837 People SEVERAL DRAINS ARE INSTALLED IN CITY STREETS **Get X-Rays**

Eight hundred thirty-seven people in Schleicher County were given x-rays last Friday and Saturday at the City Hall by representatives of the State Department of Health. in an effort to discover those having tuberculosis. P. W. Gauss, field representative for the Department, was in charge of the mobile health unit, assisted by four other men and two women from Austin.

"I am very well pleased at the response from Schleicher County residents," stated Mr. Gauss, who pointed out that more than onethird of the adults in the county took the x-rays. He said that the average response for an area is for one-hird of the adults to have the test, and that any number above that is very good.

The field represenative said that local residents were unusually cooperative in helping the health unit, and he wished to express his appreciation to each one who was tested. He attributed the large number to the advertising done by the PTA & Lions Club, who undertook sponsorship of this campaign.

He expressed his regrets that the health unit was not able to serve the large number who appeared for x-rays after closing hours. Some workers estimated that from 40 to 50 people came to the City Hall IN ELDORADO after 5:00 p. m., and were thus unable to be given the rays.



The thirty dancers, all men, were dancing back and forth to the pole to the accompaniment of Indian drums and chanting. The only illumination was provided by a single flickering lantern at the base of the pole. "We very nearly

left before we saw any of the dancing," state the Eldorado witnesses, "because it was a very frightening scene at first."

These Indians are very primitive live in tepees,' and still wear the native Indian dress. The Eldorado group also noticed an old Indian medicine man in one corner, who was trying to cure a sick man by rubbing him with an eagle feather. This ceremonial dance, which is performed only once each year, is quite impressive, and the Eldorado delegation considered themselves very lucky to see it.

The most amusing incident was one which happened as they were driving along a very mountainous ear, winding around the mountain with a sheer drop of several thousand feet at the edge. The whole





Fisher Reports On Special Session

As was expected, the called sesion of the Congress is moving slowly and will probably end in another week. Over in the Senate, the President's request for the passage of a Federal anti-poll tax bill was brought out and ran into an expected filibuster.

The Southerners don't want it because of the invasion by the Federal Government of rights reserved to the individual states to handle. Those who believe in states' rights contend that it is up to Texas, for example, to decide whether Texas is to require the payment of a poll tax as a qualification for voting. Moreover, even if a Federal law outlawing the poll tax is passed, and even if such a law should be held constitutional (which is doubtful), it would apply only to voting for Federal officials and not to state and local officials.

Other measures which are included in the President's so-called "civil rights" program, have little or no chance of passage at this session. These include an FEPC, anti-lynching law, and another against segregation. The FEPC Bill, which would establish a bureau to require farmers and merchants hire colored workers under certain conditions, is pending before a Committee of which I am a member. I am in a position to know it will not be taken up or reported by the Committee at this session. The FEPC is a "dead duck" so far as he 80th Congress is concerned.

The best and indeed the only eal solution of the race problem is through education and gradual progress. That must be done on a ocal, community level. It can't be solved by passing laws in Washington and trying to force people to change their thinking. Such attempts only aggravate the problem and set the clock of progress back instead of moving it forward.

A few months ago General Eisenhower testified before a Senate committee and defended segregation in the armed forces. In touching on the attempts to solve racial problems by law, he commented: "But I do believe that if we attempt merely by passing a lot of laws to force someone to like someone else. we are just going to get into troub-

On the housing front, which is one of the problems featured in President Truman's message to the Congress, the President submitted a report made by the Council of Economic Advisers. It was there pointed out that the "residential construction is expected to increase the total supply of dwelling units by more than a million during 1948." It is further stated in the report that this is about all the building hat available material and labor will permit, and that the building boom is inflationary because it is serving to drive costs of construction, including labor, higher. Already the costs of new houses are prohibitive and many believe that to subsidize such construction at present would run costs up beyond what they may otherwise behich are already entirely too







This growth was accomplished by the contractor finishing sections A and B, and the crew building, by force account, 21 miles up to August 1, 1947 and 86.6 more up to August 1, 1948, most of this in section C.

The year of 1947-48 is characterized by completion of section C, paving the way for starting of section D and securing approval of Sec. E.

Section C, which has received attention of Southwest Texas offic ials for over a year, is so near completion that only another week or two may be required to conclude the job. Poles in line extensions will also be up soon, if work continues at its present pace, though twelve miles of wire is still lacking.

One of two large projects confronting the Co-Op is 150 miles out of the Sonora sub-station, leadin south to Juno and vicinity and cov ering southeast Crockett. 
