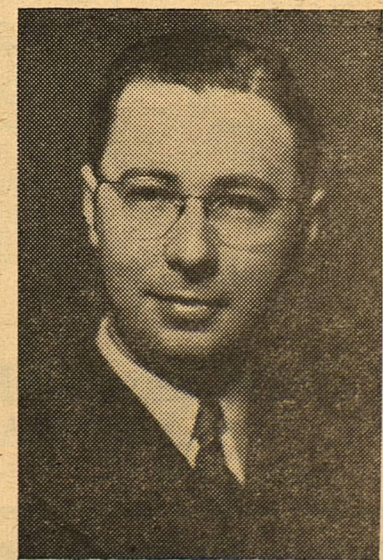

### SCRIPTURAL BAPTISM

(Matt. 28: 18-20)

Let us approach this subject with all prejudice removed from our minds, and accept what God's word says, knowing that it is His word that shall judge us in the last great day (John 12:48).

I. FIRST: WHAT IS BAPTISM?

Baptism is a positive divine command: Matt. 28:18-20; Mark 16: 15-16; Acts 10:48.

II. SECOND: FOR WHAT PURPOSE IS BAPTISM?

A. To enter the Kingdom of Heaven. John 3: 3-5.

B. For the washing away of sin. Acts 22: 16.

C. For the remission (forgiveness) of sin: Acts 2: 38.

D. For putting on Christ: Gal. 3: 26-27.

E. For SALVATION: I Pet. 3: 19-21. Here the Apostle Peter says,

"The like figure whereunto even baptism doth also now save us (not the putting away of the filth of the flesh, but the answer of a good conscience toward God) by the resurrection of Jesus Christ." Denominational teaching tries to do away with this plain teaching that "baptism doth also now SAVE US."

When Peter says "not the putting away of the filth of the flesh . . ." men opposed to baptism being a condition of salvation try to make "filth" (dirt) or "the flesh" mean Sin. It signifies no such thing. Peter is teaching that baptism cleanses, not the body of filth, but that baptism cleanses the soul of man from sin. Mark 16:16.

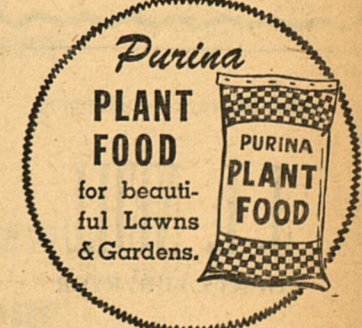

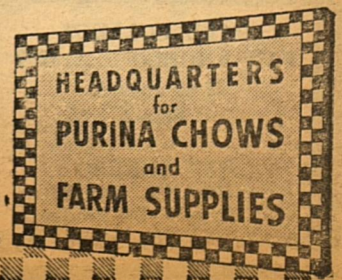

**Fireman Magazine Prints Local Stories**

**Information Received On Man-Made Rain**

The following information about the possibility of "making rain" with dry ice and other means has been received by W. G. Godwin, county agent, from the U. S. Weather Bureau, which has been receiving many inquiries from people all over the country on this question.

The idea is not new. Congress has long as 50 years ago appropriated money for investigations along these lines. The thought was then that cannon fire could make it rain. The prospects are somewhat brighter, however, with regard to present researches in the use of dry ice and other chemicals, although the public should be most skeptical about some of the fantastic stories that have been in circulation. Experiments have proved that, under certain circumstances and if temperature and other conditions are just right, moisture in clouds can be precipitated and released by dropping dry ice over the cloud from a plane. However, the actual rain produced by this method would only be a few hundredths of an inch if all you depend on is the moisture in the cloud. For example, if every drop of moisture were to be squeezed out of a cloud 1 mile thick, the yield would be not much more than enough rain to wet the sidewalk. A constant flow of large moisture-laden air masses is necessary to bring in enough rain to give relief from drought. One thing that meteorologists are presently attempting to determine is whether the initial precipitation by artificial means (experiments are in progress with other chemicals in addition to dry ice) touches off a mechanism that brings in the necessary flow of moisture-laden air.

Reports have been coming in to the Bureau that companies are being formed in the West and Southwest to produce rain under contract with local officials. It is often very difficult, or impossible, to distinguish between rain resulting from natural causes and that which is produced artificially, and it would be easy for a contract to be worded so that people paid for rain which came through natural weather conditions.

The Bureau hopes to keep county agents and others informed about the latest scientific facts on rain-making, so that communities will be fully aware of the circumstances before they contract to pay for rain which nature would bring them gratis.

**West Texas Utilities To Sell Bonds**

West Texas Utilities Company, a Texas corporation, has filed an application with the Securities and Exchange Commission in Washington, D. C., for permission to issue and sell five million dollars, principal amount, of its First Mortgage Bonds, Series B. It is proposed that the bonds, which will be dated Mar. 1, 1948, and which will mature in 1978, will be sold by competitive bids.

In announcing the filing of the application, Price Campbell, president of the company, said, "The growth of the area served by the West Texas Utilities Company has been phenomenal, but we think the greatest growth of West Texas is still ahead. The proceeds of the bonds proposed to be issued will provide a portion of the cash required to pay for additional generating capacity and other facilities for supplying the electric service necessary for the industrial and agricultural growth of West Texas.

The proposed five million dollar bond issue is one phase of an 18 million dollar construction program. This huge construction program, which is to be completed within the next four years, calls for the installation of additional generating units, construction and rebuilding of major transmission lines, extension of rural lines, and the enlarging of various other existing facilities. Through a system of inter-connections and power loop services, additional power will be provided from main generating stations. In most instances, power will be available to communities from two or more sources.

S. P. Harris, who suffered a severe heart attack recently, has been moved from the hospital to his daughter's home in San Angelo. Mr. Harris is the father of Odie Harris, who ranches east of town.

**Good Teachers Scarce Despite Salary Raises**

Texas will continue to have difficulty obtaining the qualified teachers it needs despite salary increases granted by the last legislature, it has been predicted.

"The high cost of living has more than offset the raises in pay," Miss Emma Brotze of Marshall, president of the Texas State Teachers Association, declared.

"We are grateful because the legislature provided a minimum salary scale of \$2,000 annually for teachers with degrees. That has made the average salary of our teachers \$2,500.

"The fact remains, however, that Texas is still under the average pay for teachers in the United States and that increasing cost of living is forcing many people to look to other lines of endeavor for their livelihood.

"The average salary of Texas teachers, \$2,500, is equal to a pay check of \$1,526 in the 1935-39 period," she said. "So long as high prices continue; so long as the federal government pays larger salaries for persons requiring college degrees, and teachers get less pay than semi-skilled workmen, I do not believe the profession will appeal to the type of person we want to teach our children.

"I am firmly convinced that if we are to staff our classrooms with persons properly trained to teach our children that it will be necessary to provide better salaries for our teachers."

**PROCLAMATION City of Eldorado State of Texas**

WHEREAS one out of every three persons who now die of cancer could be saved through early detection and prompt treatment, and

WHEREAS it has been demonstrated that the death rate from cancer, which is responsible for one in every eight Texas deaths, could be reduced by an informed public and existing medical skill, and

WHEREAS The American Cancer Society, Texas Division, is the recognized organization of Texas primarily devoted to the essentials of research, education, and service for the cancer patient,

THEREFORE I, J. L. Thompson, Mayor of the City of Eldorado, Texas, do hereby proclaim APRIL as

CANCER CONTROL MONTH and do request that the citizens of this city observe it as such.

IT IS MY further request that all individuals, businesses, and organizations within this city limit support fully the American Cancer Society's program of cancer research, education, and service.

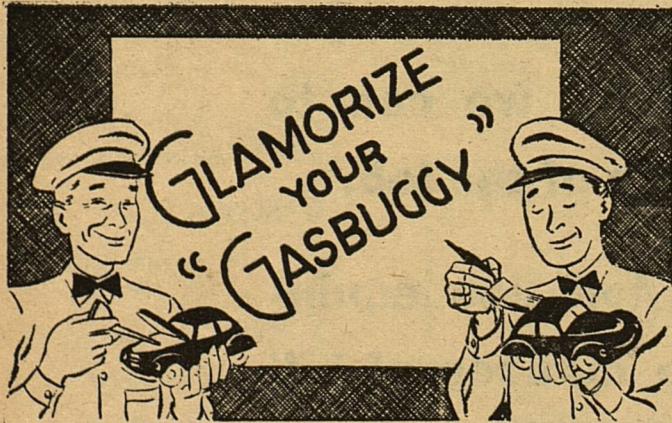
