Coaches Make Plans For '49 Football Season, Practice Starts Monday

Training for the 1949-50 football season will get underway next Monday, according to Coaches Ted Kirby and Bud Hopkins, who have arrived in Eldorado in preparation for the coming season. The two coaches begin their second year with the local team.

Players will receive equipment on Monday, and on Tuesday the workouts will begin.

In addition to the regular workout sessions, the coaches plan to arrange a number of scrimmages with the Lakeview team, who will be working out at Christoval. If possible, the Eldorado and Lakeview teams will have a public scrimmage at the local field August 20 under the lights.

Prospects for the coming year look good, with twelve lettermen (including six regulars) returning to the line-up. The team will feel the loss of Glenn Biggs, who was hurt last year, and Gordon Hamm, who broke his leg last month. Neither will be able to play this season.

A new team has been added to this district. Iraan, who won the regional championship last year, will be in this district and the coaches predict that they will be the strongest team.

SMALL TURNOVER IN FACULTY IS REPORTED

The smallest teacher turnover in many years is indicated by the fact that all of last year's teachers except two will return to Eldorado for another school year.

Two teachers, Miss Pauline Jones and Mrs. Haskins, have resigned to date.

As there will be divisions of several grades, more than these two replacements will have to be filled, states Supt. C. A. Reynolds, who has returned from a week end teacher hunt, and who expects to interview others out of town this week end.

Two vacancies are hard to fill, he states, these being homemaking and high school physical education. He also states that there is a statewide shortage of primary teachers. He finds more trained and experienced grade teachers available for the other elementary grades, some having returned to teaching because of higher wages offered.

Mr. Reynolds announces that he is still short of rooms for women teachers and apartments, furnished or unfurnished and that those with accommodations should phone him.

Architects are still working on blue prints for the new school, and it is expected that dirt may begin to fly by latter September or early October, following letting of contract.

Scattered Rains Fall Over County During Weekend

Unofficial reports received here show that the rain was scattered, with over three inches reported in some places.

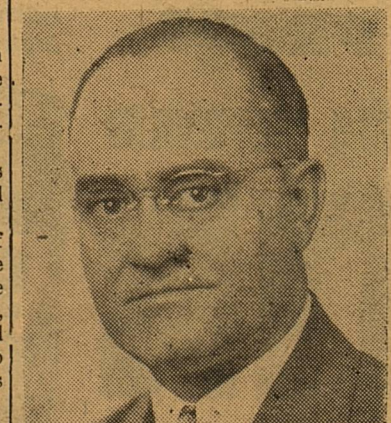
Scattered reports received early this week indicate that most parts of the county received some rain. Some unofficial figures are:

REPAIRS CONTINUE AT COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Repairs on the Schleicher county courthouse continue this month, as painters and carpenters move to the upper floors for further renovation.

All of the officials on the main floor have moved back into their offices and are in the process of unpacking files and re-arranging furniture this week.

One major change in the arrangement of office space is the renovation of an unused room into the new office of the county treasurer, Mrs. Mabel Parker. The office is located next to that of Joab Campbell, county attorney; the two offices will share the same telephone, number 25181. The county tax records have been moved to the new office from their old location in the county clerk's room.

Sheriff E. H. Sweatt is rearranging furniture in his office, as is county clerk H. T. Finley. One large desk in Sweatt's office has been painted and the top has been replaced. One light fixture in Finley's office is being replaced with a new one which will match the others throughout the building.

A terrazzo floor has replaced the old concrete in part of the main floor, and the words "Schleicher County" are outlined in the floor near the main entrance.

Inside walls throughout the building are being painted light green, and the woodwork is brown. The old cream-colored paint on the outside of the building has been blasted off, leaving the natural stone.

Seven Boys Will Participate In Range Management Contest

To date seven boys have signed up in the range management contest sponsored by the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation District for 1949 and 1950. This contest is being sponsored by the district to aid 4-H club boys in learning the value of good grasses on rangelands and pastures.

The supervisors have not yet announced what the prizes will be, but worthy prizes are planned.

Each contestant selects a pasture of range land which he wishes to use as his project for the year. An aerial photograph of his project is given each contestant, on which he outlines the different types of land, such as bottom land, upland, and ridgeland, in order that he might have an idea of the site's capabilities. He also marks fence lines, water sources, and non-grazing areas.

The projects of the boys will not be judged on the productivity of the land, but on the accuracy with which he handles his records.

The average income of farmers and ranchers in Schleicher and neighboring counties served by the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op is more than twice the state average!

This fact was brought out in a report submitted by Co-op Manager Don McCormick at the fourth annual meeting of the members Tuesday night at the Memorial Building in Eldorado.

Manager McCormick explained that the economic survey was made recently by Reuben Glazier of Bowling Green, Ky., who represents the Applications and Loans Division of REA. The survey was made to determine these counties' ability to support REA in designated new territory, and seemingly establishes this area's credit rating as unusually high for years to come.

"I've always wanted the survey made, and I'm glad they made it," stated Manager McCormick. The figures covered farm and ranch territory in Schleicher, Tom Green, Irion, Crockett, Sutton, and Menard counties.

Implications of these figures were not lost on the men and women who heard them, for all realized that rural areas in these counties, and the towns serving those areas, were in enviable position in comparison with other parts of the state.

435 Are Dined
A barbecue at which 435 plates were served opened the annual meeting of the Southwest Texas Electric Co-op Tuesday evening. A large gain in attendance over last year, when 285 plates were served at a similar barbecue supper.

An attractive display of electrical appliances, arranged by local dealers, was visited by the crowd during the evening.

The Co-op's business session opened at 7:30, with Manager McCormick, and the Co-op's attorney Louis D. Gayer of San Angelo, in general charge.

These directors' names were submitted for reelection, following a meeting on July 8 of nominating committee, Jess Koy, Carrol White and R. W. Hodge.

On August 18 the directors will hold their reorganization meeting for the new REA year.

Presented to the audience during the evening were three out-of-town visitors, R. M. Randerson and Gregory Haynes of G. E. Supply, Abilene, and O. T. Lodall, the Co-op's consulting engineer of San Antonio. Other visitors from the co-ops lines near Menard, Sonora, Juno, Mertzson and Christoval were welcomed.

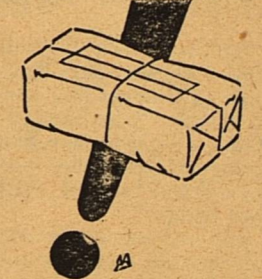

A public hearing to determine whether or not Fort Stockton has attained a population of 5,000 is scheduled Monday, August 8, at 2 p. m. at the City Hall as a preliminary to increase of the City's tax rate above the \$1.50 constitutional limit imposed on towns under 5,000.

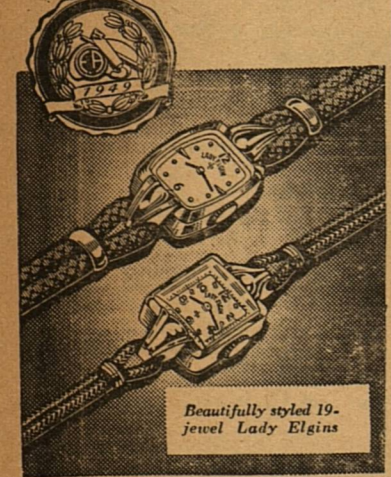

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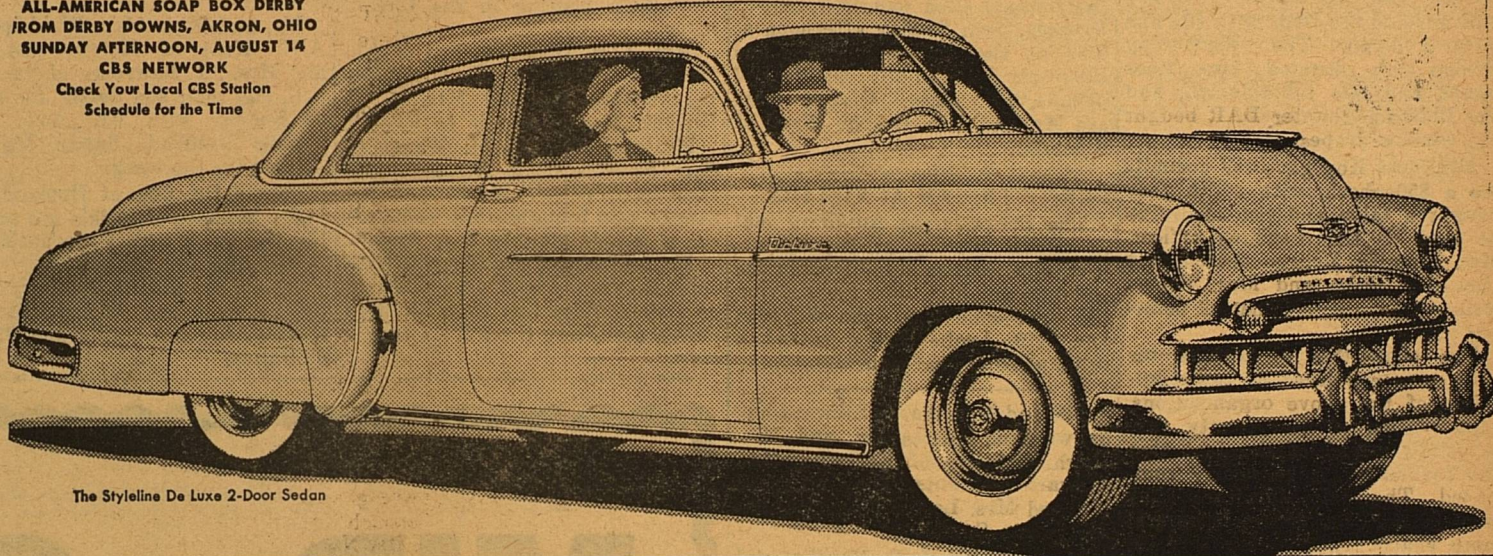

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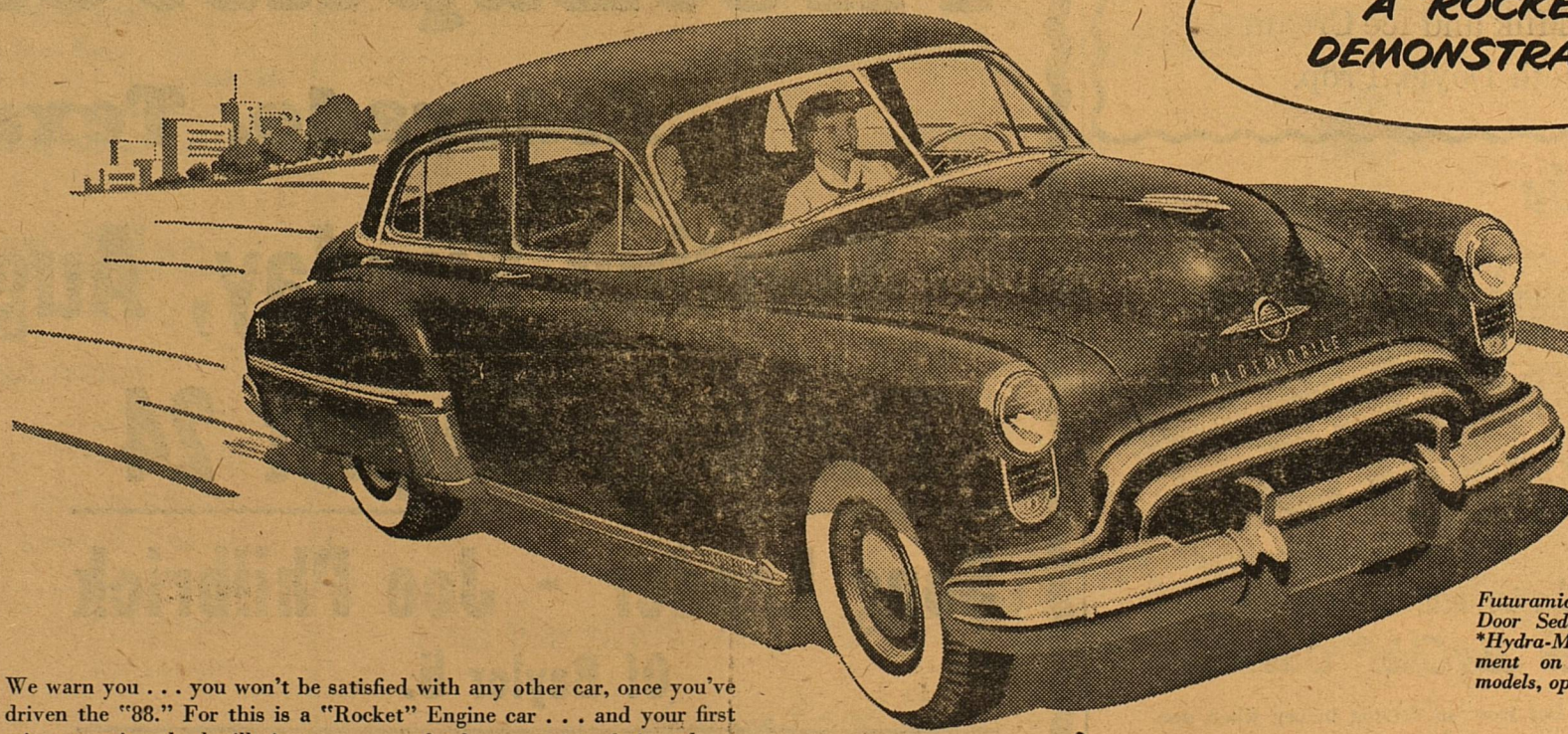
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Women Complete Furnishings For New County Club Room

LOOPHOLES in the Law

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of short case histories, all taken from court records, showing how legal loopholes often enable criminals to escape punishment in Texas. Will Wilson, of Dallas, is chairman of a special steering committee of the State Bar, which is working for revision of the antiquated Criminal Code and Code of Criminal Procedure in order to eliminate these loopholes.)

John Smith saw Joe Brown steal his watch. He had Brown arrested and the watch was found in his pocket. Smith told the officers that he had paid \$49.50 for the watch, and misdemeanor charges of theft were filed against Brown.

When the case was tried in the county criminal court, Smith said he had made one slight mistake. He actually paid \$50 for the watch instead of \$49.50. Since it was new

when stolen, it was considered worth the purchase price of \$50. Smith was a convincing witness and after all, he had actually witnessed the theft, so Brown was promptly convicted.

Upon appeal the case was reversed. The higher court held that the theft of a watch valued at \$50 constituted a felonious, rather than a misdemeanor, theft. Thus the county criminal court lacked jurisdiction over the case. There was no question about Brown's guilt, but he was given a new trial simply because the watch was valued at fifty cents more than it was originally said to be worth.

Such delays in punishing criminals, made possible by legal technicalities, hamper justice and encourage crime. Proper provision of Texas' criminal statutes, as advocated by the State Bar, would eliminate such technicalities.

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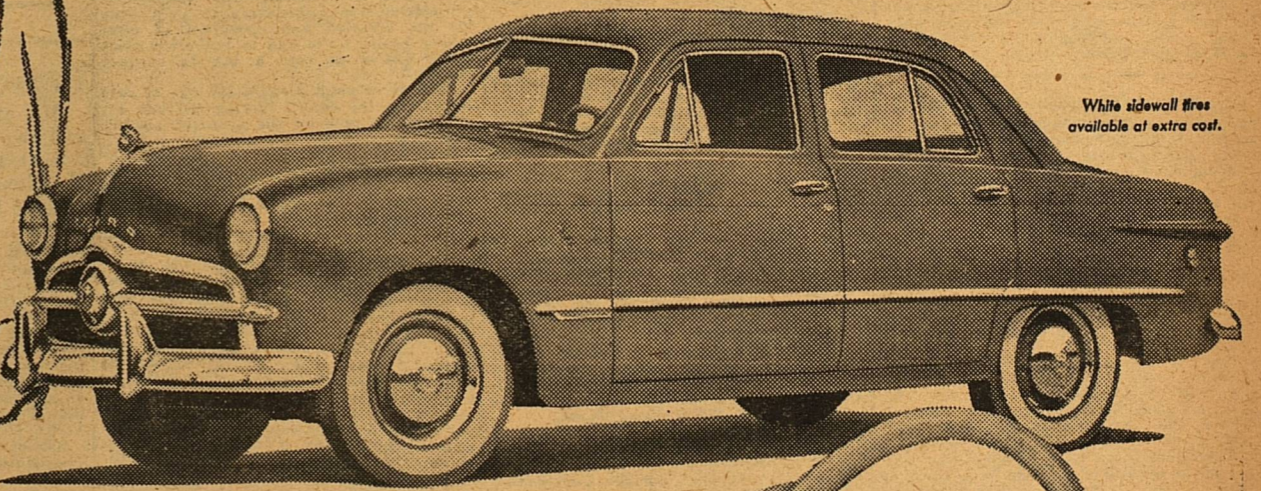
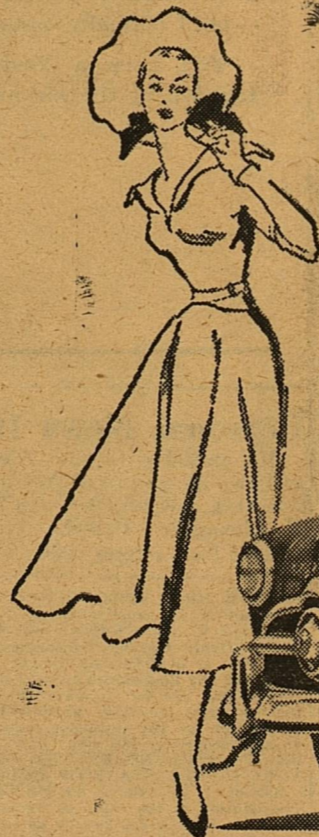

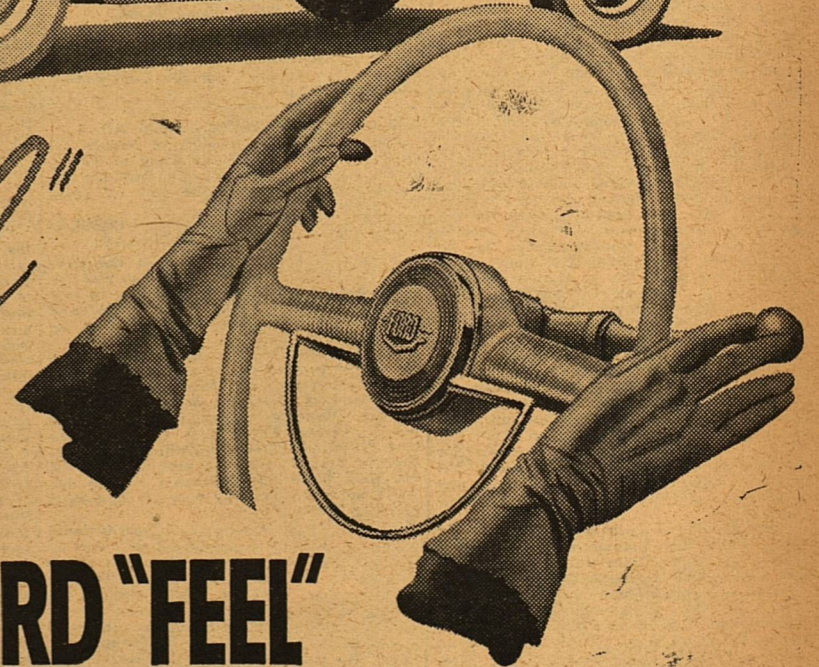
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HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D., 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases"; and

"AGAINST The Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, and the number of said districts shall be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, who shall be combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election. He shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; and he shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary."

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding."

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature specifying the time the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month."

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller."

Section 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year."

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session."

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Section 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D., 1950."

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a general election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

Section 5. The Governor of this State shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new section, to be known and designated as Section 48-d, reading as follows:

"Sec. 48-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide for the establishment and creation of rural fire prevention districts and to authorize a tax on the ad valorem property situated in said districts not to exceed Three (3) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the support thereof; provided that the tax shall be levied in support of said districts until approved by vote of the people residing therein."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide for the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR The amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election, and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return of the votes and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of the real property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendment thereof.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be designated 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be designated Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the people in each county. The administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 61f of Article III."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

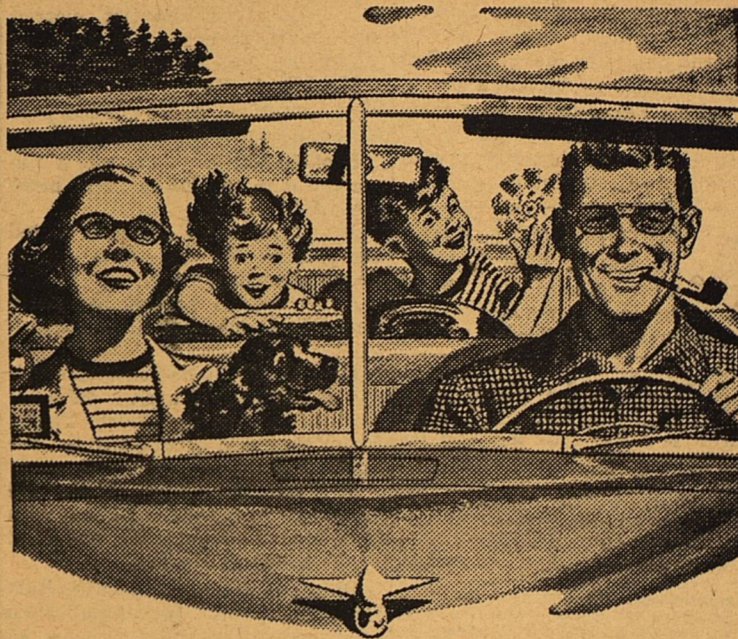
Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Section 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the next six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enforcing. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

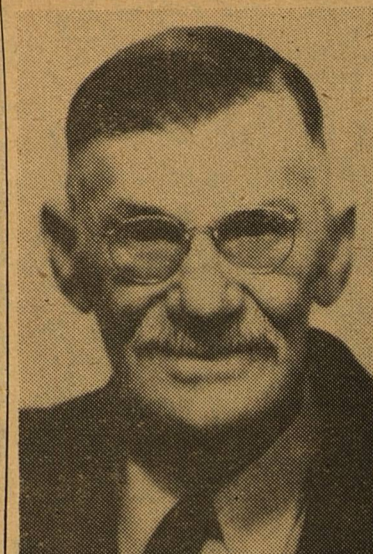

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Dinner Peppers

2 large green peppers
4 cups boiling water
1½ teaspoons salt
1½ cups diced lunch meat
1 cup drained, whole kernel corn, cooked or canned

1 cup grated American cheese
1 can condensed cream of chicken soup*
½ cup Fat Milk
¼ cup liquid off corn

Cut peppers in halves, lengthwise. Remove seeds and fibers. Boil 2 minutes in boiling water and 1 teasp. salt. Drain. Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F.). Mix meat, corn and ½ cup cheese. Mix soup, milk, corn liquid and remaining ½ teasp. salt. Mix ½ cup sauce with meat mixture. Put into peppers. Put into baking pan. Pour sauce around peppers. Top peppers with remaining ½ cup cheese. Bake 20 min., or until cheese is light brown. Makes 4 servings.

*Cream of mushroom soup also can be used.
