## AGED RESIDENT BURIED FRIDAY; AGE NEARLY 90

Cicero Enochs, nearly 90, pioneer Schleicher County resident, who operated a freight line consisting of horse-drawn drays in the 1900's, passed away quietly at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Lillie Craig, at 6:00 Thursday morning, May 8, 1947.

Funeral services were held at the West Side Church of Christ Friday morning at 11:00, conducted by Minister Travis Williams of San Angelo. The musical selections by the choir were directed by Ed Peel, and pall bearers were Don McCormick, Pomp Watson, Palmer West, Ernest Finnegan, Desmond King and Clyde Keeney. He was laid to rest in the Eldorado city cemetery.

Cicero B. Enochs was born on July 24, 1857, on a Travis County farm. He grew to manhood there, and married Mary Louise Clifton, who died in 1900. In 1902 Mr. Enochs and his only child Lillie came to Eldorado; here he boarded his daughter at the home of Eldorado residents, while he established a freight business which kept him on the road most of the time. He maintained several wagons and eight or ten horses to carry on the business, making hauls throughout the southwest from San Angelo to Del Rio. He carried camping equipment with him on his runs, and when in Eldorado stayed in a local wagon yard with his teams. During the 15 years he spent in the freight business he witnessed steady development in freighting facilities, including increasing use of cars and trucks, and improvements in highways. When he established his business he was so completely dependent upon weather that no schedule could ever be established, impassable roads often causing long delays.

Gradually the wagon yards disappeared from the scene as trucks became increasingly popular, and Mr. Enochs discontinued his business and moved to a Schleicher County farm, where for the first time he and Lillie maintained a home; three years later he went to Bertram to haul cedar, but broke his leg and returned to Eldorado 18 years ago. He moved to the sexton's house and was sexton of the local cemetery until 1932 when he moved to the home of his daughter where he has lived since that time.

Nine months ago he sustained a fall and had been bedfast until the time of his death. He was in excellent health through most of his life, in spite of crippling after-effects of an attack of spinal meningitis which he had when he was 18. He joined the Church of Christ when he was about 50.

Of his two sisters and three brothers, only the sisters survive: Mrs. Hattie Hancock of Austin and Mrs. John Tounget of Cedar Park, neither of whom could attend the funeral. Other survivors are one daughter, Mrs. Lillie Craig, 8 grand-children and 4 great grand children.

## WELL DRILLING, KILLING OF PEAR LEAD IN AAA

With benefits totaling \$64,537.49, the 1946 conservation practises were carried out in one or more ways by 180 farmers and ranchers of the county, this figure representing 67% of the 267 farm or ranch units of the county.

Leading in popularity was elimination of prickly pear, for which \$21,840.70 was paid, and second was well drilling, with \$9,996.00. Eddie Brown, head of the AAA office here, has compiled the following summary of 1946 conservation practices in Schleicher Co.:

Prickly pear elimination: 63 ranches, 28,239 acres eliminated. \$21,840.70 paid by AAA.

Wells drilled: 18 ranches; 4,998 feet drilled. \$9,996.00 paid by AAA.

Contour farming of row crops: 82 farms; 10,695 acres contoured. \$8,021.25 paid by AAA.

Cedar eliminated: 9 ranches; 1,463 acres. \$6,337 paid by AAA.

Terraces constructed: 25 farms took part, with total of 319,287 feet constructed. \$4,723.30 paid by AAA.

Mesquite eliminated: 5 ranches with total of 803 acres eliminated. \$3,951 paid by AAA.

Deferred grazing practiced on one ranch with total of 1,000 acres deferred for 5 months. \$120.00 paid by AAA.

There are a few practices of which less than \$100.00 participation was taken.

There are 267 farms and ranches in Schleicher county that have at some time taken part in the ACA program. In 1946 180 of these carried out one or more soil conservation practices, a 67% participation. Schleicher County's total benefit for 1946 was \$64,537.49.

## BIG RAIN WELCOMED IN COUNTY

Schleicher County received from one to three inches of rain during the weekend breaking a long spring drouth which was beginning to be of serious concern here.

The rain is of benefit to crops already planted, prepares the soil for sowing of feed and cotton, and is of great benefit to pasture land, on which grass had been turning brown under drying winds. A distinct improvement was noted in range land by the middle of the week, with grasses already turning several shades greener, giving an indication of what a little moisture can do for Schleicher County.

Many ranchmen and farmers report that the rain fell just right, with all of the moisture going into the ground. Heavy rains fell to the north and south, with draws below Sonora running high, holding traffic up for several hours. Electrical storms, accompanied by wind and rain, were reported in many communities.

The following are reports from various parts of the county: D. E. DeLong ranch, 2½ inches last Saturday; Horace Linthicum ranch, 3 or 4 inches; Bailey Ranch, 1½, some falling on Saturday and continuing Sunday; P. K. McIntosh, 2 inches Sunday night; Hensel Matthews, some rain Saturday, 1½ inches Sunday night; Odie Harris in Cliff community, 1½ in. Saturday and Sunday; Will Davis, good rain; Cooper Oil Field and south of there, two good rains. An average of about 1½ inches is reported for the county, with Eldorado receiving the least.

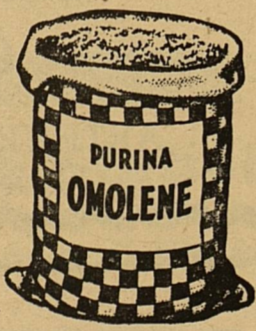
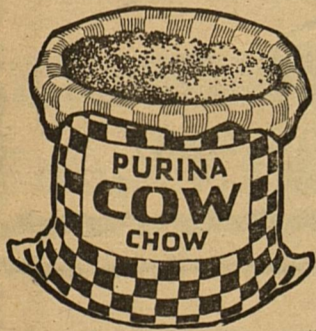

## Washington News Letter

By Cong. O. C. Fisher

Last week the House debated and acted on the Greco-Turkish aid bill. It was given the longest period of debate of any subject considered this year. It was thought by many to be the making of a new foreign policy—the Truman Doctrine. By this new departure, America frankly offers a hand to countries struggling to combat the pressure of Communism and attempting to preserve democracy.

Many who have been abroad in recent months believe that except for American commitment of aid to Greece, that country would be occupied—probably by Tito's Soviet dominated armies today. The surrounding pressure of Communism against Greece has been a constant, relentless thing, and the influence of American prestige in offering economic aid has been likened to a wet blanket thrown over the foes of democracy in Eastern Europe.

Washington now goes on daylight saving time, which means that the time will be two hours later here than in Texas. In other words, when it is 12 o'clock noon in Texas, it will be 2:00 p. m., in the nation's capital.

Of much interest and concern to the people in this country, and particularly in the South, is the report from London that 5,000 babies fathered by Negro American troops stationed in England during the war will be shipped to the United States. The London report says the babies will be sent to America "to save them from growing up as social misfits and from possible stigma."

There has been organized in London and Liverpool a Negro Welfare Society to help solve their problem. An official for the Welfare Society was quoted as saying he had received a letter from Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt "telling me she is interested in the scheme and is organizing funds in America."

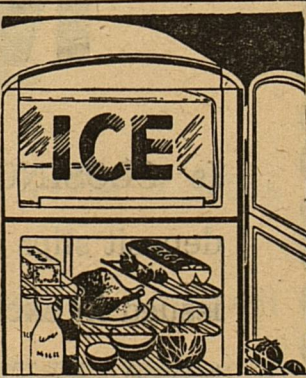
The State Department disclaims any knowledge of plans for bringing the Negro children to this country. I have expressed opposition to the scheme, but in order to prevent it, legislation may be necessary. And legislation is not easy to enact. It is believed, however, that the force of public opinion will make itself felt on our immigration authorities and discourage the move. Congressman Ed Gossett of Wichita Falls, a member of a committee dealing with immigration, has protested to the State Department and has expressed his concern over the English reports.

The Congress is now driving toward an early summer adjournment—probably by mid-July. 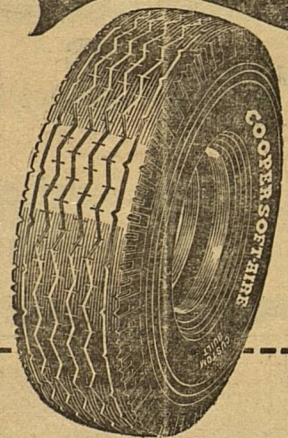

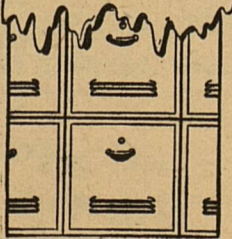

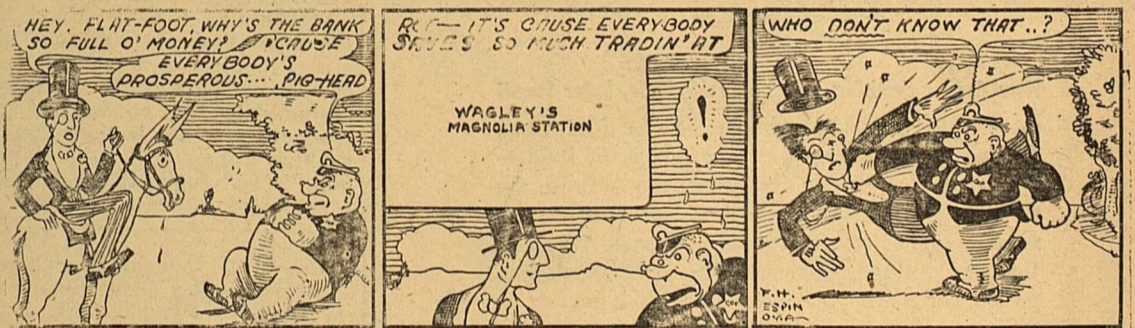
