## MIKESKAS BUY FARMERS GIN IN RECENT DEAL

George L. Mikeska of Wall and his nephew, B. J. Mikeska of Eola, have bought the Farmers' Co-op Gin, and have re-named it Mikeska Gin.

The new owners have not moved to Eldorado, but they are here each day, supervising installation of new equipment which will modernize ginning facilities in Eldorado.

The new ginning equipment, most of it Murry make, includes the latest in burr machines and the newest type drying system.

These facilities will make cotton picking easier for local farmers, as the pickers can now pull bolls. The machines will remove burrs and bale out a higher grade of cotton, and can also dry damp (not wet) cotton.

The proprietors, who own and operate gins at Wall and Eola, have similar equipment there and Schleicher county farmers are familiar with its advantages.

The Mikeskas expect to employ a man as local manager, they announce, though at least one of them (probably George L.) will be here through most of the ginning season.

## Scout Hall, Lots To Be Sold Here To Highest Bidder

The Scout troop committee of the Lions club has decided to offer the present concrete scout building and lot (100 x 140 ft.) for sale to the highest bidder. The army barracks building will be removed. Bids are being received by Joe M. Christian until Sept. 1.

The purpose of this action is to realize enough profit to buy another lot, move the barracks building onto it, and remodel it into a building for the scouts.

The Scout lot is located across the street south of the elementary building, on the paving.

## Conservationists Conduct Field Day

The fourth in a series of field days being conducted by personnel of the Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation district was held Friday at the Edward Meador ranch.

The need for soil and water conservation was discussed together with the aims and purposes of the soil conservation service.

Soil temperatures were compared and moisture penetration from the recent rain was determined. This was followed by a discussion of the various native grasses and of range condition classes.

## Leslie Baker Rounds Out 25 Years As Employee Of Bank



The month of July, 1949, marks Leslie Baker's twenty-fifth year with the local First National Bank. Baker, who began work in the bank as bookkeeper, is now assistant cashier.

During his twenty-five years of service with the bank, Baker has seen many changes and much growth in that institution. When he was employed, in July 1924, the bank was located in the building which now houses the pool hall, and had only two employees, J. B. Christian and W. O. Alexander.

Although this building had been built for and was owned by the bank, it was inconveniently arranged, the employees recall. The vault was in the middle of the building, with tellers' windows in front of it, and the directors' room behind it.

Baker and his wife, the former Zelah Shugart, were married while both were in high school, and he worked for a year or two as clerk and delivery man in the Robinson general store. When business at the bank became too much for Alexander and Christian to do, they took on a third man, Baker, as bookkeeper.

During the years, Baker has been active in civic work. He has been mayor of Eldorado and was secretary of the school board for many years. He is now assistant secretary.

In addition to his position at the bank, Baker is an accountant and does income tax work for several local firms. He and James McDonald maintain an insurance office in the Eldo Hotel building.

## CONSTRUCTION OF HUMBLE PIPE LINE WILL CONNECT WEST TEXAS & GULF

The new Humble pipe line which is scheduled to cross Schleicher county is an \$18 million construction job, with the completed line to form a direct route from Kemper, Reagan county, to the Gulf coast. Construction of the new line will begin toward the end of 1949, according to announcement received here, and will be completed around the middle of 1950. The new line will be of 18-inch pipe.

It is being built to provide a more economical transportation system for Humble from West Texas, to Baytown by way of West Central Texas which has a capacity of 50,000 barrels per day. No changes are contemplated in Humble's other line from West Texas with a capacity of 70,000 barrels per day to Corpus Christi.

## Five Tests Drilling In Scattered Points In Schleicher County

Surface casing has been set on a wildcat on B. M. Boyd land in the extreme northeast corner of Schleicher county. The test will be made by Jergins Oil company, San Antonio, of which Carlyle F. Lynton is manager. The test is in Section 94, northwest of northeast corner. There are no producers in that area. Boyd is a non-resident of Schleicher county.

Ohio has reached a depth of 1600 feet on their test on Baugh land, Section 7, Block M.

Spudder trouble has delayed the moving of rotary to Honolulu's test on Joe Tisdale land.

Western Drilling company employed to deepen the Virge Tisdale L. W. Elliott Trustee test, is drilling tight.

Lone Star is past 5800 on their wildcat on Pimson land, Section 69. In the Jackson field drilling is dormant at present, and the oil from the two producers is being trucked out.

Report is current that Sinclair Prairie is making a deal for core drilling in the western half of Schleicher and Eastern Crockett.

## Orchard Cleanup Will Help Insure Next Year's Crop

An orchard in Schleicher county means that the owner has spent much time, and done regular watering, on it each spring and summer. A great deal can be done after the fruit is picked, however, to ensure a successful crop the next year.

When the fruit is off the trees and eaten, the orchard owner has an opportunity to do some of the jobs that were put off during the growing season. Sucker sprouts are growing on both young and old trees and they should be removed; otherwise, they will make additional growth during the next 60 days and will take up plant food and moisture that is needed by the tree.

An orchard clean-up program is also in order. Remove from the orchard all fruit that has fallen to the ground—it's probably full of worms and other insects and diseases that could cause a lot of trouble in the orchard next year. An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, and a thorough clean-up is that ounce of prevention!

Every tree in the orchard should be checked for San Jose scale, phony and other insects and diseases. If San Jose scale is found, mark the tree and then go back and treat it. A & M specialists recommend washing the tree with a mixture of 1 pound of concentrated lime sulphur and 3 gallons of water. Apply the liquid to the frame work branches and the body of the tree; this should hold the scale in check until a thorough job of spraying can be done this winter. If the scale is left unchecked, it may kill the tree. Keep the solution off the leaves if possible, because it will burn them.

The use of a DDT spray mixture for controlling peach borers is becoming more popular. It is made by mixing 3 pounds of 50 percent wettable DDT powder in 50 gallons of water. Spray the body of the tree thoroughly with the mixture. Although the first application is usually made in early July, a second in early August and a third in early September, there has been little evidence of early borer damage and it is probable that an early August and September spraying will be effective.

In some of the older bearing orchards, a disease known as phony has appeared this year. It is characterized by a checking of the current season's growth and the leaves on infected trees take on a peculiar dark green color. The fruit on infected trees is smaller than usual and the crop is light. Trees suspected of having this disease should be removed from the orchard because they are a probable source of infection.

Trees that were abnormal this season and have been on the sick list should be removed and this also applies to those infected with crown gall, nematodes or oak root rot.

## Susan Peak Oil To Flow Thru Line To Shell Station

Republic has started work on a pipe line from the Susan Peak oil field near Christoval, Tom Green County, to the Shell pumping station in Schleicher county.

Surveyors have mapped out the route, and right-of-way has been bought through the Cecil Meador pasture.

The line will be a 4-inch line, about 45 miles long. It is understood that it will be completed by October 1.

This is the second new pipe line for Schleicher county, an 18-inch line paralleling Shell having been started recently by Humble. Both will provide taxable property for Schleicher county.


Clothes to be shown will include those for women, high school, and college girls, pre-school girls, and pre-school boys. Models will be club members and others.







Is the amount of grass produced altogether the result of the amount of rain a rancher gets, or is it the condition of his range and how well his soil takes up moisture and makes it available to plants? The Eldorado-Divide Soil Conservation personnel believe that the condition of rangeland is a big factor in grass production.

The rate of water intake and storage capacity of any soil type varies with the amount of organic material in the soil. Organic material in grassland soils, includes living and dead plant parts, living and dead organisms and humus. The decay of leaves and the formation of humus improves the fertility, physical condition and water holding capacity of the soil, state soil conservation workers.

Do we keep our pastures in the condition that we can retain all the moisture that falls? Or do we lose a big part of it from run-off or evaporation because of not having a good cover on the range?

As Paul Walser, State Soil Conservationist from Temple, pointed out at a conservation program in Sonora a few weeks ago, by the time run-off is figured, many ranchmen's two-inch rains dwindle down to less than half an inch of usable moisture.

That must have been what one rancher was talking about when he said, "18 inches of rainfall doesn't go as far now as 9 inches used to go."

Range conservation means improving the vegetation in such a way as to conserve the moisture that falls and hold the productive soil in place.

Mr. Walser gave an example of a range with fair cover retaining 70% of the moisture, but poor range keeping only 35%. Water tests equivalent to intense rain showed that water penetrated into the soil on fair range five-and-a-half minutes before it began to run off. On poor range the water began to run off in two minutes.

"It takes water to make grass, but it takes grass to make water count," Walser said. "Drouths hurt more than they used to. Vegetation cover is thinner, the surface harder, and it takes more rainfall than it once did to soak the soil."

Mr. Walser went on to say that producers who do not practice conservation are continuously getting in worse shape and that some ranges are in such bad condition already that rains are more destructive than beneficial.

When the fertility and cover is gone, the water won't stay home. Fertility is like a sponge; it soaks up water. On the worn-out farms and ranches, you find water goes the same route as the soil. Some springs that old timers figured would always run have dried up. That doesn't mean it has rained less. The water just went down the draws instead of soaking into the soil.

The answer to water conservation problems is about the same as the cure for soil erosion. Those dried up springs can be made to run again if fertility and grass cover are put back on the ranges.

### Eldorado Wool Co. Buys Moisture Tester

The Eldorado Wool Company, local dealer in grain and feeds, received and installed this week a Steinlite Electronic moisture tester for rapidly determining the moisture content of any grain.

The value of grain of any kind, whether sold in the open market, handled through government loan, or stored on the farm for home consumption, is governed by test weight, purity, and moisture content. Testing for weight is a simple process, and purity is a visible factor which can be estimated very closely, but to determine the moisture present can only be accomplished accurately by elaborate and expensive equipment especially designed for that purpose.

The installation of this type of equipment provides this community with a long needed facility, and in addition to determining market factors influencing grain values, will provide the farmer with a service enabling him to determine the range of safety under which he may store grain in his own bins on the farm.

### Aberdeen - Angus To Be Featured At '49 State Fair

Schleicher county ranchers will be interested in plans made for the livestock show at the 1949 State Fair of Texas, for which an exhibition of 500 top Aberdeen Angus cattle will form the major attraction.

The National Aberdeen-Angus Show, Oct. 8-13, offers a bulging premium list of \$11,500, and will attract entries from every state which produces the black hornless breed.

Climax of the show will come Oct. 12 with the National Aberdeen Angus sale in charge of Tommy Brock of Camp San Saba, prominent Texas breeder.

Judging dates are Oct. 11 and 12, with a banquet the night of Oct. 12 at the Baker Hotel, where State Fair Angus awards will be made.

Aberdeen Angus cattle since the 16th century have furnished most of the famous "roast beef of Merry England." Stemming from the native cattle of the shires of Aberdeen and Angus in rugged northern Scotland, the breed's development is one of the most interesting chapters in animal husbandry.

First imported to the United States in 1873, the breed soon proved it could hold its own with the long established Shorthorns and Herefords.

More than 1,000,000 purebreds have been registered with the national association since the breed was first imported to the U. S. and countless thousands of animals bear the characteristics of the breed—the hornless head and uniform body conformation with solid black color.

At the Fat Stock Show in Chicago, Aberdeen Angus steers have won 75% of the grand championships in the four major divisions during the past 43 years. In 41 of 43 carcass contests in the same show, the grand champion beef carcass has been from an Angus steer.

Happy Shahan of Bracketville is president of the Texas Aberdeen Angus Association.

### Radar Efficiency Greatly Increased By Texas Research

Efficiency of radar, wartime development for electronic "seeing" is expected to be greatly increased as result of experiments recently completed at Galveston by University of Texas scientists.

The researchers, headed by Dr. F. E. Brooks, Jr., associate professor of electrical engineering, spent six weeks measuring the effects of weather on radar waves.

Moisture in the air has a bending effect on the waves, sometimes extending their range far beyond the horizon, Dr. Brooks explains. He and his associates hope to compile data that will enable ship pilots to determine, by studying moisture conditions, the efficient range of their radar equipment.

The experiments were carried out by sending radar waves from an oil well rig on an off-shore island to a receiver on the east end of the Galveston Island seawall. Simultaneously, readings were taken of temperature and moisture content of the air at various levels above the water.







HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the valorem of properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people of said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT AND CREATION OF HOSPITAL DISTRICTS."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT AND CREATION OF HOSPITAL DISTRICTS."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; and for the following:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D., 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY PROVIDE FOR TRIALS WITHOUT A JURY IN LUNACY CASES."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS PROVIDING THAT THE LEGISLATURE MAY PROVIDE FOR TRIALS WITHOUT A JURY IN LUNACY CASES."

Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 27 proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer of a Judge of a Court in this State or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in the manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary."

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding."

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on November 8, 1949, at which time all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT THE JUDGE OF THE DISTRICT COURT SHALL CONDUCT ITS PROCEEDINGS AT THE COUNTY SEAT OF THE COUNTY IN WHICH THE CASE IS PENDING, EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED BY LAW; AND 'AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT PROVIDING THAT THE JUDGE OF THE DISTRICT COURT SHALL CONDUCT ITS PROCEEDINGS AT THE COUNTY SEAT OF THE COUNTY IN WHICH THE CASE IS PENDING, EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED BY LAW.'"

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year."

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session."

"Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months."

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4-5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

Section 2. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A. D., 1950.

Section 3. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS RELATIVE TO SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND TO COMPENSATION OF ITS MEMBERS."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS RELATIVE TO SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND TO COMPENSATION OF ITS MEMBERS."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office hereinafter provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR CIVIL SERVICE IN COUNTIES UPON A VOTE OF THE PEOPLE THEREIN."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR CIVIL SERVICE IN COUNTIES UPON A VOTE OF THE PEOPLE THEREIN."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 33 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be designated Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a state-wide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that no such system shall be set up to administer the state-wide municipal retirement system authorized by Section 51f of Article III."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at that election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATE-WIDE SYSTEM OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY PENSIONS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES," and "AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATE-WIDE SYSTEM OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY PENSIONS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION QUALIFYING WOMEN AS GRAND AND PETIT JURORS."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation for said election, and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and the returns thereon to be canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to Article 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax not to exceed one percent (1%) of the assessed value of taxable property in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon:

"FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PASS LAWS FOR THE CREATION AND OPERATION OF COUNTY-CITY HEALTH UNITS AND TO AUTHORIZE COUNTIES AND CITIES TO VOTE A TAX IN SUPPORT THEREOF."

"AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PASS LAWS FOR THE CREATION AND OPERATION OF COUNTY-CITY HEALTH UNITS AND TO AUTHORIZE COUNTIES AND CITIES TO VOTE A TAX IN SUPPORT THEREOF."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be designated Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a state-wide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that no such system shall be set up to administer the state-wide municipal retirement system authorized by Section 51f of Article III."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at that election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATE-WIDE SYSTEM OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY PENSIONS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES," and "AGAINST THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING A STATE-WIDE SYSTEM OF RETIREMENT AND DISABILITY PENSIONS FOR APPOINTIVE COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

State Library Books Are Available To Local Readers

Farm families in Schleicher county who are not able to take advantage of the local public library may borrow books from the Texas State Library at Austin. This tax-supported service is waiting to be enjoyed by anyone who is interested enough to write to the Texas State Library, Austin, Texas, for complete details of the two plans of borrowing.

For one plan, as many as six books may be borrowed at one time. The borrower pays the postage to and from the library and agrees to return the books within three weeks from the mailing date. Time extensions will be granted if asked for before the deadline date. This plan is known as the Service to Individual Borrowers.

The other plan is known as the Family Library Service plan. It is a continuous and automatic service. Families registered for the service may receive at definite intervals a collection of books selected to meet the particular interests of each reader in the family and books may be kept for as long as two months. More than 50 different subjects are listed and they range from sewing and house plans to farm machinery, histories and special books for the younger members of the family.

The Texas State Library makes it easy for the farm family to borrow books. The fact sheet which is filled out by the family shows the age, grade in school and the interests of each member of the family and this information is used by the librarians at Austin to help them make the best possible selections for the family. The family may select the kind of service it desires; that is, they can get another collection of books each time they return a collection or they can write for a collection when one is desired. This is an excellent service and it gives rural people the advantages of a conveniently located free public library. Any Schleicher county family interested should write to the Library for further details.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of a poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for each election to be held for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS ELIMINATING THE PROVISIONS IN SAID CONSTITUTION MAKING THE PAYMENT OF A POLL TAX A REQUIREMENT FOR VOTING, AND PROVIDING FOR A GENERAL REGISTRATION LAW."

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF TEXAS ELIMINATING THE PROVISIONS IN SAID CONSTITUTION MAKING THE PAYMENT OF A POLL TAX A REQUIREMENT FOR VOTING, AND PROVIDING FOR A GENERAL REGISTRATION LAW."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**



**Royal Meat Patties**  
Broadcast: August 20, 1949

4 large onion slices, 1/2 inch thick  
1 lb. ground beef  
1/2 cup rolled oats  
1 cup Pet Milk  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1/2 teaspoon pepper

3 tablespoons shortening  
1 tablespoon butter or margarine  
2 tablespoons flour  
few grains pepper  
No. 2 can peas, drained

Remove centers from onion slices, leaving 2 outer rings from each. Cut centers fine; mix with meat, oats, 1/2 cup milk, 1 teasp. salt and 1/2 teasp. pepper. Shape into 8 flat patties. Cook onion rings slowly in skillet 5 min. in hot shortening. Remove and save. Brown patties slowly on one side. Turn; put onion rings on top of patties. Cover; cook slowly to brown under side of meat. Meanwhile, melt butter; blend in flour, 1/2 teasp. salt and few grains pepper. Stir in 1/2 cup liquid off peas. Boil and stir 2 min. Stir in 1/2 cup milk and the peas. Heat. Serve in the onion rings. Make 4 servings.
