the looms in the year which has elapsed since the plant filled the last of its Army blanket orders.

### SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Thad A. Thomson Jr., made application to the Eldorado Soil Conservation District for assistance on his 16 section ranch. The ranch has 1139 acres of cultivated land. This is the largest farm in the district. A complete soil and water conservation plan will be worked out by Mr. Thomson with the aid of local Soil Conservation Service technicians.

Technicians of the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District are again urging all district co-operators and others to practice true contour farming during 1947.

Contour cultivation is not an expensive conservation measure to install, yet it pays off in a cash return many times greater than the annual expense involved with its establishment. Through rows laid off on the true contour, the moisture from rains is evenly distributed over the entire area of the field. This gives even moisture for planting as well as an even growing crop over the whole field. It prevents having to wait for the wet spots in the low places to get dry enough to plow, plant or cultivate.

It is recognized that a single conservation practice will not do the job needed in conserving the soil and moisture; but now is the time to give this practice consideration in your conservation plans, and let nature help with your production.

C. L. Woodward cooperating with the Eldorado Divide Soil Conservation District, twenty-five miles northwest of Eldorado, is constructing level terraces on 180 acres of his farm land with his farm tractor and disc plow. Woodward is constructing his terraces with a broad base with sufficient height so they can be cultivated easily with four-row equipment.

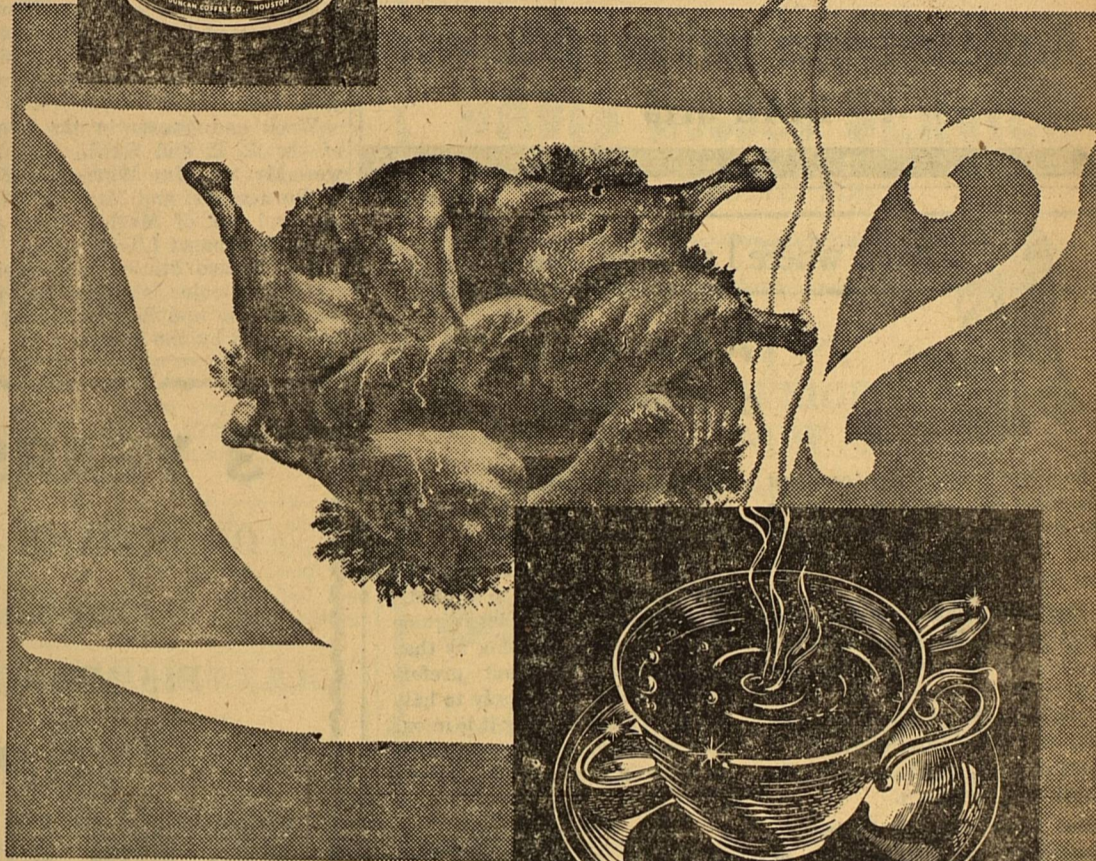

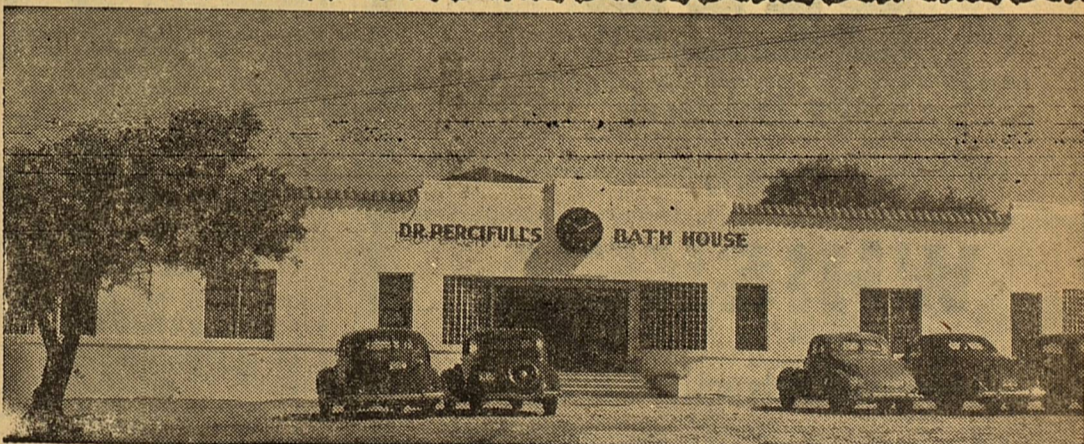

### KITE FLYING THROUGH THE CENTURIES

As far as is known, kites were invented by the Chinese about 400 B.C. In China, the ninth day of the ninth month still is "Kite's Day," when men and boys fly colorful kites of many shapes and designs—birds, beasts, dragons and fish.

Through the years, kites also have been used for meteorological and military purposes. Carrying small cameras to great heights, kites have been flown over forts to obtain "bird's eye" view photos of enemy installations. In 1894, Captain B. F. Baden-Powell of the Scots Guards constructed a series of kites fastened together, with which he lifted a man 100 feet! And in 1905, the Prussian aeronautical observatory flew a kite which attained a height of four miles!

It is not known when or where kite flying was first introduced in America, but the sport has become widespread. The kite-flying season is here again. Youngsters who want to enjoy the sport *in safety*, should carefully adopt the four good rules urged by Reddy Kilowatt.
