Farm Stored Grain Okay For Loans

Eddie Brown, AAA administrator for Schleicher County, has received notification that the Commodity Credit Corporation will accept farm-stored oats and possibly wheat for CCC loans.

Brown states that P. C. Colgin of College Station, CCC loan administrator for the state of Texas, assured him in a telephone conversation today that farmers may store their own grain, and thus save the expensive moving of the crop to the bonded warehouse in San Angelo. This is the first time this offer has been made to local farmers.

To store their wheat properly, graineries built according to dependable specifications must be erected. It is necessary that the buildings keep out birds and rodents, allow for fumigation, and be of such construction that moisture will not collect.

Many Schleicher farmers are showing interest in the building of graineries. Joe Edens has completed his, Perry Mittel, O. L. Woodward and others have theirs under construction, and others are obtaining plans and making preparations to build.

Brown states that State Loan Administrator Colgin is urging all farmers to store their own grain. In the telephone conversation this morning he cited an instance of farmers selling oats at 36 cents on the open market, contrasting with the loan of 72c or 73c on oats.

Brown states that the grain can be shipped out to Commodity Credit Corporation receiving points FOB Eldorado, farmers loading the grain on cars here; thus the expense of trucking it to San Angelo, as was heretofore done, will be saved.

The Schleicher County ACA committee, composed of Joe Edens, John Williams and Perry Mittel, will select a CCC checker, to examine the stored grain for CCC acceptance, if the work is too much for the local AAA office to handle.

Certain specifications, with which grain growers are familiar, have been set up. The grain has to be in storage 30 days before it is eligible for loan, it must be comparatively free of weeds, must be free of heating, and must comply with other requirements.

The government requires that the grain be grown by the person applying for the loan, this ruling having been made for the benefit of the farmer, to ward off the speculator.

Officials state that it is not necessary to carry insurance to receive loan benefits, though it is better for the farmer to have it.

If grain is turned down on the first inspection, it can be re-worked by the grower, and another inspection applied for.

Loan forms are made out in the Eldorado AAA office.

Donald Charles Shipley, 7, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sid Shipley of Christoval, died of polio in a San Angelo hospital at 4:00 Wednesday morning. He had been hospitalized two days.

Funeral services were held today at 4:00 in the Christoval Baptist church, the Baptist and Methodist pastors, Rev. Clinton Eastman and Rev. J. R. Medlock, officiating. Burial was in the Christoval Cemetery.

The child was born in San Angelo, Feb. 23, 1942. Survivors include the parents, two sisters, Ada Beth and Jane, the paternal grandmother, Mrs. Tex Shipley, and the maternal grandmother, Mrs. Joe Kemp, of Christoval; two aunts, three uncles, and other relatives. Pall bearers were John Wilbanks, Louis Hale, Briscoe Dunn, and W. C. Swart.

Keep Property Clean To Prevent Polio

Schleicher county residents, who have noted the alarming spread of polio in surrounding areas, are urged to take all precautions to keep the disease from coming into this county. One suggestion made by county officials is for each citizen to keep his own property clean, neat, and free of weeds and rubbish.

In San Angelo a number of cases of polio are being treated, and in Christoval one seven-year-old child has already died of the disease.

The city of Eldorado is spraying the entire town with DDT this week, and will repeat the spraying in a few days, in an effort to kill flies and mosquitoes and destroy germs. Citizens are urged to cooperate by cleaning their yards, alleys and lots, carrying rubbish to the junk yards, disposing of garbage and tin cans, and keeping weeds cut.

Bonds Carried 3-to-1; Board Members Begin Planning for New Bldg

Schleicher County's \$475,000 school bond election carried Saturday by a vote of 302 for and 103 against.

Backed by this three to one vote, the school board went into session Monday night to make plans for the building of a new high school and an extension to the grade school, and other changes and improvements in the entire system.

Architects were present, to make suggestions, and to hear board members' views on various phases of the project. As soon as the architects are selected and contract made, plans embodying board members' suggestions will be worked out, and details discussed.

It is the avowed intention of the board to spend the funds wisely, and to be as informed as possible on what is needed to make a new school efficient. To learn what other schools have done with their building programs, all of the board members, superintendent Reynolds and the architects will leave Monday morning on a tour of inspection of schools in Sonora, Ozona, Big Lake, McCamey, Crane, Odessa, and Midland.

These schools have either completed new buildings, or are now building. From all of these new school plants, board members hope to get suggestions concerning costs and experiences other boards have had in carrying out building plans under present day conditions.

After their return home, the men hope to work out detailed plans for the Schleicher county improvement program. Within six weeks, all preliminaries will probably be disposed of.

At the Monday night meeting the bond election results were canvassed, and necessary legal procedure was mapped out. Bonds must be approved by the attorney-general—this may take about thirty days. By July 15 the money will probably be on deposit.

It is expected that a start will be made on construction this summer, and board members express the hope that the entire project may be completed when the 1950-51 school year opens.

Large Crowd Hears Stamps Quartet

A capacity crowd was on hand Monday night in the school auditorium to hear a program of gospel songs and novelty numbers by the Stamps quartet. The appearance of the group was sponsored by the Lions' club.

The Lions, who received a part of the proceeds, cleared \$55 on the entertainment. The money will be used to help finance club projects.

New Well Promised At Jackson's

Oil began flowing Tuesday from the Skelly no. 3 Mary Jackson well when a drill stem test was made somewhere around 4,000 feet. This paper has no official figures on the depth and rate of flow, but the well was described as "awfully good." Since that time casing has been set and cemented and the well should be tested out later this week.

We understand that the Baugh well has been making about fifty barrels of oil a day on the pump.

The above developments are expected to give the Schleicher county oil business a new "shot in the arm."

Good Crop Ripening; Harvest to Start On Wheat and Oats

A better-than-average grain crop is ripening in Schleicher County, and threshers and combines are being readied for the harvest season.

A few who have cut and bunched their crop are preparing to thresh.

It is reported that more combines are being used this year than previously. A few growers expect to try out their fields Saturday, but others state that their oats will not be ripe until next week. By Monday harvest is expected to be well underway.

The several days of hot, drying winds which followed the last rain have hastened the ripening of the crop. Wheat is not yet ready for harvest.

Farmers expect to harvest a good crop from the 10,500 acres which Schleicher county growers planted in small grains this spring—3780 in wheat and 6720 in oats.

Crops Weedy
Farmers who have row crops planted are taking advantage of clear weather by cultivating their fields, in an attempt to eliminate the weeds which the wetter-than-average spring produced.

Ranchers report that their land has responded well under the good growing conditions and that their sheep and cattle now have plenty of grazing.

Ollie Alexander, Jr. Somewhat Improved After His Operation

His main discomfort following the operation is trouble with an arm: doctors had to make an arm incision to find the vein into which they could inject blood plasma, causing painful swelling of the wound.

Road Program Calls For Prompt Action, Representative Says

Austin—Success or failure of the \$30,000,000 rural road program voted by the legislature depends to a degree on county commissioners, Representative Preston E. Smith of Lubbock said this week.

It is the commissioners' responsibility to survey their own area and determine where each county's allocation should be spent for farm-to-market roads, Smith pointed out.

He added that when their study was completed the commissioners should present their findings to the district highway engineer so that he can make recommendations to the state highway department.

"The quicker this work is done the better," Smith said. "We all know that the funds are going to run out before all the meritorious roads are built. The counties who first present their facts will be the

ones to get the roads." Farm-to-market roads will be placed on the basis of merit with respect to population and vehicle miles travelled, Smith said he had been informed by highway department authorities.

It has been estimated that 25,000 miles of farm-to-market roads will be completed under the program, Smith said, "and when you divide that by the number of counties in Texas, it's not much mileage for each county."

The Lubbock representative called on county commissioners to carry out their part of the program—including the provision of right-of-way—to insure efficient and economical use of the money provided by the legislature.

He said that while the appropriation of \$30,000,000 for farm roads—the first of its kind—was inadequate to complete the desired rural network, "at least it is a start, and perhaps in the future more funds can be provided for this purpose."

Smith called for conscientious work on the part of all concerned in getting rural road construction under way.

"If we can make a good start in Texas," he argued, "and if we can show that the money is being spent to the best advantage in providing roads for those who need them most, then I am confident that there will be no great difficulty in continuing the program and in expanding it from year to year."

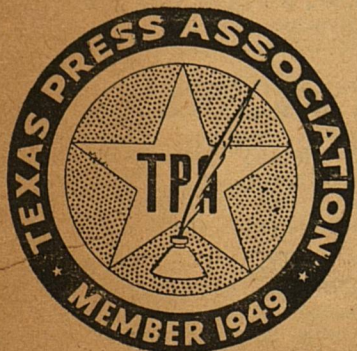

News was spotted on Capitol Hill last week. It was the pre-Memorial Day lull. In the cloak rooms there was talk about the British turning Communist. Gerhart Eisler loose, the Atomic Energy Commission got some deserved panning, and the indictments against Harry Bridges came in for some airing.

Then too there was the usual seasonal guessing of when the session will end. Normally, the end would come at the end of July. Senator Lucas, the Senate Democratic leader, has threatened to insist on continuing until the "Fair Deal" program is enacted. But Speaker Rayburn is known to frown on that idea.

The other day Lucas decided to agree with the Speaker, and told the press: "The President's program is rather extensive and covers considerable territory. It all can't be passed overnight. . . The disposition of Congress will be to adjourn."

Despite President Truman's defense of Chairman David E. Lilienthal, of the Atomic Energy Commission, Lilienthal's prestige on Capitol Hill has gone into quite a slump in recent weeks. In the first place, he defended the Commission's practice of giving \$1600 Government scholarships to Communist students engaged in advanced atomic research. At least two Communist students are known to be using such scholarships at present, and there may be others. But Congress is prohibiting that in the future.

Then too Lilienthal has admitted he was entitled to criticism for waiting seven weeks to report to the FBI the theft of an ounce of U-235, a highly valued and secret liquid used in atomic bombs.

Old John L. Lewis is expected to call his strike about July 1st and will probably let it run for a month or six weeks. He made a talk the other day to a group of career women at lunch and offered to answer questions. One of them brightened up and asked: "Mr. Lewis, what kind of hair tonic do you use?"

Prospects for inclusion of mohair in the revised long-range agricultural program appeared brighter last week after hearings were concluded on the subject. The House Agriculture Committee is expected to report an over-all measure in the near future.

Appearing with me before the committee last week to plug for the mohair producers were Ernest Williams, secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, along with Jake Mayfield of Del Rio, Casey Jones and Byron Wilson. The latter two represent the National Wool Growers' Association.

Briefly, we requested that mohair be given the same or comparable treatment with wool, cotton, etc. and that it be defined in the new law — if one is passed — as a form of wool.

Representative Bob Poage, of Waco, a member of the committee, was particularly helpful in developing our case and announced that in his judgment mohair should be included in the program.

We also testified before the subcommittee of the House Interstate and Foreign Commerce committee in support of my bill to amend the Wool Products Labeling Act so as to require labels of fiber contents to be attached to all upholsteries.

The law now exempts upholsteries from the labeling requirements and this loophole has been taken advantage of by some furniture manufacturers and dealers. Some of them advertise furniture as being "mohair" which actually contain but a small content of mohair. This practice hurts the reputation of mohair, permits unfair and fraudulent competition in the trade, and is obviously misleading to the consumer public.

I feel confident the bill will be favored by the Committee.
